The company also will erect at Christoval a 66-12-2.4 kv substation and three phase 2300 volt distribution system. The new transmission lines will tap the 66,000 volt San Angelo Mertzon line.

Christoval is a summer resort town an dis located south of this city in Tom Green County. It is anticipated that this line soon will be extended to Eldoraod and Sonora to take care of pipe lines in that territory.






