## Whitten Pleads Cause Of Farmers Against Fergusons On "Veterinarian Charge"

**Jim Purported To Have Played To "Goat And Horse Doctors" In Manner Detrimental To Stock And Agriculture Men**

Judge J. A. Whitten, chairman of the Livestock Sanitary Commission, has found what is purported to be a letter written by E. F. Jarrel, campaign manager for the Fergusons in East Texas to the veterinarians of the state, in which the Fergusons plead for the support of veterinarians. Judge Whitten pleads the cause of the farmer and of the county agents in combatting the statements made in the document in question. The letter follows:

"Dear Doctor:  
"Under the Ferguson administration the veterinary profession fared better than under any other governor.

"During Jim's tenure of office, a law was passed that made it a finable offense for county agents to practice veterinary advice to any one while the said agent was drawing a salary from the United States government, or from the State of Texas.

"Under Moody's administration this law was repealed, and they are now doing veterinary work. The farmers under the Moody administration were permitted to use hog cholera serum and virus on their own hogs. This provision has not been changed by Governor Sterling.

"Under the administration of the last two governors the vocational agriculture teachers in the high schools were permitted to and are now doing veterinary work, and are depriving us of an income that we should be receiving, which we need sorely. They are trying to usurp our right as a veterinarian, to treat, prescribe and sell drugs and remedies to the flock owners of this state. All of these wrongs will be corrected when Mrs. Ferguson is elected.

"If this is of any interest to you, then work and vote for her election in the primaries of July 23, for the office of governor of Texas. Now is the time for us to call for a show-down on these subjects. If you are with us then write and tell us so. If you like the present conditions, then vote for Sterling.

"How is the campaign progressing in your county? It looks like Ma will be a winner in the first primaries.

## G. O. P. States In Vote Gain

**Reapportionment May Add 12 In New Electoral College**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Reapportionment of House representation has resulted in a possible Republican gain of 12 votes in the new electoral college.

This big shift in the voting strength of 32 states may have unusual bearing on the outcome of the approaching presidential election. It was brought about by the transfer of 27 congressional seats from 21 to 11 states through reapportionment on the basis of the 1930 census.

Thirteen normally Republican states lost 15 seats but seven gained 21, increasing their total by six. Eight normally Democratic states lost 12 and four gained six, decreasing their total by six. That leaves a net Republican gain of twelve.

With this apparent gain, and under ordinary political conditions, the Republicans would be at an advantage in a close contest between President Hoover and Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Should this eventuate, the election result might be thrown into dispute when the House and Senate convene next February to poll the electoral college votes. They number 531, representing the 435 House and 96 Senate seats.

Under the constitution, Congress is required to reapportion the representatives every ten years on the basis of population and each state receives as many electoral votes as it has representatives and senators. A majority of the various states electoral votes elects a president.

Democratic gains included three in Texas.

The state board of veterinary medical examiners, which organization is a part of the governor's official family. Consequently, had any serious infringement of veterinary rights actually occurred, such would have been promptly resented and corrected. The Livestock Sanitary Commission is likewise governed by laws which, among other features, provide for close cooperation in certain respects with veterinarians whom the veterinary examining board has approved. During the last two administrations, relations with the rank and file of the profession have been harmonious, and there has been no friction between departments.

"In many large areas of Texas there are no veterinarians within reasonable calling distance. Substantial veterinarians admit that they cannot afford to travel great distances for the little money that a farmer so situated can pay for vaccinating his pigs or otherwise treating his pitifully few livestock under ordinary conditions. Therefore, such a farmer is obliged to meet his agricultural problems, livestock ailments included, as best he can. He must depend upon advice he has had in the past from some sympathetic veterinarian at a distance or upon the experience and help of his neighbors, including in instance, perhaps, the county agent.

"County agents are educated in agriculture and animal husbandry and realize that they are not competent veterinarians. Nevertheless, they serve a good purpose in isolated areas, because they take the veterinary problems of the people to A. & M. College and to other reliable veterinary sources of information.

"In order that the farmer, so isolated, might at least protect his meat hogs from hog cholera, the 40th Legislature at the insistent solicitation of thousands of farmers in all parts of Texas, did pass a law which permits the farmer to vaccinate his own hogs on his own premises.

One of the after effects of war is always an orgie of spending. To meet the imperative needs of war, bonds are printed by the government and sold by the billions. The crying need of war material, brings great factories into existence for no other purpose than to supply these needs.

Money is over abundant, because credit is thrown wide open and all the resources of the nation are made liquid.

Expenses are increased enormously. New departments are created by the nation to meet the exigencies of war—departments that are not needed in time of peace. These together with the war munition factories the government finds on its hands when peace is declared, and they die hard. Instead of abolishing them, the authorities strive to find new uses for them thus keeping up a useless expense.

The turning of these factories toward the production of peace time articles largely accounts for overproduction. The extra expense of them together with the useless departments of government, lay a heavy and unnecessary expense upon the tax payer. What the government needs to do today is to trim expenses down to the bare necessities of peace.

What is true of the nation is also true of the church. At the close of war when money was plentiful and every body felt rich, the churches put on drives and raised high sums with which they started numerous institutions that in these times of stress, they are finding it difficult to maintain. The result is an over anxiety to raise money to the neglect of the spiritual power of the church.

This accounts, in great measure, for the falling away of the attendance and the loss of the people's interest in them, why? Because in the churches anxiety to raise money, it has largely lost sight of the object for which it was organized, namely the salvation of souls. If the church has mission in the world, it must emulate its Master's example and seek to save that which is lost. We are in a sorry mess, both in Church and State, because each of these has lost sight of its chief mission—the betterment of prosperity of the people.  PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter read as follows: "55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932.

 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 6  
 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes, nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

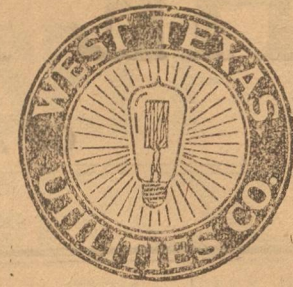

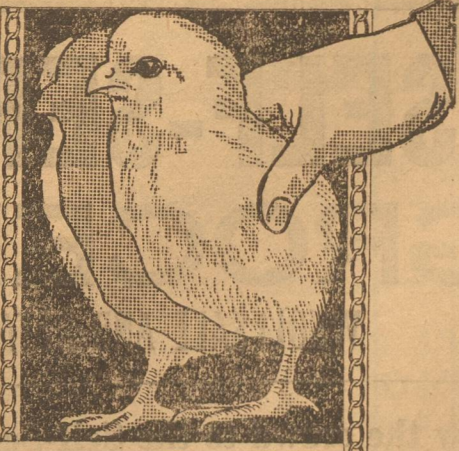

## TEXAS INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITIES

The Buckhead Crystal Co. is a new plant recently starting operations at Mineral Wells for the manufacture of mineral water crystals.

More than 100 workers were given employment when the new egg-powder plant started operations at Fort Worth recently, one of the largest establishments of its kind in the United States.

Misletoe Creameries, Inc., is occupying a new \$80,000 butter and creamery plant recently completed at El Paso.

## H. J. R. No. 21 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years until his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 8, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more inhabitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

## H. J. R. No. 1. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 1, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by any county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislatures may make.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines, and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps."

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States; or retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

## H. J. R. No. 5. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such work and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be

submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932.

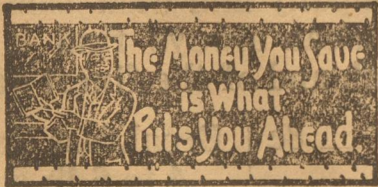

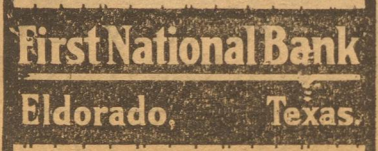

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereby read as follows:

Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made are hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Tex-

as, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of Municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided that the one-tenth of the alternate Sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in, or constitute a part of the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932. (A correct copy.)

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis: (1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon payment of the amount of money paid for the land including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) percent of the aggregate total; (2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs plus not exceeding fifty (50%) per cent of the aggregate total."
