## DANIEL BAKER WINS

The Daniel Baker reserves defeated the Eldorado Eagles in a hard fought game of football by the score of 18 to 6. The score sounds as though the Hill Billies did not have much trouble in defeating the home boys, but the game was much closer than the score sounds.

The Eldorado team were outweighed by every man on the Brownwood team but this did not take away any of the fighting spirit that the high school team is noted for.

Brownwood won the toss and chose to receive, Eldorado defending the west goal. After a series of downs and not making their required ten yards the Billies were forced to punt. They punted to W. Murphy on his own 20 yard line and behind perfect interference he ran 80 yards for the only score Eldorado made in the game. The try for point was blocked. Brownwood received again and on several line plays and a completed pass took the ball far into the Eldorado territory, where the quarter displayed some classy broken field running and went through the Eagle line for a touch down.

Eldorado chose to kick after this score and the Billies started plugging the line after failing to get any where around the ends or in the air. The Eldorado line being outweighed so much the Baker boys gained consistently four and six yards. Had it not been for the stubbornness of the Eldorado defense the score would have been much larger. Swift gave the opponents much trouble on their line plays, playing a brilliant game in backing up the Eldorado line. Ratliff and Murphy play a good game on the defense making many tackles taking the opponents for losses.

The Eldorado team showed much more training, better interference and displayed a better class of football than did the Baker eleven. But due to the fact that they were outweighed so much could not make many gains only in the air.

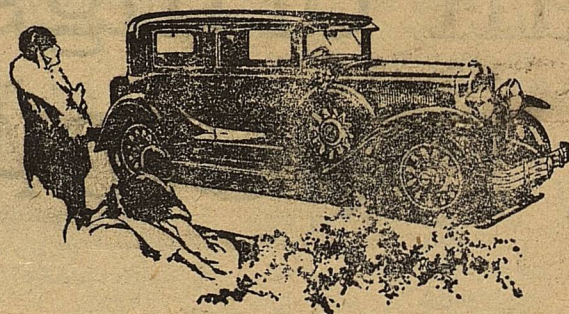

## BOB SHULER SPEAKS IN SAN ANGELO.

Quite a few Eldorado citizens attended a political speaking in San Angelo last Thursday night, in which Dr. Bob Shuler, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Los Angeles, was the speaker. Dr. Shuler is a gifted speaker and kept his crowd interested throughout the one and one half Editor of The Success was present and enjoyed the talk. The speaker made his talk plain enough for any one to understand his position and why he was right in the stand against Smith. He said that he had been a life long Democrat, born in the South and had voted a Democratic ticket all his life, but he had found a cesspool in the road and was going to detour around it.

Dr. Shuler made very little reference to the religious question, further than to state that Smith and Raskob enjected the question into politics and they could now stand on the issue they have made. Dr. Shuler was applauded many times during the discourse and had a large audience out to hear him. The writer asked several how many they thought were in the audience? They estimated it to be between two and three thousand.

## FEEDING POULTRY HALF THE BATTLE.

(A. and M. College Bureau.)

The practice of forcing the farm poultry flock to subsist on scrap and waste around the farmstead is fast becoming obsolete in Texas along with the gradual disappearance of the mongrel flock and the use of trees for roosting places. At least this is the observation of E. N. Holmgren, Extension Poultryman at Texas A. and M. College, who points to the fact that scientific feeding is coming into quiet general use. "While it is true," he says, "that good feeding is of no avail where the flock is scrubby or wormy or preyed upon by vermin or poorly housed it is also true that about half the failures to make poultry profits are due to improper feeding.

"How shall I feed my flock?" is a question asked in hundreds of letters monthly to the Extension Service, and the usual reply is a suggestion to the "Big 5 Ration," as follows: 100 pounds each of corn or milo meal, ground oats, wheat bran, wheat short and meat scraps of 50% protein. The bran and shorts may be substituted by using an equal weight of finely ground wheat. For the scratch feed the proportions are 2 pounds cracked corn or milo, 1 pound wheat and one pound oats. This ration is designed for farms where no milk is available. It is easily changed for flocks having plenty of any kind of milk before them at all times by omitting the scrag in the mash given, and feeding 3 pounds cracked corn or milo and 1 pound of wheat in the scratch feed, omitting the oats.
