

Another lawsuit filed against Jeffs and his FLDS church

FLDS prophet Warren Jeffs and four of his closest lieutenants stand accused this week of lining their pockets while at the same time failing to protect the interests of a charitable trust they supervised as trustees. A lawsuit named the men as defendants along with the FLDS Church.

The men once served as trustees of the United Effort Plan Trust, a tax exempt organization established in 1942 to oversee properties given to the FLDS church. But last year, all of them were removed from their positions of authority over the UEP by a Utah district judge. The judge then appointed Bruce Wisan, a Salt Lake City accountant, to act as Special Fiduciary on behalf of the trust and its beneficiaries. And, it was Wisan who brought the latest lawsuit.

In the lawsuit Wisan accuses Warren Jeffs, Truman I. Barlow, Leroy S. Jeffs, James K. Zitting and William E. Timpson of wrongful taking and conversion of trust property, unjust enrichment, interference with contractual relations and prospective economic advantage and civil conspiracy. The former trustees also are accused of breach of trust, breach of fiduciary duty and profits arising from administration of the trust.

The suit claims damages of \$1 million plus other unspecified damages. In it, Wisan alleges the trustees failed for years to place donations of money, property and services donated to the UEP into the charitable trust. The men allegedly transferred trust property to third parties for "little or no consideration" after two lawsuits were filed in 2004 by young men known as "Lost Boys" who claimed they were wrongly expelled from the community.

It is also alleged that within hours of the former trustees being removed in May 2005, the men and the FLDS Church directed workmen to disassemble an 18,000-square-foot building on trust land and haul it away.

Other allegations include the removal

of equipment and fixtures from a potato processing plant and the disassembly and removal of a grain elevator located on UEP land.

Additionally, the former trustees and the FLDS Church are accused of collecting property tax payments from UEP tenants, only a portion of which was turned over to the appropriate taxing authorities.

Wisan, who has proven to be Jeffs' most tenacious and resourceful adversary, says he hopes to win a quick judgement against Jeffs and the former trustees. Then, he says, he may shift his attention to Texas and ask Schleicher County Sheriff David Doran to go onto the YFZ Ranch near Eldorado and seize missing property which he believes belongs to the UEP Trust.

Wisan says he is sure that UEP property is located on the ranch but he says he doesn't have a clue where FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs might be.

"I think I know where most of the others are," Wisan says. He points to the recently discovered FLDS property near Pringle, South Dakota as the most likely spot where Jeffs' lieutenants are hiding.

But, Jeffs himself remains at large, his whereabouts a mystery, despite a \$100,000 reward being offered by the FBI and the recent designation of Jeffs as a Top Ten FBI fugitive.

Colorado City Mayor Arrested

It's becoming more and more difficult to find anyone in the polygamous towns of Colorado City, AZ and Hildale, UT who can effectively serve in local government. Recently C-City mayor Richard Allred quit his post without warning, now the town's new leader, Terrill C. Johnson has been arrested and charged with eight counts of "false evidences," each a second degree felony involving vehicle titles. Johnson was reportedly taken into custody last

Eldoradoans gather to commemorate Memorial Day

A crowd of about 70 people were in attendance Monday morning for the annual Memorial Day service at the Eldorado Cemetery. The program is sponsored each year by the American Legion Bev McCormick Post #257. This year, as in years past, small American flags fluttered throughout the cemetery, decorating the graves of local veterans and memorials.

Post Commander Weldon Jenkins served as the master of ceremonies for the program, with Post Chaplain Gene McCalla offering prayers of invocation and benediction.

A color guard from Goodfellow Air Force Base was on hand to post the colors as the audience stood at attention, some saluting, others with hands held across their hearts. Silently the color guard marched in lock step to the two flag poles where they slowly raised the U.S. and Texas flags. Once the flags reached the top they were lowered to half-mast. Weldon Jenkins then read a moving tribute to the nation's war dead. Then, one by one, the names of Schleicher County's twenty-three fallen

heroes were read aloud. The honored dead include: World War I — Thomas Ballew, Roach H. Holland, Neal Kelly, Bev McCormick, Sam I. Nicks, Jr., Roy Stevenson; World War II — Hobson Ashmore, Joyce C. Blackmon, William H. Currie, David E. DeLong, Jr., Earnest Dickey, Jr., Robert E. Doty, Thomas R. Henderson, Jr., Alton Page, Orville K. Puryear, Clark M. Reynolds, Raymond R. Reynolds; Korean War — Walter Jones, Robert H. Nolen; Vietnam War — Elton Harris, David Overstreet, Selwin Taylor and Danny Rutherford.

The cemetery then echoed with a triple volley of gunfire as a firing party from Goodfellow Air Force Base presented a 21-gun salute. Then, the mournful strains of "Taps" and a drifted across the cemetery and more than one person could be seen brushing away the tears.

Post #257 of the American Legion was named after Eldorado's Bev McCormick who was killed on Nov. 2, 1918 in the Argonne Forest in France during World War I.

It was with that in mind that rural and urban lawmakers, representing the needs of both rich and poor, crafted a school finance solution that will better serve all Texans. This latest special session was enormously successful. Poor school districts will have access to more money than ever before, and wealthy districts will be able to keep much more of the money they generate locally. All teachers will receive a \$2,000 pay raise. Homeowners will pay lower property taxes. And, the playing field for business has been leveled.

This coming school year, the school finance plan compresses the local school property tax rate by 17 cents. School districts whose rates are currently at the \$1.50 maintenance and operations cap will reduce their rates to \$1.33. School districts that are currently below the \$1.50 cap will see their rates drop proportionately. The following school year, the rate is further compressed to \$1.

To accomplish this, the state will step in with funding for education that had been provided by the local property tax. This state investment will equalize education dollars to the historic level of the 88th percentile, far above the 73rd percentile now funded. Students across Texas will benefit from education funding at the level of the Dallas Independent School District, which is presently ranked at the 88th percentile. These percentiles indicate where a school district ranks based on its property wealth per student - the wealthiest school district in Texas is at the 100th percentile.

A new local enrichment tier will provide school districts with the "meaningful local discretion" in setting property tax rates required by last year's Texas Supreme Court decision. This new funding tier will raise an even greater amount of money for every penny of tax rate. The first four cents of any new tax rate locally levied will be free of recapture for wealthy school districts; poor school districts' funding in this tier will be equal to spending at the Austin Independent School District, currently just below the 95th percentile.

Texas' contribution to these two formulas will raise the state's investment from 34 percent to 50 percent of the cost to educate our children.

In addition to investing a historic amount of money in schools, this Legislature reformed our state's franchise tax. The new system will provide a fair, reasonable levy that replaces the current tax, which many businesses avoid through existing loopholes. This legislation returns to the original intent of the franchise tax, which is payment from those who enjoy liability protection under our state's laws.

We accomplished the long-stated goal "broadening the base and lowering the rate" of the business tax. The new base of the tax will be computed on gross receipts less, at the election of the business,

Rick Monday's act of patriotism earns praise thirty years after the fact

Just over thirty years ago, on April 25, 1976, Rick Monday, an outfielder for the Chicago Cubs, prevented a 36-year-old Los Angeles man and his son from burning an American flag in the outfield of Dodger Stadium.

The Cubs had ended their turn at bat and were taking the field when a man named William Thomas and his 11-year-old son climbed over the fence and raced to Centerfield where they spread an American flag on the ground and began soaking it with lighter fluid.

The whole thing was caught on camera and, Vin Scully, who broadcast the Dodgers' games on radio described the action for listeners at home.

"I'm not sure what he's doing out there," Scully said. "It looks like he's going to burn a flag."

Monday, who now works as a broadcaster for the Dodgers, said he knew instantly what the pair intended to do and, thinking that he might have time to tackle them, he sprinted in their direction. But it was a long way to run and they managed to strike a match before he got there. Thankfully, the wind blew out the match giving Monday the extra seconds he needed to race in and snatch the flag away.

Monday says it was saturated with lighter fluid and felt cold on



his arm. Only then did he think to check and see if he and the banner were on fire.

Instantly the man and his son were surrounded by other ball players, stadium security guards and the Dodger's third base coach, Tommy Lasorda, who himself had raced into the outfield intent on stopping the desecration.

Thomas was arrested and fined \$60 for disturbing the peace. Neither he nor his son ever spoke publicly about why they wanted to burn the flag. Maybe, just maybe, they were shamed by what happened after Rick Monday interrupted their plans.

The Cubs outfield simply handed the flag off to one of the Dodgers in their 3rd base dugout and started jogging back to his place in the outfield as if the whole thing were "no big deal."

But, to the fans in Dodger Stadium that day it was a very big deal.

Softly at first, then louder and

louder from every corner of the ballpark, the crowd began singing "God Bless America."

Then on the scoreboard in Centerfield flashed the words. "Rick Monday...You Made A Great Play!"

Dodger Stadium erupted in applause.

"The world has changed," Monday says now. "We weren't that far removed from Vietnam at the time. But what they were trying to do in 1976 was wrong. It's still wrong today. That little piece of cloth represents a lot of rights and freedoms that people have given up their lives to protect."

Monday's selfless action was recognized by Major League Baseball when the Hall of Fame chose it as one of the top 100 moments in the history of baseball.

He says he still gets calls and letters from people, usually military veterans or the families of servicemen, offering their thanks. It's a little embarrassing, he says, since he claims he doesn't know a single person who would not have done the same thing.

Monday says he still has the worn and tattered flag, locked up securely in a safe-deposit box. He has resisted every attempt to purchase the flag, most recently turning down \$1 million. "What this flag represents, you can't buy."

The exploding car is back in the rodeo arena

I happened to be with legendary rodeo clowns Quail Dobbs and Leon Coffee the day Quail sold Leon his famous exploding car. For decades, Quail entertained rodeo audiences all over the world with his slapstick comedy. His old car reared up, spun around and spewed fire, smoke, car parts and fireworks all over the arena. When he wasn't clowning with his car, Quail fought bulls and was honored many times for his work as a barrel man.

Quail bought the car, a 1910 Model T with a 1927 engine, in 1966. He bought it sight unseen over the telephone and when he saw it for the first time, it looked like a pile of junk. He worked with it and created an act that rodeo fans can still quote almost word for word.

Quail fought his first bull in 1962 and clowning for 36 years at some of the most prestigious rodeos in the world. He performed at Cheyenne 28 years. He booked two years in advance and was in the arena 130 nights a year. Quail

gave up clowning seven years ago and put his car in storage. Since 1999, his arena is the courtroom. A sign on his Justice of the Peace office in Coahoma reads "The Law East of Stink Creek."

When I interviewed Quail and Leon, it was mutual admiration. Each man couldn't say enough good things about the other.

Leon, who has been in several movies and won a barrel full of rodeo honors himself, is absolutely thrilled with the purchase of the car.

"I know how good that car act used to make me feel," he says. "If I can make the people in the stands feel as good as that car act used to make me feel, then Quail's still out there. With him not clowning anymore, I figured my bringing

the car act back would be a tribute to Quail. I've always told him he was my hero. I won't try to be Quail, but there will always be part of Quail in the act."

Quail says the car needed Leon a lot more than Leon needed the car. "It sat for seven years going to waste. I'm glad Leon has it."

Leon says he's been rodeoing a long time but right now he's like a kid in a candy store. "I'm just so excited to get in it and drive it. You can't imagine how troubled I was to call Quail and ask him if he would sell me that act. It's a part of Quail's life. It's a part of history that needs to be seen by generations of young people, to let them know that car's still going. It's such a great honor to be able to have it. In my eyes, Quail will be enshrined in this car."

Leon left Coahoma with the car and spent 3 solid weeks working with it to get his act together. He tried it out at a couple of college rodeos, and now he's doing it at pro rodeos all over the country.

Comptroller OKs tax reform legislation; governor signs

AUSTIN — Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn, the state's chief accountant, certified the state has enough funds to pay for House Bill 1, a temporary buy-down of property taxes. Afterward, Gov. Rick Perry signed the legislation into law.

HB 1 passed in the just-ended special session of the Texas Legislature. It reduces property taxes, appropriates more money for classroom instruction, requires public schools to open after the fourth Monday in August and gives teachers a \$2,000 raise.

HB 1 also satisfies a Texas Supreme Court order to fix the state's tax system so school districts are not forced to set the highest allowable tax rate. Under HB 1, the cap rate is lowered to \$1.33, down from the previous cap of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation on school districts' maintenance and operations portion of the tax.

Perry and Strayhorn are political rivals, so it's not hard to see why they don't agree on how much HB 1 will cut Texans' property taxes. Perry said it would yield a \$2,000 cut to the average homeowner over three years.

Strayhorn, who hopes to unseat Perry as governor in the fall, said it'll only be a sliver of the \$2,000 Perry is touting. How much is a sliver? Fifty-two dollars in the first year, she said. Perry's office countered, saying Strayhorn's numbers are hog-wash.

Jason Stanford, a spokesman for Democratic candidate for governor Chris Bell, called the school finance plan a sham, saying too little money would be spent on classroom initiatives and teacher pay. Bell called for a \$3,000, across-the-board pay increase for teachers.

Kinky Friedman also hopes to wrench the governor's office away from Perry in November. Friedman's camp expressed weariness with the ongoing squabbles between Perry and Strayhorn and called the Perry tax plan "not a real solution; it's another Band-Aid fix we've come to expect from career politicians."

Meanwhile, members of the Friedman campaign placed the winning bid on two pairs of boots the governor auctioned off to raise money for a hurricane relief fund. One pair bears Perry's autograph; the other, California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger's.

Jury finds Enron bosses guilty

Enron founder Kenneth Lay and former chief executive Jeffrey Skilling on May 25 were found guilty on many counts by a Houston federal jury. Lay and Skilling are free on \$5 million bond, each.

Between the two men, charges stuck on counts ranging from cheating investors and employees out of billions of dollars to lying to auditors and banks and for insider trading.

The energy trading firm crumbled in 2001, resulting in the loss of an estimated \$60 billion, the disappearance of its \$2 billion pension fund and the termination of 5,600 employees.

Esteemed Texas lawmaker dies

Lloyd M. Bentsen Jr. died May 23 at his home in Houston. He was 85.

Flags flew at half-staff for five days following Bentsen's death, by order of Gov. Perry.





THC updating popular Historical Marker Program

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Historical Commission (THC) is revamping its popular Texas Historical Marker Program, the first reorganization in more than four decades. With more than 13,000 markers, Texas has more historical markers than any other state. Historical markers have been a part of the Texas landscape since 1936, when the Texas Centennial Commission placed more than 900 markers and monuments around the state to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Texas Revolution and the establishment

of the Republic of Texas. The current program dates to 1962, and is an extremely popular means of interpreting state history. It is the agency's most visible program.

Some highlights of the updated program include an annual January application deadline, more educational materials, training workshops throughout the state on how to prepare an application, and an online application and review process.

Due to the program changes, the THC is no longer accepting marker applications under the

former system. More information regarding changes to the program and a timeline for important dates and deadlines will be available as details are finalized. Visit the THC's web site at www.thc.state.tx.us periodically for updated information. County historical commissions will be notified of new guidelines in August 2006. A change in marker fees is also anticipated.

employment costs or the cost of goods sold. The current franchise tax is based on business income, with an alternative minimum tax based on net worth. And, the primary rate is dropped from 4.5 percent under the old franchise tax to 1 percent (0.5 percent for wholesalers and retailers).

This plan protects small businesses. Sole proprietors and general partnerships are exempt from the tax. In addition, we doubled the small business exemption from \$150,000 in gross receipts to \$300,000 (adjusted for inflation beginning in 2009). If the business's tax liability is calculated to be less than \$1,000, no tax is due.

In essence, this reform accomplishes the following: it taxes all entities that enjoy liability protection; it taxes gross receipts minus certain deductions; it taxes at a lower rate; and it computes the tax based on gross receipts as opposed to income and net worth.

Small businesses will no longer be unfairly burdened. This landmark reform requires large companies, such as Dell Computer Corporation and Wal-Mart, to pay their fair share of the privilege of doing business in Texas.

The steps taken this year by the current Legislature injected new life into three of our most fundamental endeavors: public education, home ownership and Texas business. As these measures become law and evolve, expect to see great things from our students, our communities and our economy.

Conaway supports ANWR passage, calls for course correction in energy policy

WASHINGTON, D.C. - U.S. Representative Mike Conaway (R-TX) made the following statement last week regarding passage of H.R. 5429, the American-Made Energy and Good Jobs Act, which will open a small portion of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) to energy production:

"The American people want legislative action that will produce long-term results.

Today's vote proved that a majority of House members are ready and willing to act when it comes to combating the problem of high energy costs. This is about the law of supply and demand. By increasing oil supply here in the U.S., we can impact rising energy costs in the long-run and decrease our dependency on foreign sources of energy. The decision to veto ANWR legislation in 1995 has unfortunately

come back to haunt us. Had the federal government acted 11 years ago, the cost of energy might not be so high. We must learn from the mistakes of the past and seize this opportunity by enacting sound, long-term energy policy that will benefit all Americans."

Jeffs remains at large as legal woes increase

Friday immediately following a city council meeting. He is said to have posted \$5,000 bail and was released. He is due to appear in court sometime in the next two weeks. Johnson could face fines of \$5,000 and a jail sentence of up to 15 years on each of the eight charges.

Search Warrants Served

Johnson's arrest came only one day after Arizona law enforcement officers simultaneously raided four homes in Colorado City. The raid was swift and surprising, and netted authorities several boxes full of evidence.

Sixteen deputies from the Mohave County Sheriff's Department reportedly swept through the polygamous community, armed with search warrants and gather-

ing evidence against a number of FLDS members, and possibly even FLDS Prophet Warren Jeffs.

Jeffs and several of his followers stand accused of unlawful sexual conduct with a child in connection with a series of arranged marriages between under aged girls and Jeff's older male followers. Jeffs is also charged with rape as an accomplice in Utah, also in

connection with an arranged marriage in which the under aged bride reportedly was forced to marry an older man.

FBI still wants him

The dragnet for Warren Jeffs has been cast far and wide. Federal authorities have charged him with unlawful flight to avoid prosecution in Arizona and Utah. The FBI

continues to seek Jeffs' arrest and is offering a reward of \$100,000 for information leading to his arrest and conviction. Anyone with information as to Jeffs' whereabouts is encouraged to contact local law enforcement authorities or the FBI.


Major crime rate drops
