Commissioners Court Met August 8, 1932

The following were proceedings of the Commissioners Court which met August 8, 1932. It is ordered by the court to pay the Deputy Sheriff salary, for June and July, 1932, and his service discontinued so far as this court's liability is concerned.

It is ordered by the Commissioner's Precinct No. One and voting Precinct No. One be amended to include Sections Nos. 86, 70, and 69 in Block LL, as follows:

Beginning at the Southeast corner of Section 86 Block LL; Thence North along the east line of said section 86, to the northeast corner of same; Thence west along the north line of said section 86 to the northwest corner of same; Thence south to the southeast corner of Section 71 same Block LL; Thence west along the north line of Sections 70 and 69 to the northwest corner of said Section 69 same Block; Thence South along the West line of said Section 69, to the Southwest corner of said Section 69, Block LL. Other proceedings were the regular allowance of the road works and monthly accounts.

Felipe Virgen Kills Wife And Then Self

Saturday night as Felipe Virgen, 36 years of age shot and killed his wife, Elvira, on the road from the Thomson Headquarter Ranch and the Sonora Highway. They had been visiting on the Thomson ranch and had started to their home in Sonora, with their six children. They began to quarrel according to the oldest son and he insisted on them quitting and going home, but the man pulled a gun he had borrowed from a brother and shot his wife three times, ordered the children to get out of the truck and walk on to Sonora, and then shot him self. The children returned to the Thomson ranch and reported the tragedy to Mr. Lawhon, who in turn phoned Sheriff O. E. Conner and Judge Doty, who went to the scene and held an inquest.

The bodies of the dead man and woman were carried to Sonora, their home, and buried in the same grave Monday.

Felipe Virgen was a captain of a sheep shearing crew and was well known to most of the ranchmen in this section.

Cotton Makes Another Substantial Rise

King Cotton is again coming back, the king of the South, came back the early part of the week with a new high level, reaching 73-4 cents, being the highest price it has reached in the past twelve months. With a short crop reported over most of the South the cotton crop this year should bring a fair price and might reach the ten cent mark, which would bring lots of new money into the borders of Schleicher County, as we will harvest a good crop here. Some cotton is still being carried over from last year by some of the Schleicher County farmers, and they have been offered more recently than they could have sold it for last year.

Cotton Strides Upward Again This Wednesday

Cotton advanced again Wednesday \$2.75 per bale, for several weeks the cotton market together with other commodities have been advancing in price, and the advance Wednesday has brought cotton up to and above the eight cent per pound mark, and it looks like now that the farmer will receive as much as ten cents per pound.

NOTICE High School Enrollment

In order to complete the enrollment of high school pupils, so far as possible, before school actually begins on Monday, September 5th, all high school pupils are requested to report at the school building on September 1 and 2nd. These two days are set aside for individual enrollment and classification. Much time will be saved if all pupils report on the following schedule:

High School Seniors: 8:30 to 12 forenoon, Aug. 1st.
Juniors, 1 to 4 afternoon, Aug. 1st.
Sophomores, 9 to 12, forenoon, August 2nd.
Freshmen, 1 to 4 afternoon August 2nd.

Parents are urged to come to the school with their children when they enroll. The parents and the teachers, working together, should help to plan the course of study which the student is to pursue.

High School Fees

The only fees charged in high school for the 1932-33 session will be for the library and for the course in typewriting. The library fee will be fifty cents for the year, instead of \$1 for last year. The money received from this source is spent in buying reference and outside reading books, all of which belong to the high school library. The Typewriting fee this year will be fifty cents per month, which is placed in a replacement fund to repair and replace typewriters as they are worn out.

Only a few more days until the cotton picking season is open in Schleicher County, and things will begin to buzz just as soon as this bumper crop gets to moving. The gins are being put in a one condition for the beginning early in September. Even the cotton pickers can smile as the nearness of the time approaches for them to begin picking, more to eat, more to wear and more to spend for the necessities of life is near. This is also passed up to the business man who sees a better business in the near future. The better prices for the cotton even makes the grower smile and in fact it looks like the corner that we have been looking for has come in sight. The Schleicher County people have never really suffered but many of them have been denying themselves many needed things because of the necessity to save for the actual need of the day.

Fifty years ago Wednesday, the Editor of The Success stood on the high ground at Ben Fick lin, and watched the little town move down stream, it then being the county seat of Tom Green county, a three days rain in this section of the country caused the South Concho to begin rising on the night of the 23, and on the morning of the 24 the water began to overflow the banks of the river and by the middle of the morning the town was almost gone, only about three or four houses left. The home in which this scribe lived was among those that washed away, however all house hold goods were saved in our home. Many changes have taken place since August 24, 1882. Many of the rescue workers of that day of the big flood have passed on to glory, our Grandparents, our parents, our Uncles and Aunts, all except one have passed to that great beyond. That flood of that day did not wait on any one. People were warned and some or most of them made their escape to safety. Others were waffled into eternity in the twinkling of an eye.

In drifting down the stream of time we often find trouble waters, in many instances beyond our control. We are constantly being warned of the danger, yet we carelessly drift and one by one we are entering eternity, are we prepared, and do we render aid to others, as the brave workers did on August 24, 1882, and caused many to be saved of the physical death that lurked near them.

GOLD

I think we have all felt that the rise in the stock market and the steady, even the slow, upward trend of commodity prices indicates the end of the long disastrous depression.

Yet some of us have longed to see some tangible reason for this welcome change. Now we have it in the increased production of Gold. An article in the Saturday Evening Post by that great financial authority, Samuel Blythe, is an eye opener. Gold, being our standard of values, the measure by which commodity prices are determined, brings us good times or bad, in proportion to its scarcity or abundance in relation to commodities. Old mines, that did not pay for the working when gold was cheap, are being reopened. Gold ornaments are being changed into money, and from thousands of sources, gold is pouring into the channels of trade. It is only a question of time when the gold supply will meet the needs of the business world and enterprise will renew its march once more. This furnishes a substantial reason for the brighter outlook that is before us. And I think that we can count on the present signs of increased prices being permanent, since they are based on the substantial foundation of increased gold supply. The wise man will lay his plans accordingly.

S. J. R. No. 28 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas, Article 16, be amended by adding thereto another Section, Section 60, which shall read as follows:

"Section 60. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places and in such manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas.

That the Legislature of Texas be authorized to make appropriation for the support and maintenance thereof; provided, that this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any other future exposition or celebration of any kind or character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 5. PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 7, of Article 11, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 11, Section 7. All counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are hereby authorized upon a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon at an election called for such purpose to levy and collect such tax for construction of sea walls, break-

waters, or sanitary purposes, as may now or may hereafter be authorized by law, and may create a debt for such work and issue bonds in evidence thereof. But no debt for any purpose shall ever be incurred in any manner by any city or county unless provision is made, at the time of creating the same, for levying and collecting a sufficient tax to pay the interest thereon and provide at least two per cent (2%) as a sinking fund; and the condemnation of the right of way for the erection of such works shall be fully provided for."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1932.

H. J. R. No. 6 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 1-a be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows:

Article VIII—Section 1-a: Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for State purposes, nothing herein shall apply within those counties or other political subdivisions now receiving any remission of State taxes, but upon the expiration of such period of remission this Section shall become applicable within such counties and political subdivisions.

Sec.2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

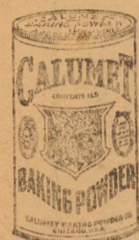

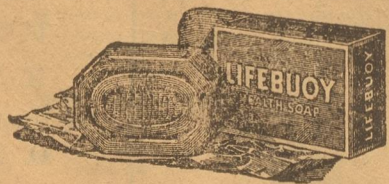
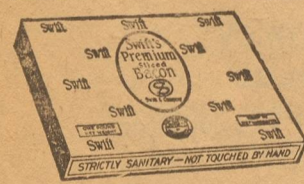

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 3a, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 3a. When an election is held by any county, or any number of counties, or any political sub-division of a county, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State and which may or may not include towns, villages or municipal corporations, or any city, town or village, for the purpose of issuing bonds or otherwise lending credit, or expending money or assuming any debt, only qualified electors who own taxable property in the State, county, political sub-division, district, city, town or village where such election is held, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: Section 1. That Section 55, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter read as follows:

"55. The Legislature shall have no power to release or extinguish, or to authorize the releasing or extinguishing, in whole or in part, the indebtedness, liability or obligation of any corporation or individual, to this State or to any county or

PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 8, 1932

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 11, of Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended by a vote of the people by virtue of Senate Joint Resolution No. 7, passed at the Regular Session of the 41st Legislature, be, and the same is hereby amended so as to hereby read as follows:

Section 11. In order to enable the Legislature to perform the duties set forth in the foregoing Section, it is hereby declared all lands and other property heretofore set apart and appropriated for the establishment and maintenance of the University of Texas, together with all the proceeds of sales of the same, heretofore made are hereafter to be made, and all grants, donations and appropriations that may hereafter be made by the State of Texas, or from any other source, except donations limited to specific purposes, shall constitute and become a Permanent University Fund. And the same as realized and received into the Treasury of the State (together with such sums belonging to the Fund, as may now be in the Treasury), shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties of said State, or in School Bonds of Municipalities, or in bonds of any city of this State, or in bonds issued under and by virtue of the Federal Farm Loan Act approved by the President of the United States, July 17, 1916, and amendments thereto; and the interest accruing thereon shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purpose declared in the foregoing Section; provided that the one-tenth of the alternate Sections of the lands granted to railroads, reserved by the State, which were set apart and appropriated to the establishment of the University of Texas, by an Act of the Legislature of February 11, 1858, entitled, 'An Act to establish the University of Texas,' shall not be included in or constitute a part of the Permanent University Fund."

Sec. 2. Said proposed amendment shall be voted on by the electors of this State qualified to vote on Constitutional amendments at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1932.
