Hoover Sweeps Nation, Invades Solid South.

COACH WILLIAMSON SHOWS ABILITY AS ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Coach Williamson, head director of athletics in the Eldorado High School, deserves a great deal of credit for his splendid work he has done in developing a winning team out of the light and inexperienced team he had to begin with.

The backfield and two or three linesmen were the only veterans on the squad, the rest being beginners in the game.

Ratliff at quarter and captain is showing up well in piloting his men. He is an accurate passer and a good broken field runner, but not extra fast.

Parker, a linesman but playing his first year in the backfield is a hard runner and a very consistent player, both on offense and defense. But a much better linesman than back.

McClatchey, an experienced back, a great broken field runner being fast and hard to tackle in an open field but is weak on defense.

Stewardson, also a veteran at the half position, a big man and a hard and sure blocker, a hard runner, especially in hitting the line. He is a good punter, getting off many punts for 50 yards and better.

Prince (Big) Murphy, a shifty back and a sure pass "snatcher" has been playing a good game on the offense as well as the defense. Cicero (Smokey) Swift, the hardest working man on the team is showing up well and plays a real game all the time at end and backing up the line. Graves another veteran on the other end has been playing a good game this season.

Ballew is a good linesman, being heavy and has plenty of driving power when he makes up his mind to use it. Wince (Little) Murphy, center and safety man is the speediest man on the team, although handicapped with like of weight has no equal in returning punts in this section and class of football. He is a good punt receiver and a dead thrower from the center position.

Edwin Sharp, at tackle is one of the hardest tacklers on the team but seems to be the least bit lazy at times.

The other linesmen, Buck, Nix, Christian, Green, Maddox and Williams all inexperienced players have been going good all season.

Coach Williamson has developed a deadly aerial attack that has brought the boys victory in many games. With the light forward wall but all very determined fighters the backs are forced to take to the aerial game which has proven very successful so far.

TWO MILLION ATWATER KENT RADIOS MADE

A message received today by The Eldorado Electric Company dealer for Atwater Kent Radio Sets and Speakers, announced that the two millionth Atwater Kent Radio had just been turned out at the company's factory in Philadelphia. In a very interesting and hard fought game of football the Eldorado Eagles overpowered the Del Rio Wildcats in their own den Wednesday, November 7, by a 12 to 0 score.

The Del Rio coach underestimated the power of the Eagles and sent his second string line up in to start the game, but only to his sorrow. By the hard line plunging of Stewardson and the deadly passing combination, Ratliff to Murphy netted a score in the first minute of play after which the full first string men for Del Rio entered the game and stopped the flying Eagles for the time being.

The Wildcats were a hard hitting clean bunch of players and the Eagles deserve great credit in defeating this type of football players. The interference of the Del Rio boys as well as their blocking was as good as you will see in most high schools. They were well coached and made several runs for long gains behind perfect interference.

First Quarter

Eldorado kicked to Del Rio, Stewardson booted to the 35 yard line where D. R. fumbled and Stewardson recovered. Murphy hit the line for 3 yds., Stewardson made a first down over the line. He hit the line again for 4 yds. A 20 yard pass, Ratliff to Murphy was completed for the first score. Try for extra point failed.

Stewardson kicked to the 15 yard line, the ball was returned 10 yards, being stopped by P. Murphy. D. R. failed to gain over the line. They made 8 yards at end, stopped by Ballew. They made 3 yds. at center and first down. They failed to gain at center, stopped by P. Murphy. P. Murphy broke thru and smothered them for a 1 yard loss. D. R. punted to W. Murphy who returned 10 yards. On a fake punt formation, Murphy went around end for 11 yards and first down. Parker got six yards at tackle. A pass, Ratliff to Murphy was good for 20 yards. (D. R. made 4 substitutions). Stewardson failed to gain at the line. Murphy lost 3 yds. at end. Incomplete pass, Ratliff to Graves. Stewardson punted high to the 10 yard line and D. R. returned 8 yards.

It must be understood here that all one has to do to reach a pinnacle of fame or goal of fortune is to go out and get one's foot smashed, one's arm cut off, or eat a lot of candy and potatoes and take on flesh. Such things aren't done deliberately, especially since civilization as we know it has advanced from the days when men maimed themselves as a sacrifice and an appeasement to the gods.

But should one happen to be a little out of line physically from the common run of people there is consolation in the fact that opportunity, thru compensating effects, will open the door for him if he uses his head.

OUR NEXT PRESIDENT

The heat of battle is to be subsided. The cudgels of political strife are to be laid aside. The country is about to settle down once more to the more sober pursuits of partizan peace. We can all look forward with much anticipation to the inauguration of our next president.

After all, what democracy takes away from a President in the way autocratic power it compensates in esteem and respect. The personality of the President typifies leadership. The office of President denotes order and dignity. The President of the United States at all times is both a figure and a head, but not a figure-head. Some one personality must necessarily represent the executive authority none of whom is superior to the others; and this is true in a definite sense of the judicial forces of the country. But not so with the executive. The instincts of civilization demand leadership, and this is because of the cooperative and disciplinary instincts of the race for what might be correspondingly term follow-ship. The Presidency of the United States is not altogether a remnant of kingdoms. It is more than that. For no organization, whether civic, fraternal, political, social or religious can long exist without making itself secure by setting up some form of leadership. Such constituted authority is by common consent.

The people of the United States might take away practically all power and authority in governmental matters from the President, and there would still be the necessity for the office. Such necessity would not alone grow out of the need for a spokesman in internal or in international affairs; not alone out of the necessity that the President deliver profound addresses on great occasions of state and country; but that there may be at the head of the nation in name at least a presence and a personality from the people may rightly expect an embodiment of the ideal that orderly and efficient government shall continue to exist.

Too all are equal in legal status and political opportunity, one may well offer a toast of honor and good wishes to our next President. He represents that opportunity which by our form of government is made common to all Americans.—Pickerrill Service
