## HISTORY OF SCHLEICHER COUNTY.

(By Alvin Luedecire.)

In the early days Schleicher County was thought of as a dry, open range and cattle-men were slow to come into and take possession of its ranges. The cattle-men found that the wells of Schleicher county yielded good water, and that catch tanks could be made to hold water the year round by the average rainfall. Among the first cattle-men to come into Schleicher County was Sol Mayer. He took up some land Southwest of El Dorado in the district of Mayer and soon became a successful cattleman. He also took part in the political movements and up-building plans of the county, and served on the first Grand jury of the county court held in Schleicher county. The example set by a few men like Sol Mayer in-

duced other cattle-men to come into Schleicher county, and it was soon ready to take its place among the other ranching districts of Texas. (1).

The sheep men soon followed in the steps of the cattle-men and came to 'Grand Old Schleicher' as some of them termed it. Among the first of the sheep men was C. C. Doty, who made his headquarters near the old Vermont well. (2) The sheep men prospered as did the cattle men, and it was this fact that helped to make San Angelo the chief wool market of West Texas. The fact that El Dorado has on railroad also helped make San Angelo what it is today, because practically all the products of Schleicher county are marketed there.

Gustave Schleicher, the man for whom Schleicher county was named, was born in Germany and educated at the university of Giessen. He chose civil engineering for his profession and de-

ided to come to America to develop this profession. In 1847 he and thirty-nine other men landed in Texas, and engaged in stock raising in Llano and neighboring counties. The Indians became very hostile and Schleicher and his friends had to go to San Antonio for protection. In 1853 he was elected a member of the lower house of the legislature of Texas. In 1854 he was elected surveyor of the Bexar land district, a tract of land including some one hundred and twenty-five counties. He served as a member of the state senate in 1859 and ranked as Captain for the Confederates in the civil war. He was a member of the 44th, 45th, and 46th, congress. He died Jan. 10, 1889. (3)

Crockett county was created from the Bexar land district and from Crockett county Schleicher county was created in 1901. Schleicher county was to be connected to Menard county for judicial purposes. Crockett county was at that time connected to Kenney county, and the distance was so great and means of communication so slow that Sutton and Schleicher counties were denied justice. The boundaries of Schleicher county as it was created from Crockett are: "Beginning at the Northwest corner of Menard county; thence West with the South boundary of Tom Green county fifty miles; thence South to the Northwest corner of Sutton county; thence East with the North boundary of Sutton county to the Southwest corner of Menard county; thence North with the West boundary of Menard county to the place of beginning.
