Lawhon Jr., Joe Williams, J. E. Hill, and L. E. Sumner. The club meets every week on Wednesday for one hour only from 12:30 to 1:30.

RANCHMEN MEET

Several ranchmen from the south and southwest part of the County, met at the Court house last Saturday night, May 19th, for the purpose of organizing another territory for trapping flies. These fly traps have been very successful in ridding the different sections of flies.

There is one organization in the southwest part of the county but has only been in operation about seven weeks, using around 275 traps. Floyd Chick has been operating these traps and is using old horses and burros for bait and rebait every ten days. The ranchmen using traps on their ranches are:

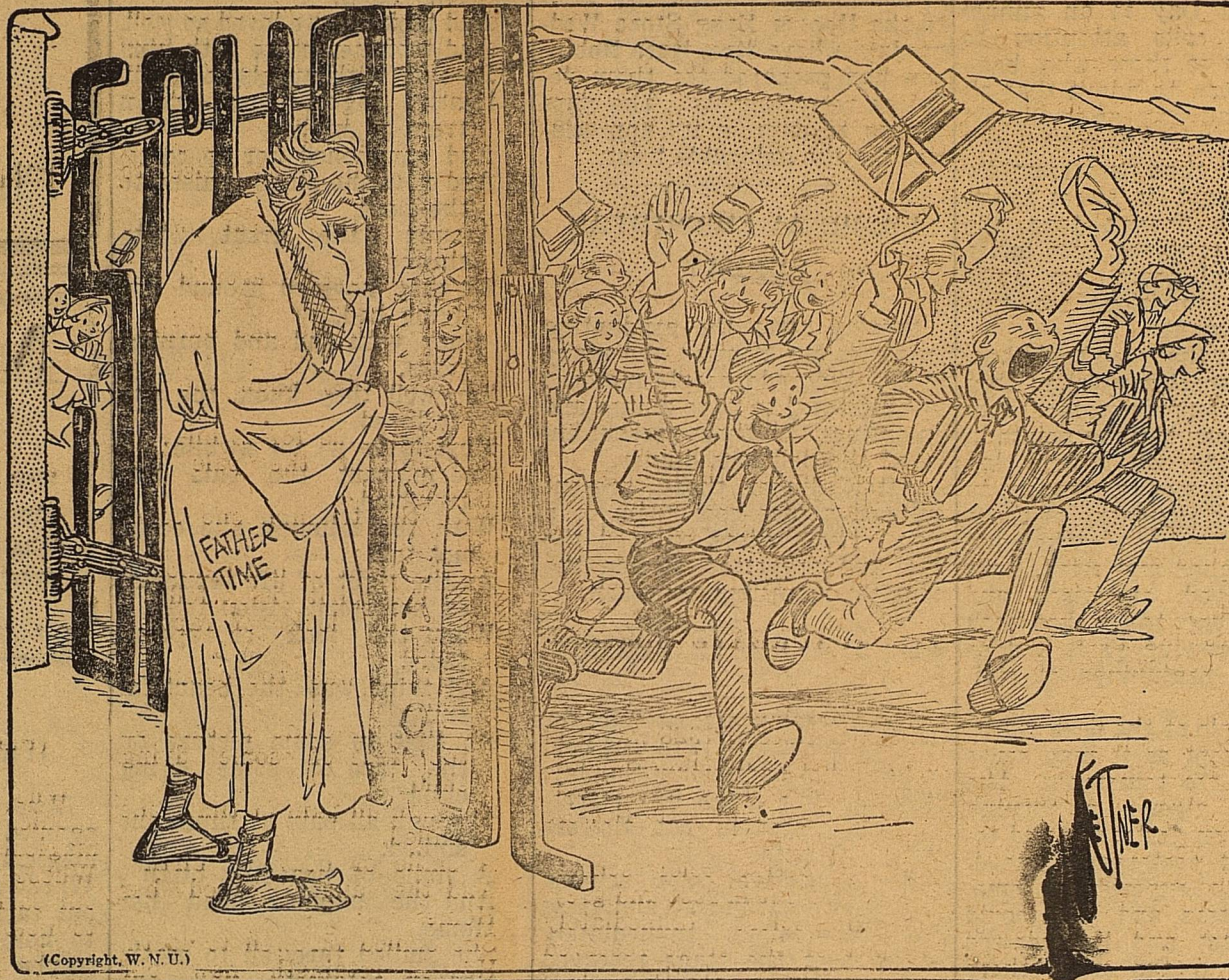
It is essential that most of the county use these traps, in order to kill all flies. The trapping in one section will do no good unless the other sections are also trapped.

Menard county has been using these traps for the past three years and have found them a very successful way to kill flies. The Schleicher county ranchmen should get together and farm an organization over the entire county and rid it of these pests.

Ozona, Texas. — More than \$4,000 in premiums and purses will be given during the Crockett County Fair Association's Rodeo, Race Meet and Stock Show to be held in Ozona June 27, 28 and 29, according to the premium list and program now being printed.

The Ozona Fair this year will outstrip any previous effort, according to Joe Pierce, President of the Association. The Stock Show, which is of primary interest to stockmen throughout this territory, will be bigger and better than ever before, more than \$1200 in premiums being offered in this division. The Sheep Sale, to be held on the mornings of the 27th and 28th, will attract some of the best breeders in America, and the sheep show will also attract entries from some of the best breeders of Texas and the northwestern states.

The rodeo and racing events will hold each afternoon of the three days, including steer breakaway, bronc riding, cow

milking, calf roping and steer riding contests. Purses in the rodeo events range from \$100 to \$250. There will be three races each day with purses ranging from \$75 to \$250.

In addition to all these attractions there will be a free barbecue each day at noon, carnival shows with 30 high class attractions, including five riding devices, an airplane circus each day at noon, and a big dance each night on the outdoor platform at the fair grounds. All West Texas is invited to come celebrate with Ozona.
