Sterling's Record As Governor Compared To "Ma's" And Jim's Record

Although the people of Texas have repudiated Fergusonism at the polls by overwhelming majorities more than once, yet Fergusonism again constitutes the principal issue in Texas politics.

We know of many Ferguson promises which are unfulfilled. All remember what Jim is most efficient in, and will remember lines, and its action in impeaching him and forever barring him from holding public office in Texas.

When "Ma" was governor in name, but Jim was really Governor, the Highway scandal, during "Ma's" term, occurred. Several hundred thousand dollars were recovered by suit and saved for the tax-paying citizens. Her administration left the Highway Department in debt to the tune of approximately \$6,000,000.00, and Federal Government aid was withdrawn from Texas, the Government refusing to furnish any more money to be spent under her administration.

Jim or his wife has been running for some office nearly every two years since Jim's impeachment. Jim ran for President of the United States on the American Party ticket, and said that the Democrats of Texas did not have the decency of a skunk nor the pride of a jackass—and still some Democrats of Texas will vote for Jim and "Ma."

Their efficiency record is interesting in comparison with Governor Sterling's record. Ferguson left Deficiencies and Emergencies—not Efficiency—for their successor to the tune of over two million dollars in the General Fund and more than six million dollars on the Highway Fund.

Neither has he spent any tax money hiring lawyers to oppose the recovery of highway funds. Several hundred thousand dollars were recovered although public funds were spent opposing the recovery.

Large Crowd Attended Speaking Monday Night

The Sterling for Governor speaking Monday night at the Court House drew a large crowd an exceptionally large crowd for Eldorado, as the people here do not generally turn out in large numbers to hear political speaking.

The meeting was called to order by Judge Joab Campbell, who called on Judge J. A. Whitten to state the objects of the meeting, who in turn introduced Judge W. A. Wright, who made a brief speech and then introduced the main speaker of the evening, Judge George T. Wilson, now of Austin, but well known here as he promoted and drilled the Whitten Oil well until he went broke trying to fulfill his contract with the people here, and who is well liked here by our people.

Judge Wilson gave the people the cold facts in regard to Gov. Sterling's public life and explained how he had befriended the people against the large Oil Companies, instead of being for them as his opponent tries to make you believe, and said he saw with his own eyes Jim Ferguson as a lobbyist for the Major Companies.

Mr. Wilson was a good talker and had no abuse for the opposition. There was plenty of things he could have said but he left the unpleasant things unsaid, which won the approval of his hearers. A few of the things that Gov. Sterling stood for that should meet the approval of this people were: He stood for and got the passage of the river bed law, in which the State could lease the Sabine River bed for oil; He stood for and has secured the passage of a law to exempt the small home owners from tax on homes up to \$3,000.00, and this measure is up to the people to vote on in the general election. This measure was opposed by the large Oil Companies with Jim Ferguson their lobbyist, in other words, according to the statements of Judge Wilson, instead of Sterling being for the large Oil Companies, it was Mr. Ferguson.

Every thinking person and anyone who kept up with the State Highway work knows that under the Ferguson administration that the Federal Government withdrew all Federal aid from the State Highway work, and that after Moody became Governor he appointed Ross Sterling as head of the State Highway Department and it was through his efforts that this aid was restored and it is under his administration that some of the most efficient road work has been accomplished, and it will be in his administration that the counties that have been liberal enough to vote bonds, which our own county did, will have this tax burden lifted from their shoulders and placed on the state, and their bond money refunded, which would relieve the tax burden of this county something over \$8,000.00 per year. The tax rate under the Sterling administration is less than under the Fergusons, and the school appropriations have been larger, what else can a people want of an officer, asked Mr. Wilson.

At the close of his address he was loudly applauded and many people signed the Sterling for Governor Club.

H. J. R. No. 26.
 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter read as follows:

"55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or defined subdivision thereof, or other municipal corporation therein, except delinquent taxes which have been due for a period of at least ten years."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments at the General Election in 1932.

S. J. R. No. 28
 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 6
 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes, nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

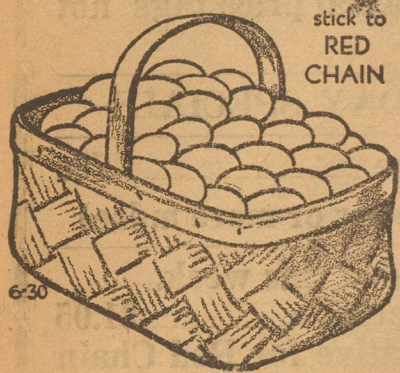

**H. J. R. No. 5.
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, breakwaters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such work and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be

submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932.

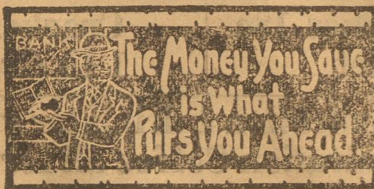

HAS \$5,000,000 SURPLUS**

Contrast the financial condition of the Highway Department now and at the end of the Ferguson Administration and draw your own conclusions as to whether there has been in recent years any mis-application of funds. On January 13, 1927, near the end of the Ferguson Commission, the cash balance in the Highway Fund was \$2,427.90. The earned and unpaid estimates due contractors on highway contracts amounted to nearly \$900,000.00. Some estimates had not been paid for several months. On June 1st, this year, due to the careful management of the present Commission, there was a cash balance of \$13,472,052.27 while the outstanding obligations on all contracts, including earned estimates and balances to be earned when all contracts are completed amounted to only \$8,133,064.19. The surplus of over \$5,000,000.00, which has been created by the economic operation of the present Highway Department, will take care of the taxes required this year to pay the interest and provide a sinking fund on all county bond issues for money spent on state highways.

**H. J. R. No. 21
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 14 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 14. There shall be elected by the qualified electors of each county at the same time and under the same law regulating the election of State and County officers, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes, who shall hold his office, for two (2) years an duntil his successor is elected and qualified; and such Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall perform all the duties with respect to assessing property for the purpose of taxation and of collecting taxes as may be prescribed by the Legislature.

Sec. 2. That Section 16, of Article 3, of the Constitution of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The sheriff of each county in addition to his other duties shall be the Assessor and Collector of Taxes therefor; but, in counties having ten thousand (10,000) or more in habitants, to be determined by the last preceding census of the United States, an Assessor and Collector of Taxes shall be elected to hold office for two (2) years and until his successor shall be elected and qualified."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

**H. J. R. No. 1.
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 1, Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 1. The following classes of persons shall not be allowed to vote in this State, to-wit:

First: Persons under twenty-one (21) years of age.

Second: Idiots and lunatics.

Third: All paupers supported by any county.

Fourth: All persons convicted of any felony, subject to such exceptions as the Legislatures may makee.

Fifth: All soldiers, marines, and seamen, employed in the service of the Army or Navy of the United States. Provided that this restriction shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy and Marine Corps."

Sec. 2. That Section 33 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 3. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps."

Sec. 4. That Section 40 of Article 16, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise, at the same time more than one Civil Office of emolument, except that of Justice of Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, from holding in conjunction with such office any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any Election; General, Special or Primary, in this State when otherwise qualified."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next General Election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

**H. J. R. No. 24.
PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932**

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 13 of Article 8 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Sec. 13. Provision shall be made by the first Legislature for the speedy sale, without the necessity of a suit in Court, of a sufficient portion of all lands and other property for the taxes due thereon, and every year thereafter for the sale in like manner of all lands and other property upon which taxes have not been paid; and the deed of conveyance to the purchaser for all lands and other property thus sold shall be held to vest a good and perfect title in the purchaser thereof, subject to be impeached only for actual fraud; provided, that the former owner shall within two years from date of the filing for record of the Purchaser's Deed have the right to redeem the land on the following basis:

(1) Within the first year of the redemption period upon payment of the amount of money paid for the land including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax, Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs paid plus not exceeding twenty-five (25%) percent of the aggregate total;

(2) Within the last year of the redemption period upon the payment of the amount of money paid for the land, including One (\$1.00) Dollar Tax, Deed Recording Fee and all taxes, penalties, interest and costs plus not exceeding fifty (50%) percent of the aggregate total."

Sec. 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the

first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

A community garden of seven acres in addition to individual gardens in South Houston Community in Harris County has been furnishing vegetables for a community canning plant where hundreds of containers have been put up this season by home demonstration methods.

The seed house at the gin in Ricardo Community in Kleberg county has been converted by Mr. and Mrs. Ben Weir into a canning kitchen where families of the community who have no canning equipment come to can.

Responding to 42 calls for

help in putting up a food supply for the year, Mrs. W. M. Harris, Brown county 4-H pantry demonstrator, reached 29 families in June as her part in the "help others" expansion program of the home demonstration clubs of the county.

S. E. McKnight, ranchman of Middle Valley, was in the city Saturday afternoon looking after business and buying ranch supplies.

TEXAS INDUSTRIAL ACTIVITIES

Gasoline Solvents Corporation is a new company at Fort Worth. Mistletoe Creameries have plans for a new creamery at San Antonio.

Crowell is to have a new 10,000-bushel grain elevator. A 50-barrel daily capacity flour mill is under construction at Floydada.

New Braunfels Chamber of Commerce has secured option on a 10-acre site for establishing a mohair and woolen mill at a cost of \$130,000.

Universal Mills, Fort Worth, is increasing its capacity from 900 to 1,800 barrels daily, which will give employment to twenty additional workers.

Fort Worth Pecan Shelling Corporation has leased space and will begin operations when the pecan season opens in the fall. It will employ sixty workers.

The new egg-producing plant at Ft. Worth will create a Texas market for 400 carloads of eggs annually. Fifty employees are regularly employed in the plant at present.

There are twenty-two plants in Texas making awnings, tents, sails, canvas covers, etc., using annually \$1,392,263 worth of raw materials, containers, fuel and power and producing products valued at \$2,328,683. Four hundred and fifty-two persons are employed in the work.

The largest industry in Texas numerically is the manufacture of bread and bakery products. There are 587 plants in the State devoted to that work, producing annually \$35,881,047 worth of merchandise and using \$16,897,278 worth of materials, containers and fuel and power. The industry employs 5,662 persons.

The Texas Packing Corporation at Texas City opened its fig canning plant in July with a force of more than 120 workers and expects to continue operations until late in the fall, processing more than 1,000,000 pounds of fresh figs. Plants at Alvin and Angleton are also reopen.

S. J. R. No. 26. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereby read as follows:

Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made are hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of Municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided that the one-tenth of the alternate Sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in or constitute a part of the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.
