## LUNCHEON

The El Dorado Lions Club met Wednesday at the Coffee Shop, for their second luncheon of the new club. Only a few were present, as the ranchmen and farmers are very busy shearing and planting.

The main discussion of the meeting was "Ridding Schleicher county of Prairie Dogs". Mr. Spencer, of the United States Geological Survey was a guest of the club and gave us some facts as to the poisoning of these dogs and other destructive pests. It is very essential for each land owner to kill the dogs and other small pests off his land, as it will do no good for the adjoining ranch to poison and the others to let them go. The dogs will soon move into another territory and their increase is very rapid unless kept down by poisoning.

Mr. L. E. Sumner, the Schleicher county agent informed the club that he had bought some of this poison and would help the people rid their ranches of these dogs.

It is a state law that every landowner kill the dogs and if he is not willing to do this then it is turned over to the sheriff to do so.

With this poison, Mr. Spencer states that it will not cost but from 2c to 4c an acre to kill these dogs. Every land owner in Schleicher county that has prairie dogs on his place should get in touch with Mr. Sumner and get some of this poison.

Mr. Spencer also gave mention to the killing of rabbits and field mice. In the experiments taken, they show that six rabbits will eat as much as one sheep.

The Lions Club offers Mr. Sumner their entire support in his work and hope that every man in the county will be willing to fall in line and get rid of the dogs and other pests.

The club is wanting more members from all over the county. Lets get together, farmers, ranchmen, town folk and make this club a real club and boost Schleicher county and El Dorado. The club should have a hundred members or more. Anyone who is for the upbuilding of his community should fall in line with the rest of the gang and get something started. Anyone wanting to join make application with entrance fee of ten dollars to Joe Williams, L. E. Sumner, J. E. Hill, or Dick Lawhon.

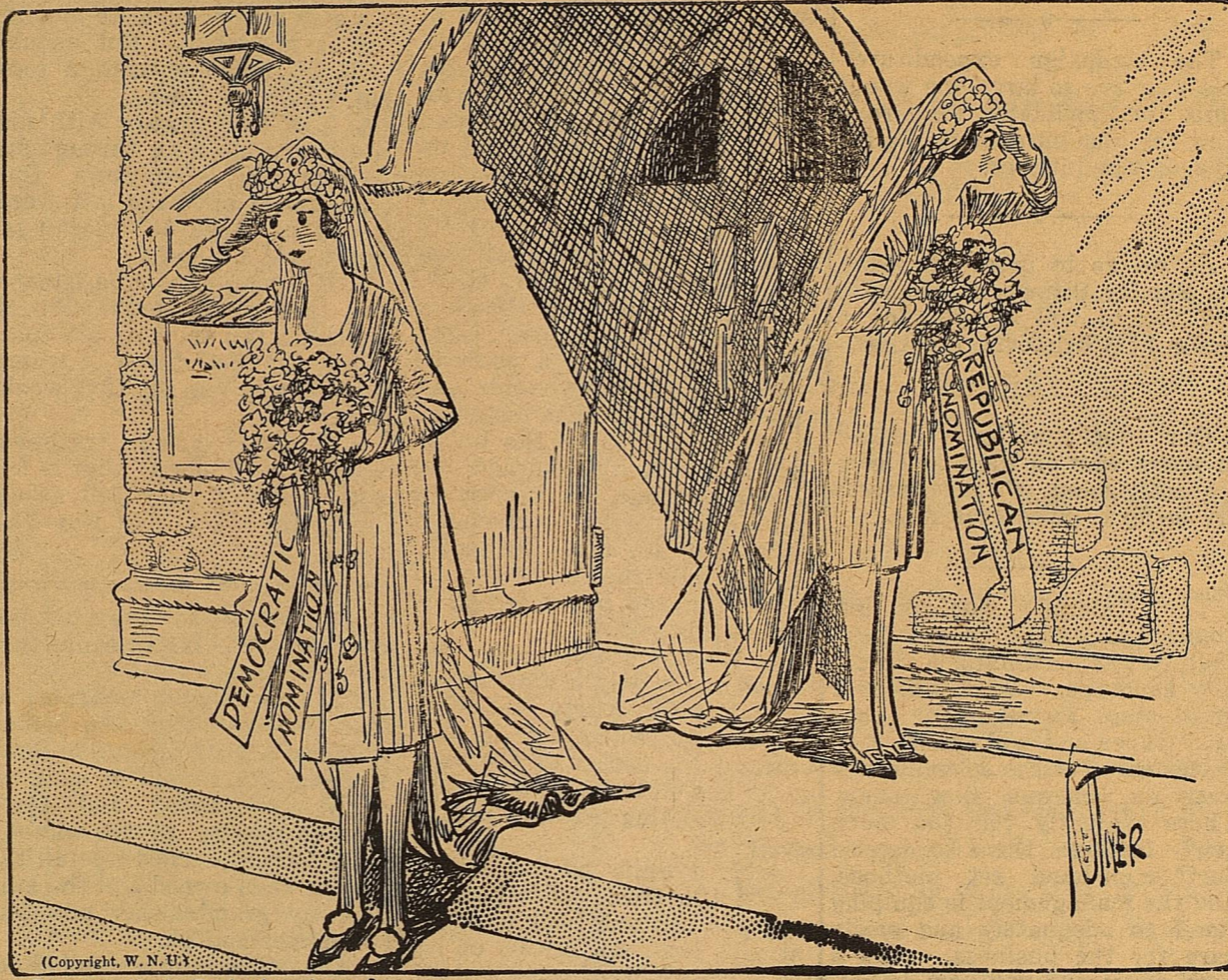
Mrs. H. W. Smith of Angleton and Mrs. C. P. Doose of Ballenger attended the party and were awarded guests prizes.

## DIRECTION OF NEW ROAD TO BE BUILT

Director of the proposed railroad from Corpus Christi to San Angelo have decided not to wait further on Frisco road, but will sell stock and build the road. The opportunities for stock purchasing is as follows: Corpus Christi, \$150,000; San Antonio, \$600,000; San Angelo, \$250,000; and \$400,000 to be raised by the counties through which the road will pass. In speaking of this route they mentioned from Sonora the road would follow the Old Spanish Trail as closely as possible, serving Roosevelt on the Llano, Junction and on to Kerrville. They are planning to use the old Orient road bed from San Angelo to Sonora.

Schleicher county will probably offer more tonnage to a railroad than most counties in West Texas. It raises more cotton, oats, and farm products than any of the neighboring counties except Tom Green, besides this we have large quantities of wool and mohair and fine stock to ship to market. We need the road and should give it encouragement.

## HISTORY OF AN EARLY SETTLER

Dave DeLong was born 18 miles south east of San Angelo, Texas, at Lipan Springs, February 8, 1866.

At the age of 6 years, his father, G. W. DeLong, started with two yoke of oxen, to get timber to build a house of. While on the way, his father with a discharged Lieutenant who was at that time staying with him, named Love, saw dust off the road about two miles away, going in the same direction that they were, but thought that it was wild mustang horses. They paid no further attention to the matter and continued on their way about five miles further when they were waylaid by Comanche Indians. The Indians had hidden in the tall Sacawesta grass and before G. W. DeLong saw them one shot him in the left arm. The man, Love, was also shot with a poisoned arrow, through the right ear. This drove him insane instantly. G. W. DeLong killed the Indian that had shot his comrade, but he was all alone, as his comrade was helpless, with fourteen Indians after his life. He placed his comrade in the bottom of the wagon and began trying to protect himself.

He climbed down under the wagon, with only a small brass steel, rim fire, forty four, Winchester, for protection. He shot through the spokes of the wagon as the Indians began charging by shooting poisoned arrows and guns.

After a while, all the Indians except the chief, went back to a small knoll and held a consultation. The chief ran by on his horse with a six-shooter in both hands, and tied down to his horse. G. W. DeLong aimed and fired at the chief, killing him. After the Indian warriors saw their leader killed they retreated because it is a custom of theirs not to fight after their chief is dead.

Mr. DeLong turned the oxen back toward home where he arrived at mid-night. The family found that he had been wounded and there was great excitement. At that time there was a small place called Fort Concho, where San Angelo now stands, and at this place a small hospital was erected. Mr. DeLong was taken to this hospital that morning and here he lay for six weeks before he revived.

At the age of eight years, Dave and their family moved to South Concho, where they erected the first dam at Christoval, Texas, for the purpose of irrigating. Although only a small lad, Dave tried to assist in the digging and erecting of this dam. At that time G. W. DeLong owned the land that Christoval now stands on. He also owned the land where a small ditch leads out of the Christoval river. My grandfather and his sons dug this irrigating ditch for four miles to irrigate all of his farm land. It took them a period of three years to complete this irrigation ditch. All the assistance that they had while digging this ditch was a small plow pulled with oxen. This shows the hard times they had in doing this

kind of work as they did not then have the instruments that we now have.

The land holding system of that time was that the person who dug a good irrigation ditch over one square mile of land, received six hundred and forty acres in return. In this way my grandfather settled up all the land he then owned and the land that my grandmother now has her homestead on.

Once, when only a small child, Dave went on a buffalo hunt with uncle Bill DeLong. They came to a large herd of buffalo and his uncle left him under a tree while he rode off to shoot some of the buffaloes.

Dave played around among the trees until he became tired and then began to wander toward the place where his uncle was shooting at the buffalo. An old buffalo with a small calf began coming in the boys direction. The uncle was not watching the small boy as he supposed that he was still under the tree where he left him. The buffaloes began chasing the boy and he began running toward his uncle. The uncle saw them then and killed the older buffalo but could not shoot the smaller one without hitting the boy. The boy was not afraid of the small calf and tried to bull-dog it but instead the calf began to wallow the boy. They began rolling over and over on the ground and the calf was stepping all over Dave. He was being bruised very badly but the uncle was afraid to shoot for fear that he would hit the boy. He finally had to take him off the boy by main force and then shoot him. The boy was almost frightened to death. He did not feel as if he would like to bull-dog any more buffalo calves after being trod all over by this one.

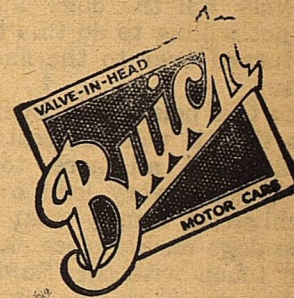

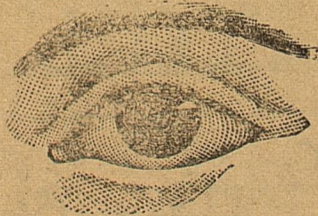

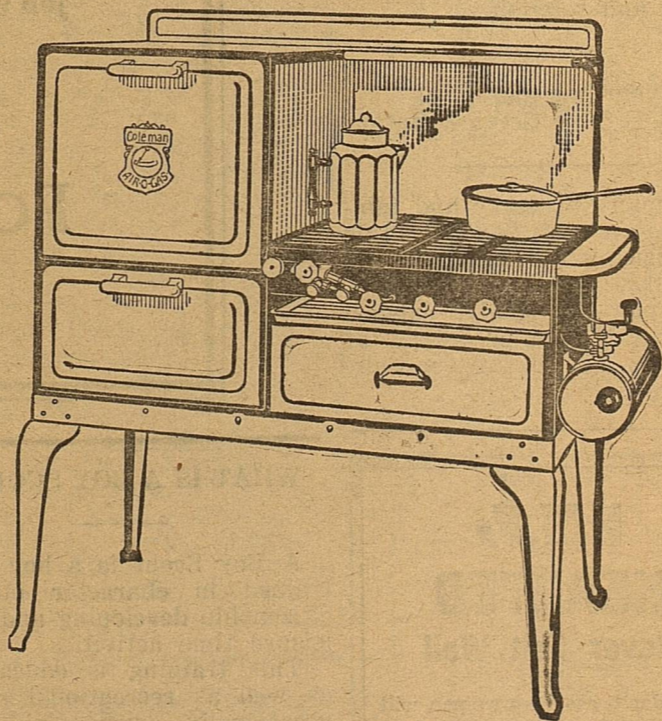

At the age of about ten, his father went off and left no one at home except his mother and a girl cousin and Dave, who was the eldest child. They were getting ready to go to bed one night when they heard all kinds of war whoops in the distance. His mother and cousin ran for the old gun, which was so large that they could hardly carry it. The old gun was filled with dirt dauber nests as it had not been in use in a great while. These two women began trying to clean the old gun without much success. Suddenly more and louder war whoops were heard. They hardly knew what to do as no help could be secured anywhere. All the children were frightened nearly to death. They were afraid that the Indians were setting the house on fire as through the windows they could see the torches of the Indians. They heard the noises stop all of a sudden and going to the door after a good while had passed, they could see nothing in sight. They were very thankful as they realized what all the Indians could have done if they had attacked the house.

As Dave DeLong grew older, he did not like the occupation of farming and took to cattle raising. He bought himself a ranch in 1895 sixteen miles northwest of El Dorado in Schleicher County. A post office was built here called Thorp, Texas. Later this post office was abolished as the people thought it about as easy to go into El Dorado for their mail as they had to get their supplies there any way.

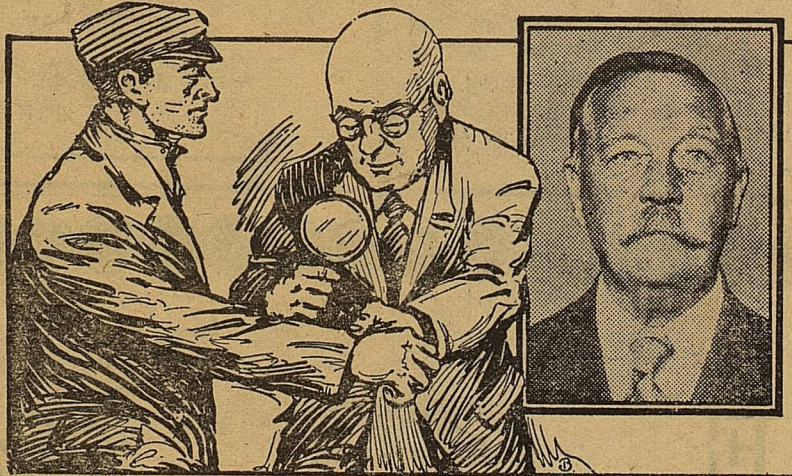
In 1899 Dave DeLong married Anna Belle Smith and they went to live on the ranch. At this time in 1905 there were two outlaws, Tom Ketchum and Dave Adkins, who were well known as bandits, who held up trains. My father and Dave Adkins were boys together in school. When Dave Adkins was about eighteen, he killed a man in self-defense and got up and left the country. He was of a good family and could probably have beat the case in court but he chose to run from the law.

Beginning with this mischief he got in with Tom Ketchum who had also killed a man over his sweetheart. They began doing worse things and did not care as they were hunted by officers everywhere. One day while riding in the pasture, my father came upon them sleeping in a canyon. Tom Ketchum had his horse trained to nicker when anyone was in sight. Dave DeLong was almost up to where they were when the horse nickered. They both jumped to their feet and put their guns on

**SCIENCE SHOWS SLEUTHS OF FUTURE MAY OUTDO EVEN SHERLOCK HOLMES**

Particles on Clothing May Show Man's Occupation and Home Town—French Investigator Paves Way With Microscopic Examination to Convict Slayer.



The Modern Sleuth Examines Suspect's Clothing With Microscope. Insert Shows Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Creator of Sherlock Holmes.

When Sherlock Holmes looked at a man's shoes and saw red on them, the great detective of fiction could tell instantly the locality from which the man came.

Detectives of the future will be able to go Holmes one better, if one may judge from some of the scientific studies now being made upon dust particles.

Physicians have long known that dust flying in the air may cause certain ailments and city officials have seen to it that children's health on city playgrounds is protected against dust by certain dust-laying chemicals, such as calcium chloride.

Researches show that a man's occupation may be determined from the dust particles found on his clothing and, further, in many cases, police may learn the name of the city in which he has his home.

The matter seems simple enough, too. A steel worker will have fine particles of steel clinging to his clothing, no matter how often he may brush them. Such particles might be removed by brooms, vacuum cleaners or even magnets, but a sufficient number remains for determination by a microscope.

So likewise might other occupations be determined: a school teacher, from chalk dust; a jeweler from gold and silver particles; a druggist from chemical specks; a lumberman from minute fragments of wood, and so through most of the scale.

In the same way a man's city may be determined by analysis of dust found in his clothing. If it contains much carbon or coal, he probably comes from Scranton; if copper, from Butte, Montana; if bits of minute coral, from St. Augustine, Florida, whose streets are paved with coral, and similarly down the list.

No one pretends that the list at this time is accurate. But some patient investigators in the future may compile a list of occupations, as well as of cities, with all the precision that advances of science may bring to it and then the job of the detective promises to be easier.

A few years ago a French scientist was able to help the police to convict a man suspected of a certain murder in a quarry. The suspect said he had been sleeping in the fields. Microscopic examination of the man's clothing revealed the presence of quartz stone traces. The man then confessed

Try the appended recipe in your oven and let the mouth-watering result speak for itself.

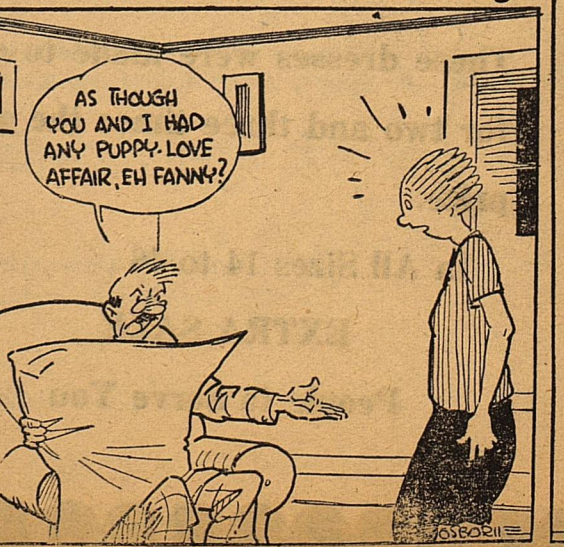
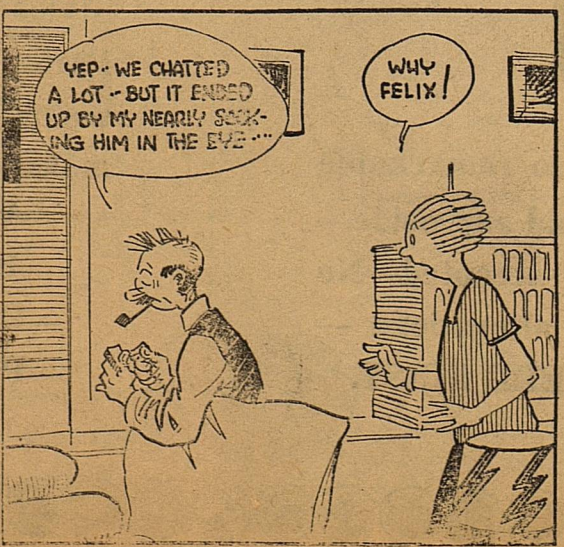
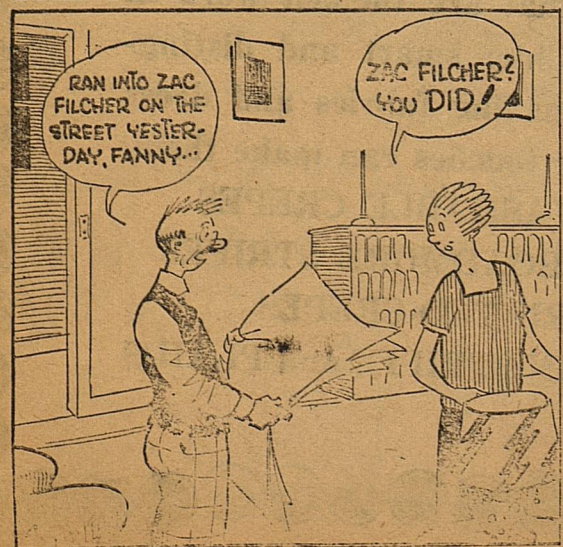
**Old-Fashioned Shortcake.**

Ingredients: Two cupsful of flour, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one-half teaspoonful of salt, six tablespoonfuls of margarine or butter, three-quarters of a cupful of milk also two tablespoonfuls of sugar, if slightly sweetened dough is preferred.

Sift the dry ingredients together, cut or rub in margarine or butter until mealy looking, and add milk to make soft dough. Flour board well, toss dough onto it, sprinkle flour over dough, and roll the mass out one-half inch thick. Cut with a large biscuit cutter for individual shortcakes, while for one shortcake, divide dough into two equal parts, rolling each one just to fit a deep cake pan. Place one on top of the other, set in ungreased baking pans and bake at 450 Fahrenheit for about twelve minutes.

When done, slit in two crosswise, spread one-half generously with margarine or butter, then with berries, placing the other half on top and cover this with whipped cream and more berries.
