## CHEATING THE CHILDREN

Garland and territory should contend themselves exceedingly successful and fortunate in that they were able to hold a full school term and pay the teachers in full. We have heard of several instances where teachers were only paid half salary, and some of our neighboring communities have been hard put to keep their schools going. Just what closing a school because of lack of funds will mean in the future might be gleaned from the following editorial from the Woman's Home Companion:

June brings vacation for most school children. But this year for vast numbers vacation has begun prematurely—in May, in April or even earlier—because cities and towns had no money with which to pay teachers. It is estimated that at least five thousand schools have been closed. Many will not reopen next fall.

Children will not be expected to start any rebellion because of this. Most of them probably think themselves just so much to the good. A few years hence they will begin to realize that a world has cheated them out of opportunities that have been the right of American children since the early days of this republic and that long months of the most valuable time there is—the time of childhood—have been wasted.

As Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur has said, "The present depression is like a forest fire which kills many trees and sears all. In some the scars are so deep that no future growth can cover them."—Garland News.

## Artesian Water Found In Irion County

While drilling for oil near Sherwood in Irion County Sunday, an Artesian flow of water was found that will be used for irrigation purposes. The well had been drilled to 202 feet when the water began to flow over the top and it is said that the water has power enough to raise a 200 pound man from the top of the 12 1-2 inch casing from which it flows. Scores of people have visited the well. The land owners have agreed to let the drillers have an interest in the water well and will retain only a fourth. Another well will be drilled near by and if water is found like the one drilled, it too will be used for irrigation purposes. The land on which the flow was found belongs to Mr. C. Kinser.

## Course In Agriculture To Be Offered In Local High School

At a recent meeting of the trustees of the Eldorado district it was decided to offer a general course in agriculture in the local high school during the coming term. This course is to be substituted for Biology and will be taught by Mr. Dave Williamson, who is a graduate of Texas A. & M. College and who has taught vocational agriculture in the past. The purpose of making the change for the coming year is to offer a practical course in agriculture to those boys who do not expect to go to college but who do expect to make farmers or ranchmen. The new course will cost little and is hoped that such a course will be continued as vocational agriculture in the years following.

## THE NEW HIGHWAY POLICY

An enthusiastic reception was accorded the highway commission's announcement that no more aid will be required in the construction of state highways. However, it might be well to reflect that the decision may not confer an unmitigated blessing.

When counties paid a part of the cost, they had more or less voice in designation of the highway route. Of late years, the commission has evidenced a disposition to override community wishes in such matters and now it no longer depends upon county funds, its members may find it even easier to ignore the voice of the people.

If the highway commission could be depended upon to build only those highways that ought not to be built, and to leave un-built those highways that ought not to be built, the new policy would deserve popular support, but if it develops that the people have been deprived of all how and when and where their money is to be spent, then we face quite another problem.

As a matter of fact, the commission's announced policy of building state highways without county aid amounts to little more or less than espousal of the principle that who uses the highways must pay for them. That principle is wholly good and sound. But it leaves to be fixed, and suggests the immediate necessity of fixing, the matter of to whom the highway commission is answerable. Is it to the people—they are not elected—or to the governor, who appoints them? The chairman of the commission has said, in court, that: "no governor can dictate to me."

Fix the highway commissions responsibility and the new highway policy should have the unqualified support of all Texas people.

## High School Receives Affiliation in Tex. Hist.

Communication was received from the High School Division of the State Department of Education recently that the Eldorado High School had received one-half unit of affiliation in Texas History. This was the only subject in the local high school taught during the past session which was not affiliated. This course was added during the past semester and took place of English History which was dropped two years ago. It is believed that a course in Texas History is practicable and worth much to the student in the knowledge gained about the history of his own state and his own government. The Eldorado High School now has a total of 25 units of affiliation with the State Department of Education and during the past year was admitted to the list of Southern Association Accredited high schools.

## W. H. Williams No. 1 Drilling by Drill Pipe

The Stanliond Oil & Gas Co.,s No. 1, W. H. Williams, was drilling Tuesday at 6,270 feet, drilling out cement and have passed some of the drill pipe lost in the well. This well was cemented back to 5,620 feet and has been drilled to a depth of 6,270 feet, which is still about 1,269 feet off original bottom. Fire on March 11, damaged the rig at this test and 700 feet of drill pipe was dropped in the well. And in addition to this 530 feet of pipe was lost in the hole. It is now thought that the drilling will proceed to the original bottom, passing up the lost pipe and making new hile and that this test will soon be in actual new ground.

This test has had one good showing, in fact had about 500 barrels per day, which was passed up for a deep test and since January first has had more or less trouble. The test is 18 miles northwest of Eldorado in Irion County.

## ON TEXAS FARMS By W. H. Darrow, Extension Service Editor.

Providence Home Demonstration Club in Smith county won first place in a sanitary pit toilet construction contest by building 37 fly-proof toilets in five spring months. A total of 75 sanitary toilets were built in that time throughout the county.

A canning plant established in the basement of the court house in Seymour by the county commissioners and a local civic organization has been operating on a toll basis under supervision of home demonstration club women. City and county furnish the cans and take one-third of the products to be used next winter for charity.

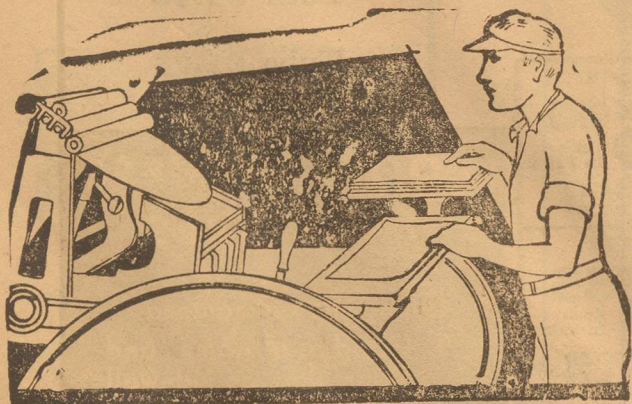
The ebby patch is a bright spot in the farm picture this season. Reports of demonstration show that berries made good money on a small scale for many people. An instance is W. I. Pemberton of Poetry Community, Kaufman county, who is said by the county agent to have gathered 1078 gallons from three acres for a net return of \$54 per acre.

The spread of clovers in Houston county due to improved pasture demonstrations by the county agent have given George Jeffrus a surprise crop of 1000 gallons of fine honey. Early summer honey was unknown before this year, he says.

Five cents in two months for groceries and gasoline is what Home Demonstration Club in Jefferson county has spent. She bartered, surplus vegetables eggs and milk for staple supplies and gas.

Forty thousand acres of crops and 300 orchards in Young county have been saved from grasshoppers by poisoning.

For the want of a leader last Saturday the meeting announced for a barbecue did not materialize. Most every one wanted the Barbecue but none seemed to want to take the lead. The Editor was busy with the Democratic Executive from 10:00 a. m. until 2:30 p. m. and really overlooked the hour for the meeting until our attention was called to it. ### H. J. R. No. 12 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter read as follows: "55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

### Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932.

### S. J. P. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 10, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

## Garden Of Experience

F. G. CLARK.

This scribe seldom refers to politics in these articles, but the present crisis seems to warrant a page out of my personal observation and reading of history. The run-off between Sterling and Ferguson this month presents a crisis in Texas history. Hence my excuse for this article.

I happen to know Ross Sterling personally and this acquaintance extends over 22 years. In the year 1910 I came south in business connection with the realty firm known as Perry & Swanson. We did most of our business in Texas with Ross Sterling, thru whom we bought many thousand acres of land upon which we established settlers. We found Sterling to be absolutely honest. At the beginning of our relation we were cautious, as any good business man should be, but as business progressed we came to trust him more and more. Out of these business transactions, involving hundreds of thousands of dollars we found his word was his bond. I came to the place in my confidence in him that I would not have hesitated to take his word for any sum, for we found his word was his bond. As road commissioner, he put an end to the enormous graft that characterized the preceding administration and road contractors found themselves obliged to earn their money by building good roads. As governor he has almost cleared the state of a heavy burden of debt. He has caught and punished many grafters and thru a terrible financial storm he has steered the ship of state safely. Ross Sterling is the offspring of an old and respected southern family. His father was a Colonel in the Confederate army and his brothers and sisters, all of whom it is my good fortune to know are substantial citizens.

Sterling made a fortune it is true, but not a dollar of it came out of the pockets of the people of the state. No man can honestly say that Ross beat him out of a nickle.

The moral issue must be kept prominent in all our political affairs, in the nation, state and county. We have tolerated grafters in the past, until we are about broke in nation and state. We are fortunate to have an honest man in the governor's chair. Let us have the good sense to keep him there.

### H. J. R. No. 6 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes, nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

# THE COMMERCIAL USE OF TEXAS HIGHWAYS IS A PRIVILEGE, NOT A RIGHT

● The highways of Texas are the property of its citizens. They constitute a system of nearly 200,000 miles of road of which 20,000 miles are designated as State highways and the remainder are county roads. All types of road are represented in this system, less than 5% have so-called "permanent" surface.

The total cost of these highways is unknown but it amounts to many hundred million dollars. From 1917 to 1930, inclusive, counties and road districts of the State issued \$243,592,834 in bonds for the construction and improvement of roads and bridges. In the two-year period ending August 31, 1930, the State Highway Commission expended \$89,032,825, of which \$22,488,426 was for maintenance of the State highways.

In view of these tremendous costs the preservation of our highways from rapid wear and destruction is a matter of very vital interest to their owners, viz., the public. It is especially important that they be made to outlast the life of the bonds, which run from 20 to 30 years.

The use of the public highways for commercial purposes is not a right but a privilege which may be withheld or granted subject to such restrictions, regulations and charges as the Legislature may see fit to impose. Such regulations are intended to promote safety, preserve the highways and safeguard the interests of the public.

Texas Railroads, which pay the entire cost of construction and maintenance of their own roadbeds and, in addition, make substantial contributions to the cost of Texas highways, are thoroughly regulated with respect to their services, rates, methods and practices. There is no good reason why commercial users of the highways, built and maintained at the expense of the public, should not likewise be regulated to such extent as the public interest requires and pay such charges as will represent proper compensation for the privileges granted them.

● The statutes governing highway transportation as enacted by the Forty-second Legislature represent the wishes of the citizens of this State and express their desire to give equal rights to all and special privileges to none. These statutes should be given a fair trial and their value ascertained. Unless this is done, a chaotic condition in transportation as a whole will surely ensue.

## H. J. R. No. 21 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of these United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

## INDORSES STERLING FOR GOVERNOR

George O. Wallace, Dallas County Chairman of the Ounter for Governor campaign, today announced that he would support Governor Sterling in the second primary. In a statement issued to the press today Mr. Wallace said:

"Believing that Tom Ounter would make Texas one of the best governments it ever had, I gave to him my full support. In doing so I think that I fully discharged my duty as a good citizen of my state. Mr. Hunter having been eliminated, it now becomes my duty to make choice between Governor Sterling and Mrs. Ferguson.

I would not vote for the best woman in Texas for this high office if I thought her husband would be the governor in fact. This would be true even if that husband should bear the best reputation for integrity and patriotism. I will not support a candidate who will be governor in name only, and approve a governorship by proxy. I cannot forget the corruption which occurred during the administration of the Fergusons, husband and wife. As a good citizen, I will not lend my vote for the possible return of similar conditions.

The first qualification of this office is that of honesty. No amount of brains or efficiency will take its place. I therefore without hesitation or reservation will give my support in the runoff to Governor Sterling.

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United

States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund, and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

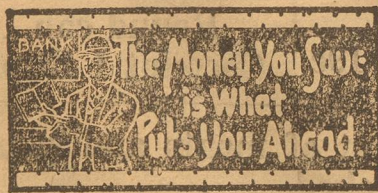

## H. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

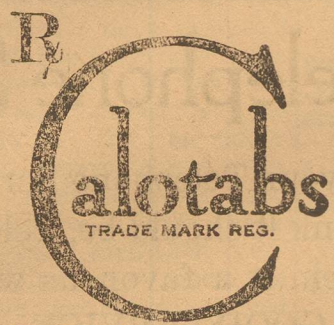

### THE COST OF TRANSPORTATION

Unfortunately, transportation of freight commands a price that must be figured in human life as well as money.

300 innocent users of the Texas highways were killed by trucks in 1931. This figure represents the cost in human lives of transporting 386,208 tons of freight.

247 private citizens, employees and trespassers were killed by the railroads in 1931. This figure represents the cost in human lives of transporting 7,773,985 tons of freight, as well as passengers, over Texas railroads.

The ratios command attention. It costs one life to transport 1287 tons of freight by truck; it costs one life to transport 31,474 tons of freight by rail. Had the trucks transported as much freight as the railroads, and had they kept their mortality down to the present figure, they would have killed 6040 Texas citizens. In other words, truck transportation, figured in human lives, is more than 24 times as expensive as railroad transportation.

Texas railroads transport freight at a money cost averaging one cent per ton mile. Truck transports freight at a money cost fluctuating between five and ten cents per ton mile. Had the trucks carried all of Texas' freight in 1931, the cost of transportation entering into Texas commodity prices would have soared from five hundred to one thousand per cent.

These facts, readily corroborated by the records at Austin, indicate that railroads are by far the cheapest and safest form of land transportation. To wreck the railroads, in order to make trucking profitable, would be a case of cutting off the public's nose to spite the railroad's face.

### H. J. R. No. 24. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

(1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon payment of the amount of money paid for the land including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) percent of the aggregate total;

(2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs plus not exceeding fifty (50%) percent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

### S. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereby read as follows:

Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made are hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of Municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided that the one-tenth of the alternate Sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.
