The big Dirigible Shenandoah which was traversing the skies over central United States, was wrecked in storm Friday morning, while some 5,000 feet high, with 43 people aboard, 14 die in the wreckage, one of the dead is a nephew by marriage to Mr. Thad A. Thomson ranchman of his County, being a nephew of Mrs. Thomson. Lewis Hancock was second in command of the Shenandoah and perished along with the others 13.

Freight loading carried by each car has increased 3.12 tons, or 14 per cent. Freight loading carried by each freight train has increased 226 tons, or 54 per cent. These are gratifying marks of progress.

The Santa Fe hopes to keep on growing and to keep on giving satisfactory service.

## Texas Items

Customs collections for the port of Texas City for the month of August totaled \$455,282.35.

The towns of Tom Ball and Walburg have received one-cent cuts in their fire insurance key rates. Tom Ball now being 98 cents and Walburg 99 cents.

An issue of \$50,000 city of Kerrville street paving bonds bearing 6 1/2 per cent interest and maturing serially has been approved by the attorney general's department.

Rock has been placed along the Dixie Highway from Starrville eastward to the Gregg County line for the purpose of tarriating the unsurfaced stretches along the pike.

At the election held at Beeville the amendment to increase the school tax from 50c to \$1 on the \$100 valuation in the Bellville School District carried by a majority of 97 votes.

A number of Texas architects now are preparing detailed plans and specifications for the construction of a new \$150,000 library building at the College of Industrial Arts at Denton.

The Coleman County tax rate has been increased from 31 to 35 cents on the \$100 valuation. It is estimated that the 4-cent increase will produce about \$4000 additional revenue.

The pecan crop in the Bastrop section will be very short, about 25 per cent normal. The failure is due to the drouth and nut weevil, which caused the trees to shed the fruit.

At a special meeting of the Kenedy school board an election for September 16 was called for the purpose of voting on the question of increasing the present tax 50 cents on the \$100 valuation.

Cotton receipts in Tyler for the week ending August 29 passed the 5500-bale mark, the season continuing more than three weeks ahead of last year and more than a month ahead of normal.

Warnings have been issued by T. E. Hubby, fish and game commissioner, to operators of irrigation projects to have strainers placed over the mouths of ditches to prevent fish from being washed onto the farm lands and dying.

An election has been set for September 22 at San Saba to decide for or against the organization of an irrigation district for the San Saba Valley. The proposed district will embrace 45,000 acres of the fertile valley lands.

Kaufman County levee engineers of District No. 4 Saturday filed with B. F. Williams, state reclamation engineer, an application for approval of a project to reclaim 12,000 acres. The project is to cost \$500,000 and includes a 30-mile levee.

An invitation has been accepted by the Texas railroad commission from the interstate commerce commission to sit in the hearing at Brownsville, October 5, on the application of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass to extend its line from Falfurrias south.

Miss Octavia F. Rogan has qualified as state librarian to succeed Miss Elizabeth Howard West, who assumed the librarianship of the Technological College at Lubbock. Miss Charlotte Ryan of San Antonio succeeded Miss Rogan as legislative reference librarian.

Application to build a 27-mile extension from MacBain in Motley County to Floydada in Floyd County, the extension to pass through Motley and Floyd Counties, has been filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission by the Quanah, Acme and Pacific Railroad.

Collections for the Galveston customs district for August surpassed those of August, 1924, by \$32,457.61 according to figures obtained at the customs house. Collections for past month totaled \$937,118.76, while in August, 1924, they totaled only \$904,661.15.

Standardization of fire hose couplings, so that the fire fighting equipment of one Texas city may operate effectively in any other city or town of the state, is now well under way, states J. J. Timmins, state fire marshal. In order to hasten standardization, the state has been divided into 29 districts.

The good crops in Wood County will mean that thousands of dollars in delinquent taxes will be collected in the county if the plans of Tax Collector E. J. McCrary are carried out. The collector has notified delinquents that in view of the fine crops, efforts will be made by Wood County to collect every cent of taxes due to county and state.

Houston cotton exports for the first month of the 1925-26 season broke all previous records for similar periods with a total of 116,897 bales, as compared with 66,893 bales during August last year, and 67,060 bales two years ago.

At request of contestants, decision of the state board of water engineers regarding priority rights to waters of the Frio river as affecting Uvalde and Frio County irrigation districts, has been postponed until September 16, when another hearing will be held.

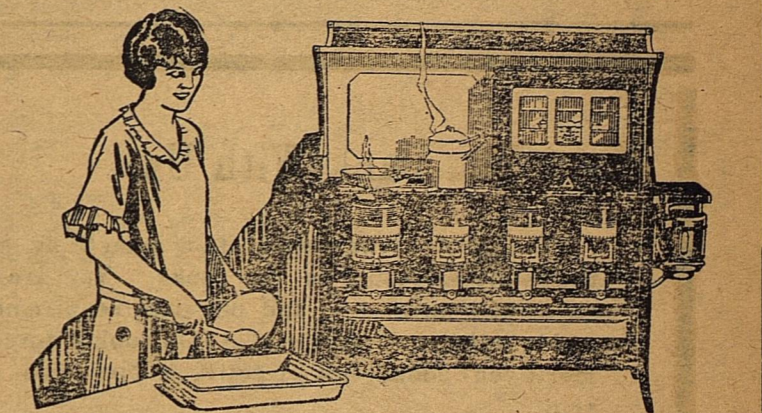

**CONDENSED AUSTIN NEWS**

The Attorney General has approved an issue of \$50,000 of street paving bonds of Kerrville, payable serially and bearing 5 1-4 per cent interest.

Contract has been awarded by the Board of Control to E. W. Johnson of Gainesville for construction of a cottage at the State Girls' Training School, to cost \$7,310.

The Attorney General has received a copy of the so-called Chrysler-Palmer plan of insurance and Assistant Attorney General R. B. Cousins Jr., has started an investigation of the authorities.

Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson honored the requisition of the Governor of Colorado for the return to Larimer County in that State of B. L. Brookins to answer a charge of forgery. Brookins is reported to be under arrest at Wichita Falls.

Railroad Commissioner Lon A. Smith has returned from a tour of the oil fields in Navarro County in company with Deputy Supervisor F. H. Pierson of Corsicana. He reports that he found conditions in those fields generally good.

Empire Building and Loan Association, Dallas, capital stock \$10,000,000, has been granted a charter. Incorporators and directors are W. E. Everett, J. W. Blanton, Tom L. McCullough, George H. Paul and J. M. L'artin, all of Dallas.

Unexpected increase in the number of automobiles registered in Texas caused the State Highway Commission to place orders for 75,000 additional pairs of license plates for immediate delivery. This brings the total for 1925 to 960,000.

Heard oil well No. 1, near Refugio, is running wild, according to advices received by Judge H. E. Bell, chief oil and gas supervisor of the Railroad Commission. It was reported to be blowing out about 30,000 gallons of sulphur water from a depth of 1,200 feet.

Subpenas have been issued for the first witness to testify in the State's \$50,000,000 oil suit, their evidence to be adduced in Houston, starting on Sept. 7, before Charles E. Pickle, commissioner appointed by District Judge George Calhoun of Travis County, in whose court the noted case is pending.

Arch Bennett, negro farmer, 80 years old, convicted in Guadalupe County of manslaughter in connection with the killing of Peter Dawson, May 15, 1924, and sentenced to two years, has filed appeal in the Court of Criminal Appeals. Bennett claimed that Dawson had whipped a 10-year-old girl who had been placed in his care by the aged dary.

Charter was given the Houston Association of Retail Furniture Dealers, no capital stock. The purpose is "to establish and maintain uniformity in the commercial usages of the city of Houston and to promote the interest of trade and increase of facilities of commercial transactions." Incorporators are John B. Black, J. W. James and R. Doc Herod.

A. V. Knight, Chief Deputy United States Marshal at San Antonio, has been appointed Deputy Clerk of the Federal Court for the Western District of Texas, headquarters at Austin, to fill the vacancy caused by resignation of A. B. Coffee. Mr. Knight has been connected with the United States Marshal's office at San Antonio for eight years.

State Treasurer W. G. Hatcher having refused Comptroller Sam H. Terrell's warrant to deposit the \$873,981 of University oil royalty to the University permanent fund and Mr. Terrell having rejected Mr. Hatcher's request for warrant to place it in the available or building fund, the situation remains unchanged and the money still is held in escrow. It will take a court decision to settle the controversy.

The population of the State prisons decreased ninety during August, according to the official report made to the Governor by the Prison Commission, there now being a total of 3,505 convicts on hand. There has been a steady decrease in prison population since June 1. On that date State convicts numbered 3,640. The records show that on July 1 there was a population of 3,621, and on Aug. 1 that number had been reduced to 3,505.

When the new law authorizing the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission to establish State game preserves becomes effective Sept. 1, six preserves will be in operation, Commissioner Turner E. Hubby has announced. The combined acreage of the preserves will be approximately 163,000 acres and all of the land has been posted, warning trespassers that any hunting during the next ten years will constitute a violation of law with penalty of a fine ranging from \$50 to \$100.

Mrs. A. E. Shepperd was born February 20 1862, in Alabama, moved to Texas with her parents at the age of 15 years and settled in Smith County her maiden name being Miss Claudie Woodruff Wilson, she joined the Baptist Church in early childhood and lived a conservative Christian life to the end.

She was married to A. E. Shepperd at Tyler, Texas, January 8, 1888, and to this union were born six children one girl died at three years of age, three daughters and two sons survive Mrs. Fayett Murray of Christoval, Alfred Shepperd of 7481 North Seely Street, Chicago, Ill., Robert Shepperd, of Christoval, Mrs. Henery DeLong, of Christoval, and Mrs. Frank Chaple of Christoval, all present except Alfred, who had just returned from her bed side.

Mrs. Shepperd came to Christoval in 1888 at the time of her marriage and made the trip from Tyler to this country in a wagon and has been a prominent factor in the development of West Texas having given her best days in christianizing the West, she and her husband kept open house to all who came their way, no stranger ever being turned aside, but found comfort when they reached this home. It was the pleasure of the writer to make his home with these good people for some time while in our school days and learned to love them as my own people, as we come to the closing pages of her life we can reflect back on the past 37 years that we have known her and can not recall a single instance when some one has said aught against the subject of this sketch, nor have we heard her say aught against her fellowman, but she constantly tried to live up to the Golden Rule. Although afflicted from early life she bore the burdens of life with a smile and came to the end of her 63rd mile post with a life well spent.

Rev. Baucum of San Angelo preached the funeral service at the home in Christoval, to a large number of friends who had gathered to pay their last respects to this noble Christian mother who had gone on to the Glory land where Heaven is made brighter by her coming. The large floral offering best speaks the highest esteem in which she was held by her friends and associates. Yes Heaven is made brighter not only to those who rest there but the way left behind for her loved ones will be brighter for the hand will beckon them to come on and assist them to cleave to that which is good until they too will answer that call that must come to all.

Mrs. Shepperd is also survived by one sister and two brothers her sister being present at her death, but the brothers Jack Wilson of San Antonio and Bob Wilson of Tyler could not come she also has 14 grand children, left to profit by her life of Christian living. The remains were deposited in the Christoval Cemetery Friday afternoon, afternoon, after the end came Thursday at noon, September 7, 1925, along side those of her husband who died March 5, 1923.

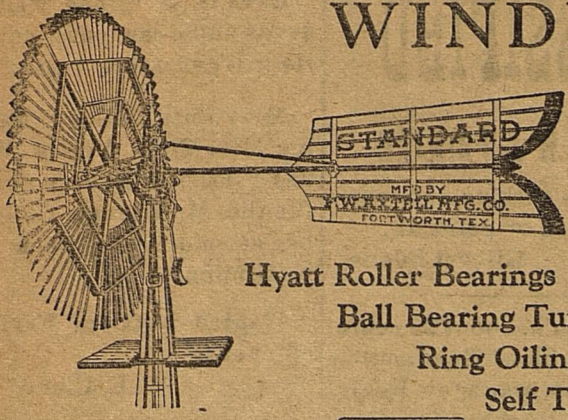

FOOD FOR CHILDREN WHO  
TRAVEL

Many times, and especially during  
the summer months, mothers are  
forced to take their children on trips  
with them. During these trips, the  
parent is forced to contend with that

chief source of worry, during these  
periods, is the milk supply, its source,  
its purity and its food value. It is  
not always convenient to get market  
milk of dependable quality for, in many  
sections of the country, adequate fa-  
cilities for its care are not provided.  
To meet the needs of mothers in these  
trying situations, science has provided  
a form of milk, conveniently carried  
and easily prepared. The cans are in  
two sizes, the one containing six  
ounces and the other sixteen.

Evaporated milk is just pure cows'  
milk with more than half of the water  
removed. None of its food value is  
lessened; in fact its digestibility is  
improved. It is easily mixed with wa-  
ter and is, undoubtedly, the most prac-  
tical form of milk for use as a food for  
children. Some of the country's lead-  
ing pediatricians recommend its use,  
employing the following formula:

From Sixth Week to Third Month.  
Milk, evaporated ..... 6 ounces  
Lime water ..... 3 ounces  
Milk sugar ..... 2 ounces  
Bottled water ..... 26 ounces  
Seven feedings in twenty-four hours;  
4 to 5 ounces at three-hour intervals  
during the day and four-hour intervals  
at night.

From Third Month to Fifth Month.  
Milk, evaporated ..... 7 1/2 ounces  
Lime water ..... 3 ounces  
Milk sugar ..... 2 ounces  
Bottled water ..... 29 1/2 ounces  
Six feedings in twenty-four hours;  
5 to 6 ounces at three-hour intervals  
during the day and a feeding at 10 p. m.

From Fifth to Seventh Month.  
Milk, evaporated ..... 10 ounces  
Lime water ..... 3 ounces  
Milk sugar ..... 2 ounces  
Bottled water ..... 29 ounces  
Five feedings in twenty-four hours;  
6 to 7 ounces at four-hour intervals,  
the last feeding to be given at 10 p. m.

From Seventh to Ninth Month.  
Milk, evaporated ..... 11 ounces  
Lime water ..... 3 ounces  
Milk sugar ..... 2 ounces  
Bottled water ..... 35 ounces  
4 to 5 ounces at four-hour intervals  
during the day. Last feeding at ten  
at night.

From Ninth to Twelfth Month.  
Milk, evaporated ..... 12 ounces  
Lime water ..... 3 ounces  
Milk sugar ..... 2 ounces  
Barley water ..... 34 ounces  
8 to 9 ounces at four-hour intervals  
during day. Last feeding at ten at  
night.
