



## Olsak's pecans take Grand Champion trophy at Texas State Pecan Show

Leroy Olsak and his late wife, Sally, owners of Eldorado Pecans are grand champions in the Texas State Pecan show in the classic division, with their prize winning Nacono pecans.

Beginning with the Concho Valley pecan show in San Angelo last December, then on to the regional show in Abilene, the Olsaks' pecans prevailed over all competition. The state championship judging took place in Austin, July, 2005.

The Olsaks' winning plaque was eventually sent to the Schleicher County Extension Office, where Mr. Olsak picked it up last Friday and was persuaded to pose for a photograph.

The Olsaks planted the first trees in their orchard four miles southwest of Eldorado in 1971. When asked to explain why his pecans have the quality to be state champion, Mr. Olsak said "good soil, good water."

Sally Olsak died March 20, 2005.

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## Cops catch 20+ juveniles at keg party Arizona man charged with supplying the teens with beer

More than twenty local juveniles were cited for Minor in Possession last Saturday and an Arizona man was arrested and charged with Providing Alcohol to a Minor after Deputy Kevin Herbert interrupted a "keg party" at a ranch some four miles west of Eldorado.

The incident took place in the early morning hours on Oct. 15, 2005, following the Eldorado/Junction football game. A motorist reportedly spotted suspicious activity, including an open gate, at the property west of town and called the Sheriff's office to have it investigated. When Deputy Herbert arrived he found a group of "twenty to thirty" juveniles gathered around and a newly tapped keg of beer.

Deputy Jason Chatham and Game Warden

Marco Alvizo also responded to the call to serve as backup.

Ray Mitchell Cooper, 20, the only adult in the group, was arrested and charged with Providing Alcohol to a Minor. Cooper, who is a citizen of Arizona, currently lives in Talpa and is attending school in Brownwood. He was arrested three days short of his 21st birthday. Cooper was released that same day on a \$2,000 surety bond.

It is noted that at the time of the arrest Cooper was not old enough to legally possess alcohol and authorities say that they continue to investigate exactly where he obtained the beer. His age does not prohibit him from facing the stiffer charge of supplying it to other underage individuals, investigators say.

Meanwhile, all the juveniles at the party (youths under the age of 17) were issued citations for Minor in Possession. Under Texas law the names of juvenile offenders are withheld from the public.

Justice of the Peace James C. Doyle advised the Success this week that Minor in Possession is a misdemeanor crime punishable by a fine of up to \$500. Juveniles appearing on such a charge must be accompanied by their parent or guardian, Judge Doyle said. He noted that the customary fine in his court is \$100 + court costs for the first offense.

It is not unusual, however, for first time offenders to pay a \$200 fee + court costs and receive deferred adjudication, meaning that the charge will be stricken from an individual's record if that person stays out of trouble for a period of 90 days.

## Ministry on Wheels still going strong, but needing your help

The citizens of Eldorado have a big problem on their hands and some don't even realize it. There are many people, including elderly, who go hungry or miss meals everyday. It is happening right under our noses. The reality is that some individuals don't know how or when they will get their next meal.

There are seven local churches who are trying their best to fill every empty tummy, but they need help.

Volunteers from local churches spend their Saturday mornings delivering meals to those in need. Ministry on Wheels is beginning the eighth year of service to those who are convalescence, elderly, or just in need of a meal. Meals are provided on Saturdays at noon and Holidays.

There are currently 64-70 individuals who receive meals, but there are many more that do not. It is in part because there are many individuals who do not know about the Ministry on Wheels. Also, these churches just can not do it alone.

They need help through donations or volunteers willing to donate some of their time.

Ministry on Wheels was started in 1997 by First United Methodist Church. This church provided meals without help from outside sources for one year by having weekly lunches at the church in order to raise funds. Seven churches took over this service with the help of the Ministerial Alliance. Churches that participate include: First United Methodist Church (the host church), Catholic Church, First Baptist Church, Presbyterian Church, Agape Assembly of God, Templo Getsemani, Church of Christ and Community Baptist Church. Also, Saint Luke Baptist Church sends donations on a regular basis.

Each church is assigned a specific Saturday. On that Saturday the responsible church can prepare whatever they wish and deliver it in their own way. There are no rules or guidelines to follow. The host church provides all materials needed for delivery including storage containers, disposable cups and

plates, silverware, etc.

Some volunteers like to add their own personal touches to their meals. For example, Kim Albin of the First Baptist Church took her kids, Madison and Austin, with her to deliver meals. She also took a couple of the youth on her delivery route on occasions. Those who received the meal were so thankful for the meal, but they were also able to see some of the youth of Eldorado and get some visiting in. This also gave the youth a chance to become aware of the conditions that our citizens are living in.

There are many people who benefit greatly from the Ministry on Wheels, but there are those who need assistance but aren't getting it. We as citizens need to make sure that every tummy is being filled and no one is going hungry. One meal a week is a good start at fighting hunger but is it really enough?

# Southwest Airlines did not censor travelers

A recent decision by Southwest Airlines to throw two passengers, a husband and wife, off a flight holds a valuable lesson about private-property rights, censorship, and the Bill of Rights.

The reason the couple was grounded was that one of them wore a t-shirt containing a photo of President Bush, Vice President Cheney, and Secretary of State Rice along with an obscene phrase that resembled the title of the popular movie Meet the Fockers.

While some would undoubtedly cry, "Censorship!" they would be wrong. There was no censorship in what took place here. There also was no violation of the First Amendment.

Contrary to popular opinion, the Bill of Rights does not operate as a control over private actions. Instead, its restrictions are limited to conduct by officials of the federal government. Read the First Amendment carefully. You'll notice that it expressly prohibits Congress, not private individuals and corporations, from depriving people of such fundamental rights as freedom of speech, freedom of the press, and freedom of religion.

Why would our American ancestors see the need to impose such an express prohibition on U.S. senators and congressmen? Because they knew that Congress inevitably attracts people who believe in depriving people of such rights, especially during crises and emergencies. After all, if the federal government attracted people who believed in a consistent honoring of fundamental rights, why would the restrictions in the Bill of Rights be necessary?

As the owner of its own planes, Southwest Airlines has the right to set any restrictions it wants with respect to people who board its flights. One of the restrictions that Southwest has implemented is: No obscene attire on board their flights.

If a person chooses to fly Southwest, he implicitly agrees to the airline's conditions for passenger behavior. By setting a "no obscene attire" condition, Southwest Airlines is not "censoring" its passengers. As the owner of the planes, it has the right to set forth the conditions under which the planes will be used by its passengers.

By the same token, while Southwest has the right to set conditions for passenger conduct on its airline, it cannot force people to fly its planes. If people don't like the conditions, they are free to fly some other airline or use some alternative means of transportation. People have no "right to fly" that would enable them to violate the conditions on passenger behavior set forth by Southwest.

As our American ancestors understood so well, ultimately a free society is based on the protection of private property rights. Thus, under principles of liberty and property, Southwest Airlines has the right to set conditions for passenger behavior and conversely passengers have a right not to fly Southwest.

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# Some folks are betting that you won't bother to vote in September 8th election

The Marriage Amendment, stating that marriage in Texas is between a man and a woman easily passed in both houses of the Texas Legislature and will be on the ballot for the special election on November 8. Many are saying that the thing is a slam dunk and will be overwhelmingly approved by the voters. Interestingly, most of the people predicting amendment's passage are actually opposed to it and are working feverishly to see that the measure fails.

What? How can that be? Why would an amendment's opponents be telling everyone that it's going to pass?

That's easy, they want you to stay at home that Tuesday while they muster their forces to defeat it.

Opinion polls show that Texans overwhelmingly believe that marriage should be limited to a man and a woman and if the vote on Proposition #2 was being held during a routine general election there is little doubt the amendment would be approved by a wide margin.

But there won't be any candi-



dates names on the ballot come Tuesday, Oct. 8th. There will be no hotly contested race for governor or president, or even county judge or mayor. Just amendments—dull, boring amendments. And...that's what has supporters of Proposition 2 worried.

Conversely, the supporters of same sex marriage believe there will be a low turnout and that they will benefit from it since their voters are motivated.

Other states have passed laws banning same sex marriages only to see those laws overturned by activist state court judges. Texas is trying a different course, actually amending the state constitution to take the issue out of the courts' hands.

In fact, Texas is the only state

where the measure appears on the ballot this November, meaning that it has caught the attention of virtually every liberal interest group in the nation. Those groups are devoting their time and money to ensuring that Proposition #2 fails in Texas believing that if they can kill the idea here, they won't have to face it elsewhere.

To that end, much time and effort is being spent to convince you that the Marriage Amendment is going to pass without a problem. Meanwhile millions of dollars are being pumped into the state in preparation for a huge get out the vote campaign aimed at defeating the amendment.

I know you're busy. So am I, and it would be oh so easy to skip the hassle of voting, especially if the amendment you support looks like it's a sure thing. Please resist that temptation and go out to vote.

For those of you who disagree with me about this issue, don't worry about it, you've got this thing in the bag. No need for you to go vote. Just stay at home and relish your victory.



# The Brown Ranch has Hummingbirds


The Hummer House is on Dan Brown's ranch at Christoval. It's been in his family since 1927. Hummingbirds have been fed there for 44 years, resulting in the largest concentration of hummingbirds in the state.

Dan is considered an expert on hummingbirds and gives lectures on their migrating and nesting habits.

From April until August Dan feeds the hummers 4 gallons of sugar water a day with a mixture of one cup of sugar to 3 cups of water (that nearly resembles the sugar content in nectar). Last year he used 825 pounds of sugar feeding the birds. He feeds other types of birds, too.

When we were there we saw several painted buntings, a striking creature with bright green, yellow and pink feathers. Dan puts about ten pounds of white millet a day for the buntings and cardinals.

He has an observation room with a wall of windows for viewing the hummingbirds. Large feeders spaced six feet apart are just outside the windows. His ranch is open to the public and has some guest rooms for overnight visitors. The

observation room and cottages are in a pecan and oak thicket, which is home to turkey and deer. Dan keeps them coming around by feeding them 45 tons of corn a year.

"It's a work of love and enjoyment and it's never ending," says Dan.

"This all got started 44 years ago with one hummingbird feeder. That year ended with six feeders and it's grown every year since then."

He says the number of birds has increased every year except one when a hailstorm destroyed about fifty percent of the population in ten minutes.

He built his first cottage in 1995, then built the observation room.

He's in the process of building two more guest rooms, one for families and one for anniversaries or honeymoons. Reservations are

recommended. Call 325 255-2254. Adults pay \$5 to get in the observation room. Children are admitted free of charge.

"I'm nearly booked solid all summer and nearly so in the wintertime. A lot of people want to see the deer and the turkey apart from the hummingbirds but we'll have a lot of other birds coming in that stay here all winter."

Dan works with the parks and wildlife department on a bird-banding program. "We've banded over 21,000 birds here in the last ten years representing 123 species. We have banded over 2,000 painted buntings at this location."

He has banded six species of hummingbirds. "The Rubythroats come in the spring, but they don't stay long. This is the largest feeding and nesting site of Black Chins in Texas. We do have Calliope and Rufus, which stay with me all winter."

Dan says most people think hummingbirds leave in the fall, but that's not so. "Keep a feeder up and keep it fresh and you'll have some birds in the wintertime."

# Perry pledges \$10 million to beef up border security

AUSTIN — Gov. Rick Perry on Oct. 12 proposed a security plan for the Texas-Mexico border region, saying, "In this post 9-11 era, there is no such thing as homeland security without border security."

Texas shares 1,200 miles of border with Mexico. Perry's \$10 million plan would beef up the presence of law enforcement and improve communications among various law enforcement entities in the region.

"I offer this plan, not because it is the state's responsibility to control the federal border, but because the state of Texas cannot wait for the federal government to implement needed border security measures," he said.

Perry praised the federal government for providing 1,000 new border patrol agents and for investing in surveillance at crossings, but said Congress must do more.



## TV ads blast DeLay prosecutor

A group claiming to have no connection to indicted former U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay of Sugar Land lashed back at Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle with television commercials that portray the state's top ethics prosecutor as a vicious dog.

Washington, D.C.-based Free Enterprise Fund sponsored the commercial, which aired in Austin first but later may be broadcast in other markets.

Meanwhile, Earle filed a new subpoena seeking DeLay's phone records from Sept. 1 to Dec. 31, 2002, and documents related to the purchase of a 2004 minivan.

DeLay and two associates have been indicted by Travis County grand juries on charges of money laundering and conspiracy to violate Texas law in the months leading up to the November 2002 state election.

DeLay's lawyers have called the charges politically motivated and baseless.

## Search for library site continues

A search committee in charge of finding a site for a proposed George W. Bush presidential library has narrowed the field of possibilities to Baylor University, Southern Methodist University, the University of Texas at Dallas and Texas Tech University.

The University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M University were dropped from the list.

The library search committee includes Bush staffers Karl Rove, Andrew Card and Harriet Miers; the president's youngest brother Marvin Bush; Secretary of Commerce Don Evans; and U.S. ambassador to France Craig Stapleton.

## Newspaper challenges Kinky

On Oct. 14, the San Antonio Express-News challenged Kinky Friedman to write a gubernatorial campaign song that clarifies his views on current issues.

The Hill Country musician, author and animal-rescue rancher hopes to run for governor in November 2006.

But to earn a spot on the ballot he must collect 45,000 signatures from registered voters who skip the March 2006 Republican and Democratic primaries.

Gov. Perry is running for reelection and is expected to face Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn in the GOP primary. Former congressman and broadcast journalist Chris Bell of Houston is campaigning for the Democratic nomination.



## AG's Medicaid fraud investigation lands Wichita Falls nurse in jail

WICHITA FALLS - An investigation by Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit officers has led to the indictment and arrest of a licensed vocational nurse employed at Cedar Falls Care Center in Wichita Falls.

Marian Shivers, 40, was arrested last week by a Wichita County Sheriff's Department deputy after Attorney General Abbott's investigators revealed that the nurse illegally obtained 22 hydrocodone pills, a controlled Schedule III narcotic also referred to as Vicodin. Shivers was arrested following a grand jury indictment charging her with possession of a controlled substance, a felony. Wichita County District Attorney Barry Macha handled the grand jury case.

"We cannot tolerate the smuggling of controlled drugs away from those who need them to those who are supposedly acting in the patients' best interests," said Attorney General Abbott. "Texans deserve to be able to trust the

health care they receive through the state's Medicaid program, and we will weed out those who abuse the system."

The prescription painkillers Shivers had diverted had been intended for a resident at the care facility. Shivers allegedly destroyed the resident's "narcotic count sheet," which tracks the number of painkillers assigned a patient over

time. The nurse allegedly hoped the destruction of the count sheet would allow her to divert the drugs to herself without being detected by colleagues or law enforcement officials.

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## Eagles fall 47-6 to Junction

Eldorado fell to 1 and 3 in the district race this past Friday when they lost 47-6 to a spirited Junction Eagles team.

Junction managed 27 points in the first period alone, and would continue the scoring into the fourth quarter.

Eldorado found its only score with 7:54 left in the third quarter on a 5 yard Russel Cathey run.

The Warbirds ended the night with 222 total yards: 113 of which

came on the ground and 109 through the air.

Though Eldorado gained more first downs in the contest than Junction, the Warbirds were stopped short of scoring on all but the one drive.

Two interceptions, a lost fumble and four punts took the ball out of the hands of Eldorado's offense and left Junction control the game most of the evening.

With a playoff birth virtually out of the question Eldorado will look to play spoiler in their remaining three contests against Ozona, Mason and Wall.

The Eagles will travel this week to Ozona to face a stingy Lions team.

The Lions, standing at 5 - 2 on the season, 2 - 2 in district play, are still in the hunt for a spot in the post season.

The game is slated for 7:30 p.m. and will be held at Lions Stadium in Ozona. Everyone is encouraged to make the trip to Ozona to support the Eagles.

## So, exactly what does the law say about minors and alcohol?

A charge of Minor in Possession (M.I.P.) means that you, being a person under the age of 21 years, have been given a citation by a police officer or Texas Alcohol Beverage Control Officer for being illegally in possession, ownership, or control of an alcoholic beverage. The principal element of this crime, which must be proven beyond a reasonable doubt, is that you were in possession, ownership, or control of an alcoholic beverage.

Minors are at risk of an M.I.P. citation anytime they go to a party, nightclub, or when they are in a vehicle where alcohol is present. A minor can be in the proximity of alcohol which belongs to another person, but cannot touch, hold in his/her hand, transport, attempt to purchase, consume, or have any contact with it.

Possession of an alcoholic beverage may also include situations in which there is "constructive possession." An example of constructive possession is when a minor is in an automobile where alcohol is readily accessible to any minor passenger in that vehicle. This situation extends to alcohol which is on the car seat, floor, or stored in the trunk of an automobile in which the driver is a minor and is in possession of the keys which unlock the trunk.

Constructive possession may also exist when: 1. you are at a table with several people who are drinking from a pitcher of beer with cups scattered about; 2. you pick up empty beer cans and cups; 3. you hold a friend's beer so that they can put on their jacket; 4. or you use a beer can a spittoon.

Furthermore, a minor will be considered to be in possession of alcohol simply if he/she is carrying a grocery bag for a friend in which alcohol has been packed.

Code, Sec. 106.05 provides that a minor (a person under the age of 21 years) commits this offense if he possesses an alcoholic beverage.

A minor may possess alcohol if he is in the visible presence of his adult (over the age of 21 years) parent, guardian, spouse, or other adult to whom he has been committed by a court.

A minor may possess alcohol while in the course and scope of his employment if he is an employee of a license or permittee and the employment is not prohibited by this code.

This offense is a Class "C" misdemeanor punished by a fine not to exceed \$500.00. However, if a minor has 2 prior convictions, the punishment is a fine of not less than \$250.00 or more than \$2,000.00 and/or confinement in jail for a term not to exceed 6 months!

The court shall order a convicted minor to perform community service for not less than 8 or more than 12 hours. However, if he has a prior conviction, the community service is not less than 20 hours or more than 40 hours.

The court shall order the Department of Public Safety to suspend the minor's driver's license or permit or, if he does not


have one, to deny the issuance of one for: 30 days if he has no prior convictions; 60 days if he has one prior conviction; or 6 months if he has 2 prior convictions.

For the purpose of determining whether a minor has a prior conviction, an order of deferred adjudication for a prior offense is considered a conviction!

The court shall require a convicted minor who has not been

previously convicted to attend an alcohol awareness course approved by the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse. If he has been previously convicted, the court may require him to attend the course.

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

## Statewide sales tax collections continue to rise

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn said today that the state took in \$1.33 billion dollars in sales tax in September, a 14.2 percent increase over Sept. '04

Strayhorn sent \$363.5 million in monthly sales tax payments to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 11.3 percent compared to last October. So far in 2005, local sales tax allocations are 7.8 percent ahead of last year.

September state sales tax collections and October allocations of local tax revenue represent sales that occurred in August. Since Hurricane Katrina struck the Gulf Coast on August 29, and Hurricane Rita struck on September 24, these

sales tax figures do not reflect the impact of the two storms. The impact will begin to be seen when businesses report their September sales tax to the Comptroller later this month, and November sales tax allocations are sent to local governments.

The double-digit increase in tax revenue in today's report can be credited to the continued strength of the Texas economy, notably the mining and construction sectors, and reflects the three-day Sales Tax Holiday that annually packs stores with Texans and out-of-state shoppers who splurge on taxable items along with tax-free clothing and shoes.

Strayhorn sent sales tax alloca-

tions of \$247.1 million to Texas cities, 11.3 percent more than October 2004. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax rebates are up 8.1 percent. Texas counties received October sales tax rebates of \$21.6 million, up 11.6 percent compared to a year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 8.9 percent higher than last year.

Ninety-nine special purpose taxing districts around the state received \$10.3 million in sales tax, up 19.4 percent compared to last October. So far in 2005, sales tax allocations to special purpose districts are up 12.7 percent compared to 2004. Ten local transit systems received \$84.3 million

in October sales tax rebates, up 10.3 percent compared to a year ago. Year-to-date, transit sales tax revenues are up 6.3 percent.

Locally, Schleicher County's numbers showed the most improvement, jumping by 31.04 percent. (See chart below)

## Autumn is the season to service your furnace.

Now that the cooler temperatures of autumn have finally arrived in Texas and the blue northers of winter are looming just around the corner, many people will be looking ahead and calling a contractor to service their furnace to make sure it is operating properly.

The Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation (TDLR) would like to remind consumers that they should hire only a licensed air conditioning and heating contractor to work on their systems. Only licensed contractors are properly trained and can

demonstrate they have the skills and experience to service heating and air conditioning equipment. Licensed contractors also are required to carry insurance.

"If you hire an unlicensed individual to service your heating or air conditioning unit you risk more than just poor performance from that unit," said William Kuntz, TDLR's executive director. "Improperly serviced equipment or a poorly wired unit can be dangerous. It can cause a fire or emit hazardous levels of carbon monoxide. It can even explode."

Consumers also run a financial risk if they hire unlicensed, unqualified individuals. People who are performing the work of a contractor without a license rarely have insurance to cover the cost of

the repairs should their work prove deficient. They also may not be willing to return to fix problems their workmanship has caused.

"This is a consumer safety issue," Kuntz said. "To earn a state license, a contractor has demonstrated that he or she is experienced and has passed a state-administered test of their knowledge. Are you willing to risk your home and the health of your family to someone who is unwilling or unable to prove that they know what they are doing?"

TDLR offers these tips to help identify licensed contractors.

- State-issued license numbers, which begin with TACL, must be on all print advertisements, company vehicles, business cards, work proposals, and invoices. If no

license number is evident, the contractor is most likely not licensed to work in the state.

- Consumers also can check the status of a license at the TDLR website ([www.license.state.tx.us](http://www.license.state.tx.us)) or through TDLR's customer service lines at 1-800-803-9202 or 1-512-436-6599.

- Consumer also can research a licensed contractor's enforcement history complaint history on the TDLR website or by calling customer service.

- Consumers who are unhappy with the quality of the work performed or who believe a contractor is not licensed may report complaints against contractors on TDLR's website or by calling TDLR's enforcement division at 1-512-463-2906.

not guilty with the court clerk prior to your appearance date stated on the ticket. You must prepare for your defense at a bench or jury trial. You should have the court clerk issue subpoenas for those witnesses necessary for your defense. It is recommended that you seek the advice of an attorney prior to the trial. Please contact our of-

fice at your earliest convenience to schedule an appointment.

### Guilty Pleas

If you are guilty of M.I.P., you may enter a plea of no contest or guilty and ask the court clerk for an uncontested hearing with the judge on the issue of punishment. At the hearing, introduce yourself to the judge and explain that you

desire to avoid an M.I.P. conviction on your record. Therefore, you request that the court grant you Deferred Adjudication.

### Deferred Adjudication

The judge may defer further proceedings without entering an adjudication of guilt and place you on probation for a period not to exceed 180 days. At the conclusion of the deferral period, if you present evidence that you complied with the requirements imposed by the Court, the judge shall dismiss the M.I.P. complaint and note in the docket that there is not a final conviction. However, the arrest will still appear on your record.

In most cases, the judge will grant Deferred Adjudication and order six months probation, 25 hours community service, attendance at an alcohol education workshop and court costs.

### Expunction of Record

Any person convicted of not more than one violation of the Texas Alcohol Beverage Code while a minor, on attaining the age of 21 years, may apply to the court in which he/she was convicted to have the conviction expunged. Following entry of an expunction order, you may deny the occurrence of the M.I.P. conviction and the existence of the expunction order.
