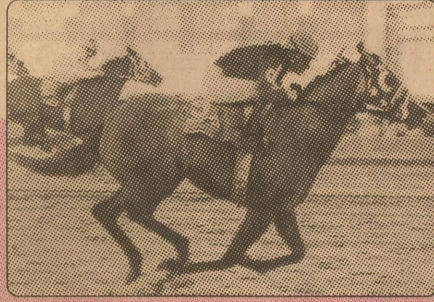

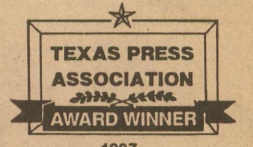

Landfill takes center stage for City Council

The Eldorado City Council spent much of its time this week discussing the city's landfill. At the council meeting on Monday night, the group discussed then voted unanimously to enact a tarpaulin ordinance. The new law requires anyone transporting garbage to the city's landfill in an open truck or other vehicle to cover their load with a tarpaulin. The new rule carries with it a \$20 fine for anyone violating the ordinance.

Then, on Tuesday morning, a public hearing was held in the Memorial Building to hear from parties who had contested the city's application for a permit to expand its landfill.

Administrative Law Judge Leslie Craven presided over the hearing which began with statements from the public. The only person to make a statement was Tommy Hunley who said that he was aware of a "sink hole" in the

in the playa lake which adjoins the proposed landfill site. Hunley said he knew water standing in the lake drained into the aquifer via the sink hole.

Next, Judge Craven told the audience that there were already three "parties" represented at the hearing. The first party was the City of Eldorado which was represented by Mayor John Nikolauk, City Administrator John Callison and City Attorney James Kosub. The second party, she said, was the Executive Director of the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission (TNRCC) Dan Pearson who was represented at the hearing by attorney Steven Shepherd. The third party was Todd Galiga, TNRCC attorney who served as a "Public Interest Counsel."

Craven then named two other parties in the proceeding, Bill Tay-

Grand jury indictments

Schleicher County Grand Jurors met Thursday, January 8th and handed down several indictments. Among those indicted were:

Victor Lozano Galindo, 42, of Eldorado was indicted on two counts of Driving While Intoxicated;

Johnny Joe Factor, 40, of Eldorado was indicted and charged with Driving While Intoxicated;

Kelly Jo Flemming, 21, of Eldorado was indicted on one count of Burglary of a Building;

Jimmy Don Flemming, 47, of Eldorado was indicted on one

charge of Burglary of a Habitation one count of Burglary of a Building;

Jesse Morgan Evans, 34, of Eldorado was indicted and charged with Injury to a Child;

Ruben Hilario Moreno, 28, of Eldorado was indicted on 2 counts of Possession of Counterfeit Documents with Intent to Pass; and

Jesse Lee Sparks, 37, of Eldorado was indicted on one count of Injury to a Child.

Three other indictments were handed down but were not made public pending arrests.

School trustees meet twice in four days

Schleicher County I.S.D.'s board or trustees met Thursday evening, Jan. 9th and again on Monday evening, Jan. 12th. At the first meeting, the board entered into a lengthy executive session. The reason listed on the agenda was Superintendent's evaluation. After nearly three hours behind closed doors, the trustees emerged into open session and took no action.

Again on Monday, the board took up the subject of personnel in a closed door session. This time however, when they returned to the open meeting, the board voted unanimously to extend Superintendent Hal Porter's contract for one year. The term of his contract will now run through June 30, 2000.

In other business on Monday evening, the trustees learned of a recent bid opening for commercial property and fleet insurance. According to Supt. Trimble-

Batjer submitted the low bid and was awarded the bid.

Next, the board heard information about the recent refurbishing of the new "Eagle 1" bus and of the call for bids to refurbish the "Eagle 2" bus. The board authorized Supt. Porter to accept bids for the work and set a ceiling of

\$22,000 for the project.

The board then voted to employ Candis Davis to replace Maggie Middleton subject to her release by Rocksprings I.S.D.

In other business, the trustees voted to adopt local policies DC, concerning recruitment of teachers,

Recently, Judy Christian and Carol Orand, found two documents which underscore just how much things have changed in the teaching profession. They dropped them by the Success office and I include them here for your consideration. The first one dates back to 1872.

OVER THE BACK FENCE

Rules for Teachers

- 1) Teachers each day will fill lamps and clean chimneys.
- 2) Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session
- 3) Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
- 4) Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
- 5) After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- 6) Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 7) Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.

- 8) Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
- 9) The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

By 1915, things had improved only slightly for teachers. That year, the Cabel County, West Virginia Board of Education adopted the following directive:

Rules of conduct for teachers.

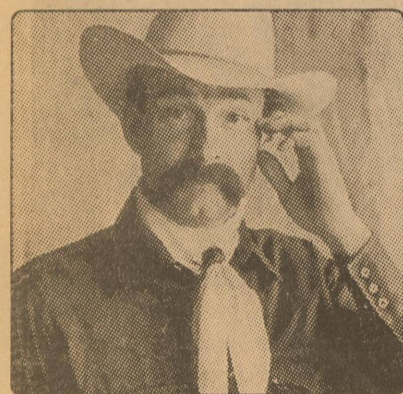
- 1) You will not marry during the term of your contract.
- 2) You are not to keep the company of men.

- 3) You must be home between the hours of 8 p.m. and 6 a.m. unless attending a school function.
- 4) You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
- 5) You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.
- 6) You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with a man unless he is your father or brother.
- 7) You may not smoke cigarettes.
- 8) you may not dress in bright colors.
- 9) You may, under no circumstances, dye your hair.
- 10) You must wear at least two petticoats.
- 11) Your dresses must not be any shorter than 2 inches above the ankle.
- 12) You will keep the schoolroom neat and clean, sweep the floor at least once daily, scrub the floor at least once a week, clean the blackboards once a day, and start a fire at 7 a.m. so the room will be warm at 8 a.m.

It's fun to reminisce about the "good old days", but I doubt if many teachers would want to return to the time when these rules were in place. On the other hand, teachers were allowed to discipline their pupils back then...

Did ya see the Calf Ropin'?

The 1997 National Rodeo Finals. Nobody went to the bathroom durin' the calf ropin'! It was a rodeo where the timed events stole the show.

It often seems the bucking events' stir the most excitement. And at this Finals we did see some spectacular rides, some breathtaking "gaves" by the rodeo clowns and one performance where not a single cowboy rode a bull to the whistle.

But the calf ropin' at the Friday night performance brought the house down. The NFR arena record was 7.3 seconds. Out of the clear blue, like lightning from the sky, from the middle of the pack, one Ronnie Hyde of Bloomington, Indiana reached out and tied one down in 7.1 seconds.

It took everyone, including the announcers a few seconds to realize what had happened. When the loud speakers boomed out that the record had been broken we rose in rousing standing ovation. Suddenly the crowd was galvanized. It was contagious, Marty Becker roped one in 7.5, Jeff Chapman in 7.4. The air was electric. Fred Whitfield, 1996 World Champion, tied his in 7.2! He, too, had broken the record, but finished second in the go around!

Even though 20 minutes later Keith Adams scored a 94 on a bull that spun so fast the helicopter eye view looked like he was bein' sucked into a whirlpool, the buzz the

next day in the Las Vegas Rodeo crowd was, 'did ya see the calf ropin'.

The next night durin' the steer wrestling it became apparent that 52 year old Butch Meyers was leading the NFR average. The same Butch Meyers who had appeared in his first NFR before several of his present competitors were even born. He put his steer down in 3.6 seconds and won the round.

Every man in there who was losing his hair, wearing loose fit jeans or worrying about his prostate felt vindicated. Women his age suddenly felt more attractive.

When the calf roping began the crowd was tickin' like a two dollar watch. Several ropers made respectable showings. None of us in the grandstand really expected a show like the night before. We'd been blessed with somethin' to tell the grandkids. But we watched this collection of men with new respect. Then Blair Burke, a 24 year old from Durant, Oklahoma came outta the box swingin' and when he threw his hands in the air, the scoreboard showed 7 seconds flat!

Pandemonium! He had broken the record set the night before!

What happened next would be as likely to predict as man walking on Jupiter by New Year's Day.

Fred Whitfield followed with an unbelievable 6.9. He held the arena record for less time than it takes to clean your fingernails. Then Jeff Chapman, another young warrior from Texas, set the house on fire with a 6.8 second run.

It was more than most of us could absorb. It was like we'd walked to the edge of a tall building and looked down. It took several breaths just to come back to earth.

Sunday's final performance named Cody Ohl the World Champion Calf Roper. Fred Whitfield set a new NFR ten calf record, five men within two days had owned the single calf NFR record and Jeff Chapman got a new lucky number.

Oh, and Butch Meyers finished first in the steer wrestling NFR average and broke the old record which had stood for twelve years. He had set it himself back when he was 40 years old.

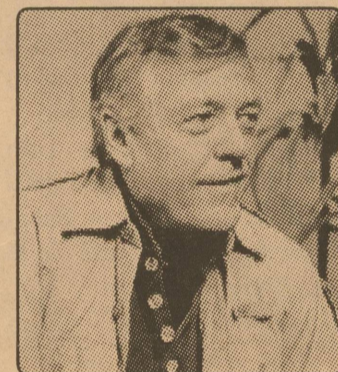
Colorado City has its cannon back. Sweetwater has a new cannon. Everybody's happy.

The story starts more than fifty years ago. At the end of World War Two, Colorado City acquired a cannon to put on display so people could see it and feel patriotic about our country. The cannon became a landmark and a symbol of liberty. It was first in Colorado City's National Guard Armory, then moved to the front of the American Legion Hall.

When the American Legion Post disbanded in the seventies, the building and all surrounding property, including the cannon, were deeded to the Boys Club. The cannon stayed there for years and eventually people in Colorado City didn't really pay much attention to it. The cannon began to show some age.

Last year members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post in Sweetwater decided they wanted a cannon to display in front of

their building. They looked into what was involved and determined it would be too expensive to get a cannon and have it delivered to Sweetwater.

Then they learned about the cannon in Colorado City, which was virtually abandoned. They got the paperwork started to acquire the cannon, claiming it was neglected and improperly displayed.

They got permission from the Army to remove the cannon from Colorado City and place it in front of their building.

When Colorado City residents learned about what was happening, they suddenly felt a strong attachment to their old cannon. They protested. They secured the cannon with a big heavy chain.

But they couldn't stop the Sweetwater folks from coming over and getting the cannon.

The story began to get nationwide coverage. There were jokes about the situation on the internet.

After the cannon was taken from Colorado City, the editor of the local newspaper, Eunice Fisher, let the Army know that the incident had caused some hard feelings. That's when Ed Wolverton stepped in. He's a Big Spring native who is now head of the Army Re-Use Department. He managed to find a cannon at Fort Hood and had it deeded to the Sweetwater VFW. It is now

on display there.

A group of Colorado City residents went to Sweetwater and got their cannon back. It is displayed in front of the Heart of West Texas Museum.

Colorado City Mayor Jim Baum says to get the cannon back, there were forms to fill out and the city had to agree to properly display the cannon. A concrete pad had to be built, a flagpole had to be erected and the cannon has to be properly maintained. Mayor Baum agreed to the conditions and signed the papers. The city is now the official owner of the cannon.

Birdie Childs, head of the VFW in Colorado City, said at the dedication ceremony for the cannon: "Our VFW's are still comrades in arms, have always been and will continue that way, We just happen to live in a country where you can disagree on something. But with cooperation, the right thing is done."

Sharp offers criminal justice reform plan

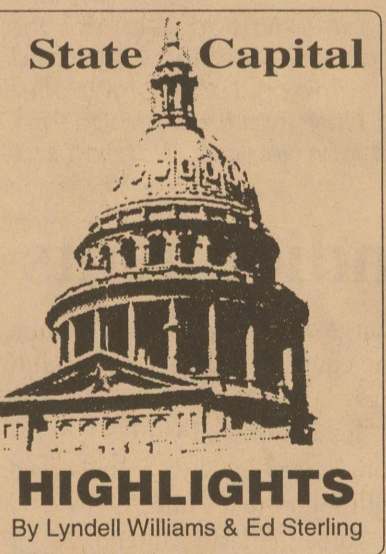
AUSTIN --- Violent sex offenders would be locked up indefinitely and the death penalty could be assigned to repeat child molesters and drug traffickers under a proposal by Democrat John Sharp.

Speaking at a news conference last week, Sharp, state comptroller running for lieutenant governor, said, "Making Texas safer must be our top priority. My criminal justice reform plan will help accomplish that."

Sharp also proposed placing more state prison inmates in work programs and retroactively eliminating mandatory early release for prisoners by passing a law that could be upheld in the courts. He also recommended a crackdown on juvenile gangs and shoring up penalties against those who assault teachers.

Republican Rick Perry, who is also running for lieutenant governor, said, however, that Sharp's plan "echoes" his own plan for criminal justice reform. The Dallas Morning News reported. Regarding Sharp's news conference, Perry's campaign manager Jim Arnold, said, "Many of the ideas announced today are so good, they have already been proposed by state leaders like (Agriculture Commissioner) Rick Perry and Gov. (George W.) Bush."

Both candidates' criminal justice reform plans would have to be approved by the Legislature to be

come law. The lieutenant governor presides over the Senate and wields much influence over the passage of legislation.

Teen Drug Use Rising

The Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse has compiled figures showing that illegal drug use by Texas students in grades seven through 12 increased in 1996.

Released by the commission last week, the survey showed an upward trend in teen drug use beginning in 1992. About 34 percent of all secondary students in 1996 had used some type of illegal substance during their lifetime — up from 22 percent in 1992, but below the rate of 39 percent recorded in 1988.

"Alcohol continues to be the

most widely used substance among Texas secondary students," the survey said.

"In many ways, curtailing alcohol consumption is more problematic than reducing the use of illicit drugs because of the availability of alcohol and the perception among adolescents that drinking alcohol is not as dangerous as using other drugs."

According to the survey, parents can do much to keep their kids off drugs, such as:

- * Encourage children to work at getting good grades;
- * Show support for children at school events; and
- * Talk to children. Make sure they know that drug use is unacceptable.

The survey was based on responses of 106,924 secondary students (48 percent male and 52 percent female) in 72 school districts.

Fund-Raising Suit Settled

The Texas attorney general's office said last week that a telemarketer for Dallas police and sheriff's union has settled a lawsuit that accused it of fraudulent fund-raising. The Dallas Morning News reported.

Merritt Productions Inc. misrepresented where money would be going and what contributions were charitable tax deductions, the state alleged.

The settlement prohibits Daniel

Merritt, owner of the company, from exercising control over any future firm that does not comply with strict solicitation guidelines.

The attorney general's office filed the lawsuit as part of a multistate effort aimed at "police charities." The state's suit alleged that Merritt employees misrepresented that solicited funds were going to the police and sheriff's departments, when the money actually was going to support unions.

Some company solicitors also told consumers that decals provided in return for contributions entitled the person to break traffic laws with impunity, according to the suit.

The fund-raiser kept 85 percent of money collected for the two unions.

Holzhauser to Skip Race

Texas Railroad Commission candidate Steve Holzhauser, a Republican, dropped out of the race last week.

His announcement to withdraw came five days after former Secretary of State Tony Garza, also a Republican, announced he would run for railroad commissioner instead of land commissioner.

Garza announced his switch Jan. 2 — the filing deadline — too late for Holzhauser, a six-term House member from Victoria, to file for re-election to the House.

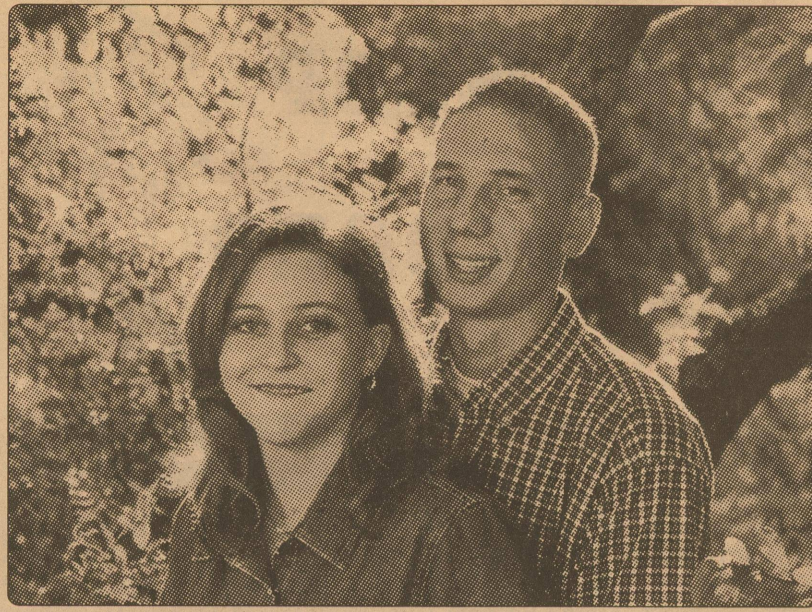
and husband Kip, also of Hamilton, and Jill Preston and husband Richard of Eldorado; nephews and nieces.

Oralia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jose Barrera of Eldorado, received a Bachelor of Science in

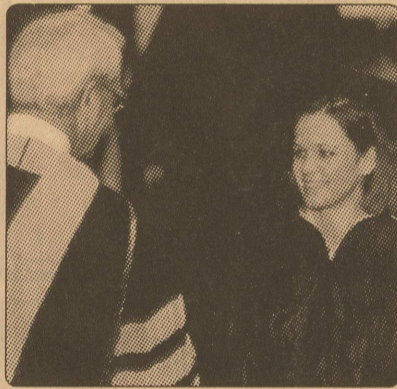

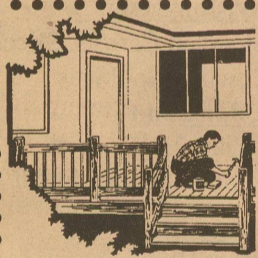
'Senior Connections' Community Meeting

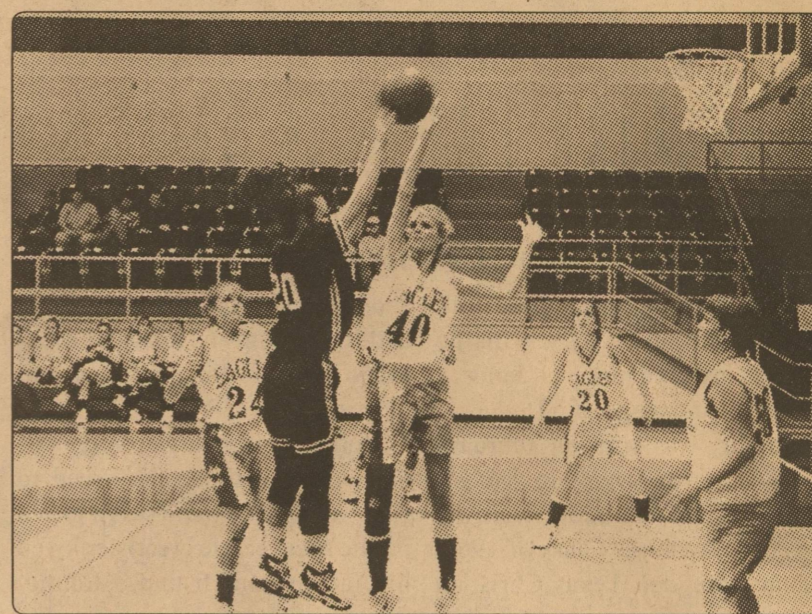

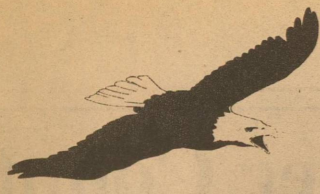

'Eagle One' has landed

On December 22, 1997, the first of two charter-type buses (aptly named Eagle 1 and Eagle 2) purchased by the school officially arrived in Eldorado. Originally the district was to receive the two charters in the fall, but because of several unforeseen circumstances and delays, the buses were unable to arrive before the end of the fall semester. One of the reasons for delay was that the bus was equipped with several added features (the buses were originally made for military/government purposes and transporting workers to and from their jobs at a nuclear power plant).

Glen Nix, former transportation director, said, "These buses are extremely well built." High school organizations of more than 25 people will be able to use the buses. Also the Middle and Elementary Schools will be able to use the buses. "Eagle 2" will arrive sometime in late May, when not in use by the high school. Drivers will be Tony Martinez, Oscar Martinez, Glen Nix, John Kotch, and new transportation director Coach Jim Fryar. Mr. Nix also added that because each bus seat was \$300, they were made to face one another to save money and to give more leg room.

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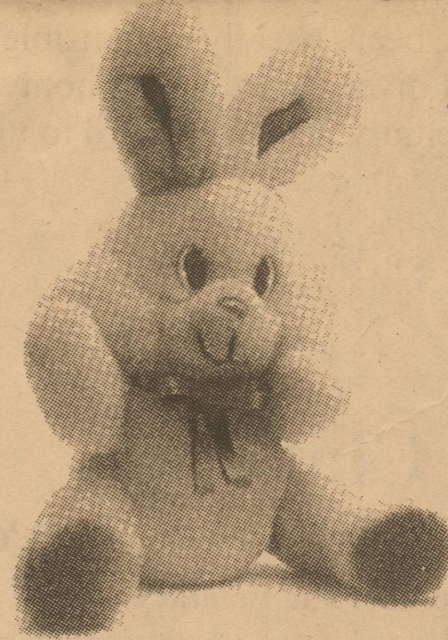

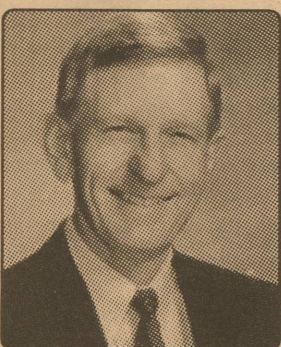

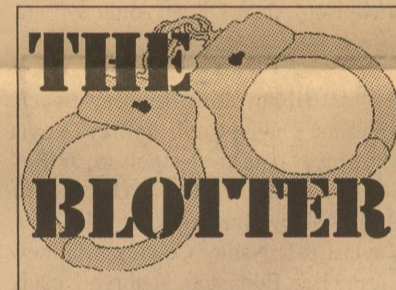

lor of San Angelo and Wayne Joiner of Eldorado. Taylor, who owns land adjoining the proposed landfill site was represented by attorney Tom Massey. Joiner, who lives a mile from the proposed site said he wanted to be a party because he was concerned about the city's compliance with TNRCC rules.

Craven then called a recess in the meeting and instructed the five "parties" to confer to see if any of their differences could be worked out. After 90 minutes of discussion, Craven called the hearing back to order and announced that the City of Eldorado and Bill Taylor had been unable to resolve their differences over the proposed landfill. She set a formal hearing date of June 22, 1998 and directed the two sides to be prepared to present sworn testimony before her at that time.

Wayne Joiner told the Success after the meeting that most of his concerns had been addressed and that he planned to meet with representatives of the city in the near future. He indicated that at that time he would "most likely" drop his protest to the city's permit application.

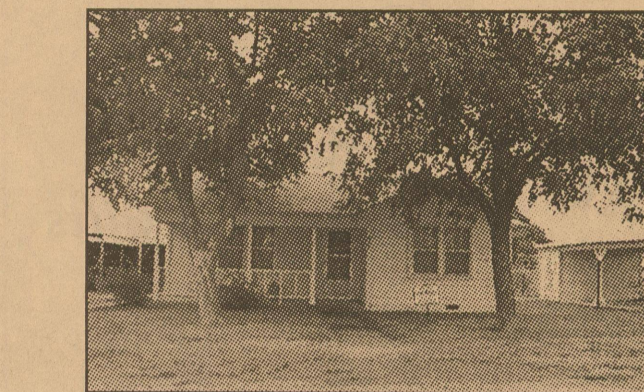

Accusatory wins Quarter Horse Futurity

David Powell's 2-year-old filly "Accusatory" ended her racing career with a win at Sunland Park in El Paso on December 27, 1997. Powell said his horse, ridden by jockey Brett Shipley, ran from the 9th position in the starting gate. The filly covered the 400 yards in 19.6 seconds.

"The track wasn't too packed out there and she got away clean," said Powell. Accusatory crossed the wire nearly a full length ahead of the heavily favored Rosies Royal Classic. The win resulted in a \$27,000 payday for Powell.

It wasn't the first time Powell's horse has beat the field to the wire. Accusatory won two races earlier in the racing season before qualifying for the "All-American Futurity" at Ruidoso Downs.

But Powell said that he's retiring the filly. "Eighty percent of the added money in horse racing is for two-year-olds. After that you can race 'em but it won't pay," stated Powell.

So, Accusatory is now back home in Schleicher County. "She's got to rest up a bit," said Powell.

A date with a stud horse named Merganser is the next thing on Accusatory's calendar. Merganser is stabled at Gardendale, near Odessa. Powell says he's looking for several good foals from Accusatory over the next few years. Meanwhile, he's already bought another two-year-old and is looking forward to campaigning her at Ruidoso and Sunland Park this season.

Accusatory was trained by Jimmy C. Collier of Ruidoso.

T.D.H. launches air attack on Rabies

ALICE — Three bright yellow Canadian airplanes lifted off from the Alice airport last week to launch the Texas Department of Health's (TDH's) fourth annual air attack on rabies in South Texas.

During the next few weeks, the specially-equipped planes from the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources will air-drop some 1.5 million vaccine-laced baits over parts of 28 South Texas counties to immunize coyotes against rabies. Each of the small fish meal baits contains a hidden plastic pouch of an oral rabies vaccine. Coyotes, the primary carriers of canine rabies in South Texas, eat the baits and become immune to the disease.

TDH began the vaccine airdrops in 1995 to fight an outbreak of canine rabies that started in Hidalgo and Starr counties in 1988 and spread to 21 South Texas counties, threatening to invade San Antonio and other heavily-populated areas.

Gayne Fearneyhough, D.V.M., director of the TDH program, said that since TDH conducted the first vaccine airdrop in 1995, the northward spread of the outbreak has been stopped and the number of animal cases of canine rabies in South Texas has dropped 98 percent.

"We're not doing this to protect coyotes. We're doing it to protect people," Fearneyhough said. "It's too easy for rabies to get from coy-

otes to pets to people."

Canine rabies kills between 50,000 and 100,000 people worldwide every year, mostly in developing nations, but Fearneyhough said South Texas is the only place in the United States where the canine strain is found. "If we can eliminate it here, then the rest of the U.S. won't have to deal with it."

He said health officials from other countries are interested in the Texas program and especially in field tests of a baitless vaccine system to be conducted as part of this year's airdrop. Instead of being manually sealed in the hollow of

baits made of fish meal or dog food, the plastic vaccine pouch is mechanically dipped in a sealant and flavoring. If effective, the new method could reduce costs by two-thirds.

After the South Texas airdrop is completed, crews will move to Odessa and then to Burnet to conduct the third annual airdrop in West and Central Texas to contain an outbreak of gray fox rabies.
