

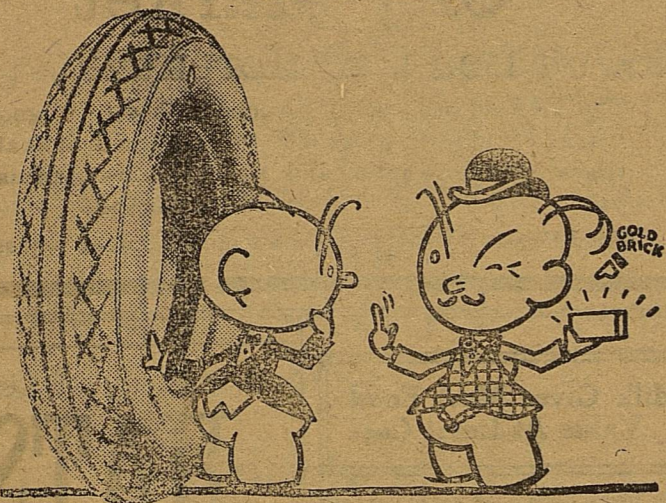

SCHLEICHER COUNTY FAIR A GRAND SUCCESS.

The Schleicher County Fair of 1926 is now history, the big event is passed, and is recorded as the biggest event in the history of the County. The entertainment was good, the exhibits were excellent and arranged in perfect order in the new exhibit hall, the farm display was excellent and only shows the productiveness of our virgin soil. The textile department was most beautiful, containing many designs of the needle work of the women and girls of our fair land, the display was large and pleasing to look upon. Paintings, flowers, birds, gold fish, etc. were in abundance to lead spectators to the exhibit hall.

The stock exhibit was good and shows that some of the best stock in Texas is handled by our stockmen, various breeds of sheep were shown, also the famous Hereford cattle, both sheep and cattle had a splendid display and reflected to the leading industry of the County.

The new grand-stand was not large enough to accommodate the crowd, but the new Fair Ground is so arranged that parking of cars around the ground, gives a splendid view of everything that takes place inside the grounds.

The grounds was lighted by a Western House Light Plant furnished by a Del Rio Agency, we understand the lights were furnished without cost to the Fair Association.

The poultry division made a splendid showing and only shows what valuable birds can be raised here.

A big dance platform was on the grounds and those who liked this amusement were entertained to their fullest hope for three nights.

The largeness of the crowd, and the scarcity of liquor, was noticeable by all who had visited our largest gatherings in times past, only two or three arrests were made during the occasion, all were for drunkenness, and they seem to have all they had on the inside of them. No fast driving on or about the grounds was noticeable, no accident occurred happened and only one disturbance, that was between a drunk and an officer.

An exhibit was placed together and is now on exhibition at the All West Texas Exposition at San Angelo. Those who worked at the exhibition hall were faithful and the splendid co-operation from all added to the completeness of the occasion. This event is to be an annual affair and should grow each year as time goes on.

JUDGE SUTTON GIVES INSTRUCTED VERDICT AGAINST MRS. HUGGINS

Mrs. Ina Huggins lost her \$50,000.00 damage suit against the Orient and Santa Fe Railroads, growing out of the death of her husband, Nick Huggins, a brakeman, at Sweetwater in 1922, when an instructed verdict in the Orient's favor was ordered Thursday in District Court by Judge J. F. Sutton. The Santa Fe had been dismissed as defendant in a similar action Wednesday.

The grounds on which Collins Jackson & Sedberry and James Cornell asked an instructed verdict for the Orient were: first that Mr. Huggins in the employ of the Orient was engaged in interstate commerce, that he assumed the risk of an open frog being blocked on the line and that he was familiar with these conditions, having been in the Orient's employ a number of years; second, that there was no evidence of the fatal injury to him having been the result of negligence of the part of the railroad.

The instructed verdict in the Santa Fe's favor Wednesday was on account of the fact that Mr. Huggins was working on an Orient train on an Orient track at the time of his injury, the Santa Fe having no connection with or responsibility in the matter. —San Angelo Standard.

EDEN FOOTBALL TEAM COMING SATURDAY.

El Dorado is to have her first Football game for this season Saturday, also the first game for the local school team this year.

The El Dorado School team has never won a game although they tied in some last year and lost several only by a small margin. They expect to make up this year for their losses in the past, each game will require a little expense and they will have to depend on the gate receipts to help defray their expenses, so when you go to see the game take some change along, the charge will be 25c for school children and 50c for adults.

The game Saturday will be between Eden and El Dorado. At the Fair Ground.

THE RACES AT THE FAIR.

Dowty, owned by Guy Bodine was first in the quarter mile dash Black Beauty, owned by Cook of Sanderson was second, Brother Compton, owned by Otis Buie, was third; June, owned by Cam Lawhon, of San Angelo was 4th.

Slip Along, owned by Cook of Sanderson, was first in the three eighth mile dash.

Pickaninny, also a Cook horse, was second; Stingaree, owned by Sam Roberts was third; while Lua Baker, a Lawhon entry was fourth.

The Friday races were as follows: Miss El Dorado, the Sweet mare won first in the cow pony race.

The quarter race was won by Slip Along first, Brother Compton second.

The three eighth mile race, Black Beauty first, Stingaree and Pickaninny tied for second.

Otis Buie of El Dorado won first in bronco riding with Chick Reynolds of Sonora second.

Eldridge Roach won first in steer riding.

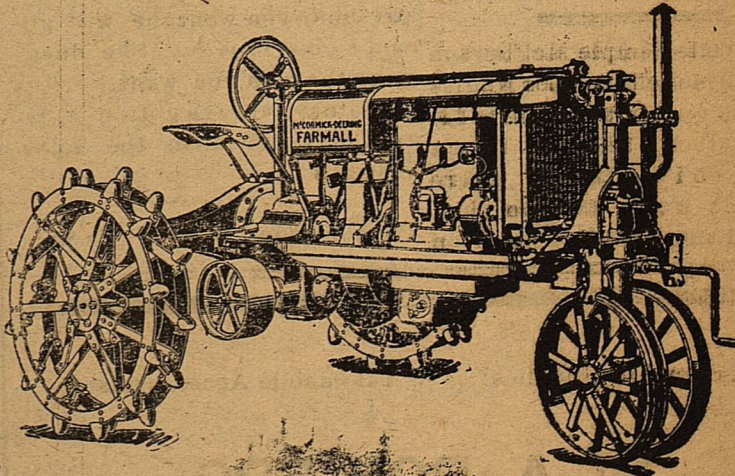

NOTICE OF ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given that a bond election will be held in the City of El Dorado, Texas, on the 19th day of October 1926, in conformity with the following:

ELECTION ORDINANCE

An ordinance authorizing an election for the purpose of submitting a proposition for the issuance of waterworks bonds of the City of El Dorado and the levy of a tax sufficient to pay the semi-annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity.

Whereas, The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of El Dorado, Texas, deem it advisable to issue bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Therefore, Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of El Dorado, Texas, that an election be held on the 19th day of October, 1926, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Shall the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of El Dorado, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of the City of El Dorado in the sum of Forty-thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00), bearing interest not to exceed six per centum per annum, due and payable serially or otherwise, not to exceed forty years from their date, for the purpose of the purchase and construction of a waterworks system in and for said City of El Dorado; and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the semi-annual interest and provide a sinking fund to pay the principal of said bonds at maturity, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, including Chapter 9 of the General Laws passed by the Thirty-Seventh Legislature, 1921, at its regular session"

Said election shall be held at the County Court House in the City of El Dorado, and the following persons are hereby appointed officers of said election: Sam E. Jones Presiding Judge; G. M. McWhorter, Assistant Judge; and E. W. Brooks and Joe Williams, Clerks.

Said election shall be held under the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters who are property tax payers of the City of El Dorado shall be allowed to vote at said election.

All voters desiring to support the proposition to issue said bonds and levy said tax, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS", and those opposed, the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS".

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws regulating general elections.

A copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary of said City shall serve as notice of said election; and the Mayor of said City is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted at the County Court House door and at the post office in said City of El Dorado, for at least 30 days prior to the date of said election.

The Mayor is further authorized and directed to have said Notice of Election Published in some newspaper of general circulation published in said City, such notice shall be published each week for four consecutive weeks, the date of the first publication being not less than thirty days prior to the date of the election.

Passed and approved, this 14th day of September 1926.
