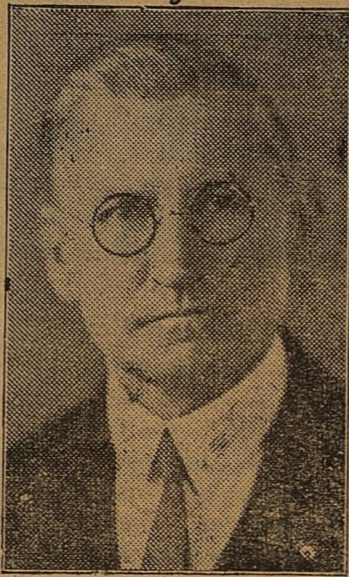

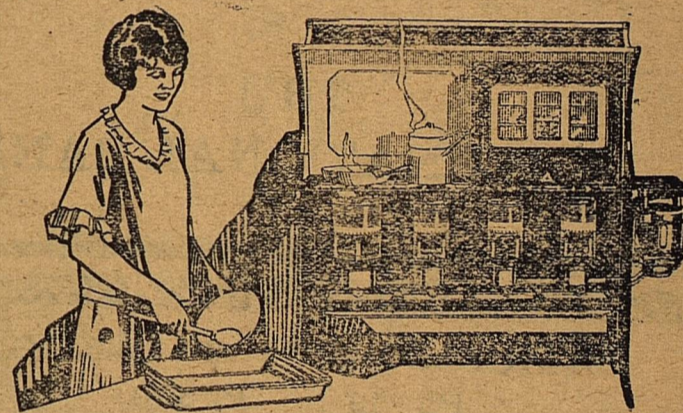

## CONDENSED AUSTIN NEWS

Wille Meyer, convicted in Refugio County of unlawfully catching fish in Aransas River with a seine or net other than a minnow seine not exceeding twenty feet in length, and fined \$25 and costs, has filed appeal in the Court of Criminal Appeals.

The Texon Oil Company paid \$101,486 as royalty on oil produced on University land during July, compared with \$102,837 for June or a decrease of \$1,351. This made a total of \$220,885 paid in July royalty for the Big Lake contributed \$119,399, compared to \$105,053 for June.

Oscar D. Hudnall of Austin, for more than twenty-nine years a member of the staff of the Texas Railroad Commission and many years head of the commission's rate department, has been appointed rate expert for interstate matters at a salary of \$4,250 per annum.

Captain W. R. Hendrickson, State building inspector for many years, died recently at his residence in Austin, after a brief illness. He was 72 years old and was under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Control. In his official capacity he passed on the plans and materials used in State structures.

The petition filed by a number of professional fishermen of Galveston with the State Game, Fish and Oyster Department, asking that Galveston Bay be temporarily closed against the taking of shrimp, has been refused by Commissioner Turner E. Hubby, who said that he did not deem it advisable to close any additional public waters.

The 112th Cavalry Band, Texas National Guard, stationed at Mineral Wells, the only mounted band in the guard, has been employed by the Dallas Fair Association to furnish music during the State Fair next October, Brig. Gen. Jacob Walters, commanding the cavalry brigade, announced in a letter to the Adjutant General's Department.

According to information received here the State Prison Advisory Board spent some \$2,000 before its members discovered that the Legislature had failed to make an appropriation to defray its expenses in visiting the prison farms and penitentiary. As a result the claims will have to await appropriation by the Fortieth Legislature.

The United States geological survey engineers have been moved to the Trinity River near Ennis, to survey the Trinity for reclamation purposes. A stretch of thirty miles will be covered and connect with previous mapping. This is done for levee construction purposes under joint arrangement with the Texas reclamation department.

Dr. H. P. Bybee, for eleven years a professor of geology in the University of Texas, has severed his connection with the University to become geologist for an oil company with offices in San Angelo. Dr. Bybee has been granted a leave of absence for one year. Arthur H. Dean of Austin graduate of the University of Texas and the University of California, has been appointed to fill the vacancy.

Protest against the proposed placing of a bust of Abraham Lincoln in the West Texas Technological College at Lubbock as one of the five great men in history of America, was made by the Albert Sidney Johnson Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy at a meeting here. The members went on record as being unanimously opposed to the proposed honoring of Lincoln.

S. B. Cowell, chairman of the State Board of Control, said that practically every bed in the State hospitals are now occupied except a few in the negro men's ward at the Austin State Hospital. However, he said, the jails had been cleared of those suffering with mental disease and that the hope is to keep them clear for some time. There are now 7,222 patients in these State hospitals.

An inspection of the gravel roads and bridges in Southeast Texas and Northeast Texas will be made by Highway Commissioner Joe Burkett with a view of determining their condition for future action by the commission. He wants to know their exact condition so that the roads may be retained by hard surface coating if they have not deteriorated too much and whether the bridges are in condition to stand constant use.

Announcement has been made in the Governor's office that James W. Swayne of Fort Worth has been appointed chairman of the State Industrial Accident Board and will assume his duties on Sept. 1. Swayne is an attorney and at one time was a partner of James S. Hogg in the oil business, the firm name having been the Hogg-Swayne Syndicate. He will succeed J. H. Fowle, who has been chairman of the board for some years and was given his original appointment by James E. Ferguson when the latter was Governor.

## EL DORADO TAKES FOURTH GAME FROM ROBERT LEE.

Thursday as we were going to press the El Dorado Base Ball team were over at Robert Lee playing the fourth game of ball with the Robert Lee team and won the fourth game by a score of 9 to 3. Although being a little embarrassed by threats of going to jail the Eagles hit hard and safe and brought home the bacon. The fourth game ended in a row between T. J. Bailey and the first basemen at Robert Lee, this ended the game by Robert Lee forfeiting it at the end of the eighth, the score standing as above mentioned.

This is the first fight any of our ball players have had in all the games played this year and we doubt if they were altogether to blame.

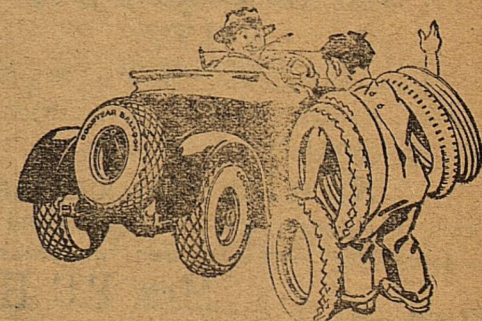

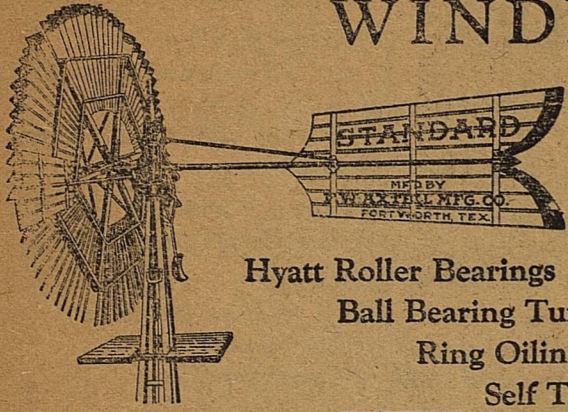

## TEXAS NEWS

Application of the Texas railroads for an increase of 3 1/2 cents per 100 pounds on the rate of cotton between points in Texas was denied by the railroad commission recently, in an order issued by the commission.

Proposal to increase the school tax at Edgewood from 80 cents to \$1 on the \$100 property valuation was defeated at an election held there several days ago.

Transfer of highway equipment for division 6 is now being made from El Paso to Alpine, new division headquarters.

The people in a wide section of Brazoria County will decide at an election called for Sept. 26 if systematic cattle dipping will again be resumed.

Three thousand bales of prison farm cotton will be ginned by Sept. 1, according to report made to Governor Ferguson by Walker Sayles, member of the state prison commission, and it is to be concentrated on the ship channel at Houston.

A bid submitted by Will C. Hurst, covering the making of ownership maps for incorporation of the city of Longview and of the Longview independent school district, has been accepted by the city commissioners. The bid amounts to \$4600.

The Texas State fair and about twenty-five conventions, some of which are national, are expected to bring more than one million visitors to Dallas within the next year, the convention department of the chamber of commerce says.

More than 8,000 farm laborers, most of them from drouth stricken counties, have been placed this summer by state free employment agencies, and at the present time there are five jobs available for every applicant, F. R. Crocker, state labor commissioner, stated this week.

Crop conditions in Bastrop County become more unfavorable each day as the extreme dry weather continues, and it is now almost too late for rain to help the cotton crop. The crop will be the shortest known in years, and it is estimated that the yield in the county will not exceed 1800 bales.

The scramble of state departments for more room in the capitol building has run into legal complications. A ruling has been secured by the board of control on its power to allot rooms for the departments and the legal decision is that the board may not move any bureaus from offices it already holds.

A federal employment bureau has been opened at Waco, and other bureaus likely will be opened within the near future at Benton and Greenville, State Labor Commissioner Crocker was notified this week by C. W. Woodman, assistant director of farm labor of the federal department of labor.

Cotton originating in area infected by the pink boll worm where quarantine rules do not permit compression en route when consigned to points in Texas east of Sierro Blanca, under bills of lading carrying the notation "to be compressed" may, at the request of the owner or shipper, be compressed and fumigated at El Paso for 66c a bale, the Texas railroad commission has ordered.

The Texas & Pacific Railroad has applied to the interstate commerce commission for permission to issue \$2,475,000 for equipment trust certificates to buy new engines and freight cars, it was announced this week. The money to be received will be used toward purchase of \$3,310,250 worth of equipment, including ten freight locomotives, five passenger engines, ten switch engines and 750 gondola type freight cars.

Eight Texas towns have lost a 3c credit on their respective fire insurance key rate. J. J. Timmons, state fire marshal, says the fire insurance commission has penalized Albany, Hubbard, Angleton, Memphis, Meridian, Tahoka, Tenaha and Wellington because of failure of the city fire marshals of these towns to send in required monthly reports. Because of this failure, the key rate for each town was raised 3c.

Ten carloads of cattle were shipped from Gonzales the past week, nine by Johnson and Kelly consigned to Pool of Bay City, and one car by A. E. Floyd consigned to New Orleans market. J. L. Du Bose of Westhoff just over the line from Gonzales County shipped out nine cars of yearlings and two year old steers to San Angelo to grass. The stock range in this county is very bad, there being practically no grass on the range at all.

Contract for the construction of a chapel, dormitory and power house for the Home for Dependent and Neglected Children at Waco has been awarded by the state board of control.

The cotton shippers of Nacogdoches and surrounding territory are gratified with the announcement made from local Representative M. L. Love of the Southern Pacific that special cotton trains would be made up at Dallas and at Palestine each day at 5 p. m. to run to Houston via Nacogdoches and Gallatin over the Texas and New Orleans, reaching Houston at 6 a. m., thus giving one night service in the delivery of cotton from all points between Dallas and Houston, and between Palestine and Houston.

## THE PENCIL MAKES A FARM PAY BETTER

Farm Accounting Reveals Losing Methods and Points Way to Bigger Profits.

(From Banker-Farmer)

A farm cannot properly be called successful unless it pays a fair rate of interest on the investment and returns fair wages for the farmer's labor. Agriculture is considered by all odds the most important industry in the world, and yet in no other industry is the business end so neglected. It is common to find a farmer with an investment of fifteen to twenty thousand dollars, yet does he keep books? Perhaps he may jot down a note now and then of an important deal, but this is of no value in an analysis of his business as a whole. No other industry, however small, is carried on without books of some sort.

Farming is a business and to be successful must be conducted in a businesslike way. The business man's mind should have indelibly printed upon it two questions: What profit is my business making? How can that profit be increased? To know the latter, one must find out the former; and to find out about profits requires the keeping of books.

It is not necessary for a farmer to have a course in bookkeeping. Almost every agricultural college in the country has issued a simplified farm accounting book which it sells at cost, and only a few minutes are required each day to jot down the day's happenings.

Accounts Increase Profits  
Instances number a thousandfold where farmers have profited by knowing their business. Accounts kept by nineteen farmers in Illinois led them to improve the organization and operation of their farms in ways that added approximately \$650 to their average net income in 1922, the seventh year they had kept accounts.

An Iowa farmer found at the end of the first year he kept books that crops fed to livestock brought more money than when sold outright. His figures showed that his cows were poor; compared with other farms in the state, he found the number of acres cultivated per man on his farm, as

well as the number of acres per horse, were below average. He rented more land and replanned his fields, so that the crop areas per man and horse were increased. He sold some of his scrubs and bought good cows. The second year his income from the farm, after paying all expenses and interest on the money invested, had been increased over \$350.

Costs Can Be Regulated  
"I have discovered," says one farm bookkeeper, "that the kind of man you have on a job, as well as the particular team, often makes quite a variation in the cost of performing certain tasks. I have learned from the pages of my book that if I could have increased the yield of my wheat field by two bushels and my corn by five bushels I would have realized a substantial profit from them."

While the farmers may not be able to fix prices on their products, they do have a voice in determining the costs of production. To reduce this cost they must first know what the costs are.

The number of farmers who are keeping books on their business has increased remarkably in recent years, but the number of businesslike farmers is woefully small when listed alongside the sum total of the farmers in the country.

Inventory Is Indispensable  
The basis of any system of farm accounting is the annual property list or inventory. It is the starting point of the farm records. One must take into consideration decreases or increases in the value of all property owned to gauge the progress of the business. Lacking facts as to the value of his property, no business man can form an accurate estimate of how he stands financially. Increased cash may be due to property which was sold, or increased debts may be due to improvements made. If a farmer is falling behind, the inventory will emphasize this fact. Often when a man is discouraged and thinks he is making no progress, his inventories will tell him that he is better off than he thought.

At the end of each year a financial statement is drawn off. This is the farmer's rating and no farmer with a good financial statement need fear walking into a bank and asking for a loan.

### BANKERS HELP

A bank in Monrovia, Ind., tests seed corn for farmers. A basement room was fitted out last season for the purpose and 25,000 ears were tested for fifty-six farmers. One-fourth of the seed tested last year was unfit for seed. This year the percentage will run even higher. The work is done under the supervision of the high school agricultural teacher. He reports that the community will have a surplus of seed corn this year.

The banks of Conway, Ark., have offered prizes for the most marketable sweet potatoes produced on one acre of land. A first prize of \$150 is offered, along with three district prizes of \$50 each. The county agent and the banks are working out the details. The County Bankers Association

will help to employ a full time county leader this year for boys' and girls' club work in Calhoun, Cherokee and Buena Vista counties, Iowa.

## LONDON HOTEL BURNED THURSDAY AUG. 20.

The London Hotel of San Angelo burned last Thursday afternoon, fire started between 1:00 and 2:00 o'clock, and the entire structure was burned. The damage is estimated at \$150,000, the building had just been repapered and painted and floors oiled. The origin of the fire is not known.

## G. E. THOMPSON DIES SUDDENLY THURSDAY.

C. E. Thompson died last Thursday afternoon, very suddenly, at his home in San Angelo, the remains were shipped to Temple Friday afternoon for burial, he is survived by his wife and two sons, Luke Thompson who ranches in this county and H. L. Thompson of San Antonio.

Mr. Thompson has been a ranchman of this county for about nine years but his son Luke has been in charge of the ranch most of the time.

Married, in San Angelo, Texas, Thursday August, 20th at 3 o'clock, Miss Ethel May Jones of Sonora, to Mr. Melvin Hodgerson, a Schleicher county ranchman; Rev. Gaston Hartsfield, Pastor of the First Methodist Church of that city officiating. Miss Jones is a cousin of R. M. Cozby, whom she visited this week.—Christoval Observer.
