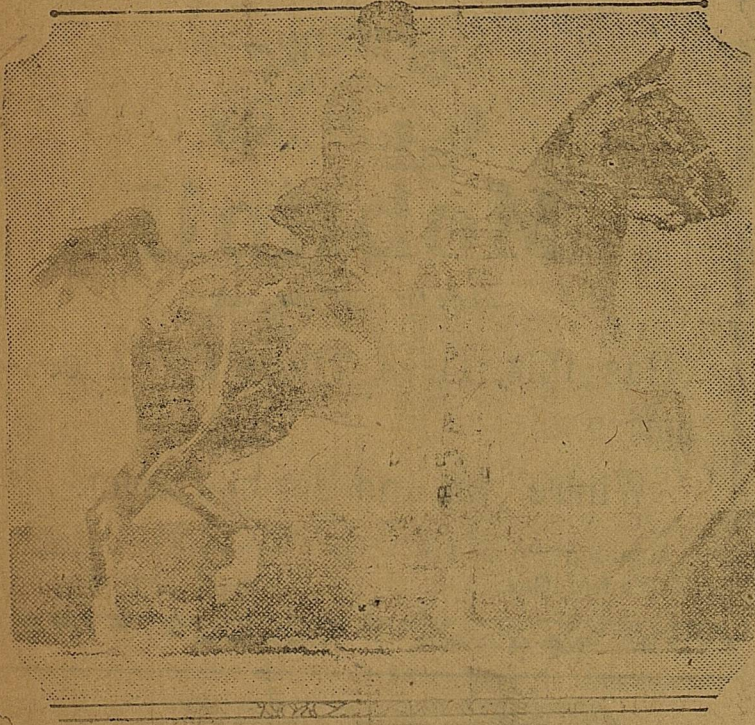

## Nation's Champion Horses To Compete in February



Nancy Highland, horse shown in the above picture which last year gained the title of the best gaited saddle horse in the United States is to be shown again this year with the several other champions available at the Los Angeles Horse show February 5 to 12. Nancy Highland won the national championship at the New York Show last year dethroning Bohemian Actress which had held the title for two years. This horse is owned by Frank and Mrs. Banks of Covina, California, and is trained and ridden by Roy Davis, shown riding. The Los Angeles show is to have 110 classes with a total of \$35,000 in prize money. This is more than ever awarded before in any show. It is to bring out the finest contest of them all when Edna May's King owned by Royal Lindsay English, and Easter Star owned by Marco Hellman, meet in the five gaited championship. Easter Star won last year after the judges were obliged to keep the horses in the ring for twenty extra minutes to determine which was the better. Since that time Edna May's King has won the \$10,000 stakes of the Kentucky state fair. One of the horses will gain the distinction of being the best five gaited horse in the United States. The 110 classes, which include five \$2,000 stakes, will show a total of about 400 horses. More than 150 of these are from East of the Rocky Mountains.

Jarrett for the sum of Fifteen hundred and sixty-six and 51/100 (\$1,566.51) dollars, with interest thereon from the 16th day of November, A. 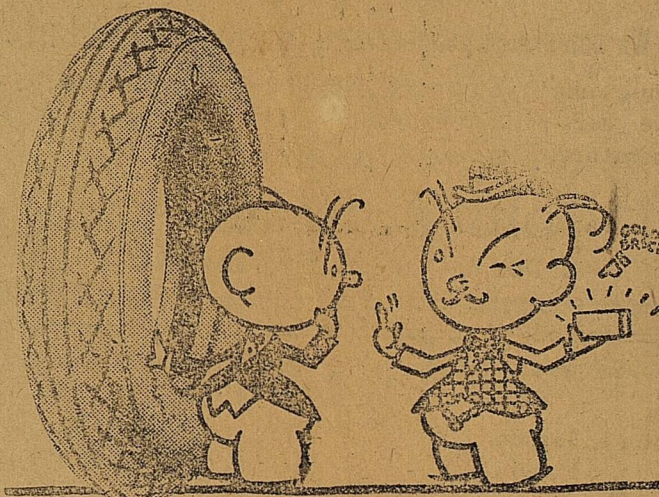

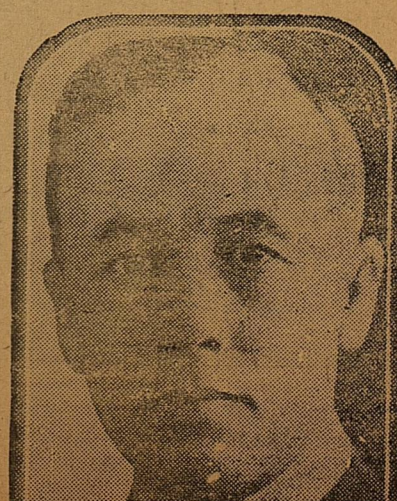

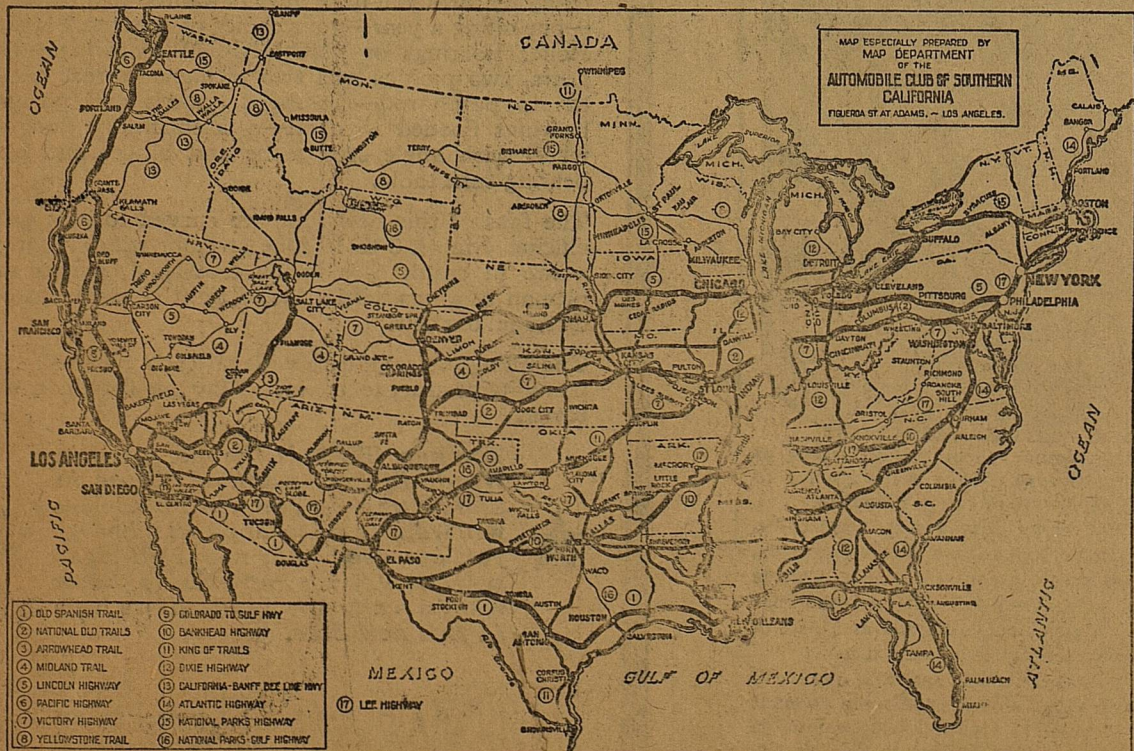
## Vickrey Appeals for Million To Aid Armenian Quake Victims



MORE than a million dollars will be required to meet the needs of earthquake victims in Armenia, according to Charles V. Vickrey, general secretary of the Near East Relief, in a nation wide appeal for the observance of International Golden Rule Sunday.

This sum will be required to provide adequate medical attention, food, clothing and supplies to the thousands of families made homeless by the earthquake and to care for the nine thousand orphan wards of the relief organization in the Caucasus until June, 1927. HUNDREDS of villages have been laid waste and many of the children have been orphaned. Others are unsafe for use until the roads can be made. 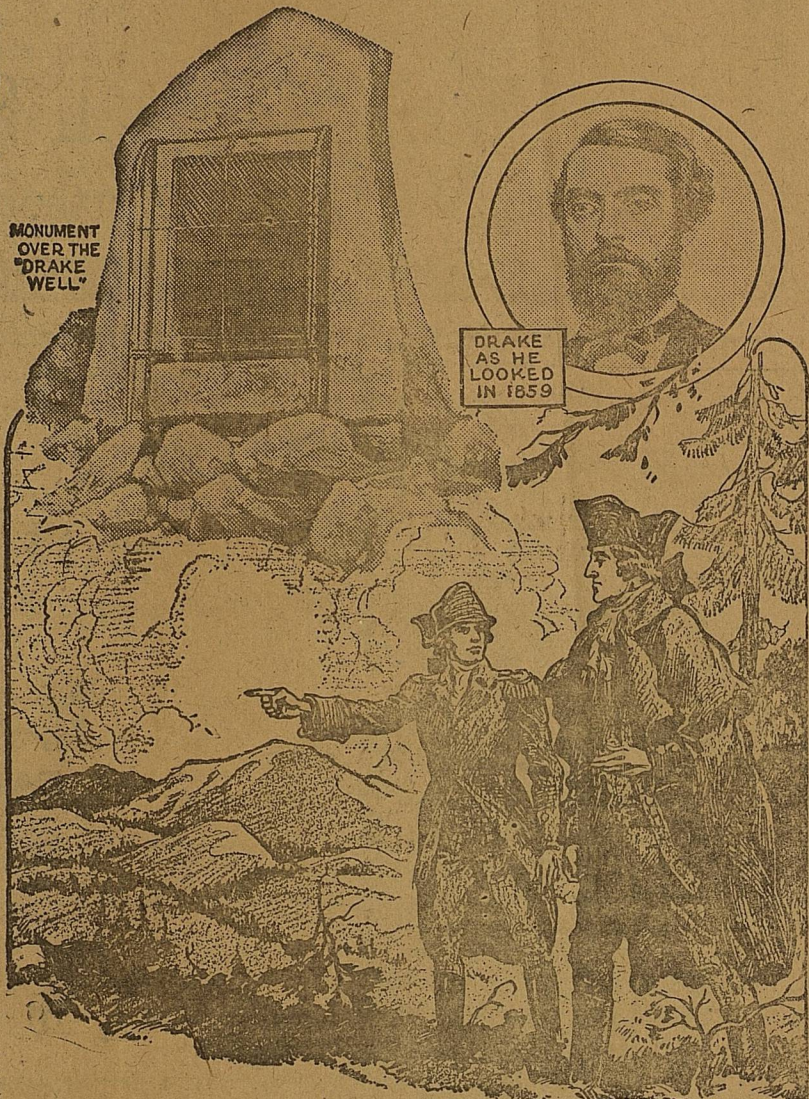

## Washington's Early Adventures Now Assuming New Significance

**A**FTER well nigh a century and three-quarters a new interest has recently been aroused in the earliest military adventures of George Washington. When barely twenty-one years old, in 1753, Washington was sent by Governor Dinwiddie of Virginia into the far northwestern wilderness—that is northwestern Pennsylvania—to warn the French that they must cease their efforts to occupy that region. Recent researches have given a new historical significance to that expedition, during which Washington, always reckless of his personal safety, had one of his narrow escapes from death at the hands of a treacherous Indian guide.

The French at that time occupied Canada and claimed the Mississippi and Ohio Valleys. Though the fringe of English speaking colonies along the Atlantic contained the chief European population, France maintained sovereignty over most of North America's area. They were apparently determined to occupy northwestern Pennsylvania, partly because it was known even then to be rich in petroleum.

**Region's Wealth Known**  
Pioneers and missionaries, English, French, German and Dutch, had all reported to their governments that the petroleum was of great potential value. There is, however, no reason to believe that Washington knew of its existence or value until his adventure of 1753. Then he learned that the oil had long been used by the Indians and the pioneering whites for fuel and light, for medicine and in making war paint. Washington was so much impressed with its possibilities that he later became owner of a large area of oil-bearing lands. Although the petroleum industry in its modern form was then undreamed of, Washington was so sure that a fortune resided in his oil-bearing lands that in his will he listed them as his most valuable holdings. In the property schedule attached to the will he wrote:

"This tract was taken up by General Lewis and myself on account of the bituminous spring which it contains, of so inflammable a nature as to burn as freely as spirits and as nearly difficult to extinguish."  
**The Will of Washington**  
Some historians declare that in an earlier will Washington dedicated this "burning spring" to the public. At any rate, it had passed from his ownership before his death. He sold this tract for \$200,000, but, suspecting it might revert to his estate under a mortgage, he warned his heirs that should it do so it would be worth much more than the \$200,000.

Although Washington's first knowledge of petroleum was gained within a few miles of the place where the first oil well in the world was drilled, that first well was not opened until one hundred and six years later, in 1859. In that year Edwin Laurentine Drake bored the first well, just south of Titusville, Pennsylvania, and really started the modern petroleum industry.

**A Development Wonder**  
Today the American industry is the part of the world's oil business. It is directing oil development over the world. It is all

machinery was only beginning with its insatiable demand for lubricants, while kerosene, though the best illuminant ever known, was dangerous because poor refining left gasoline that was liable to explode. It is difficult nowadays, when the world is being combed for more petroleum to make more gasoline, to realize that gasoline was once a nuisance and a menace. The internal combustion engine created the demand for gasoline, now the primary product of petroleum. The demands of millions of motor cars increasing constantly, invention and chemistry were set at work by the captains of the industry to make the barrel of petroleum turn out a larger and larger proportion of gasoline. This was done by the cracking process, through which every year now sees a larger proportion of crude oil turned into gasoline.

**High and Growing Demands**  
Today well-nigh 2,500,000 barrels of petroleum are required every day to satisfy the demand for motor cars, tractors, trucks, buses, artificial gas plants and the innumerable social products. Invention is constantly finding new uses, as enterprise just as constantly finds new supplies of petroleum. The wonderful and rather mysterious fluid has revolutionized social habits and industrial methods; yet it is only two-thirds of a century since the industry had its feeble beginning in the Pennsylvania oil country.

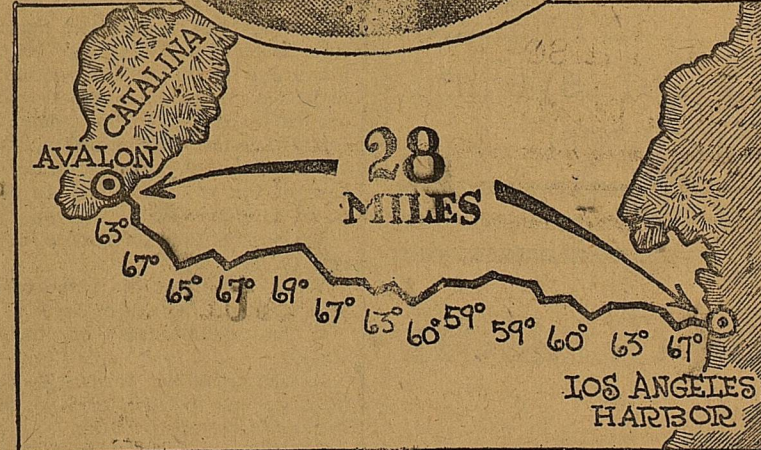
This year the country will use about 750,000,000 barrels of petroleum. The country will use 700,000,000 gallons of gasoline and will export 1,900,000 more. The production, processing and marketing of petroleum is probably second only to agriculture among American industries.

Roughly 70 per cent of the world's petroleum industry is American. Ten billions of capital is invested in it—half the valuation of the national railroad system. It employs just about 4,000,000 people. The petroleum pipeline system, gridironing a good share of the country, aggregates about 85,000 miles. Petroleum revolutionized naval warfare by bringing in the oil burning ship; it is fast revolutionizing merchant marines in the same fashion. Multiplication of motor cars, along with the special taxation of their gasoline, has made possible the modern highway system.

**A True Social Service**  
Perhaps the most nearly revolutionary result of Drake's modernization of the petroleum industry is to be found in the change it has brought in the life of rural America. It has carried the city to the country, the country to the city. It has, by making possible the cheap and quick transportation that everybody nowadays enjoys, enabled country and city to know and understand each other as they never did before. It has brought social and educational privileges to country dwellers that a few decades ago seemed absolutely denied to them. On the one hand it has enabled the cities to spread out into suburban areas and the zone of country around them; on the other, it has enabled the people of the open country to have neighbors, society, church and school privileges, intimate acquaintance.

It is a historic fact that the tendency toward division of interest and understanding between city and country is the most serious internal menace to

## Relay Maps Route for World's Greatest Swim



The world's greatest swim for one of the greatest prizes ever hung up—\$25,000 in cash—is to be staged in Southern California January 15 and thereafter until the swim is accomplished.

The swim is the Catalina channel. It separates the island of Catalina from the California mainland. The nearest distance is approximately twenty-three miles.

In the English channel the big problem was rough water and tides. In the Catalina channel an entirely new problem comes up. It is currents and change of temperature in the water.

Along the California shore the temperature is, as noted, 67 degrees. This is ideal for swimming. It is a factor that has made the California beaches the most popular in the world. But as one gets out a mile or so from shore the temperature starts downward. There is always a variable of eight degrees and frequently a greater variable. The shore temperature remains steadily at about 67 degrees and the channel temperature dropping to ten or even twelve degrees lower.

That the channel can be crossed by a swimmer has been demonstrated. Recently Fred Cady, coach at the Los Angeles athletic club, who has been a large factor in turning out crack California swimmers, crossed it with a relay of swimmers. The first in the water was Viola Hartman Cady, his wife. After she swam a mile, another swimmer entered. Temperatures were taken as the swimmer stroked across the water. They are shown. The journey with fourteen swimmers in the relay took 23 hours and seventeen minutes, and the zigzag course measured 33 miles. This is indicative of the difficulty of the swim. Truly Elerie swam the English channel alone in fourteen and one-half hours.

But then the English channel swimmers swam for glory. This swim is for \$25,000. The effort to cross or January 15 will be enormous. Will it be done?

**Quake Destroys "Golden Rule Orphanage"**  
CABLED dispatches from Armenia indicate that "Golden Rule Orphanage," one of the Near East Relief institutions in Leninakan, formerly Alexandropol, Armenia, has been destroyed by the series of earthquakes that cost hundreds of lives and made thousands of persons homeless.

More than a million dollars will be required to aid the earthquake victims and to care for the 9,000 children in Near East Relief care in Leninakan until June.

**Lesson for January 2**  
**THE CHRISTIAN A FOLLOWER OF  
 JESUS**

LESSON TEXT—Mark 1:16-20, 2:13-17; 1 John 2:6.  
 GOLDEN TEXT—And said unto him, "Follow me," and he arose and followed Him.  
 PRIMARY TOPIC—Learning from Jesus.  
 JUNIOR TOPIC—Enlisting with Jesus.  
 INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—What it Means to Follow Jesus.  
 YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Receiving Jesus as Saviour and Lord.

1. Jesus Calls Four Men to Follow Him.

1. Who they were (vv. 16, 19). Simon and Andrew, John and James, two pairs of brothers. It is usually wise to engage in the Lord's service in fellowship—in pairs. This is not only necessary for effective testimony, but for needed fellowship on the part of workers and protection of the witnesses.

2. From what they were called (vv. 16, 20). They were called from positions of definite service. God always chooses His servants from the ranks of the employed.

3. To what they were called (v. 17). "To become fishers of men." These men no doubt had been successful as fishers. The qualities which made them good fishermen, namely, patience, bravery to face the storm at night and perseverance which led them to toil all night, though no fish were caught, would make them good fishers of men. Winning souls for Christ requires great patience, bravery and perseverance. Becoming fishers of men is the most important business in the world. It is the hardest work in the world to do.

4. The cost of obedience to Christ's call (vv. 18, 20). Obedience to Christ's call meant sacrifice, painful separation, to give up all business interests and leave their father behind. Regardless of the cost they yielded prompt obedience. They put their trust in Him who called them, believing that He was able to supply all their needs.

5. Their reward (v. 17). These four men have wielded wondrous influence in the world. Their names have become immortalized. Had they remained at their business they would only have been humble fishermen.

11. Matthew Becomes a Follower of Jesus (Mk. 2:13-17). Matthew was a despised tax gatherer under the Roman government. For a Jew to fill such a position was to become unpopular. Since they regarded taxes paid to the Roman government as unlawful extortion, a member of their race engaging in the business of tax collection was to be exposed to shame and contempt.

1. Observe the abruptness of this call (v. 14). While sitting at his place of business he heard the call of Jesus.

2. The definiteness of the call (v. 14). It was to follow Jesus. To follow Jesus means to learn of Him and to engage in service for Him.

3. His instant decision (v. 14). Matthew did not stop to reason on the question, but rendered definite and instant obedience. He openly gave up his business and identified himself with the Lord. Happy is the man who has the good judgment to instantly respond to the call of the Lord even though it may be costly. Matthew made a feast and invited many of his publican friends to meet his newly found Saviour. This had a twofold objective:

(1) An expression of grateful appreciation to the Lord for His saving grace.  
 (2) To bring his former friends and associates into touch with his newly found Saviour. It is natural for those who have found the Lord to desire to bring their friends into touch with Him.

11. Walking as Jesus Walked. The Supreme Test of Abiding in Him. (1 John 2:6). Abiding in Christ means to have experienced the life of God in Christ, to have come into contact with Christ's personality and to be consciously living in fellowship with Him. Christ's oneness with the Father and His devotion to His will is the supreme and grand example. Anyone who pretends to abide in Christ, who is not walking as He walked, is not entitled to the claim of Christian. The walk of the Christian implies the whole of his life. The reality of our profession is determined by the consistency of our walk.

"Ye Must Be Born Again"
