

BURIATS MUST STOP STEALING OF WIVES

Marriage Laws in Siberia Have Been Changed.

Washington.-Marriage isn't what it used to be in Siberia. One of the latest laws reported to the outside world provides three years' imprisonment for any Buriat who, following the customs of his fathers, steals the woman of his choice. The matter is complicated by the reported preference of the women to be stolen rather than to be asked for or bought.

"The Buriats are true children of nature when not influenced by outside cultures," says a bulletin from the Washington headquarters of the National Geographical society. "When the Russians came upon them on the banks of Lake Baikal in the Sixteenth. century many of them made their living wholly by hunting and fishing while the majority had only progressed one more step in their journey from natural conditions, being nomad stock

Nature Worshipers at Heart. "A little handful of Buriats, after

contact with Russian colonists, have become agriculturists; and remarkably good agriculturists at that, even surpassing the average Russian farmer. But the great majority still make their living close to unmodified nature, as herders and hunters.

"It is in their religious life that their love of nature makes itself most deeply felt. Many are frankly Shamanists-nature worshipers. nearest Mongolia profess Lamaism, But nature worship underlies the rites of all of them: the sky, the mountains, the rivers, the rain, the wind-all are peopled for them by gods. Even the nominally Christian Buriats nearest the shores of Lake Baikal insist that 'the Holy sea" called "lake," and that when so insulted it will become stormy and turbulent, perhaps destroying shipping.

"The nomadic Buriats, near the Mongolian border, have many traits in common with their kinsmen the Mongols. They are like them in appearance, live for the most part in "yurtas" or skin huts, raise cattle and sheep and are excellent horsemen. The typical well-to-do Buriat and his horse are Inseparable companions during life; and an ancient custom demands that the horse be tied to his owner's grave

to starve and so accompany him in death. The heirs of the deceased usually manage to get around this custom, however, either by substituting a worn-out hack for the good saddle horse, or by tying the latter with a weak thong. When the horse escapes and trots back to his fellows they say

that it, is the will of heaven' that he live. The Buriat horses are remarkable for their endurance, often trotting fifty and sixty miles without a pause, and showing no fatigue at the journey's end ..

"Buriats are so wedded to the yurtas that many who have followed Russian customs and built permanent huts, !eave a smoke hole in the center of the roof (as in a yurta) and build their fires in the center of the floor. They are fond of display, and the more prosperous have rugs on floor and walls, and wear silken robes. They are as inveterate smokers as the Burmese, and as in Burma even small children Tea drinking is also a common habit. The Buriat man of affairs wears a broad silk girdle, in which he thrusts his pipe and teacup, that these necessities may be ever at hand.

Brides Have Fur Dowries. "Only a small group of Buriats have practiced the theft of their wives. One common custom is for families that have both sons and daughters to exchange girls as wives for their respective sons. If the make-up of the families does not permit exchanges, a wife is in effect bought, usually by a gift of cattle, The bride's dowry usually more than offsets the price, however. In some cases the dowries are furs

worth many thousands of dollars. "The old Siberian province of Trans-Baikalia, east of the great lake, is the region in which most of the Buriats live. This is considered the most beautiful part of Siberia, a land of alternating forests and steppes. The soil is permanently frozen, although the immediate surface thaws out in summer. Agriculture is not possible over much of the Buriat country, but the shallow soil permits grazing activities.

"In the forested regions the tree roots penetrate the soil only a few inches but grow far horizontally Many of these poorly anchored trees are overturned by the wind; and characteristic feature of the country is supplied by the great rough disks of roots of the fallen trees towering almost as high as their upright fel





Santa Fe, N. M.—Brothers of the serving the traditions of their organization which arose from the martyrdom of priests who passed centuries in the conversion of the Pueblo Indians from their pagan beliefs to Christianity.

Much research work is being done by scholars to bring to light the facts of the spiritual conquest of the Pueblos, which they believe to be one of the most colorful pages of the history of the Americas.

Father Theodocius Meyer, after considerable study in the archives of the mission at Santa Barbara, Cal., has compiled a list of 51 members of the order who gave their lives in the period from 1542 to 1696.

The result of this search contrasts the religious brothers with the proud conquistador, the one for the prize of mystical gold and gems, the other for the prize of human souls.

The history of the Christlanization of the Indians showed that there were waves of persecution of the priests at intervals of 40 or 50 years

throughout nearly two centuries. They reached their climax in 1680, when the Pueblo Indians rose in rebellion against the tyranny of the Spanish rule, and killed nearly every white man in New Mexico. By prearranged plot, 31 missionaries in a score of pueblos, many of them 100 or more miles apart, were killed on one day.

ALASKA HOTEL OWNED BY 'MOTHER OF NORTH'

Got Her Start Cooking for Gold Seekers.

Skagway, Alaska.-Many tourists rom the States know Mrs. Harriet Pullen of the famous Pullen house, which is 1,500 miles as a plane flies from Ketchikan, at the southeastern tip of Alaska to Nome, out to the northwest on Bering sea.

All over the world, wherever linger those madmen and others who came rushing to Alaska and the Klondiketo the eastward, in Canada-for gold in 1898 and 1899, Mrs. Pullen is loved.

A handful of women became famous because they were able to stand beside the sprinkling of men in the uncounted myriad of goldrushers who were hard enough to conquer the North—and of all that bright company the men of the golden North count Mrs. Pullen the brightest.

Young, comely, strong, Harriet Pul-len was daughter of a rancher on Puget sound in Washington state. She came to Alaska in 1898 with her four children to go with her husband over the Chilkoot trail or the equally terrible White pass trail into the Klondike for gold.

Had \$7 and Four Children. She lost her husband. Camped on

the beach here she had \$7-and four little children.

The rush was never so mad that men dld not eat, and the mother with the four children and \$7 went to cook ing. She cooked so well and withal was so kind and helpful that those thousands passing through here and up the White pass trail or through Dyea, four miles from Skagway, and up the Chilkoot trail, called her the Mother of the North. She prospered and bought out old Cap Moore's boarding house in Skagway.

The boarding house she developed

into Pullen house, a 20-room modern hotel, standing in a landscape garden of several acres, split by a mountain stream with an island and rustic bridges. Canadians opening up their country came with a railroad over White pass—the White Horse & Yu-

The railroad still runs, and Mrs. Pullen still prospers because the whitehanded children of the outside come, taking this fast route to see the sights of the North. Pullen house is reputed to have entertained more disinguished guests than any other hostelry in the North

Sent to West Point.

Mrs. Pullen's oldest son was Dan. He attended the University of Washington, which then had a preparatory school, five years. President Roosevelt gave him the first appointment from Alaska to West Point. He became all-American tackle, and graduated among the first five cadets in his

Into the World war he went as a colonel of engineers. He was pressed into service as a tank commander With his squadron of tanks he took a German position, but infantry following him, failed to consolidate. hold the position. Pullen hastened back afoot, reformed the infantry, led them back and retook the position. He died of sleeping sickness, attributed

o war service two years ago Royal Pullen graduated from the University of Washington, playing guard, and was an officer in the World var. Both brothers were cited for gallantry, and General Pershing once exclaimed: "I wish I had a regiment

of Pullens." Mildred Pullen graduated at a nurses' school in New York city. Chester Pullen, a student at the Uni versity of Washington, was drowned at Ketchikan on his way back to the States after a summer at home.
