## Growing Green Feed in Winter for Chickens

One of the surest and easiest ways of supplying green feed to poultry during the winter is to sprout oats, starting a new crop every week to insure a regular supply of the feed from time to time. The most convenient way is to sprout them in trays, but elaborate sprouters are not necessary.

An oat sprouter can be easily and quickly made and started within ten minutes, by using old lard tubs or large wooden pails. Punch a hole in the tub or bore a hole in the bottom of the pail and make a plug for the hole so the tub or pail can be drained when necessary.

In starting the oats cover the bottom of the tub with a thin layer of dry oats and pour in enough luke-warm water to cover them to a depth of about two inches. This should be done in the morning, the water drained off at night and the wet oats poured into another pail. Then cover the oats with warm water and let them stand for five minutes and stir them until the water is being drained off. Keep the pail in a warm place. A wet cloth kept over the oats will keep them moist and within a week or less time the oats will be ready to feed. After the fifth day it is a good plan to place the oats in trays and keep them in the sun for two or three days so they will turn green.

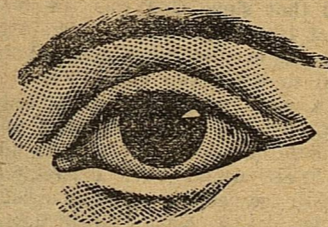
