Does Schleicher County Need Any Funds

A. T. Wright has been designated by Wilbur C. Hawk, President of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to serve as Governor R. S. Sterling's representative in the preparation and submission of Eldorado application for funds out of the \$300,000,000 provided by the Federal Emergency Relief and Construction Act of 1932.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been charged by the Governor with the responsibility of naming the chairman in each town and county in its territory and assembling the applications from the towns. The directors of the affiliated towns have been named as chairmen. In unaffiliated towns, the Chamber has named others as chairmen.

Already application blanks and instructions have gone out to the two hundred towns, cities, and one hundred thirty counties in West Texas from the office of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce at Stamford.

Assistance in making out the applications is to be given by the regional organization. General Manager D. A. Bandeen, at Stamford, will devote most of his time during the next two weeks in assisting towns and counties in that part of West Texas in making the applications. The same service will be given to the Panhandle—Plains cities by Assistant Manager Maury Hopkins at Plainview. Jack Hott, Manager of the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, will assist at Fort Worth, and Captain E. H. Simons, Manager of the El Paso Chamber of Commerce, in that part of the territory.

Applications for relief must be made through the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and must be filed by October 13 in order to give the organization time to transmit them to the Governor before October 15. The Governor will make application for the State of Texas on October 15.

The funds to be applied for now are for the months of October, November and December. The amount will be based upon the amounts that have been spent for relief and relief work by the respective applicant cities during the past twenty-one months, or since January 1, 1931.

260-YEAR-OLD DREAM HAS COME TRUE

(Sterling City News Record) Pere Marquette, a Frenchman who explored the regions around the Great Lakes 260 years ago, predicted that a waterway reaching from Lake Michigan to the Gulf of Mexico would one day be constructed. That old timer's prophecy is about to come true. The canals of the water way is due to be completed by Nov. 15. The enterprise will have cost Uncle Sam \$107,500,000.

Water to operate the first section of the scheme will be taken from Lake Michigan at Chicago down a canal to Lockport, Ill. From Lockport to Utica, Ill. From Utica, down the Illinois river to the Mississippi river into the Gulf of Mexico.

It will soon be possible to travel by water all the way from Galveston to Chicago. Millions of tons of freight will go over this route at a great saving to the shippers.

C. C. West Drops Dead Thursday Morning

C. C. West, for 42 years a resident of this section of Texas and for the most part in Schleicher County, dropped dead at the Rock Filling Station about nine o'clock Thursday morning, after he and his son, Palmer, had arrived at the Station. They had stuck in the mud in coming down and Mr. West got out of the car and pushed it out, upon reaching the station he got out of the car and fell, never to speak any more.

Mr. West was born February 16, 1856, in Williamson County, Texas, being 76 years old last February, and moved with his wife and one son to this county about 42 years ago and has been ranching and following the stock business for the most part. When he came here the range was all open to any one who might want to use it, and Mr. West for many years never attempted to get any land. But later on he bought three sections of land adjoining the town site of Eldorado which developed to be some of the best land in the county and has become valuable.

Mr. West and family have played an important part in the development of this county and were among the first residence of the city of Eldorado, moving here from Verand then the only town in the county and which virtually moved to Eldorado when the townsite of Eldorado was laid off.

Mr. West has for the past several years operated the Rock Filling Station, together with a nice Tourist Camp, which is one of the most convenient Tourist Camp's in this part of the State. Mr. West was the first Justice of the Peace Schleicher County ever had and has served as school trustee of the local school and in many ways has helped to develop our city and county.

He was a member of the Church of Christ and help to build the first Christian Church in our city.

The West home like all old time West Texans was an open home to all who might come that way and many a wayfaring traveler sought shelter in the home and enjoyed the hospitality of he and his good wife.

Mr. West is survived by his wife, who through his long and useful life in this county has been his guiding star, and nine living children, with one dead. Nine of the children were born in Schleicher County, they are, Herman, Bertha, Agnes, Carson, Ada, Palmer, Cora Lee, Pauline and Jim. Blanche, a daughter, having preceded him in death.

Schleicher County Farmers May Look To New Financing Plan

With Abundant Feed, They Can Get Aid To Fatten Lambs And Calves

Schleicher County farmers who have abundant feed crops on their hands and no market are looking to the San Angelo branch of the Agricultural Credit Corporation, which is now open for business, as a place where they can get the necessary financing to buy lambs and calves to feed out their surplus feed crop and get something for their abundant fall pastures.

The new livestock bank, which is a part of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, was created to help the price of livestock and feed drops by providing an agency that could finance ranchers to get feed for their stock and farmers to buy livestock to help them market their feed.

Two Financing Plans

There are two general plans of financing, according to sample application blanks received by County Agent L. E. Sumner, one for feeder stock and one for feeding stock. The feeder loans are to be made for the feeding period—while the breeder loans are to be made for a much longer period—it being possible to get assurance of range loans for as long as three years. The interest rate will be at 7%, but no service charges or fees, such as inspection, etc., will be made, providing the cheapest money available to the farmer and ranchman in years. All applications will be passed on by the local board of the San Angelo branch and its action will be final—not subject to review by any other body. This is taken to mean that loans will be made with rapidity and can be secured as fast as they can from any private institution.

Ford Hovey, who heads all the Agricultural Credit Corporations, actively for the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, is President of the Stockyards National Bank of Omaha, Nebr. He is said to be one of the outstanding livestock loan men in the United States and the banks under his direction are expected to function with unusual rapidity and lack of red tape usually tied to government enterprises.

WEEK END RAIN DAMAGES MUCH COTTON

Rain began to fall last Thursday and continued until Sunday noon, which will cause much loss to the cotton growers here, as much of the cotton was open, and the best rotton was in the low lands and some of this is standing in water.

Much feed has been damaged and lots of it will never be stacked.

There had been ginned up to Thursday about 125 bales of cotten, which was selling for about 7 cents per pound. What the farmers need here is about 60 or 70 days of dry weather.

BALL GAME RAINED OUT SUNDAY

The ball game that was to have been played between the Eldorado Club and the Red Roosters here last Sunday was postponed to Sunday, October 2, on account of rain. Two games will be played here next Sunday, beginning at 2:30, at the Fair Park. Admission will be 35 cents for the two games for adult men and boys and 25 cents for women and children.

STATION A SCHOOL

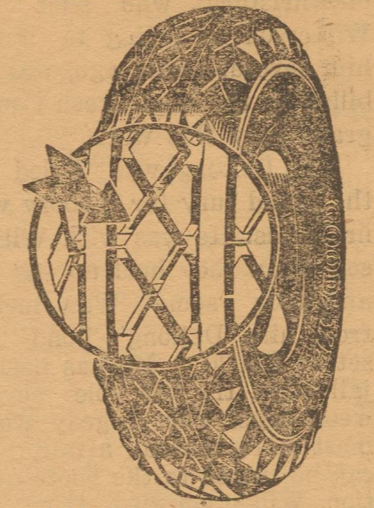

THE MAN AT THE WHEEL

In an address before the California Committee of Public Safety, B. W. Black, Health Officer of Alameda County, drew some extremely interesting conclusions from a report made by a Michigan psychopathic clinic on drivers arrested for various traffic offenses.

The men were given nervous, mental and physical examinations, and a study made of their previous records. Their arrests were caused for speeding, reckless driving, drunken driving, failure to stop at signals, and similar common offenses. Their median age was thirty.

The examination records of 58 of the men showed that 12 were definitely feeble-minded, that 42 were of inferior intelligence, that 3 had serious physical defects, and 7 had significant defects in hearing and 14 in vision; that one showed an active epileptiform tendency, and that 46 were seriously handicapped by alcoholism. Of the entire number, only 13 were acceptable as drivers, under the most liberal interpretation of the term.

These case histories show, better than words, the reason why the automobile claims almost 35,000 lives a year. The highways are thronged with cars driven by persons congenitally incapable of driving carefully, competently and efficiently. The reckless and the mentally and physically defective constitute a dangerous percentage of men behind the wheel. Only stringent drivers' examination laws, and the rigid enforcement of modernized traffic codes, can solve this phase of the accident problem.

ON TEXAS FARMS

In a drive by a local Taylor civic organization to can 1,000 containers of food for the unemployed, 125 persons from various organizations worked for one day under direction of local county and home demonstration agents in a wholesale canning festival which resulted in 992 cans of food.

Sixteen registered pigs were recently acquired by Shelby county farmers by a unique trade engineered by the county agent with two swine breeders, whereby farmers traded yearling heaves for breeder pigs thru the medium of the local market man. He appraised each yearling and paid the swine breeder. The farmer was then notified and called for his pig.

Sixty-seven Hale county 4-H club boys are feeding 48 baby heaves and 256 pigs for show and sale next spring.

By spending \$12.15 for seed, weed cutting and rodent control in a 15-acre pasture, and spreading 10 tons of barnyard manure, G. R. Donaho, Madison county pasture demonstrator, received \$237.60 worth of grazing during the first half of the year, the county agent reports.

Hamilton county farmers have been shown by the county agent how to destroy beds of stinging red ants at a cost of about 3 cents per bed. A solution of sodium cyanide is poured in the beds when all the ants are at home.

About 100 farm home bedrooms have been improved by home demonstration club women and girls in McLennan county at costs averaging about \$15. The winning room in the contest cost only \$3.77 to improve.

CENTENNIAL AMENDMENT PERMITS BUT DOES NOT REQUIRE STATE SUPPORT OF CELEBRATION

Every Texan favors a Centennial Celebration. There are some who may vote against the Amendment unless they understand its terms. These are plain. To quote from the Amendment itself, it would "authorize a Texas Centennial, commemorating the heroic period of early Texas history, and celebrating a century of our independence and progress, to be held at such times, places, and in such a manner as may be designated by the Legislature of Texas."

It is merely a referendum or enabling act to decide first, whether Texans want Texas to celebrate its Centennial anniversary, and then whether the Legislature, in the exercise of its judgement, may provide for it. It does not provide for any bond issue or new tax.

If conditions do not seem to justify the Centennial in 1936, the Legislature may construe "the heroic period of early Texas history" to mean any time from the first settlement to the admission of Texas into the Union, and many postpone it to a later date or drop it altogether. Most Texans believe now, however, that long before 1936 Texas will be in better financial condition than at any time in its history, and others assert that a creditable Centennial celebration would do more than any thing else to bring about economic and business rehabilitation.

The legislature is left to decide the extent to which the State shall take part in it if at all. It is expressly provided that "this authorization shall not be construed to make appropriations for any future exposition or celebration of any kind or character" than this one-hundredth anniversary observance.

The suggestion occasionally heard that private capital should finance the Centennial is impractical. First, it cannot be secured, and then, if it could be, the Centennial would be a private exploitation of the public rather than a prideful official State celebration.

The Chicago "Century of Progress" is already an assured success a year in advance of its opening. The California Legislature appropriated \$1,000,000 for the recent Olympic Games, and this was paid back with \$1,000,000 more profits to the State treasury. Certainly Texas can do as well whatever it undertakes. Vote for the Amendment and make the Centennial possible. It is the opportunity of a Century.

TRUCKS NOT LESS EXPENSIVE

(This Week's Opinion)

In a recent editorial, the able editor of the El Campo News gave expression to a common misunderstanding. He suggested that transportation of freight by truck was less expensive than by rail.

Nothing could strike farther from the truth. The railroad rate structure is a composite—a balancing—of profitable and unprofitable charges. It has been built in the best interests of the whole people by a commission representing the people.

An explanation for the whole railtruck controversy is found in the fact that the trucks solicit only the railroad's profitable business and leave it only the unprofitable business. Continuance of such a condition, obviously, means the ruin of the railroad industry. And then what happens?

The average cost of freight transported by rail is one cent per ton mile. The average cost of freight transported by truck is five cents per ton mile. Wreck the railroads and you have multiplied the freight element of commodity prices five times. That is the answer to the statement that it costs less to freight by truck than by rail.

The public interest is paramount. The controversy must be adjudicated with the public interest in mind. And that means that common carriers on the public highways either must transport their share of the unprofitable business or that op-

THE TEXAS TUBERCULOSIS ASSOCIATION MET AT WACO

The Executive Committee of the Texas Tuberculosis Association met in Waco September 20, at the home of Mrs. W. O. Wilkes to consider a "Five Year Plan for the Study and Eradication of Tuberculosis in Texas." The plan was submitted by Dr. Elva A. Wright, Houston, chairman of a state wide committee appointed last May for the purpose of developing such a program. It was adopted as submitted.

Among other provisions, the plan outlines a suggested procedure for the examination of all school children in Texas for the detection of the early, or childhood, type of tuberculosis. Some 25,000 children in various sections of the State have already received this examination and it is believed that five years of intensive work among children throughout the State will result in greatly reduced death rates from tuberculosis.

Dr. John Potts, President of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, appointed a committee of three physicians to work out a uniform examination card to be used in the examination of children. Appointed on this committee were Dr. W. F. Hoehn, Waco chairman; Dr. Henry Meyer, Houston and Dr. John G. Young of Dallas.

The cooperation of other state and local agencies in carrying out the Five Year Plan has been requested by the Texas Tuberculosis Association. Commenting on plan, Dr. J. C. Anderson, State Health Officer, stated: "I wish to reiterate what I have often said in the past, that the National and State Tuberculosis Organizations have put a very valuable piece of work during the last decade, and after looking over the plan, I feel that it will bring even greater results in the next five years than have been accomplished during the five years in the past. Speaking for the Texas State Board of Health I wish to advise that the entire health department is behind any plan or program which has for its object the control of tuberculosis."

The Five Year Plan has also the endorsement of Dr. J. B. McKnight, Superintendent of the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium, who states that he thinks it is good and will get results.

The plan also has the approval of Mr. C. N. Shaver, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, who pledges the cooperation of the members of the State Department of Education.

The Executive Committee of the Texas Tuberculosis Association authorized the use of funds raised by the annual sale of Christmas Seals to finance the Five Year Plan for the Study and Education of Tuberculosis in Texas.

Members of the Executive Committee are: Dr. John Potts, Fort Worth, President; J. W. Butler, Galveston, Secretary; H. A. Wroe, Austin, Treasurer; Mrs. W. O. Wilkes, Waco; Mr. Murray G. Thames, Beaumont; Dr. Z. T. Scott, Austin, Managing Director, and Miss Pansy Nichols, Austin, Executive Secretary.
