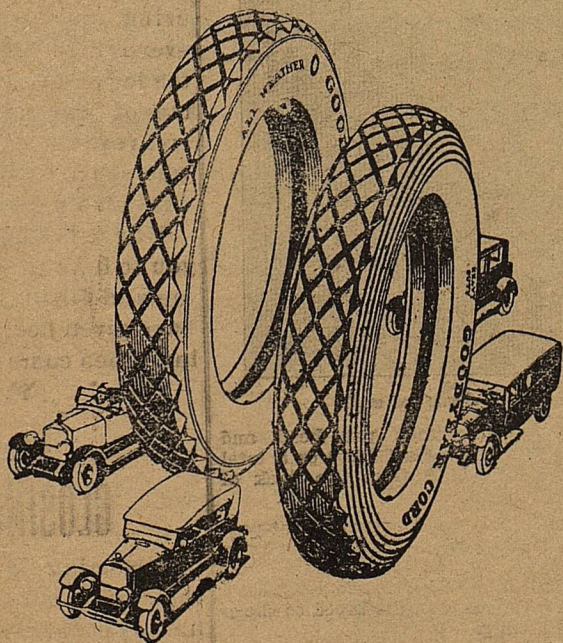

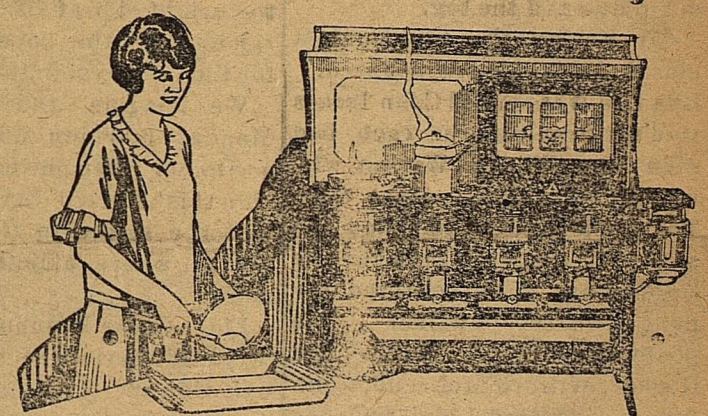

BETTER SPEECH WEEK.

The Eldorado High School observed April 5-9 inclusive as Good English Week. All English students in the high school made posters characteristic of the week. Many of these were very original and clever. When the posters were collected, the English teacher asked the other members of the faculty to act as judges and to select the six best.

On Monday we put up all of the posters in the store window and in the recitation rooms. We began to criticize speech. Each student received a tag upon entering the building on Monday morning which read "Watch your speech." Only so long as a student made no mistake to the knowledge of his classmates could he wear his tag. In case of a mistake the one noticing is and being able to correct it could demand the tag.

On Friday the tag contest closed and tags were counted. Lila Lee Watson and Conn Isaacs tied for first place as each had nine tags. Ola Mae Watson, who ranked second, held eight tags. The Senior Class collected the greatest number of tags and the Sophomore class collected the next greatest number. The posters made by Herma Lee Hooker, Wilford McLeod, Conn Isaacs, Una Ford, Lelah Spencer and Annice Putman were selected as the six best.

For the Friday assembly there was arranged a mock trial for the murder of Good English. The mock trial consisted of a jury bearing the name "Society," the lawyers for the state, "Miss Good Speech," "Miss Knowledge," the lawyers for the accused, "Mr. I Don't Care," "Mr. I Suppose," and witnesses Mr. Ain't accompanied by Miss I seen, Miss Hadn't Ought, Mr. Hain't, and Mr. Slang was accused and found guilty of murdering Good English on Main Street of Eldorado. The sentence was ninety-nine years in grammar for Mr. Ain't, and fifty years in grammar for his accomplices.

MRS. F. R. KEELE.

Mrs. F. R. Keele was born at Goliah Texas, January 17, 1863 and died at her home in El Dorado, Texas, April 19, 1926.

Mrs. Keele, nee Miss Nancy Ella Howell joined the Christian Church in early childhood and lived a consecrated Christian life until the end came.

She was united in marriage to F. R. Keele May 18, 1893, at Burnett, Texas, and to this union were born four children, two sons and two daughters, all survive her and all present for the funeral. Mrs. Keele moved to this County in January 1906 and has made for her self many friends, she was a devoted mother and a true companion and during the past six years laid on the bed of affliction, not in a sorrowful manner, but rather of a cheerful disposition, looking for the bright side of life here and rejoicing in the hope she held for the life beyond the grave.

We imagine the summons Monday morning was a sweet one to her when she could lay aside this afflicted body and sit with the saints in the land of Glory, where affliction is no more.

Elder Oscar Brannon of Winters held services at the Christian Church Tuesday morning and burial was made in the El Dorado Cemetery about noon Tuesday, in the presence of a host of friends.

DAWSON, ONCE PRIDE OF YUKON, IS FADING

Scene of 1900 Gold Rush Slipping Into Oblivion.

Dawson City, Yukon.—A bunch of the boys no longer whoop it up in the Malamute saloon, nor is there a rag-time kid available to hit a jag-time tune on the music box. The episode dealing with the demise of Dangerous Dan McGrew and the reign of the lady known as Lou are but vague memories of bygone days as far as this town is concerned.

When Robert Service wrote the "Shooting of Dan McGrew," the Malamute saloon was one of the many bright spots during the mad gold rush of 25 years ago. Together with scores of other such places, it played host to the hordes—the frenzied gold-seekers. Today, with its kindred resorts, it stands in the last stages of decay.

From the status of a thriving city of 30,000, Dawson City today has dwindled to a struggling village of less than 1,000.

Dawson's mushroom growth had its genesis in the great Klondike strike of 1900. Miners, adventurers, con men and courtesans swept into the frozen city of the North. Fortunes were made and lost over night. The miners made the fortunes, the hangers-on mulcted them. Winnings at the faro tables in the scintillating gambling halls went the same way. Thousands dragged their bodies over the frozen wastes—many to fall from exhaustion before the journey ended—to the gold-mad city. The North exacted a heavy tribute from those who would wrest fortune from the ground.

With the exception of the California strike of '49, the rush of 1900 was the richest in the history of mining. Hundreds of millions of dollars in dust and nuggets was taken from the ground. For more than ten years the yield stood up under the terrific pressure.

Then began the fading of the strike. From 1900's peak of \$22,250,000 gold production in the territory dropped to \$1,450,000 in 1924. Treasure-seekers dwindled and other sources received the rainbow-chasers.

183,000 Ladybirds a Profit to Insectary

Los Angeles, Cal.—A checkup just made on the Santa Barbara county (California) insectary, established two years ago, shows that a small profit has resulted from the operation of the plant, according to F. C. Greer, entomologist in charge. After all expenses including salaries were paid and 10 per cent allowed for depreciation of buildings and equipment, the county made a profit of \$100 from the sale of 183,000 ladybirds at 2 cents each, Mr. Greer found.

The first year the insectary was in operation the county raised 50,000 ladybirds, which cleaned up mealy bug infestations in a number of Carpinteria lemon orchards. The mealy bug, however, has been spreading rapidly, although prevented from doing great damage by its enemy insects. This year Mr. Greer will try to raise 200,000 bugs in an effort to keep the lemon orchards commercially clean.

The ladybird is being employed not only in the lemon orchards, but in the walnut orchards as well, and on lettuce and other vegetables.

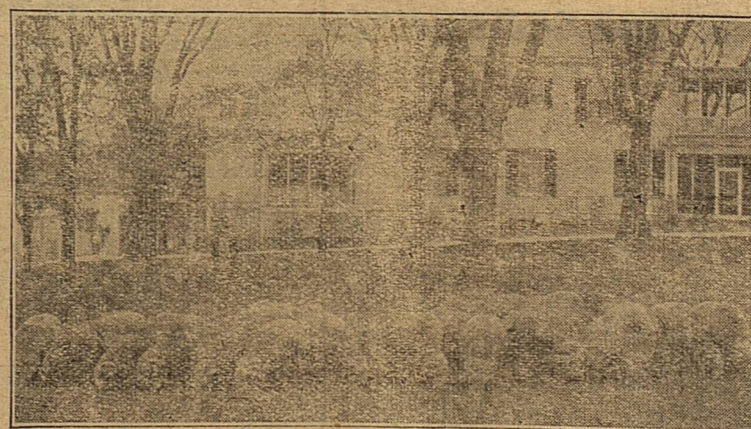

LIGHTHOUSE BLUES BANISHED BY RADIO

Music From Air Now Comes to Lonely Isles.

Boston.—Adoption of the radio by keepers of lighthouses and lightships has given brilliant touch to a new chapter in the romance of the Atlantic ocean.

Since the days when first wooden fires were kindled in the tower of Pharos light to warn and guide mariners entering the ancient harbor of Alexandria, the life of the lighthouse keeper has been one of dreary monotony and isolation.

For ages the keepers have tended their wooden fires, huge wax candles, oil, gas or electric lanterns, never allowing them to burn low or cease their flashing.

Pilots seeing the beacon altered their courses to steer clear of rocky ledge or treacherous hidden shoal. The keeper of the light watched their approach and followed their departure until the ship dropped below the horizon or its lights were extinguished in the dark of night, leaving only intensified solitude in its wake.

Even today visitors are almost unknown at many lights that dot New England's broken coast. Only an occasional visit by a tender ship that brings supplies breaks the monotony that makes all days seem as one. In bad weather the periods of isolation are liable to extend over months. Newspapers and magazines are weeks old and their news, as such, has long since ceased to be.

Their Greatest Boon.
It is not difficult, then, to believe with Capt. George E. Eaton, superintendent of the Second Lighthouse district, that radio has given the greatest single boon to lighthouse keepers in generations.

The picture he lays before the land-lubber could have its setting in the desolate Great Point light, miles from the mainland, or in the famous Minots ledge light that rises from the water without apparent support. Minot's foundation is cut in the solid rock of one of the most dangerous submerged ledges on the entire coast line.

The last visit of a tender is weeks back. Overhead the signal light flashes and blinks in unceasing rhythm. In the season of gales and out of the bleak north sweep unleashed winds that scourge the Atlantic and froth its surface in foam. Spray turns to ice and coats the glass protection around the flashing light with sleet. The observation loft whistles in the gale.

The keeper's "trick" is up and he is relieved by an assistant.

He now retires to his room. He turns a knob on his radio set. The scene shifts and forms a new picture. The winds subside and waves no longer pound. It is a peaceful night and strains of Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata" fill the room. Soon the leader of the Philharmonic orchestra in New York or Philadelphia surrenders his baton to a "jazz" outfit in Pittsburgh or Chicago. As for the news of the day, in fact, of the hour, he needs but turn his dial to another station and instantly he is listening to despatches that under ordinary circumstances he would not have known for weeks.

Nearly All Have Radio.
In all there are about 120 lights scattered along the Bay state coast. Of these, 60 are "watched" lights and some 75 keepers are employed to see that their beacons are kept burning. Most of them are illuminated by gas lanterns as lighthouse officials believe it to be even more dependable than electricity for their need.

Almost without exception these stations house one or more radio sets which the keepers themselves have purchased.

On board the lightships the change is even more pronounced and fascinating. There are 17 of these vessels bobbing at anchor at points of greatest hidden danger. Life on board them is more isolated than that of the lighthouse. One hundred and two miles off the coast is stationed the Nantucket shoals ship, the furthest-from-land lightship in the world. Fifteen men comprise its crew and it is often months at a time that they never see land.

Street Names, Like

Kins', May Live or Die
Baltimore, Md.—The longevity of the names of city streets is much like the longevity of family names, says a writer.

In some families a name is handed down unchanged from father to son; in others, the name is quickly lost through the marriage of daughters or perhaps dies through lack of living descendants.

So with the names of city streets. Some live sturdily on, others change frequently or are connected, link by link, with other streets, and the name of the most important of them becomes the name of several sections.

Take Broadway as an example of the changing names of thoroughfares. It was originally called "Point road." In course of time the "Point road" was called "Market" street, the thoroughfare was widened and the 29 blocks of stately avenue became known as Broadway.

Baltimore street has experienced three changes of name and has absorbed other titles.

Three jovially named alleys—Cider alley, Whisky alley and Bottle alley—adorn the map of 1801. Whisky alley has lost its identity, doubtless through interference of prohibition influences. Cider and Bottle alleys still gayly hold their own.

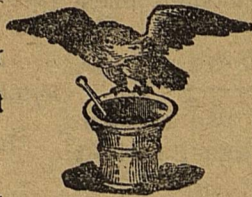

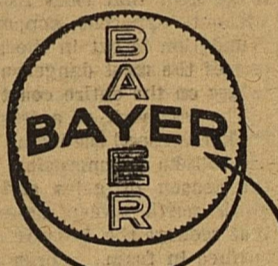
