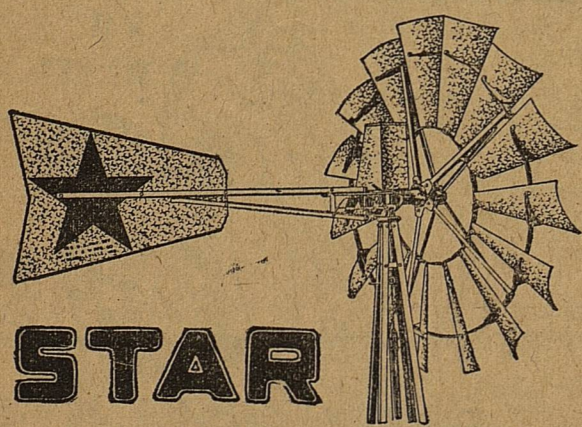

Probably what is thought to be the last word on home owning has already been said. In song, in story, on platform and in pulpit, everywhere—we have learned the value of owning one's own home. The practice of acquiring a home has become a part of the national code and custom. Even the lowly advertisement has not lacked for literary expression to extol the virtues of acquiring a lot, building a house and furnishing its rooms, accommodating it to the weather, and providing whatever comforts and conveniences that create the domestic atmosphere. But there has not been enough said either in praise or justification of the humble renter. With so much said in favor of home-owning, the renter has felt almost in a class of "undesirables." This should not be the case.

A mere house does not make a home. The ownership of a house, worthy as it may be in its acquisition, is not complete sum and substance of contentment, thrift and good citizenship. It

is true, of course, that all else being equal, the finer auspices of practical citizenship should be accorded the man or woman whose foresight and industry, coupled with the determination to locate permanently, has led him or her to actually hold legal title to a piece of real estate and improvements which is called home. But this does not justify the conclusion that the renter is any less valuable to society, nor indeed, that he contributes any less to the common pot of community welfare.

Renters—from the squatter type (if honest, industrious and law-abiding) to the wealthy tipster of hotel bell-hops—not only form a large part of the population, but, undistracted by the expense, the cares, and the "tied-down" feeling incident to house ownership, are often better able to grasp business opportunities and move more readily to take better positions; thus, after all, come nearer being "live wires" in commercial pursuits than their worthy brethren

who cut their own lawns.

In a sense, we are all renters. Though you may have the deed to your property instead of a mere lease on it, the Government exacts its rent in the form of taxes and assessments, the insurance companies claim their pound of flesh, and lastly, Nature demands its recompense by summoning you to annual repairs and upkeep. This much for the humble renter whose lease has never been surrounded with quite the romance or mystique that has gladdened the heart of the owner of a home.

CONDENSED AUSTIN NEWS

Requisition from the Governor of Arizona for the extradition of John Hamilton, wanted in Mohave County, Arizona, on a complaint charging criminal assault, was honored by Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson. Hamilton is in custody at Ballinger, Runnels County.

Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson signed a deficiency warrant for \$58,180 for meeting the general expense of taking care of the unexpected large attendance of students at the first session of Texas Technological College at Lubbock, and that amount is now available for use by the board of regents of the new college.

Purposes of the Wholesale Credit Men's Association, granted a charter by the Secretary of State, are establishing and maintaining uniformity in Texas commercial usages, securing close co-operation of wholesale credit men's associations throughout the State and assisting in removal of causes of financial failures.

Payment of oil royalties for production on University lands in Reagan County during September by the Texon Company has been delayed on account of the Reagan County purchasing company's calculations not having been received, according to a telegram received by the State Land Office from Group No. 1 Oil Corporation of the Texona. This telegram followed one saying that \$104,000 in royalties were being sent.

Cancellation by State Superintendent of Public Instruction S. M. N. Marrs of certificates of five school teachers in Hopkins County some time ago was not sustained by the State Board of Education at the regular monthly meeting of the board. The board held that the evidence for cancellation of the certificates was insufficient. The State Superintendent had alleged that the certificates had been obtained through fraud.

Dallas leads cities and towns of Texas in fire apparatus with forty pieces of auto apparatus to its credit, according to a list of cities and towns in the State having water-works and fire departments, compiled by the engineering division of the State Fire Insurance Commission under the direction of Chief Engineer G. C. Hawley. Dallas also leads in the number of firemen, with 323 listed in the double platoon system.

Adj. Gen. Mark McGee had in conference with him recently the six ranger captains now in service and discussed with them work accomplished by the State ranger force during the present administration and plans for future service. It was the first get-together meeting held by the ranger captains since Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson reorganized the force early in her administration. The force is now being operated with the smallest number of captains than in many years.

From Gaines Mill to Appomattox, through Gettysburg, upborne by fourteen who received mortal wounds in its support, a flag that once saw the bloodshed of Civil War, now rests amidst the workings of economic peace. Survivors of the famous "Bloody Fifth" Regiment of Hood's Brigade have contributed their battle-scarred flag to the Confederate Museum in the old Land Office at Austin, where it will be officially received next week by the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson recently addressed a letter to William E. Register at Dallas, giving her approval and commendation to the annual sale of forget-me-nots Nov. 4 to 10 for the relief of needy and disabled war veterans and their dependents. Mr. Register is chairman of the Texas campaign to raise funds. After writing that the movement had her warmest support, Gov. Ferguson declared "it is indeed a worthy cause and should be sponsored by every patriotic citizen."

The American Road Company of Dallas refunded to the State Treasury \$15,730.67, representing accounts that had been paid twice to the company. The money in certified

Murphy played good ball at the tackles being outweighed but not out fought, Ratliff and Young were heavily out weighed in the ends but managed to get several tackles each. The backfield played a sluggish game with the exception of Captian Isaacs. The whole team played sluggish football, apparently not recovered from their hard last weeks schedule in which they did the unheard of thing of playing 3 games all of which were very hard struggles.

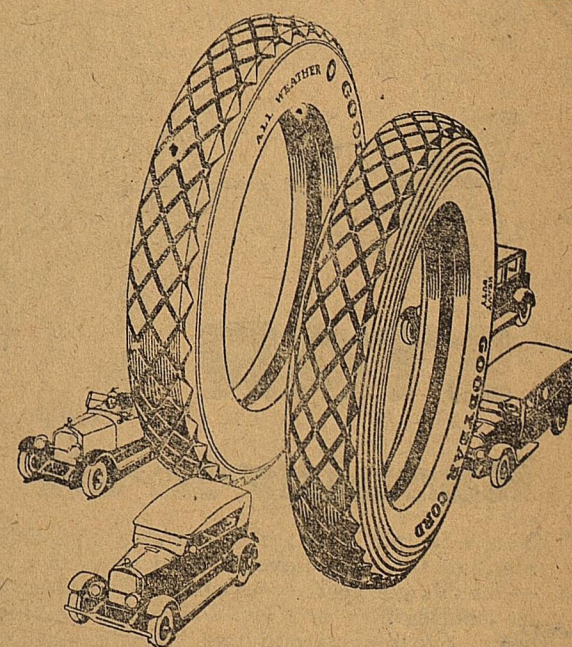

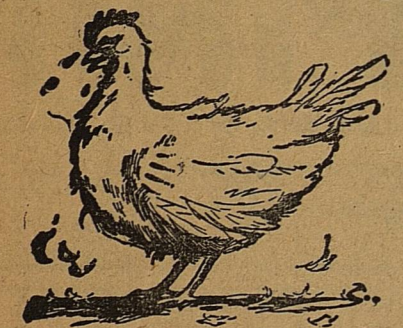

Texas News

There were ginned in Caldwell County from the cotton crop prior to October 1, 1925, a total of 2250 bales as compared with 36,068 ginned to October 1, 1924.

Building authorized in 113 leading cities of Texas in the past nine months amounted to \$71,826,321, compared with \$68,143,530 for the same period last year.

Laying of the 10-inch water main extension in the southern part of Corpus Christi, started several weeks ago, will be completed this week.

A move has been started for a memorial monument at Amarillo to Colonel J. B. Golding, Texas soldier who died in Amarillo recently.

The \$70,000 school bonds of the Weimar Independent School District were sold last week for \$2,100 premium and accrued interest.

Three-fourths of the poll taxes is sued in Travis County have been received by women, according to county officials.

Houston's largest building permit was issued a few days ago. The permit covered construction of the new 30-story Esperson Building, and amounted to \$3,100,000.

There were 5933 bales of cotton ginned in Brazos County to October 1, according to J. F. Howard, ginning census enumerator for Brazos County. This compares with 13,062 bales to the same date last year, a loss of 7129.

Income tax return blanks will be mailed to 125,000 taxpayers of the southern half of Texas about January 1 in the opening of the annual income tax collection, according to officials of internal revenue collection headquarters at Austin.

There exist large and valuable deposits of asphalt near Uvalde, which is being worked and shipped in large quantities for the surfacing of new roads. This industry is increasing and becoming of great value in highway development.

The work of repairing the damage done to Anderson County dirt and gravel roads by the recent heavy rains is about completed. Bridges and culverts that were washed away or damaged have been repaired and traffic is moving over them as usual.

No trace of citrus canker is to be found in the Rio Grande Valley. George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, said upon his return from an inspection trip. He said valley citrus growers expect to make as large a crop of fruit as they did last year.

Texas Technological College was granted a \$58,180 deficiency by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson Saturday. Representative R. M. Chitwood, business manager of the Lubbock school, obtained the approval, and the money will be used for salaries and general expenses this year.

Twenty-seven bales of cotton off 26 acres of land is the record made by R. F. McKay, Cove farmer, this year. He is the second Chambers County farmer to report gathering more than a bale of cotton to the acre. Wilburn brothers picked and ginned 57 bales averaging more than 500 pounds each from 50 acres.

Two bond issues for good roads carried in Guadalupe County Saturday by big majorities. The largest issue, that of \$20,000, to supplement the state's allotment of some \$75,000, was voted in the road district running along the Southern Pacific Railroad east to the Caldwell County line. The other issue of \$6000 was for road improvement in the district southeast of Seguin.

The turkey crop of De Witt County, along with the cotton and other crops, is the shortest in several years. It is stated, and in addition to the shortage in numbers many of the turkeys are not going to be ready to offer for sale for the Thanksgiving market on account of their under-sized condition.

Creation of common school district No. 26 by the school boards of Gillespie and Kerr counties was sustained Saturday by the state board of education. The board thus upheld the ruling of S. M. N. Marrs, state superintendent of public instruction. District No. 40, out of which part of district 26 was carved, was the appellant.

Gypsum, the hydrated sulphate of calcium and the dehydrated sulphate, the mineral anhydrite, is found at many localities in Texas. Texas has emerged slowly from the Gulf of Mexico, the evaporation of its waters has caused the accumulation of the enormous deposits of salt, potassa salts, sulphur and enormous quantities of gypsum. Only a small area is worked. The value of the gypsum produced in Texas in 1923 was only \$2,237,024.

Seventy-five per cent of the autos in Texas are equipped with head lamps, adjusted in accordance with the law. Reed Grandberry, headlight engineer said this week. This information was gathered by sending out questionnaires to every county in the state. "After the first of the year Texas roads should be practically free from glaring headlights, since no car can be registered unless it has its lamps properly adjusted," Grand said.
