### WHEN PEOPLE GO

After holidays, and after nearly every Sunday, we read of an unusual number of motor car accidents, usual for Sundays and holidays, unusual for weekdays. It is sad to think that sorrow and grief must attach to the lives of friends and relatives whose dear ones are either snatched from this earthly form or disabled in body in the manner of automobile accidents.

When people go they go for business or pleasure. On week days they usually go for business the business of making a living. On Sundays they go for worship or pleasure. In any circumstance or condition of travel people are entitled to safety or as reasonable a degree of freedom from danger as is possible. What is the solution?

Never before in the history of motor travel have expert minds been so engrossed upon the problem of traffic control. Whether to further restrict by artificial and physical barriers as well as by more stringent laws on the one hand or whether to throw open wider avenues of traffic and thus place greater responsibility on the heads and shoulders of the drivers themselves is the vital and perplexing problem to solve.

Adding to the national hysteria is whether husband, wife, son or daughter will arrive home safely. To those inclined to worry, the situation is nothing short of appalling. But it will do no good to worry. It does good to admonish and caution. It does also good to enforce traffic regulations without fear or favor. It will also do good by study of traffic problems by police departments and legislatures.

[There is a growing tendency nowadays for guilty motorists to try to "alibi" out of responsibility by dependence upon signs and controls. No prudent motorists will depend alone upon a sign. His dependence must also include common sense. It is not so much a question of who had the right of way as it is who was driving in a safe and careful manner under any circumstances.

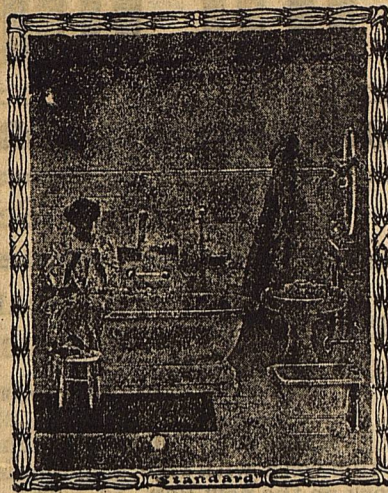
We believe the tendency is to place more responsibility upon drivers and less upon speed and signals. Signals serves the mere purpose of relieving congestion—a matter of actual getting people thru. The signals of the mind and heart serve a far greater purpose.

### SELF-DETERMINATION

The right of a man or woman to vote for the candidates of his or her choice is a fundamental privilege which should always be zealously guarded. We have known cases of persuasion in favor of one candidate or one party which has amounted almost to intimidation. Had it not been for the secret ballot such apparent compulsion might have proven effective.

We have seen a giant corporation uninfluenced by politics, and this is as it should be. John J. Raskob and Mr. Dupont came out strongly for Governor Smith. Another high official came recently for Mr. Hoover. This should prove to all fair-minded people that the General Motors Corporation itself is not in politics. But it shows something of self-determination in political thought and action is no respecter of persons, and now we see it is no respecter of corporations.

Perhaps the worst form of undue influence which always crops out in a campaign of national import is false propaganda. This kind of political persuasion is subtle and cunning. The voter finds himself separating the wheat from the chaff and it is no easy task. To read only reliable publications is necessary to guard against untruths.

When the right of the voter to use his ballot free from force either of personal influence or false statements shall be imperiled the foundations of free government are shaken. Let us have our issues, our radio talks, speeches and our button-hole arguments, but let us guard and protect our sacred right of self-determination at the ballot-box. —Pickering News.

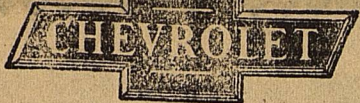

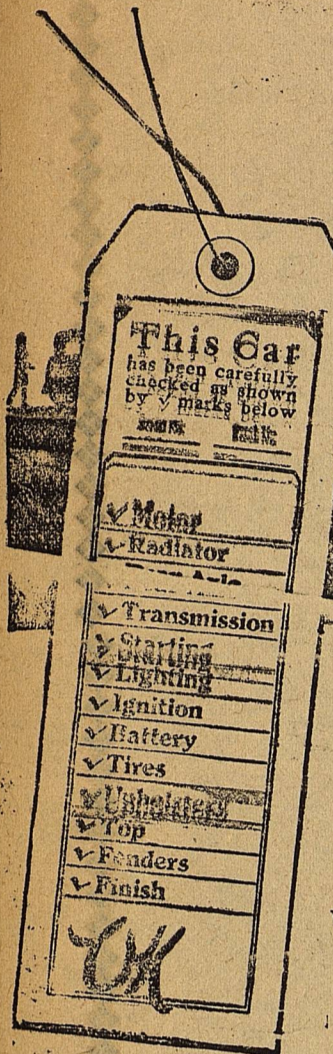

### WEEKLY COTTON REVIEW

Prices Slightly Higher. Demand For Spot Cotton Fair To Good

A better undertone prevailed in the cotton market during the week of September 1st to 7th, with final quotations up about 5-16 c per pound, compared with the previous week. There was a fair to good domestic demand reported with some improvement in the foreign demand. The for cotton in lengths of 7-8 to 15-16 inch staple, for prompt shipments.

The average price of middling spot cotton on September 7th, in ten designated spot markets was 18.57c compared with 18.25c the previous week and 22.78c the day a year ago. Prices paid for middling cotton, 7/8 inch staple, in the ten designated markets, on Sept. 7th were as follows:

Norfolk 19c; Augusta 18.81c; Savannah 18.91c; Montgomery

18.30c; New Orleans 18.71c; Memphis 18.55c; Little Rock 18.50c; Dallas 17.85c; Houston 18.45c; Galveston 18.60c. Spot sales on the ten markets for the week were 162,295 bales of cotton compared to 149,939 bales a year ago in the same week. Future contracts on October cotton for the week, on the New York Cotton Exchange advanced 37 points to 19.15c and at Chicago they were up 31 points to 18.46c. In New Orleans they were also up 31 points to 18.40c.

Certified stocks on September 7th were as follows: New York 7,379 bales; New Orleans 3,028; Houston 1,550 and Galveston 1,074 bales. Total stocks in New York 17,785 bales, New Orleans bales and Galveston 130,319 bales. Exports to September 7th were 430,498 bales compared with 530,729 bales last year.

below middling widened somewhat. Strict low cotton was 60 points off middling and low middling 124 points off compared with 48 and 101 points respectively, on August 31st.

**Staple Cotton.**  
A limited demand continues for premium staple cottons with a slight narrowing tendency of premiums in some markets.

**Southern Mill Centers.**  
Some reports indicate fair to good demand for prompt shipments and fair demand for Fall Shipments. Inquires seem to be more for middling and strict middling, 7/8 and 15-16 inch staple, for prompt shipments. Southern Spinners taking August 1st to September 7th were 348,617 bales compared with 370,713 bales in corresponding period in 1927.

**Foreign Markets.**  
Reports covering the week of September 1st to 7th indicate a better demand for Texas and Atlantic growth cotton with offerings from America on a higher basis compared with last week.

Liverpool reported that the spot demand in that market was improving. Manchester reported a more general desire to buy the new crop cotton. Havre, France reported that the spinners were freely fixing the prices and beginning to receive more orders. Stocks of American cotton in Liverpool on August 31st were 385,000 bales compared to 763,000 bales a year ago.

[The world's visible supply of American cotton; on September 7th was 1,881,961 bales compared with 3,255,388 a year ago on the same date. Interior stocks 251,324 bales against 371,441 bales last year.—Texas Radio Market News Service.

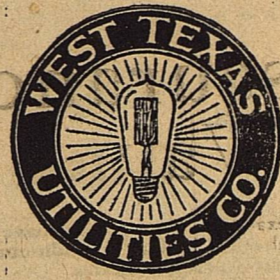
