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**EDITORIAL**

Ordinarily, a visitor to Washington, D. C., has no trouble in getting a look at the United States Senate in action. During the sessions, there is always plenty of room. We have, when in Washington on several occasions visited the Capitol and looked on from the balcony while the senate was in action.

According to what we read in the papers of our National City, matters are very different now. If you want to attend the Senate, you have to go early in the morning and wait. By the time roll-call is announced, the galleries are jammed and hundreds of disappointed people must be turned away by the doorkeepers.

This change isn't due to a rising interest on the part of citizen in serious questions of government altogether. Nor is it due to Senatorial achievement, which might automatically

bring in admiring thousands who want to watch their elected officials keep the wheels of government moving. It is due instead, to the fact that the present session has turned itself into a first-class road show, admission free.

Members are fighting among themselves, are quarrelling over the pettiest of matters. There haven't been any fist fights yet. According to the associated press in the daily newspaper Congressman P. L. Gassaway, Oklahoma would like to "whip hell out of Huey Long."

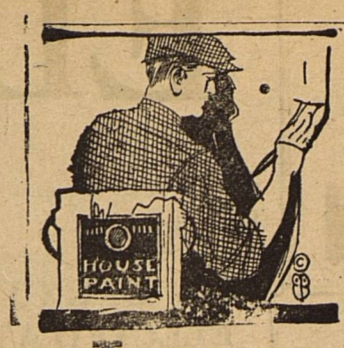
**TREASURY TO PAY JUNE**  
15 LIBERTY BOND ISSUE

The U. S. Treasury on Thursday called for payment on June 15 its entire issue of outstanding first Liberty Loan bonds, aggregating approximately \$1,933,000,000.

The issue consists of a total of \$1,392,226,250 bearing interest at the rate of 3½ per cent; \$5,022,450 of converted 4 per cent bonds and \$535,981,250 of converted 4¼ per cent bonds.

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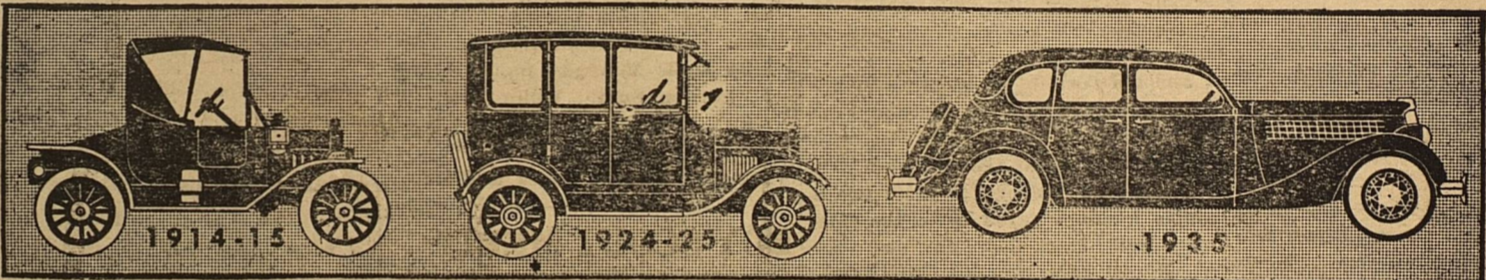

The Senior Class of a northern High school met to plan for 1936 celebration of the Tercentenary of Secondary Education.

One boy rose up and said, I think that the best way to celebrate the school 300 years ago, would be to help graduates to get jobs. And to help the young people in town who should be attending Northern High. They haven't graduated and haven't jobs either.

They decided to make a careful study of the community. By dividing up the town into manageable districts and assigning a team of the students to each for a house-to-house canvass, the class found, after a two week's investigation that roughly 50 per cent of the young people of high school age were enrolled in school, while very few of those not attending school had jobs. They learned that 60 percent of the graduates of the last five years had nothing regular to do. More than half of all young people in the community between 14 and 23 had neither school or jobs.

Some people say, "What good does school do one if he can't get a job when he is finished. There must be some encouragement for the boys and girls to go to school. If a boy goes to school from the age of 7 to 23 he expects some returns for his labors when he is out. If he is cast back in the company of a boy of his same age who did not attend school it is discouraging.

Something must be done to encourage the people to go to school or our nation will lose its standing.

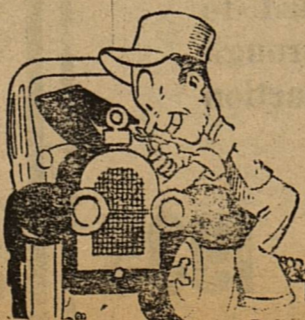
