CO-OP MEMBERS MAY NOW FIX PRICE ON COTTON IN BUREAU

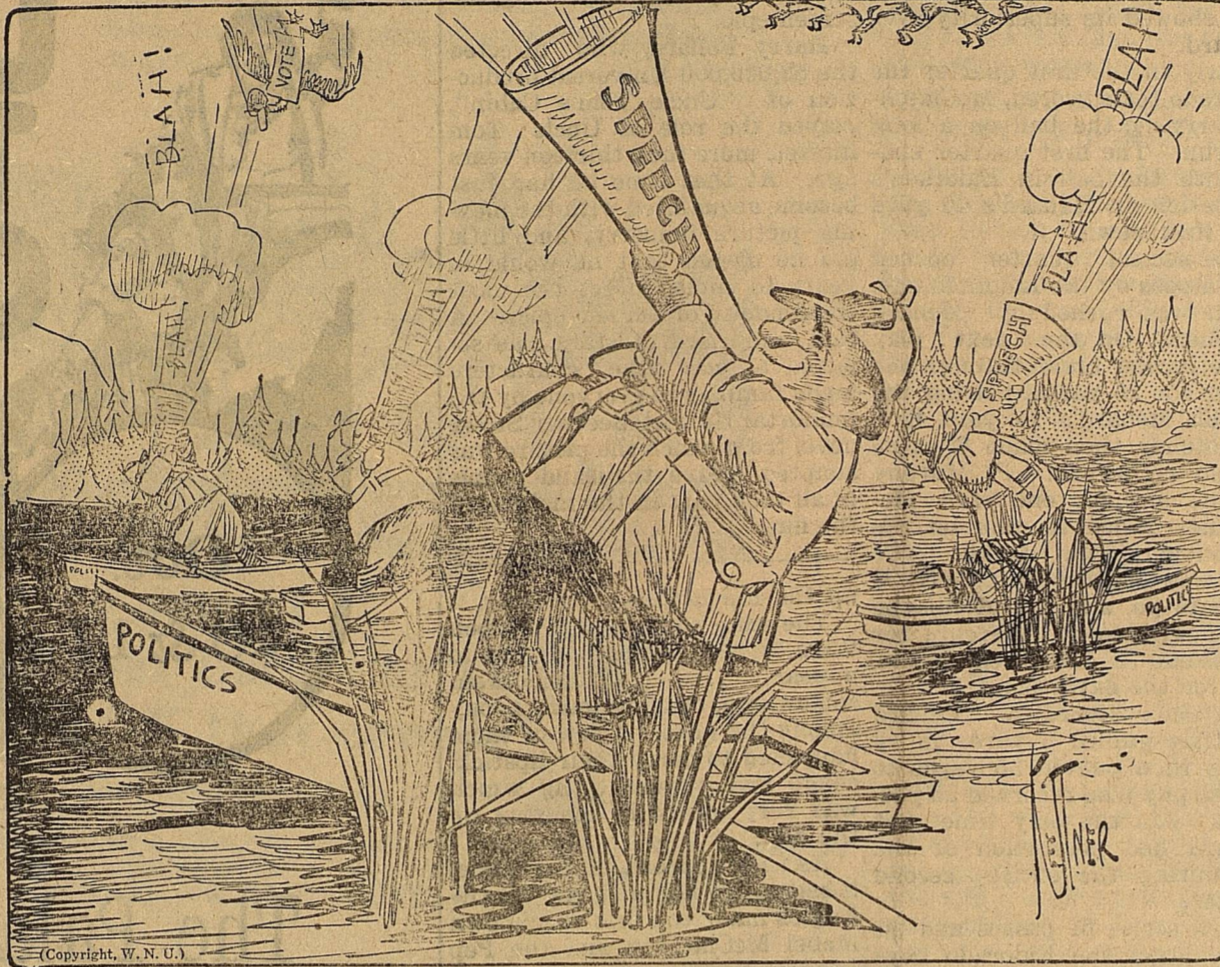
Farm Bureau members, under new contract now effective, may designate day they want price fixed.

A new Farm Bureau contract, giving the member the privilege of naming the day upon which he desires the base price of his cotton fixed, has been approved by the Board of Directors of the Texas Farm Bureau Association and is now in effect. This information was received in Eldorado today by J. A. Oneal, field service representative. The new contract he said, also gives the member privilege of cancellation at two year intervals, and in addition to the price fixation pooling plan, still retains the regular seasonal pool.

"Cotton shipped by the member to the price fixation pool in the future can be sold and the price fixed at any time designated by the member". Mr. Oneal said, assuring the member practically complete settlement at any specified time. This assurance will now enable the member to make his financial arrangements along definite plans, and the new contract from this view should also prove more unanimous endorsement and approval on the part of business interests.

"Under the new plan", Mr. Oneal stated, "the member shipping cotton to the price fixation pool draws the regular authorized advance, and when he fixes the price on his cotton practically a complete settlement is made with him as soon as his cotton is weighed and classed". It is, in fact, he said, the present marketing agreement of the Association made more liberal. Mr. Oneal is highly enthusiastic over the new features and states that in his mind deliveries to the cotton cooperative marketing association in the future will show tremendous increase. The new plan, he stated, "removes factors which in the past have retarded a greater growth". The price fixation pooling plan, it is said, is now in effect in all of the var-marketing associations where on the part of the membership and the public generally, as well as effective in increasing deliveries to the channels of co-operative marketing.

ROTARY CLUBS RECEIVE DISFAVOR OF VATICAN

Washington, D. C.—Another organization, typically American in its make-up, is apparently about to come under the ban of the Vatican and the Italian Government, according to a dispatch in the New York World.

The Vatican and the Italian Government are both about to take action against Rotary Clubs the dispatch states. The Italian Government's complaint is understood to be that they hide Freemasons since Freemasonry was legally abolished there. The Catholic Church fears too much American influence in the Holy See.

Pope Pius, The World is told indirectly, is going to issue a warning separating the civil, political and religious responsibility of the Holy See from Rotary Club action. The warning will not be addressed directly to the clubs but through the bishops and parish priests.

According to The World's information, Italian Catholic circles in Rome complain about Americans having invaded the Holy See with the power of their dollars, building beautiful churches, colleges and sporting fields and penetrating the very heart of the Vatican through the library and archives.

It seems that the Italians are perfectly willing for the United States to be the principal source of the Vatican financially but wish to avoid other American influences.—Scottish Rite News Bureau.

STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

Report of School Supervisor on Eldorado High School, October 3, 1928. Superintendent, R. D. Holt, President of Board, E. C. Hill, Supervisor, M. B. Brown.

The work of classifying and accrediting the public schools of Texas is under the direction of the State Committee composed of six members chosen by the public schools and six by the colleges. This committee determines the condition upon which high schools are classified and accredited for the purpose of establishing educational standards encouraging schools to attain these standards, and certifying those that have attained them so as to facilitate the transfer of students to any other school or college.

The regulation as prescribed by this Committee are administered by the State Department of Education through high school supervisors. In the visit of the supervisors and in their report to school authorities, recommendations are offered in the spirit of cooperation and helpful suggestion, with the earnest desire that all school authorities will join with the State Department of Education in their efforts to maintain the necessary standard of secondary education in Texas.

In order that the schools may be properly certified it is essential that minimum requirements be met. To that end the supervisor who recently visited your school makes the following recommendations:

1. That sincere approval be indicated for the excellent physical condition of the school plant, and for the good organization that is found here. It is very unusual to find such excellent conditions.
2. That genuine commendation be expressed for these forward steps during the year just closed.

- a. A contribution exceeding \$400 made by the P. T. A. for general school purposes.

- b. Quite commendable work by various pupils of local history projects.

It is encouraging to find a superintendent who is enough interested in the history of our state to assist in collecting its historical material, while at the same time he starts pupils on a course of worthwhile achievement.

3. That those in authority be commended for the generally healthy school sentiment in Eldorado and for the spirit of cooperation that is evident.

4. That the source books and fiction for the high school library be supplied before Thanksgiving, as was agreed between Mrs. Holt and the supervisor.

It was a pleasure to the representative of the department to visit here and he is under obligation to the superintendent and his faculty for various courtesies.

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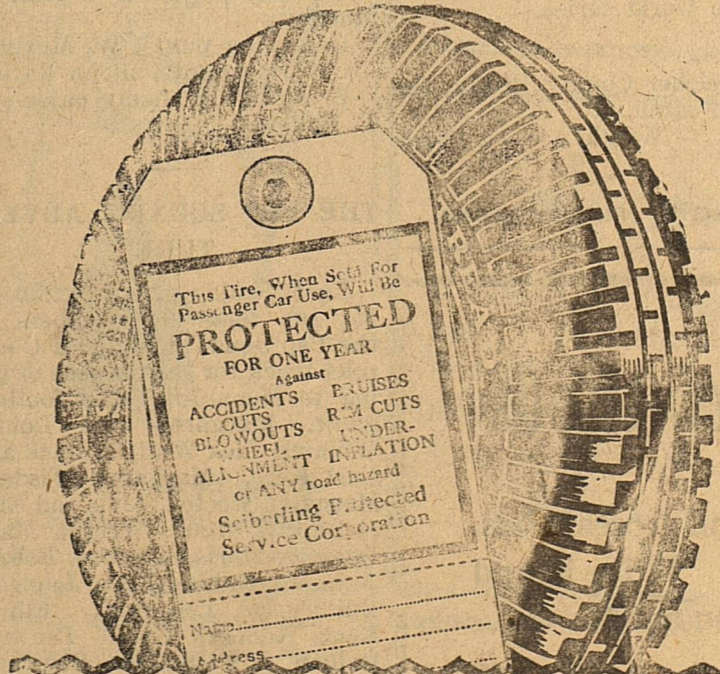

ELDORADO BEATS MENARD

Playing before a crowd of some four hundred at the Menard Polo Grounds Friday Oct. 5, the Eldorado foot ball team again showed its superiority over Menard.

Early in the first quarter the Eldorado team scored, McClatchey carrying the ball on a long end run. The first quarter ended with the ball in Eldorado's possession on Menard's 40 yard line, first down.

The second quarter opened with a pass by the Eldorado men which was rushed by Menard linemen. On the next play Rosco Parker broke through the center for 25 yards, placing the ball on Menard's 15 yard line. McClatchey then made 8 yards around right end. P. Murphy hit the line for one yard, McClatchey failed to gain on the next down-over tackle. The play was fourth down, with 4 yards to go, and Ratliff hit the center with no interference for a touchdown and then kicked goal for the extra point.

Menard kicked to Menard and they gained 5 yards in 3 downs then punted 35 yards to W. Murphy who returned 25 yds.

This was the only time that Menard had possession of the ball during the entire second quarter.

On a series of passes and off tackle plays the Eldorado boys had the ball near the Menard goal line with 20 seconds to play before the end of the first half. A pass on which Eldorado gained 15 yards. McClatchey gained 14 more on two off tackle plays and then they needed two yards for a touchdown and had 2 seconds to play. P. Murphy carried the ball over for the score but in the scramble lost the ball, Menard recovering for a touchback as the half ended.

Second Half
After a see-saw game of several minutes at the opening of the second half, Eldorado secured the ball on a punt and marched from midfield for a touchdown; P. Murphy and Ratliff going for several long runs. Murphy carrying the ball over for the touchdown.

McClatchey's place kick for extra point was blocked by Menard's left end.

The last quarter found Menard still fighting, although the score was 25 to 0 against them. Starting the last period with a 25 yard gain from a pass, Menard continued to pass their way to a touchdown.

On an exchange of punts Eldorado again had possession of the ball in mid-field, where a steady march was made for the last touchdown of the day, a short pass, Ratliff to Parker, who ran through a field of Menard men for the score. J. T. Ballew scored the extra point thru the line, making the final score 32 to 6 as the game ended.
