HIGH LINES INCREASING

San Angelo, Texas, — Twelve miles of 66,000 volt transmission lines are being constructed to extend to Christoval for the electrification of that town. Completion of this work will mean the addition of the 107th. town to the properties of the West Texas Utilities Company served by the network of more than 2,000 miles of highline.

The company also will erect at Christoval a 66-12-2.4 kv substation and three phase 2300 volt distribution system. The new transmission lines will tap the 66,000 volt San Angelo Mertzton line.

Christoval is a summer resort town and is located south of this city in Tom Green County. It is anticipated that this line soon will be extended to Eldorado and Sonora to take care of pipe lines in that territory.

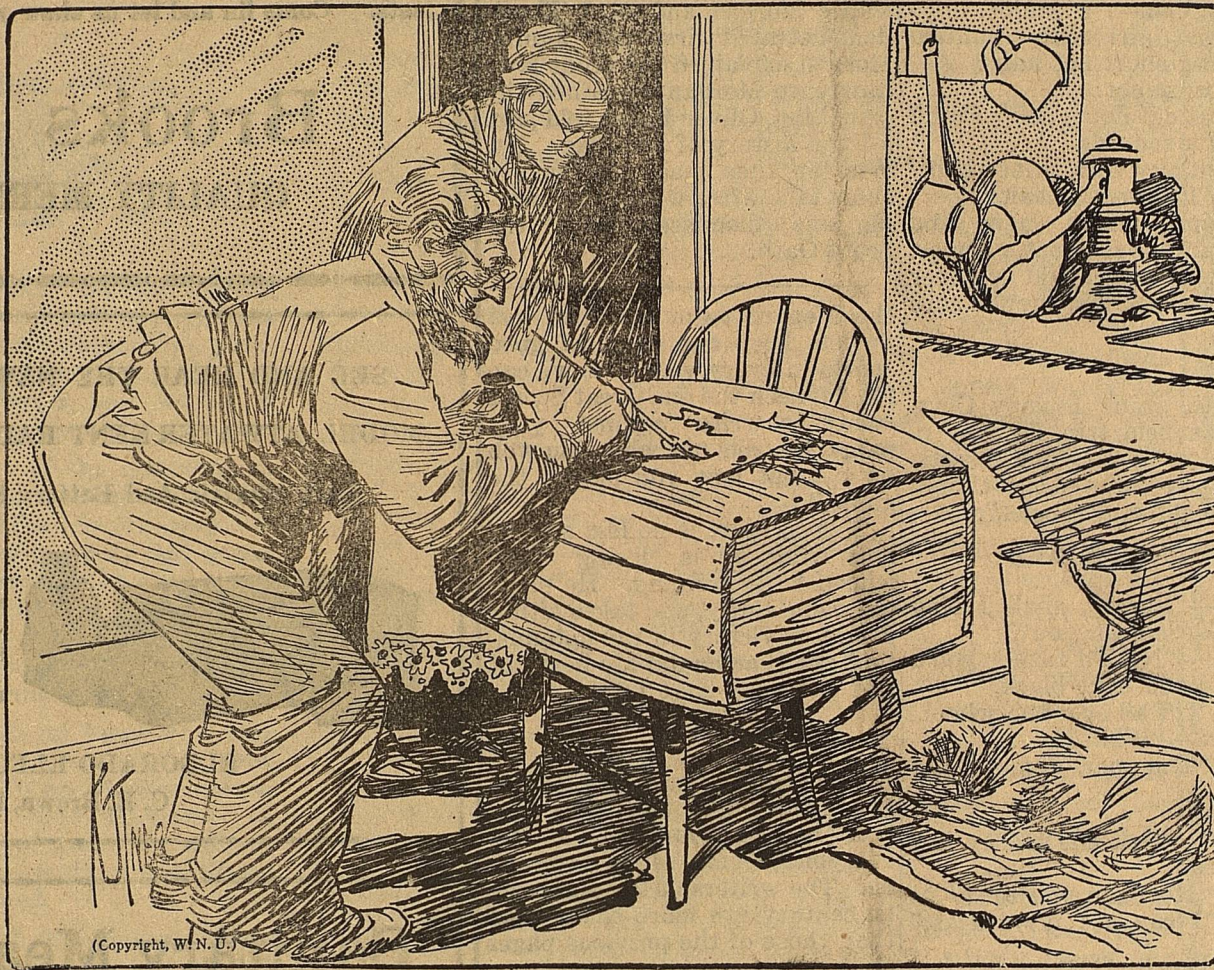

ELDORADO 6—BIG LAKE!

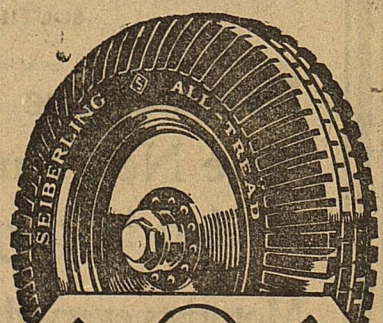

GOVERNMENT AND PEOPLE

By the time the ink was dry on the first newspaper that announced definitely the result of the Presidential election, and almost with the dying away of the echo of radio voice of the decision the American people had practically forgotten the strained condition of the political campaign. And with no intention to minimize the importance of a Presidential election, or take from Herbert Hoover the great honor that is his, at least two reasons suggest themselves for the apparent indifference of the people toward matters of state between campaigns.

In the first place the form of government of the United States as outlined by the Constitution somewhat surrounds the office of President with certain barriers against a possible exercise of autocratic power. It is a case of "we want a President, but we don't want him to 'preside' too much over our destinies".

The President has the power of recommendation on the one hand and of veto on the other. These indeed are great powers. In national emergency he is clothed with the authority of commander-in-chief of the armed forces of the country. As an incident to the office the President has the power of civil, judicial and political appointment. But in enumerating the official duties of the chief executive, which in the main are of legal or diplomatic nature, the fact must not be overlooked that his duties extend into the social, moral and educational elements of the nation. The psychology of leadership finds expression even in one elected by the partisan preference of the ballot. The President becomes a common consent as well as by force of custom and law a spokesman of all of the people in national and world affairs, altho such monitorship is at best temporary and subject to political change.

Secondly, an attitude of forgetfulness on the part of many people takes prominence because of so many interests other than governmental. But with considerable amount of hopefulness the proposition may be reversed by saying that it is fortunate for the purposes of a democracy that as often as every four years the people take a more or less intensive interest in the issues involving their own government.

THE FARM OF THE FUTURE

Electricity is solving many farm difficulties. By doing away with slow, expensive and inefficient physical labor, it is today bringing about an agricultural revolution similar to the great changes that took place during the period when power was introduced into industry.

A practical experimental farm established in Illinois is a good augury for the future. It is of 80 acres, stocked with cows, hogs, and chickens, the three great enthusiasms of those who advocate diversified farming.

All of the cow's needs are supplied cheaply and quickly by power. The hay is pitched by an electric motor and the water pumped into automatic drinking cups. Electricity cuts the feed and lifts it into the bins. Electric milkers do the arduous milking job and electric refrigerators cool the milk.

Flies are kept away from the cows by an electric killer that attracts them with bait and when they touch it, electrocutes them.

The feed for the pigs is likewise electrically prepared and their house is warmed by an electric stove.

Electricity operates the incubator and young chickens are treated with ultraviolet rays to prevent sickness. By use of electric light the hen's working is lengthened to as much as 15 hours increasing winter egg production.

The farm house is equipped with almost every known and perfected electric labor saving device.

This farm established as an experiment, is proving an outstanding sign, if it is a model for the future.—Industrial News.

G. C. Magruder, of Mertzon sold 4500 pounds of Mohair at 63 and 73 cents to D. E. Hughes of San Angelo. This constituted the entire amount in storage in the warehouse at Mertzon. He also sold several hundred pounds of short wool for 34 and 36 cents.
