

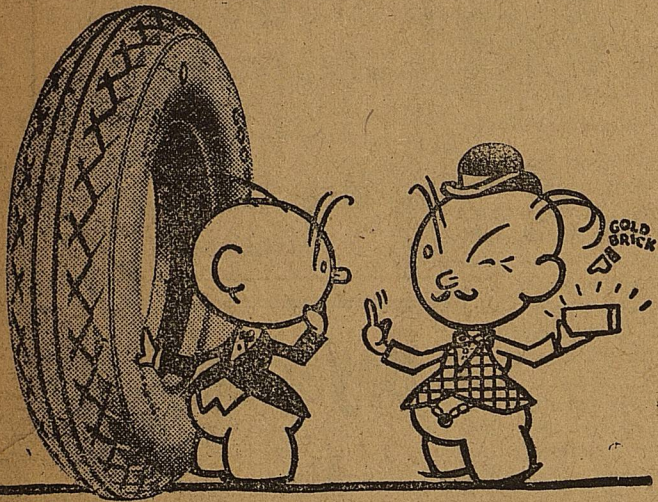

JONES AN ESCAPED CONVICT, ADMITS GUILT.

Jack Jones who accidentally shot and killed Buck O'Connor last week, was acquitted of the killing of O'Connor, but was held over for Federal authorities, being an escaped convict from Leavenworth Kansas, his name being Elmer L. PORTION OF SHEPPERD RANCH SOLD.

The estate of the late A. E. Shepperd of Christoval has sold in fee five out of nine sections that comprise the property for a total of \$41,600, it was learned here Saturday. All the land that changed hands is in block 24.

Will C. Jones of San Angelo bought sections 30 and 35 at \$12.50 an acre, and Henry DeLong, son-in-law of the late A. E. Shepperd, purchased sections 22 and 34 adjoining. He paid \$15 an acre for section 20 and \$12.50 an acre for the other two sections. The property acquired by Mr. Jones is unimproved, but obtained by Mr. DeLong contains fifty acres in cultivation, a farm house and three wells with windmills.

The four sections yet unsold embrace the headquarters ranch. The property adjoins the Anson Head-of-the-River Ranch on the Southeast. Heirs of A. E. Shepperd are his daughters, Mrs. J. L. Murray, Mrs. F. H. Chapple and Mrs. Henry DeLong, all of Christoval, and sons, Alfred Shepperd of Chicago and R. W. Shepperd of Christoval—San Angelo Standard.

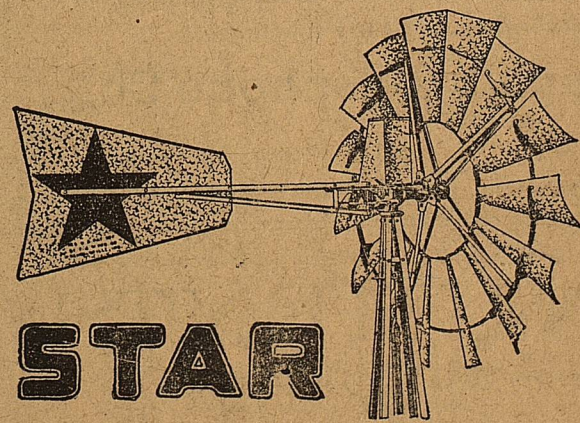

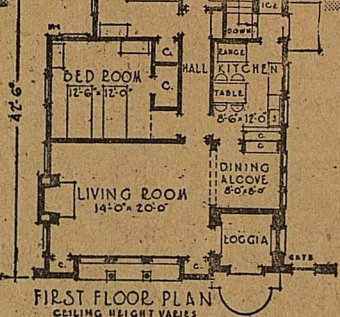
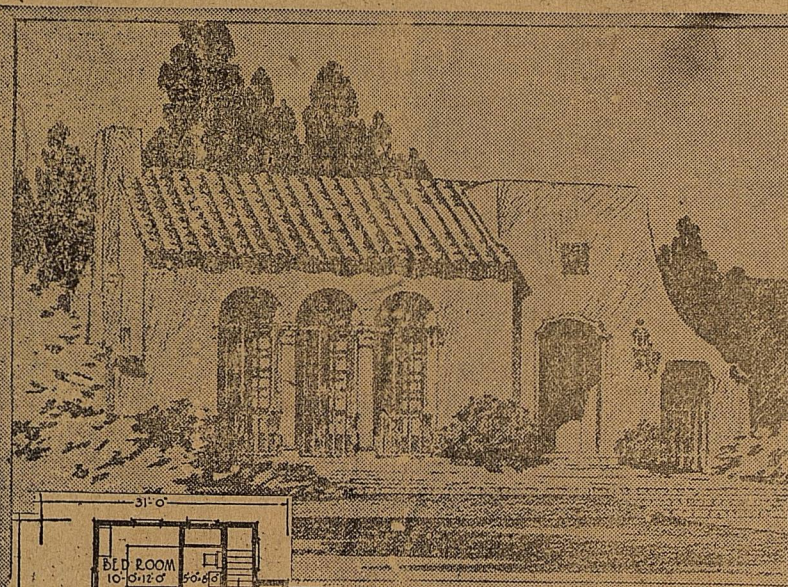

First 24 Hours of Life Baby's Hardest Time

Undernourishment is one of the most common of the causes of infant mortality, according to a survey recently undertaken in Chicago. Statistics show that of 4,522 babies under one year of age that died in 12 months, 988 died in the first 24 hours.

Eight hundred and seventy-six died in the first six days, exclusive of the first 24 hours, and 1,798 died from the seventh day to the sixth month. Eight hundred and sixty died in the last six months of the year. The survey indicated that a surprisingly large number of infants are artificially fed, which condition, doctors agree, had a marked bearing on their undernourished conditions. Naturally, no one food may prove satisfactory in every case, although the survey showed that evaporated milk in many cases had proved an excellent substitute for mother's milk. This may be explained by reason of the fact that evaporated milk is simply pure, concentrated cow's milk from which 60 per cent of the water has been removed. It contains practically every element necessary for good health and is consequently an excellent builder of bone and tissue.

Although authorities on health recommend evaporated milk as a baby food, like other substitutes for the natural supply, it should not be considered as a food complete in itself. Addition of orange or tomato juice, barley water or lime water is important in providing adequate diet for the infant.

For babies, milk of dependable purity is essential. Market milk will not keep for any length of time and is liable to contamination, especially in hot weather, while evaporated milk, hermetically sealed in sterilized containers, remains as fresh and pure as on the day it was canned.

Sterility in evaporated milk, authorities agree, is one of the most important points in its favor. In processing, evaporated milk is subjected to 240 degrees heat for a half hour, thereby removing all possibility of bacterial life being present in the milk. Heat is the only preservative for this type of milk and the heat has the further beneficial effect of making the curds of milk more flocculent and easier to digest.

Know Your Cook Book, Girls, Advice of Diva

Margery Maxwell, prima donna with the Chicago Civic and Ravinia opera companies, and who enjoys the distinction of being among the first American girls to be recognized in grand opera circles, takes particular pride in her culinary skill. Cooking, in her estimation, is a fine art which is rapidly being lost.

"Doubtless one of the big reasons for this condition is that modern young men don't expect the girls they marry to know much about cooking," said Miss Maxwell.

"In the future, before man pops the question, he's going to find out whether the girl knows what calories are and whether she's wise to the elements of a balanced diet.

"A few questions before the minister asks, 'Do you take this woman?' would save a thousand recriminations later."

There are certain dishes to which Miss Maxwell is partial. As she explains them, they are readily prepared. Miss Maxwell uses for Maryland Chicken.

Two 2 1/2 lb. chickens (broilers) Fat Salt Pepper 1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1 cup water 2 eggs Fine bread crumbs 1-3 cup butter 1 tsp. salt Dash pepper 2 tsp. flour

Dress, clean and cut up chickens. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dip in crumbs, egg, and crumbs. Place in a well-oiled dripping pan, and bake twenty minutes in a 450-degree F. oven, then reduce the temperature to 350 degrees F. and cook until tender, about twenty minutes longer. Baste every ten minutes during cooking with 1/2 cup melted butter. Remove to platter and pour around a cream sauce made of fat in dripping pan, the flour, diluted milk, salt and pepper.

Asparagus on Fri. 1 bunch fresh asparagus 6 rounds toast 1/2 cup water 2 tsp. butter 2 tsp. flour 1 tsp. salt 1 cup evaporated milk diluted with 1/2 cup grated cheese

Prepare a white sauce of the butter, flour, salt, pepper and diluted milk. Cook the asparagus in boiling salted water. Drain and add to white sauce. Place an egg in center of toast. Surround the egg and top of all.

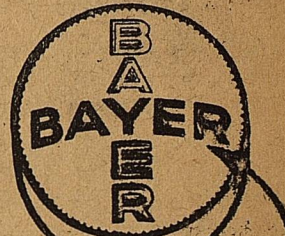

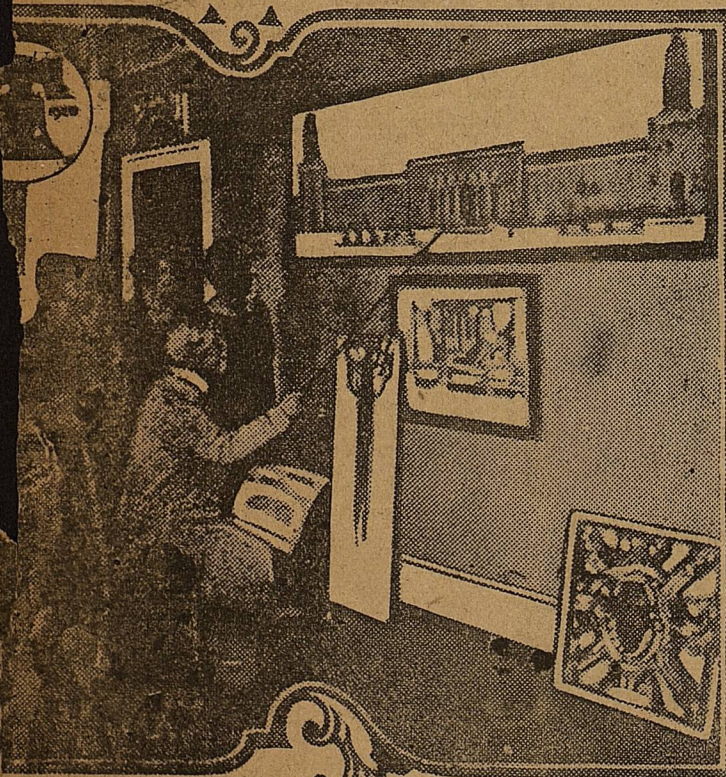

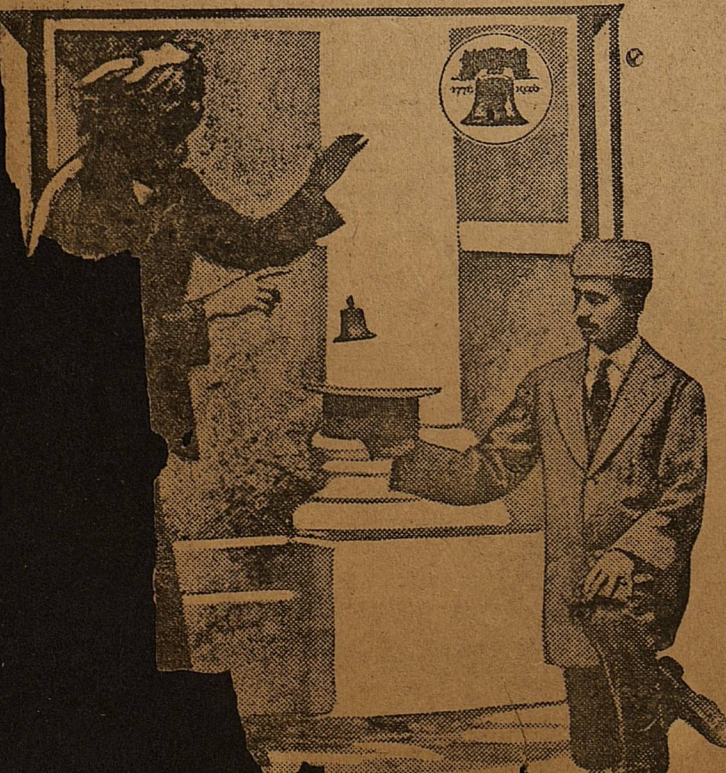

FAMOUS ARTIST INSTRUCTS

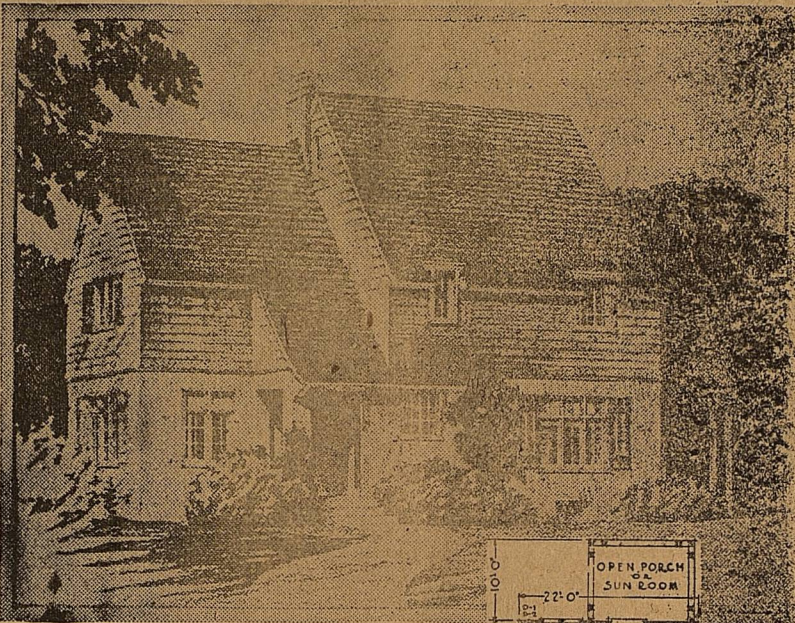

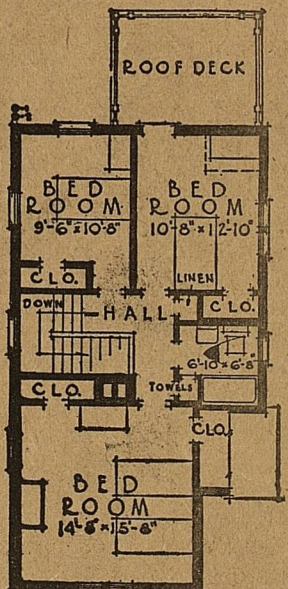

Old World Charm Meets New World Conveniences



PLACING your house according to your lot is the privilege of the person who builds this practical dwelling of the English farm house type. The entrance is so arranged that the house may either be placed lengthwise for a thirty-foot city lot or crosswise for a 60 or 75 foot lot.

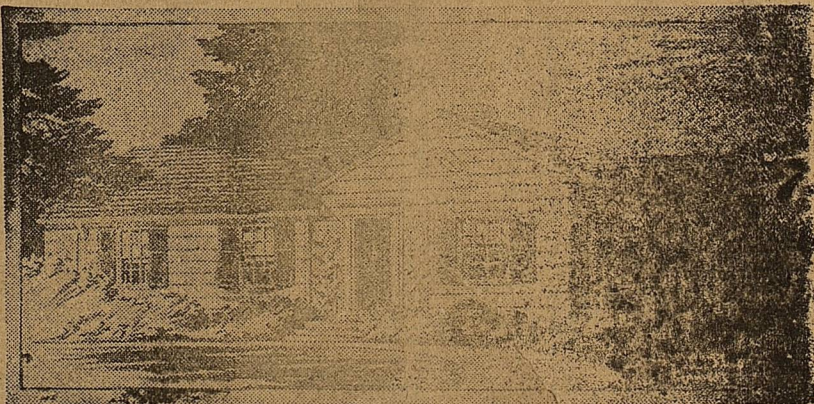


The design here calls for a combination of stucco and stained siding with the roof of dark weathered shingles. The pleasing features of the living room include its windows on three sides, open fireplace and built-in book shelves. The open porch or sunroom may open off from either the living or dining room. The kitchen has all the detail that delight the housewife—cupboards, broom closet, breakfast nook and double windows over the sink.

The three bedrooms all have double exposures and are well provided with clothes and linen closets. The bathroom is so placed as to be equally accessible from each bedroom. The attic is ventilated and makes a serviceable storage or playroom by sheathing the rafters and sides with celotex, which serves both as a wall-board and insulating material.

This small home so light and spacious, yet compact and adapted to doing without a servant, is a typical 1926 product. The poky, dark houses of fifteen or even ten years ago with their fussy little hallways and poor planning would be scorned by the modern housewife who has learned to expect comfort built right into her home and to have everything planned for her convenience in working. Cold, draughty houses are also out of date. All well built houses, are insulated as this one is, with celotex sheathing on the exterior walls under the stucco. This affects a great saving in fuel in the winter and resists the intense heat of the sun in summer.

This Six-Room Bungalow Adapts Self to Any Lot



THERE is much to be said in favor of the one-story dwelling, and when the floor plan is as expertly arranged as in this Colonial bungalow the usual objections of lack of privacy and long distances to walk, are avoided.

This house may run either lengthwise or across the width of the lot. The exterior is of stained grey shingles with either a green shingled or tiled roof. The trimmings should be white and the shutters green to harmonize with the roof.

The three bedrooms are well shut off from the rest of the house. The large open porch or sunroom can be made to open off either the living or dining room. The kitchen has the desired built-in features, including the useful breakfast nook.

The cost of this house can be materially reduced by omitting the basement and allowing space on the main floor for a small boiler room. The walls and roof also are sheathed with celotex to keep the temperature at comfort point the year round.

CALEB'S FAITHFULNESS RE-
 AWARDED

LESSON TEXT—Josh. 14:6-16.
 GOLDEN TEXT—I wholly followed
 the Lord my God.
 PRIMARY TOPIC—The Brave Spy
 Rewarded.
 JUNIOR TOPIC—The Reward of
 Service.
 INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOP-
 IC—Caleb, the Courageous.
 YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOP-
 IC—Blessings That Follow Whole-
 hearted Obedience.

I. Elements of Caleb's Character.
 1. Independence of spirit (Num.
 13:30).

Though the multitude clamored to
 follow the report of the ten, Caleb de-
 termined to stand alone. This is an
 element in human character which is
 highly important. One should stand
 for what he knows to be right, re-
 gardless of the sentiment of the
 crowd.

2. True to convictions (Josh. 14:8,
 cf. Num. 14:6-9).

What Caleb knew and felt he spoke
 out. He did not wait for the opinion
 of others and then modify his to
 suit the populace. A true man and one
 who can be trusted will be loyal to
 his convictions.

3. Unselfish (14:12).

He did not ask for some easy place.
 He did not wish to thrust someone
 else into the place of difficulty. He
 wanted to go into the place where it
 would require fighting in order to
 drive out the giants which were in
 the land.

4. Courageous (Josh. 14:12, cf.
 13:30).

This courage he displayed when he
 insisted that they were able to go up
 from Kadesh-Barnea and take pos-
 session of the land. Forty-five years
 have elapsed since that time. He
 would be considered an old man now,
 but still he desired that place for an
 inheritance which would require some
 fighting. He said, "I am as strong
 this day as I was in the day that
 Moses sent me, as my strength was
 then, even so is my strength now for
 war."

5. Loyalty to God (Josh. 14:8, cf.
 Num. 14:24).

He served God with a whole-hearted
 devotion; indeed, this is the way to
 his character.

II. Caleb Laying Claim to His In-
 heritance (vv. 6-12).

Caleb did not come alone to make
 his claim. He came in the presence
 of the children of Judah, lest he be
 suspected of taking advantage. He
 did not wish to wait until after the
 lot was cast, for God had already
 given a certain portion to him. It
 were useless to ask God to decide a
 matter which He had already deter-
 mined. The basis of his plea was:

1. The ground of his service (vv.
 6-8).

He had endangered his life in spy-
 ing out the land—had gone to Hebron
 when the giants were there. He
 brought back a true report when his
 brethren were all against him. He
 bore his testimony and insisted that
 they go up and take the land though
 to do so incurred the displeasure of
 his brethren and necessitated his
 standing practically alone.

2. On the ground of the oath of
 Moses to him (v. 9).

Joshua had respect for Moses, and
 was bound to follow the counsels of
 his faithful master whom he had suc-
 ceeded. This plea was effective.

3. On the ground of God's providen-
 tial dealing with him (vv. 10-12).

God had preserved him in bodily
 health. Though he was now eighty-
 five years old, his natural forces were
 not abated. He said, "I am as strong
 this day as I was in the day that
 Moses sent me, as my strength was
 then even so is my strength now for
 war."

III. Joshua Giving the Inheritance
 to Caleb (13:14, 15).

1. Joshua blessed Caleb (v. 13).

He not only acquiesced in Caleb's
 claim, but bestowed the blessing of
 God upon him in it.

2. The inheritance given (vv. 13,
 14).

Hebron was the name of the inher-
 itance. The name Hebron means fel-
 lowship. It was given because Caleb
 had fully followed the Lord. Only
 those who fully follow the Lord can
 enjoy fellowship with Him. Though
 Caleb now legally possessed Hebron,
 it was necessary for him to fight to
 drive out the giants who infested it.
 In Christ we have an inheritance
 which God has given us. We, too,
 must fight because the enemy is un-
 willing to relinquish his claim upon it.
