SAN ANGELO CRIME A MOST HIDEOUS ONE

One of the most hideous crimes known to West Texas has been committed in the City of San Angelo, when on Saturday night March 3, 1928, Newt Byrnes with a hatchet and butcher knife brutally murdered Mrs. W. J. Juergens, her 12 year old daughter Myrna, and Mrs. Rosa Shirra, mother of Mrs. Juergens and dismembered their bodies and left them locked up in their home until the stench from their decaying bodies became noticeable to nearby neighbors and lead to their discovery.

Byrnes had been making his home with the Juergens family about three years, and according to his own statement quarreled during Saturday with Mrs. Juergens over money matters, returning Saturday night after they had retired for the night and committed his horrible crime, after the deed was committed Byrnes went to a hotel and spent the night, returning to the scene on Monday, plundering the house, finding \$40 in money he took the family car and left San Angelo.

After the bodies were discovered, Mr. Juergens at Texon was notified and immediately came to San Angelo, told officers he suspected Byrnes, friends at Sulpher Springs were notified by phone of the crime and that Byrnes was suspiciously, the reply came back that Byrnes was then in Sulpher Springs, he was arrested and later confessed to the crime.

Mr. Juergens was also held a few days for investigation, but was released and allowed to accompany the dead bodies to Pitsburg, Pa., for burial.

Mr. Juergens was an employe of the Big Lake Oil Co., Picture Show, working at Texon, his family residing at San Angelo.

Byrnes will be 25 years old in April, he says he is not crazy although he has a sister and an aunt that is crazy, he says he was a Baptist, but guess he would want a Priest as the Juergens were Catholics. He father states that he guess he had told enough to send him to hell but he would fight for his freedom. His father is dead, his mother Mrs. J. E. Dorsett lives in Birmingham, Ala., Byrnes had no education. He is now in jail at San Angelo. Some things about the crime he dose not remember using the butcher knife or ice pick, he says he used an ax, but the girls body showed that the ice pick had been stuck into her 11 times, the butcher knife was also used in mutilating the bodies as well as a hatchet.

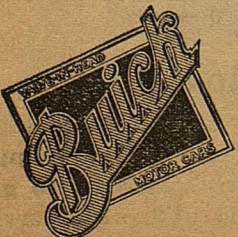

We call the attention of the American Bankers Association to the case of Mr. Washkowsky of Brooklyn. Mr. Washkowsky is hard working and thrifty, but like so many of us his education is defective; who is to blame for that we don't know. Mr. Washkowsky has been saving a part of his weekly wages for a long time, but hadn't told Mrs. Washkowsky where he was depositing his nest egg. That was a mistake, probably, but an inquiry into it belongs to another branch of education with which it is probable the bankers association cannot be held to have any concern.

But with Mr. Washkowsky's depositary it has. He chose for that purpose an old shoe. He kept the shoe and its mate in his closet, and up to the other day had tucked away in one of them savings amounting to \$300. On that same other day Mrs. Washkowsky, rummaging Mr. Washkowsky's closet like a good housewife, seeking what she could throw away or transfer to another place where Mr. Washkowsky couldn't find it, as is the habit of good housewives, found this same pair of old shoes. We suppose she said to herself, Mr. Washkowsky not being present to have it said to him, "Isn't that just like a man?" and acting thereupon just like a woman she sent the shoes to the cobbler to be repaired. It was either that or the ash barrel for them, and being frugal and Mr. Washkowsky paying the cobbler bills anyway, she sent them to the cobbler.

A distraught man was Mr. Washkowsky when he next went to make a deposit in his old shoe. "What new place," he asked in that martyr tone affected by husbands on similar occasions, "have you found for my old shoes?" Mrs. Washkowsky told him, expecting to be praised for her thoughtfulness. Women—but that's another branch of education.

Mr. Washkowsky went to the cobbler and found his shoes, but not the money, which we cannot but feel is not remarkable. We hope he will find it, but he hasn't yet, which again should cause no astonishment.

But what we would like to hear from the American Bankers Association is what steps it is taking to discourage people of maple habits from keeping their money in stoves, shoes, mantle clocks, behind wall pictures, under floor boards and similar places. We have made no exact calculation, but from casual evidence we are inclined to believe there are enough funds hidden away in such places in this enlightened and progressive country to pay off the national debt. Not that we advise paying it off, because that would leave congress nothing to fuss with Mr. Mellon about; but if deposited in banks our banker might have some to lend when we need it, which he now never has; he says money is very scarce. We hold it is not; it is merely in Mr. Washkowsky's shoe.

Seeing that we have been pursuing education, or something called that, for several centuries, we cannot but feel this is a bad showing and that the bankers association is somehow responsible. It hasn't sufficiently impressed on the people that it has banks and what they are for. Mr. Washkowsky hasn't heard. And there are a lot of him in this country.—Kansas City Star.

Begin Preparations for Spring Planting

If Plans Are Well Laid Better Crop Will Result.

"Now is the right time to begin preparations for the spring rush of planting," says E. C. Blair, extension agronomist at the North Carolina State college. "If plans are well laid now and put into action without delay, a better crop will result. There are many important factors that contribute to a good yield, such as soil fertility, proper fertilization, good seed, good cultivation, and good seasons; but other things being anywhere nearly equal, the crop that is planted on time will always outyield one planted too late.

"Fall and winter plowing is the first step to take. All fields not growing cover crops should be well broken as soon as soil conditions will permit. Winter freezes will pulverize these fields much better and cheaper than can be done with harrows in the spring.

"The farmer who is following a definite crop rotation already knows how many acres of each crop he will have in the spring, and on what fields each crop is to be planted. This practice should be followed by all farmers to enable them to plan intelligently."

Find Phosphate Trebles

Crop Yield in Missouri

How six bushels of wheat were added to the acre yields each time that 200 pounds of acid phosphate were applied to the field is strikingly illustrated in the report of M. B. Ditty, county agent, to the Missouri College of Agriculture.

Previous to 1924, the six and one-half acre field of S. W. Vivion, Lafayette county (Mo.) farmer near Mayview, returned only six bushels of wheat to the acre. That fall, he applied 200 pounds of 16 per cent acid phosphate per acre when the wheat was sown. In 1925 he harvested 12 bushels from this "six-bushel" field.

A second planting of wheat, on the same field, in the fall with an additional 200 pounds of 16 per cent acid phosphate, increased the yield to 18 bushels. A mixture of alsike, red and sweet clover, sown on the 1925 wheat, returned 15 tons of cured hay this season from the six and one-half acres.

At present car lot prices, the 400 pounds of 16 per cent acid phosphate cost \$5.29 for each acre, but returned six more bushels of wheat the first year and 12 more bushels the second year, a total of 18 bushels to the acre. If the wheat is valued at \$1 a bushel, the returns for this labor approximate \$12 more to the acre. As the clover crop was also doubled, the net returns for labor are even greater.

Three Points Spelling

Success or a Failure

Farmers who intend to plant apple orchards should remember that if an orchard has a good site, if the soil is good, and if good varieties are planted, there is a good chance for success, but if these three points are unfavorable, even the most industrious and best-informed fruit grower may not be able to make money, according to the New York State College of Agriculture.

Varieties must, of course, be adapted to the site and soil, but also to the present market demands. The future market preferences must also be anticipated. The trees, themselves, should be heavy producers, for large yields are produced at less cost for each bushel or each barrel.

Quality of the fruit is another point that must be considered, for the fruit must be in demand on the market and must sell for a good price. As time goes on, quality is going to be more and more important, largely due to present-day transportation and storage facilities.

Perishable McIntosh may now be kept in cold storage until April if carefully handled. Thus they compete directly with better keeping but lower-quality varieties which formerly enjoyed a ready sale when earlier sorts were gone.

According to a recent survey in New England, 50 per cent of the apples for household use are used raw, and this tendency will undoubtedly increase.

Much Experimental Work Made on Dairy Wastes

Much experimental work on dairy wastes has been made by the following institutions: United States public health service, Washington; college of agriculture, Madison, Wis.; Iowa State college, Ames, Iowa; college of agriculture, Ithaca, N. Y.; and each of these have available bulletins and suggestions.

In general, the use of a septic tank will take care nicely of wastes from washing milk bottles, utensils, tanks, floors and so on. The tank should be of fairly good size, but built in the same manner as recommended for household use. In fact, the same tank can be used for both if of good size. The sludge formed has a tendency to get rather solid and it may be necessary to remove some sludge every year or so. Apparently a reasonable use of washing powders does not seriously interfere with the action of the septic tank. Large quantities of skim milk, whey or buttermilk will seriously interfere with the action of the septic tank. Milk wastes will quickly clog up any cesspool, even in gravel soil.

WHAT EDUCATION INVOLVES

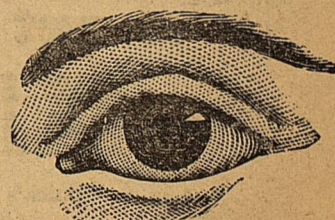

Disinfection Is Best for Scab

Kills Organisms on Tuber and Prevents Introduction Into Soil.

The importance of seed disinfection in the growing of a clean crop of potatoes is much greater than the average grower realizes. Potato specialists at the college of agriculture in New Brunswick point out that in tests conducted in 1920 disinfected seed showed an increase of 33.9 bushels per acre over untreated seed. In addition to the increase in yield there was a considerable reduction in the number of scabby potatoes.

Kills Organisms.
Not only will disinfection kill organisms on the tuber, but it prevents their introduction into the soil as well. This is especially true of scab organisms. Unquestionably, if seed treatment had been more generally adopted in the past, more growers would not now be growing scabby potatoes.

There are two chemicals commonly recommended for seed treatment, formaldehyde and corrosive sublimate. Formaldehyde does not give as efficient control of scab, so the use of corrosive sublimate is advised. This material is a poison and must be kept away from animals; furthermore, it corrodes metal and must be made up and used in wooden containers.

Mix Corrosive Sublimate.
Mix corrosive sublimate at the rate of 4 ounces to 30 gallons of water. The potatoes should be soaked in this solution for at least one-half hour, but if heavily infected with scab or rhizoctonia, continue the treatment one hour. As soon as potatoes are treated they should be removed from the solution and dried. Corrosive sublimate is removed from the solution by the potatoes, so measures must be adopted to keep it up to original strength. This may be done by adding one-half ounce of dissolved corrosive sublimate after treating every four bushels. Seed can be treated for from four to five cents a bushel.

Swine Flu Exceedingly Expensive to Breeders

Since the introduction of preventive measures for hog cholera, greater loss is sustained by hog producers from flu than from cholera. Flu undoubtedly causes greater financial loss to the producer of hogs than any other single disease. While many hogs actually die from flu the main damage occasioned by this disease is the result of loss in condition of the herd. When a herd is infected with the flu, even though recovery is secured without loss of death, there is a tremendous waste of feed, for the porkers not only fail to gain in weight while affected with the disease, but generally they also lose weight. When brood sows become affected with the flu, the problem is still more serious because it very often causes abortion and if not, many of the pigs will be born dead, so that the average number of pigs raised per sow, even though no sows are lost, may be reduced by 100 per cent, which makes the pigs very expensive. The thing to do is to institute preventive measures against this disease by supplying good, well ventilated sleeping quarters, kept well bedded.

Take Vigorous Measures Against Pest of Rodents

With rats and mice in evidence in large numbers, farmers will do well to begin vigorous control measures against these filthy, destructive pests. Powdered barium carbonate, mixed with various types of food on a basis of one part of the poison to four parts of the selected food, has proved very effective.

In the control of large rats, which are especially destructive to young poultry, a rabbit carcass with the poison worked into knife cuts, has given unusually good results. The poison should be worked into the cuts in the proportion of one part to four of the flesh, and the carcass placed where rats will have ready access, but poultry and other domestic animals will not be endangered. Securing the carcass firmly with wire will prevent large rats from dragging it away.

Short Farm Notes

Scrub seed should not be allowed to reproduce themselves.

Look up last year's garden plan and study it for improvements.

Plan your plantings so all your work won't come at the same time.

Sweet clover seed should not be sown too late in the spring or it may not give a good stand.

Look over the lists of new garden tools. They turn out new and more efficient tools every year.

Time spent selecting and testing seed corn will pay the farmer many dollars per hour, for his labor.

Early potatoes may be secured by early planting of early varieties in deep, rich, warm soil, followed by thorough cultivation or mulching with straw.

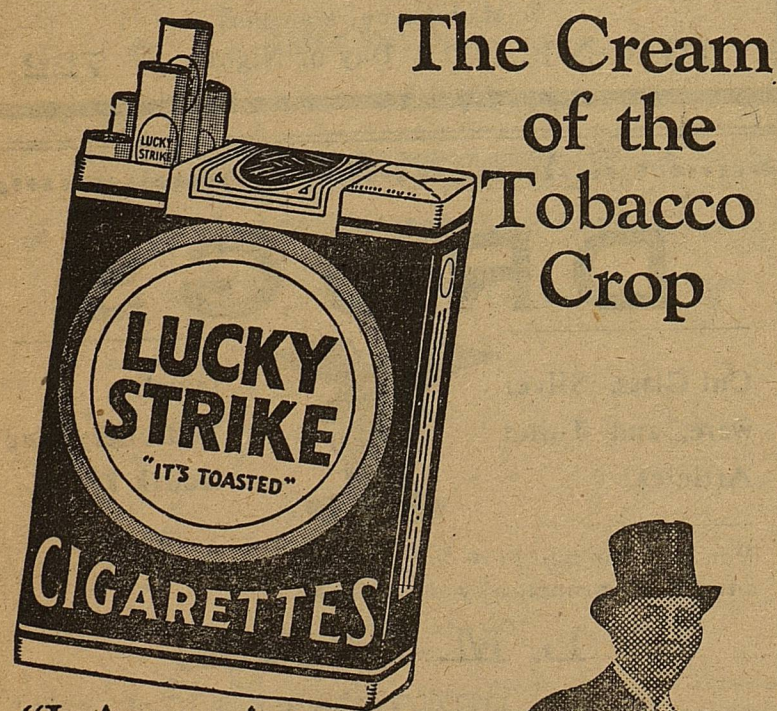

Quills Long in Use

Quills are supposed to have been used for writing pens in the Fifth century, though the conjecture rests mainly on an anecdote of Theodoric, king of the Ostrogoths, who, being so illiterate that he could not write even the initials of his own name, was provided with a plate of gold through which the letters were cut, and, this being placed on the paper when his signature was required, he traced the letters with a quill. The date of the earliest certain account of the modern writing pen is 633. The next notice occurs in the latter part of the same century, in a Latin sonnet to a pen by Aldhelm, a Saxon author. Steel pens were first made by Wise in England, in 1803.

Sunday School Lesson

Lesson for March 18

JESUS TEACHES SINCERITY

LESSON TEXT—Mark 7:1-23. GOLDEN TEXT—Keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life.

PRIMARY TOPIC—Obeying God and Our Parents. JUNIOR TOPIC—Honoring God and Our Parents.

INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Sincerity in Religion. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Jesus Denounces Formalism.

I. The Emptiness of Formal Worship (vv. 1-7).

The tendency of the human heart is to depart from the life and to choose the mere form which is calculated to express the life. The traditions and customs adopted by men for the temporary help of the spiritual life frequently are crystallized into laws and made to supersede the laws and institutions of God.

1. The charge against Christ (v. 2). This was that Christ's disciples ate bread with unwashed hands. The charge was not on the basis of physical uncleanness, but their disregard of custom which was to engage in the thorough washing of the hands before eating, as well as washing the pots and vessels.

2. Examples of empty forms (vv. 2-4). (1) Washing of the hands before eating (v. 3). They not only washed their hands often but diligently and intensely.

(2) Washing of cups, tables, pots and brazen vessels. The ceremonial washing applied to the vessels as well as the hands.

3. Explanation demanded by the Pharisees (v. 5). They asked Christ to explain why His disciples ignored the tradition of the elders with reference to ceremonial cleansing.

4. Christ's answer (vv. 6, 7). He declared that worship which centered in forms was as empty and meaningless as was lip service where the heart was away from God. This He calls hypocrisy, even such as foretold by Isaiah, the prophet. Men of his day made much of external observance and of religious rites, while their hearts remained unchanged.

II. Making the Word of God of None Effect (vv. 8-13).

1. How it may be done (v. 8). It was done by punctiliously observing the precepts of man, such as washing of the hands, pots, etc., while ignoring the commandments of God. This is being done by those who make much of the externalities of religion but at the same time are indifferent to the moral requirements.

2. An instance cited (vv. 9-13). The law of God as given by Moses said, "Honor thy father and thy mother, and whoso curseth father or mother, let him die the death; but ye say, if a man shall say to his father or mother, it is Corban, that is to say, a gift, by whatsoever thou mightest be profited by me, he shall be free, and ye suffer him no more to do ought for his father or his mother." The law of God demands of children that they care and provide for parents in their need. According to an accepted tradition among the Jews, if a man should consecrate his goods or possessions to the Lord's service by pronouncing over them the word "Corban," which means "the gift," his goods would be thus dedicated to God, and would not be available for help to his parents. It was possible, therefore, for a man to be enjoying wealth while his parents were in destitution.

III. The Real Source of Defilement and Impurity (vv. 14-23).

1. Sin is moral and spiritual. Uncleanness before God is not of the body save as the body is directed by the soul. A man is not defiled by that which enters his mouth but by that which springs out of his soul.

2. That which springs out of the heart—the deliberate choice of the will—is the source of defilement (v. 20).

3. A list of evils springing out of the heart (vv. 21, 22). The awful list is as follows:

Evil thoughts, adulteries, fornications, murders, thefts, covetousness, wickedness, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, blasphemy, pride, foolishness, which all come from within. This catalogue includes every possible form of evil. Every one of them originate in the heart and when they become acts of the will and life they defile the man. It is only when temptations and solicitations lead to indulgence by the deliberate act of the will that they corrupt a man.
