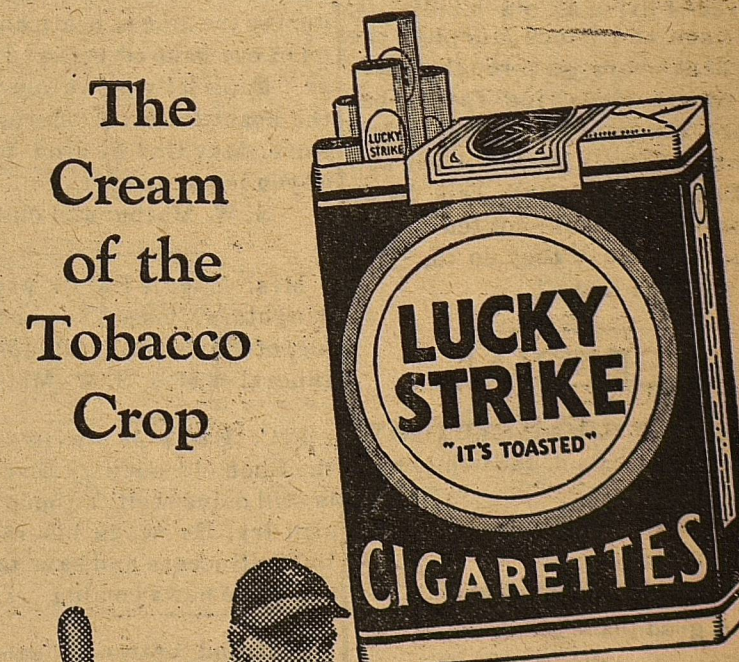

A. D. Jackson, Chief, Division of Publications, of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at College Station, writes the new editor of The Success quite encouraging. A portion of the letter reads as follows:

"Allow me to welcome you into the newspaper fraternity. I am not directly connected with the publication of any paper but furnish a great deal of copy to the newspapers and I edit a large number of publications for the Experiment Station."

"I am writing this letter principally because of the editorial paragraphs noted in the issue of April 13, wherein I think you hit the key note on farm relief by advising the farmers to advertise. I have been advocat-

ing this proposition for several years, and every summer during the Farmer's Short Course I have had as many editors as would accept our invitation to meet here as guests of the College to discuss newspaper policies and practices, and I have tried to emphasize in every one of these programs for six years the fact that farm products should be better sold, and in order to do it advertising is absolutely essential."

The Editor appreciates the nice long letter, of which we only print a small portion, from Mr Jackson, and such letters will inspire us on into a sure enough newspaper man.

Our Linotype was shipped out of New York Monday and should be here in two or three weeks. It won't be long until we lay aside our hand setting system in the most part, then we can give you a much neater paper and more of it.

### THE FLIGHT OF THE BREMEN.

Another flight of world renown has been accomplished. Again it was a monoplane. Again it was the story of intrepidity—of unquantified courage. This time three men flew together over the restless north Atlantic, proving once more than "it can be done."

Captain Hermann Koehl, Baron Von Huenefeld and Commandant James E. Fitzmaurice may never receive the plaudits accorded to Lindbergh, nor even the honors bestowed upon Byrd, Chamberlin, Levine and other daring souls who have braved the air and seas, but the world's hat will also be taken off and waved for the men of the Bremen. It was only the shortage of fuel that prevented them from reaching their intended destination, New York. Their forced landing taking nothing from their credit, detracts nothing from their deserved fame. For they have again contributed to the world of science and aeronautics a positive example of practical achievement.

From a romantic viewpoint the flight of the Bremen has brought nearer the time when trans-oceanic flights will have lost their glamor. The almost uncanny achievements of Lindbergh in his flight from New York to Paris, of Chamberlin and Levine from New York to Germany, and of the round-the-world and Hawaiian flyers and North Pole circlers will, of course, remain indelibly fixed in the minds of those who have lived and known, and will stand out as pioneer undertakings in the field of aviation and in future history. But what is to come next?

Next will come actual and commonplace transportation by air across and over lands, lakes, oceans, plains and jungles. In fact, this is upon us. The whole world is becoming air-minded. People are now talking less about the dangers of flying, and more about the efficiency and utility of the air travel in practical and pleasurable pursuits of mankind. The dangers of flying are being minimized by the onward rush of necessity. Men are spending millions in the perfection of safe and powerful motors to be placed in comfortable and commodious ships. Aviation is coming true. Lindbergh's heroic accomplishment—that dazzling, enchanting, superman effort—is becoming real. And the brave men of the Bremen have helped to make America's idol of the air a real human being, whose deed will be taken by future generations as a great beacon light to the path of progress. Thanks to the Bremen, Lindbergh's deed will not in a thousand years be recalled as a

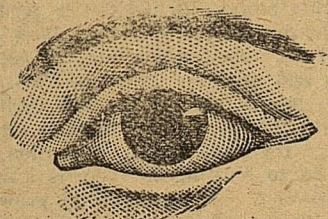

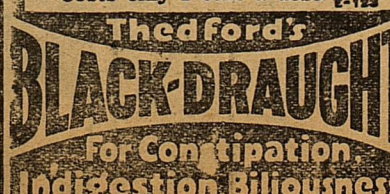

**Lesson for April 29**  
**THE COST OF DISCIPLESHIP**

LESSON TEXT—Mark 10:17-27; 12:41-44.  
GOLDEN TEXT—Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—Loving Jesus Best of All.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—Putting Jesus First.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—The Supreme Choice.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Peril of Riches.

1. The Rich Young Ruler (10:17-27).  
1. His question.  
"What shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?" This young man was in earnest. He came running and knelt to Jesus. This question reveals a void in his heart. He was a young man with a lovable character. "Jesus beholding him, loved him." He was moral, honest, earnest and courageous, but had a defective theology. He thought that eternal life could be obtained by good works. Though he claimed to have kept the law, he was conscious of lacking something. He was willing to do something to fill up that which was lacking, therefore he came to Jesus to make inquiry as to that lack.

2. Jesus' reply (vv. 18, 19).  
He knew the young man's heart and put his finger on the weak spot in his life. Jesus reiterated the commandments, but when it came to parting with his possessions in order to help his neighbor he parted with the Lord, going away sorrowful.  
3. Lacking one thing and yet lost (vv. 21, 22).  
When the Lord pointed out to him that the defect in his life was the love of money, he was unwilling to pay the price. When the time came in his life to choose between eternal life and riches he chose wealth and parted company with Christ.

4. The peril of riches (vv. 23-27).  
Jesus said, "How hardly shall they that have riches enter into the kingdom of God." When He discerned the astonishment of the disciples He answered again and said, "How hard is it for them that trust in riches to enter into the kingdom of God. It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God." The difficulty does not lie in the fact that a man possesses riches, for one may possess riches and still be an heir of the kingdom. Wealth is a mighty power. In itself it is good. It will provide bread for the widow and orphans, amelioration for the suffering, and send the gospel of Christ to the ends of the earth. The peril of riches lies in trusting in them. However, the step from possession of riches to trusting in them is a very short one. The tendency of growing wealth is to destroy the noble life of the soul. So long as a man possesses riches he is safe, but as soon as riches possess the man he is in deadly peril.

II. The Widow's Mite (Mark 12:41-44).  
Jesus had spent a strenuous day and was now quietly watching the surging throng. Observe:  
1. Jesus sitting over against the treasury (v. 41). The treasury was the place where the worshippers deposited their tithes and offerings. Jesus sat where He could see them drop their money into the chests. He saw the poor casting into the treasury their small coins and He also saw the rich bringing larger coins. It is a solemn truth that Jesus' eye always beholds the gifts of the people. We may be able to conceal them from the people, but we cannot conceal them from His eye.  
2. A certain poor widow threw into the treasury two mites (v. 42).  
The mite was the smallest copper coin made. The mite was worth about one-eighth of a cent, therefore her offering was one-fourth of a cent in value.  
3. Jesus said unto His disciples, "Verily I say unto you that this poor widow hath cast more in than all they which have cast into the treasury" (v. 43). The Lord estimates gifts by the motive of the heart, not by their amount.  
4. Gifts are measured by what the donor has left, not by what was given

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(v. 44). This widow cast into the treasury all that she had, even all her living. The rich gave of their abundance. Though their gifts were much more than that of the poor widow, yet they had an abundance left.  
This woman's influence goes on. Many devoted Christians have followed her example and have given their all.

**Development of a Plan Needed for Good Garden**

The first step toward making a successful garden is the development of a plan showing the general arrangement, direction of rows and area devoted to the different crops. More economical use may be made of the area available by planning for succession, companion and intercropping. For example, a crop of late beets may be planted after a crop of early peas have been harvested or a crop of lettuce may be raised between the tomato plants and gathered before the tomato plants need all the space. Fresh peas, beans and corn may be had over a longer period by making several plantings at intervals of two weeks or by planting early, mid-season and late varieties. The likes and dislikes of the members of the family should be considered and selections made accordingly.

**Fanning Mill to Clean Seed Most Satisfactory**

A few hours spent indoors cleaning seed with a fanning mill may save many days in the hot sun next summer and will pay handsome dividends in the form of bigger and better crops. A farm fanning mill operated at the correct speed and equipped with the proper sieves and screens is capable of doing an excellent job of cleaning clover, alfalfa and other seeds. Since experiments have shown that the main object of cultivation after the preparation of the seed bed is the eradication of weeds, and since most weeds are introduced by means of impure seed, the use of cleaned seed will save a great deal of future work. The value of a good fanning mill in cleaning farm seeds has been demonstrated by hundreds of farmers.

**Agricultural Hints**

Soy-bean hay as a roughage is equally as valuable in the ration as is the seed.

The main thing in inoculating soy beans is to make them real dirty with the right kind of dirt.

Swiss chard belongs to the beet family and is grown the same way—in rows thinned 6 to 12 inches apart.

Treating fence posts with creosote makes many kinds of wood posts last 20 or more years. The treatment costs but little.

Let the hoe be your garden putter, brassie and dibble, for half an hour a day, and you will surprise yourself with a wonderful garden.

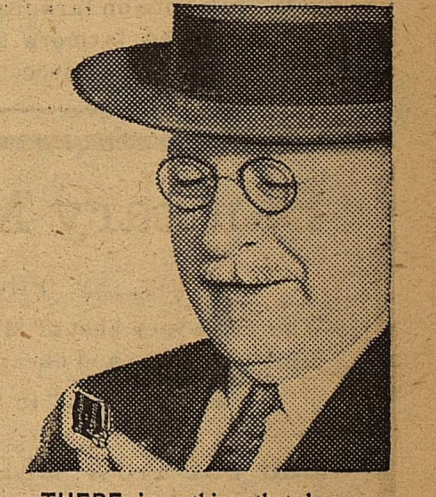
