OPENING OF SCHOOL

The plans are complete for the opening of the Eldorado Public Schools for the 1928-29 session. The teachers are to meet at the school building on Saturday, September 8th, to begin the work of organization and planning of the year's work.

ENROLLMENT OF HIGH SCHOOL PUPILS

All high school pupils are requested to meet at the school building on Saturday, September 8th, for the purpose of enrollment. The individual enrollment of each pupil is necessary. The order in which to report is as follows:

Seniors — 9 a. m.
Juniors — 10:30 a. m.
Sophomores and Freshmen 1 p. m.

A library fee of \$1, the same as last year, will be charged to each pupil in high school, to be paid at time of enrollment.

MAKE-UP EXAMINATIONS

Those pupils who for any reason wish to take examination in order to get credit on work studied during the past term will be given the opportunity to take these examinations at the first of school. No pupil will be allowed to proceed to the next grade or course until these requirements are satisfied. All pupils wishing to take any make-up examinations, either in the high school or the grades, will be given the opportunity to do so at a time to be announced later.

OPENING EXERCISES OF THE SCHOOL

The opening of the school will be on September 10th. All patrons of the school and visitors are cordially invited to be present at that time. A short program is planned, beginning in the auditorium, at nine o'clock. After this program the pupils will report to their respective rooms, where books will be issued and work begun.

The Eldorado Methodist Church held its fourth Quarterly Conference last Sunday afternoon. The reports show that the finances for the year are still somewhat behind, with about 6 weeks to complete the years work. Two additional Stewards were elected for the coming year, W. F. Meador and Mrs. V. H. Humphrey. No action was taken to elect a Sunday School Superintendent, A. J. Atkins, who has served in this capacity for years is trying to resign from his position but no one seems to think that they can fill his place and he will probably be conscripted for another year.

The annual Conference will meet at San Antonio the latter part of October, and the Pastor and Stewards will endeavor to get up all the finances of the church.

SERVICES AT METHODIST CHURCH

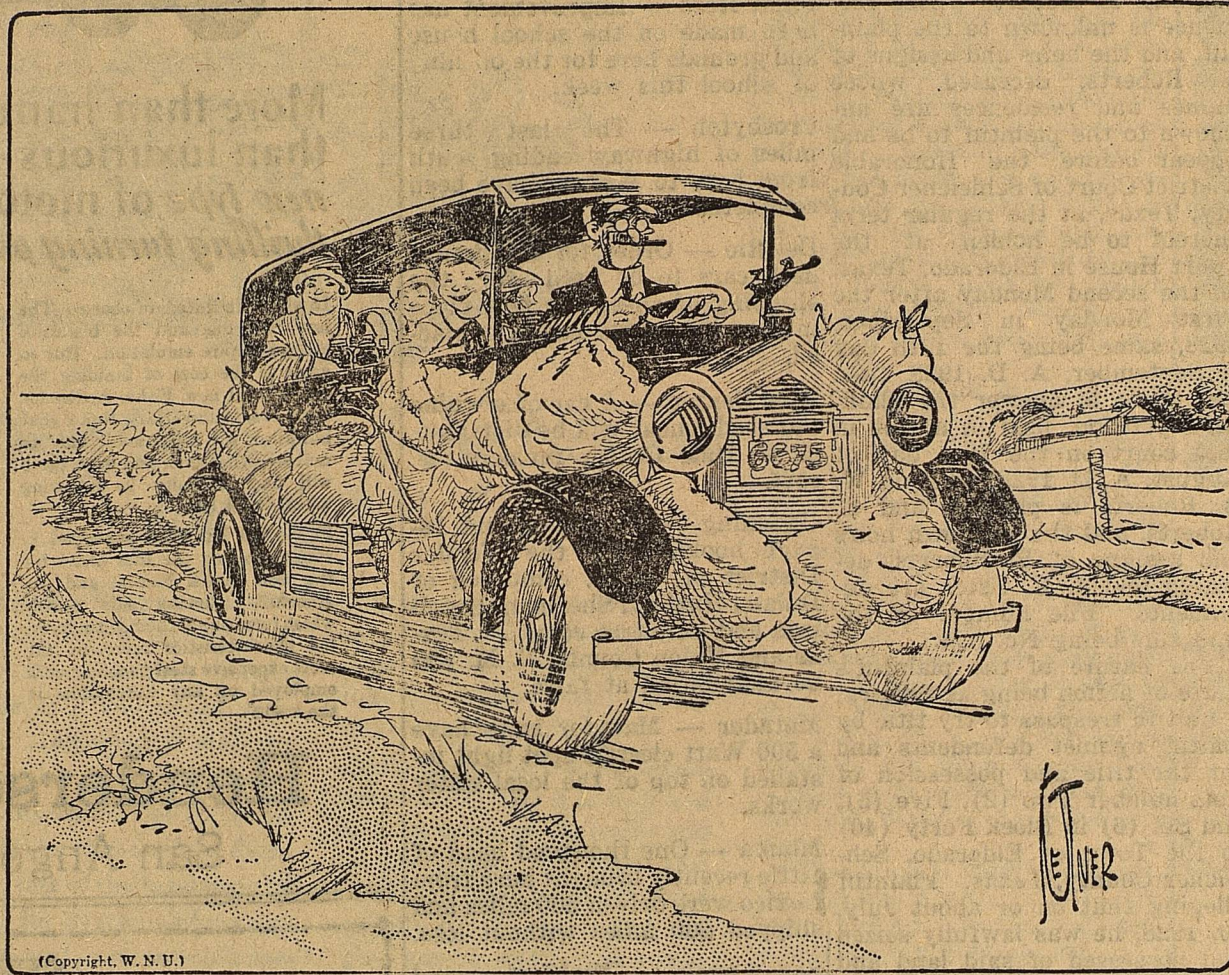

OBREGON'S SLAYING LAID TO "MARTYRS" GROUP

Mexico City, Mex.—Seven women and five men, all Roman Catholics, are under arrest accused of having conspired to slay President Calles, as well as the late President-elect, General Obregon, according to an Associated Press dispatch. The police officials declare that the group had first planned to slay the two officials with poison at a dance which they attended and later to bomb a bridge over which General Obregon and President Calles were to pass. Both plans were abandoned as impracticable but it is alleged that the conspirators continued their plottings until they resulted in the death of General Obregon.

The police attribute to Rafael Enriquez Vidal, who is one of those arrested, the statement that he was invited to join the group, being promised entrance to heaven if he should become one of the "martyrs."

In a signed statement Antonio Rios Zertuche, chief of police, said, that Enriquez and others among those under arrest made confessions. Enriquez, he declared, told of Mother Superior Concepcion Acebeda de la Lata, who has been in custody for some time in connection with the slaying of General Obregon, showing him pictures of young men executed for religious activities and expressing her determination to organize another group of "martyrs." The police state she told him the pope would canonize all those who died in behalf of the church.—Scottish Rite News Bureau.

THE COUNTRY NEWSPAPER

J. C. Holton, Mississippi state commissioner of agriculture, recently paid a worthwhile tribute to newspapers that expresses graphically the general public feeling for the press.

"I have always appreciated the power of the press, more especially the country press," said Mr. Holton. "The home papers carry the home news and are read from cover to cover by those whose first interest is in home affairs. They reach the people and constitute a powerful influence of public sentiment.

"A wonderful power for good is the country newspaper: worthy of the pride and support of folks at home, an avenue of commercial entrance to those who would sell their goods to our people. President T. L. Turner in his annual address eloquently described its importance in these words:

"Out yonder stands a locomotive on the railroad track. Every thing about it is in order: water in the boiler, coal in the tender, engineer at the throttle; but it can't move. All it lacks is steam. Remove the newspapers from Mississippi, take away the steam and this state would soon be a state of idle people; its credit gone. Weeds would grow in the streets; our farmer would look for pastures newer, manufacturers would depart from us and our people would seek new fields of labor."

"The 'home town' paper is an integral part of the lives of the people it serves. It has been a tremendous factor in building up an American spirit and consciousness, and in turning public opinion into wise avenues.

A petition was being circulated Wednesday, asking the school board to order an election to allow the people of the Eldorado Independent School District a chance to vote, to raise the school tax from 50 cents on the \$100 to \$1 on the \$100 valuation.

Rev. L. D. Hardt, pastor of the Methodist Church and Rev. J. L. Ratliff, pastor of the Baptist Church, both of Eldorado, were accepted as honorary members of the club.

Greetings:

You are hereby commanded that by making publication of this citation in some newspaper published in Schleicher County, Texas, if there be a newspaper published therein, but if not, then in the nearest County, where a newspaper is published once in each week for four consecutive weeks previous to the return day hereof you summon E. Roberts whose residence is unknown to the plaintiff, and the heirs and assigns of E. Roberts, deceased, whose names and residences are unknown to the plaintiff to be and appear before the Honorable District Court of Schleicher County, Texas, at the regular term thereof to be holden at the Court House in Eldorado, Texas, on the second Monday after the first Monday in September, 1928, same being the 17th day of September, A. D. 1928, then and there to answer the plaintiff's petition, filed in a suit in said court on the 10th day of August, A. D. 1928, wherein W. E. Roberts is plaintiff and E. Roberts, and the unknown heirs and assigns of E. Roberts, deceased, and J. E. Estes are defendants. File number of the said suit being No. 334.

The nature of the plaintiff's cause of action being as follows: Suit in trespass to try title by plaintiff against defendants and for the title and possession of Lots number Two (2), Five (5), and Six (6) in Block Forty (40) to the Town of Eldorado, Schleicher County, Texas. Plaintiff alleging that on or about July 30, 1928, he was lawfully seized and possessed of said land and premises by fee simple title and that he and those whose estate in said lands he has held have paid taxes due thereon for a period of more than five years claiming to have good and perfect right and title thereto, have had and held peaceable, continuous and adverse possession of same, cultivating, using and enjoying the same for a period of more than three years and for a period for more than five years, and for a period for more than ten years after the defendants cause of action, if any, accrued therefor, and before the commencement of this suit; such possession being under memorandum of title specifying the boundaries of said land duly recorded in the County Clerk's office of Schleicher County, Texas, prior to said ten year period. Plaintiff alleging that defendants unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected him therefrom on or about July 30, 1928, and alleging the annual rental value thereof to be \$5,000.00 plaintiff sues for \$250.00 damages and for general and special relief.

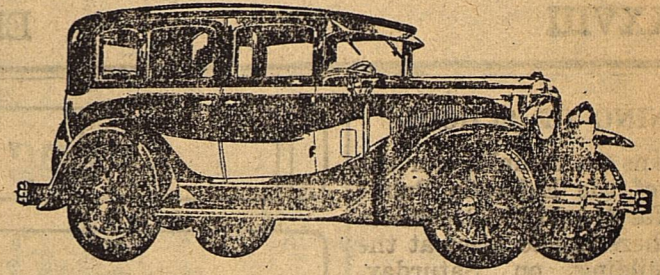

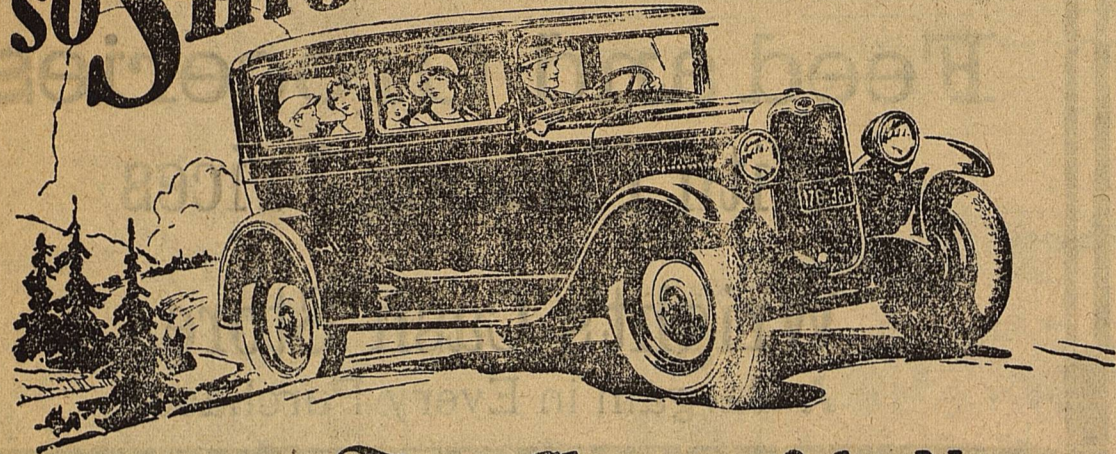

LOCK UP REPEATING CRIMINALS

Recently three robbers attempted to holdup a branch of an important bank in a northern California city. During the robbery one of them shot and killed a teller who did not obey orders with sufficient alacrity to satisfy the thug. Fortunately the three were captured when the car in which they were escaping crashed into a truck. And the fact appeared that all of them were old offenders with continuous records for felonies in Pacific Coast cities. The record of the killer embraced an eight year sentence for robbery, an escape from prison and identification for a previous bank hold up. He was also wanted for robbery in Los Angeles. The second member of the trio had to his credit conviction for assault with a deadly weapon,

an arrest as a bank roddery suspect and an escape from authorities while being taken to answer for the charge. The third thug, not to be outdone, had demonstrated his ability by an arrest for attempted burglary, a sentence on another burglary charge, an arrest for robbery and another arrest. Laws similar to the Baumes Laws in New York State would mean life imprisonment for confirmed criminals of this type, upon fourth conviction for felony. They could not be turned loose, time after time on a helplation, which would prohibit the law abiding citizen from owning a gun on the theory that such measures would tend to prevent crime, would in no way detract from dealing death and destruction while perpetrating their unlawful acts. Let us tighten up the laws affecting criminals rather than those affecting the home owner or lover of sports.

COPPER DEMAND INCREASING

An element that is fast bringing copper to the industrial forefront is the tremendously accelerated European demand. Net imports by the primary consumers of copper outside the United States during the first quarter of 1928 were almost 40 per cent higher than during the same period last year. And while figures are not yet available for the second quarter it is known that exports were unusually great. The producers of copper, lead, and zinc have been solving many of their problems by competent economical management and scientific production methods. The result is that the metal mining industry in many of our great states is being placed on the most substantial basis in its history, with ensuing benefit to the workman, the investor and the public.—The Manufacturer.

CONTROL OF BOLL WORM NOT PRACTICAL

College Station — It is not practical for farmers to attempt to control the cotton boll worm which is causing unusual damage this season in North and East Texas, according to R. R. Reppert, Entomologist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. "Earlier experimental work indicated that a considerable degree of control could be effected by keeping the foliage covered with arsenical poisons applied at frequent intervals, but experience and observation of the last few years show that not even a small degree of control can reasonably be expected from such measures, he said. "Certainly the results would not repay the expense involved and the farmer might as well rely on such natural control factors as the weather and other insect parasites which sometimes destroy heavy infestations of the boll worm in a short time.

"The finding of an occasional pinkish cotton boll worm has led some to think they had discovered the pink boll worm," Mr. Reppert reports. "The latter insect does not grow to a length of more than one half inch, while the cotton boll worm when mature measures about one and one fourth inches long. It is a varied coloration from very dark green through lighter shades to almost white. Unlike the pink boll worm, the larger boll worm which is the same species that attacks corn (often called the corn ear worm) has noticeable hairs.

"The damage done by the cotton boll worm is to the bolls, the worm boring into the bolls and often hollowing them out completely. During its later stages of growth the insect is unaffected by any small amount of poison it may eat in boring its way inside. Experience has shown that poisoning for this worm in its younger stages is not uniformly successful and hence the admonition to save time and money by leaving its control to natural factors may operate in any given locality.

No extensive damage from leaf worm has been so far reported to Mr. Reppert and no authentic reports of its appearance in North and West Texas have been received. He believes now that no extensive fight will have to be waged against them this year, but should they appear he states that prompt spraying with calcium arsenate, lead arsenate of Paris green will effectively control them.

DO WE WANT AN

AUTOCRACY?

Every American citizen has been raised with a belief in democracy, and a knowledge of what it meant to those who founded our government and those who came after them and maintained it.

No less, every American citizen has been raised with a very real horror of autocracy and its freedom-stifling evils.

Yet many good citizens are led by persuasive talk into lending their support to bureaucratic measures that in practice, no matter what they are in theory mean autocracy.

Bureaucracy gives to a small group of public employes an arbitrary and undemocratic power over the lives of fellow citizens. Too often a public servant proves himself to be in reality a petty Alexander, with vague dreams of empire.

It is said that one person in every six in our country is a public employe living at the expense of the other five. This means we are approaching an extreme of bureaucratic government. In an autocracy a portion of the population by virtue of being descendants of powerful families or friends of the king, are empowered to control the lives and liberty of others. In a bureaucratic, those in control live by virtue of having some public office that limits freedom of action of liberty of others. There is no fundamental difference.

When we favor public ownership project, for example, we are endorsing paternalism that revokes liberties of the citizen and prevents him using his own initiative and enterprise. We thus place private business in the hands of the bureau composed of men with something of the power of emperors.

Do we want an autocracy? The average citizen would answer an unqualified "No!" But he must do more than that—he must realize that the danger is ever present, often under an attractive guise.

The United States was settled as a nation where free men could lead free lives, untrammelled by vicious "Divine Right of Kings" nonsense, and the iron fist of the autocrat. As we adopt paternalistic measures or allow alien influence to creep in, we destroy the foundation of our freedom. The Manufacturer.

AGRICULTURE AND THE TARIFF

The recurrent statement that the farmer suffers from the protective tariff is disproven by the facts.

It is held by free trade and low tariff advocates that farmers must buy in a protected market and sell in a ruinous unprotected market. An examination of the tariff laws shows the reverse of this to be true.

Practically everything necessary to agriculture is sold in a free trade market. The list of articles is illuminating. It includes plows, harrows, reapers, threshing machines, cultivators and other machinery. Animals imported for breeding purposes come under this duty-free provision as do binding twine, all material for fertilizer, building materials etc.

The second supposition is equally unsound.

Farm products protected by customs duties include almonds, grapes, apricots, bacon, beef, onions and others.

It may be that the duties are in some cases too low and need revision upward. Certainly, a cure for low duties that afford insufficient protection from foreign, low wage scale countries, is not to drop all duties and all protection.

The tariff, instead of impoverishing the farmer, has done much to insure his prosperity, by helping him get the necessities of his business at low prices and sell them at good prices.

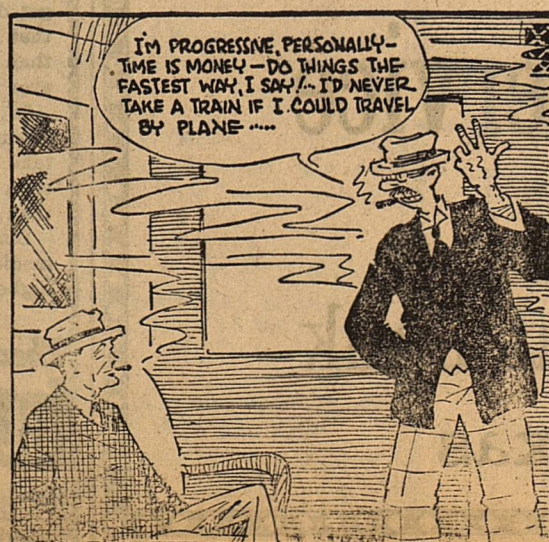
