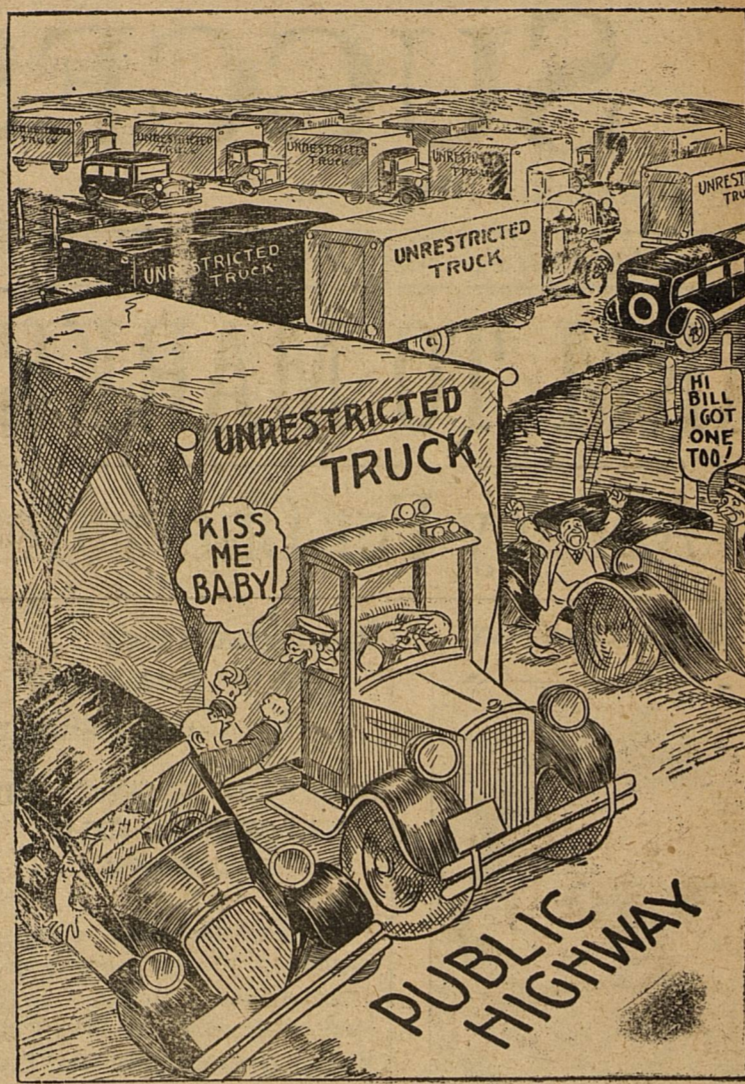

the State-Federal Highway Planning Survey for use in working out a logical plan on which future road and street construction will be based. Mr. O. E. Connor the Assessor and Collector of Taxes, has been given a number of post cards which ask for fundamental information that is needed in road planning, thus affording the motorist opportunity to participate in outlining his future road program. These cards to be distributed to car owners as they pay their 1937 registration fees, require no postage and are self-addressed. The number of cards which have been furnished Mr. Connor was judged according to the number of motor vehicles which were registered in the County during 1936. The number of cards allotted to Schleicher County is as follows: 650 for passenger automobiles, 250 for trucks, and 25 for trailers and motorcycles, and 15 for owners of five or more vehicles.

The business of constructing and maintaining highways, streets, and roads has become a tremendous task within recent years, and it now affects the well being of every citizen. Obviously, every effort should be made to plan our public road system so that it will serve all car owners in an equitable manner and so that the tax burden for roads will be distributed justly. The information sought on these cards is vital to the establishment of an equitable, well-rounded program. In order to work out such a program, the Texas Highway Department and the United States Bureau of Public Roads are conducting a State-wide Highway Planning Survey, and it is to the advantage of each County to participate to the greatest extent possible.

**VENTILATED PANTRY**

Mrs. Truett C. Stanford, the pantry demonstrator of the Country-Women's Club, is building a ventilated pantry as a portion of her work.

"The ventilation at top and bottom will make my pantry much cooler than the rest of the house—and the ventilation at the top will also cool the whole house," Mrs. Stanford continues. "I'm going to make my shelves with slats so that the cool air drawn from beneath the house will circulate between my canned goods."

Ventilated pantries are being built by many of the Farm Food Supply demonstrators in Schleicher county. These ladies find that it is well worth the trouble and slight expense to put in the ventilation grills.

**IMPROVES KITCHEN**

Mrs. S. D. Harper tells of some work she has done as a co-operator in Kitchen Improvement Demonstration.

"I needed some small air-tight containers for staple groceries in my pantry and had been saving some two and three-pound coffee cans for this purpose. During the bad weather by children kept asking for something to do so I got some paint and two brushes and allowed them to paint the cans on the outside. Now I have some gaily colored air-tight containers in which I can keep my sugar, flour, short-

**AUTOMOBILE SALES DROP IN JANUARY**

Austin, Texas, Feb. 17.—Reports from fifteen representative Texas counties show total sales of 5,454 new automobiles during January, a drop of 32.8 per cent from December, but an increase of 1.5 per cent over January last year, according to the

### Governor's Safety Program Emphasizes 3 "E's" Of Safety

"Let Us Act To End The Reign Of Sudden Death," Says Governor

Austin, Feb. 17. —(Special) C. J. Rutland, of Dallas, as Chairman of the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, will direct the statewide war on traffic accidents which has been declared by Governor Allred.

Mr. Rutland was elected by the committee at its meeting in Austin last week when one hundred members gathered from every section of Texas to organize and plan a state safety program which will end the reign of Sudden Death on Texas highways and streets.

The chairman is an outstanding authority on traffic safety having served as regional director of the National Safety Council and as chairman of the Dallas Citizens Traffic Safety Commission. He is a graduate of Texas A & M College and of Cornell University.

The safety program adopted by the Governor's Committee will be built around the three "E's" of safety—Engineering, Education, and Enforcement—a tried and proven program of safety endorsed by the President's National Conference on Street and Highway Safety as well as by the National Safety Council. Supplementing the

three "E's" of safety will be the legislative work of the committee which urges the adoption of a stricter driver's license law and other safety legislation now pending before the legislature.

The membership of the Governor's committee is composed of representatives from women's clubs, civic clubs, parent-teacher associations, churches, chambers of commerce, automobile clubs, boy and girl scout organizations, the press and radio. In addition public spirited citizens and public officials charged with safety responsibilities comprise this non-partisan, non-political traffic safety committee.

In the words of Governor Allred "the committee will be the super safety-salesman of the state who will spread the gospel of safety throughout Texas in this relentless warfare on traffic accidents."

### Preston Addresses Student Body; 'Finding Yourself' Is Topic

Mr. T. W. Preston, who has spoken previously to the student body of Eldorado, gave a very educational speech, "Finding Yourself," in the school Auditorium Tuesday, February 8, 1937 between 11:00 and 12:00. The main theme of this talk was character education.

"The hardest thing in the world to do is to find yourself," said Mr. Preston. "The subjects I use for lectures were stumbled upon, and this is the way you find yourself. Everybody must have some principle to look forward to, because that principle is the biggest thing in life."

In his speech Mr. Preston brought forward the age old adage "Pretty is as pretty does." He gives examples of a homey man being hired for a job, and everyone can't see why he was hired. When people have associations, they then see why he was hired. He is intelligent and almost perfect in everything he does. His ways make people forget how he looks.

"One must be truthful to find yourself." If you have small faults in your younger years, but are always truthful, you will soon overcome the smaller faults. If you tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth at all times, the truth will stand by you like a Rock of Gibraltar. "It is the small things that we do not see that destroys us." Small insects may destroy a large building, but from looking at them you would not believe it. If we overlook small

things, it will be the destruction of our characters. "Back of every great man is a mother." When we are well born, we will have good characters. If our mothers drink, gamble and smoke we will probably do likewise. "If this world is a good world, somebody made it good."

"Declining morals have destroyed more nations than arms and artillery." And so it is with man. America leads the world in crime, and still they are called a great nation. Our plea should be to save America. Our women drink, gamble, smoke and use profanity. The trouble is that too many girls are trying to be men. When you are doing this, you are violating the laws of nature. Act like a lady.

If schools lead in scholastic standing, and the students after graduating go to the pen, wouldn't it be very good school? Students should major in manhood, rather than some other subject.

Mr. Preston last words to the students were: "Girls be ladies and boys be gentlemen." His speech was full of inspiration and moral teaching.

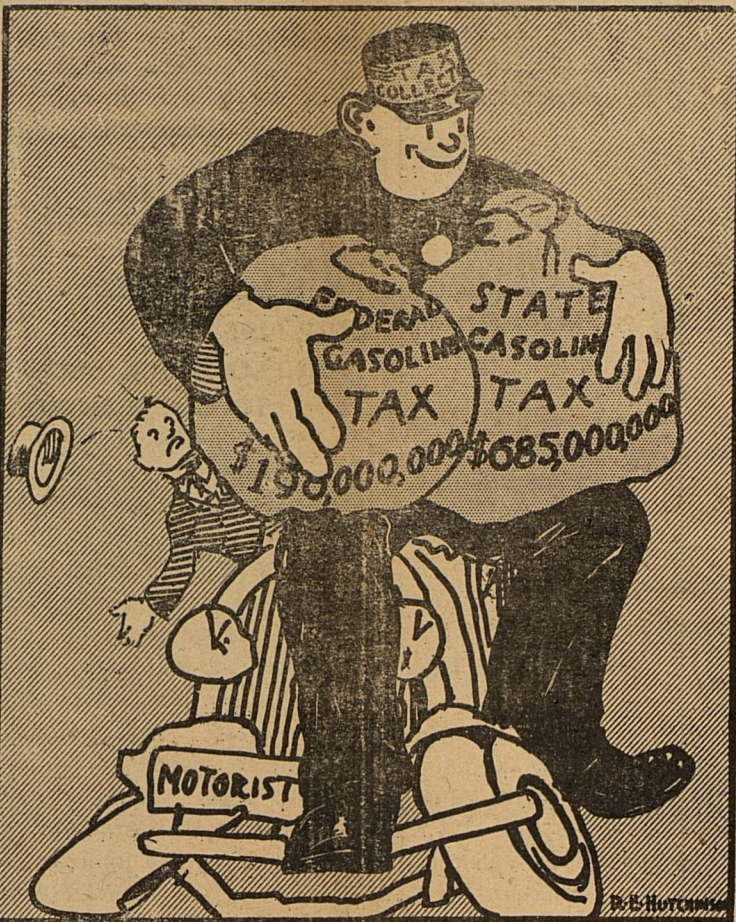
After these talks, Mrs. Glenn R. Lewis, of San Angelo rendered a vocal solo.

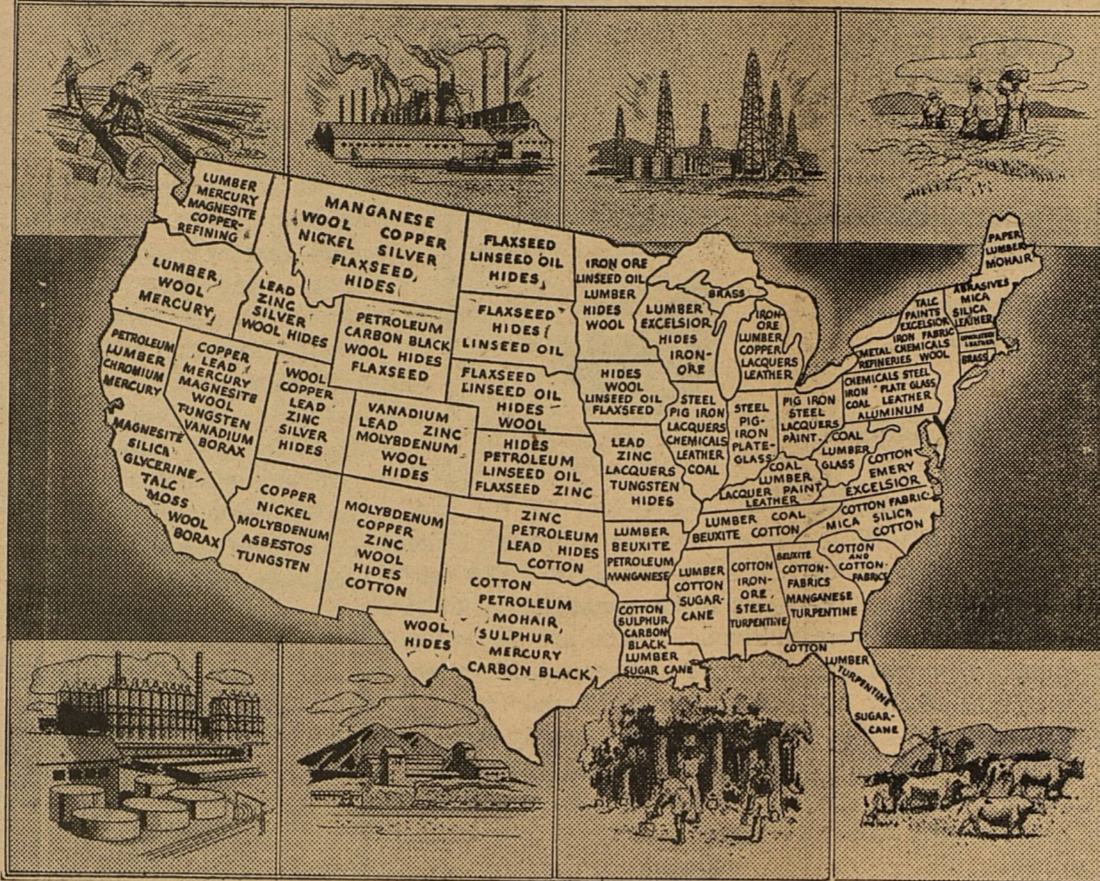

# City To Vote On Water-Sewer System

## WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM TO BE SUBMITTED TO PEOPLE

At a call meeting of the City council Monday night, all members being present except, Mr. George Long, the City Council voted unanimously to call an election to vote on Revenue bond in the amount not to exceed \$120,000.00 bearing 4 per cent for the purpose of building a water and sewer system for the city of Eldorado.

Mr. C. W. Arlitt of Austin is preparing the election papers and the required notices, which will appear in the Success as soon as ready, announcing the election date.

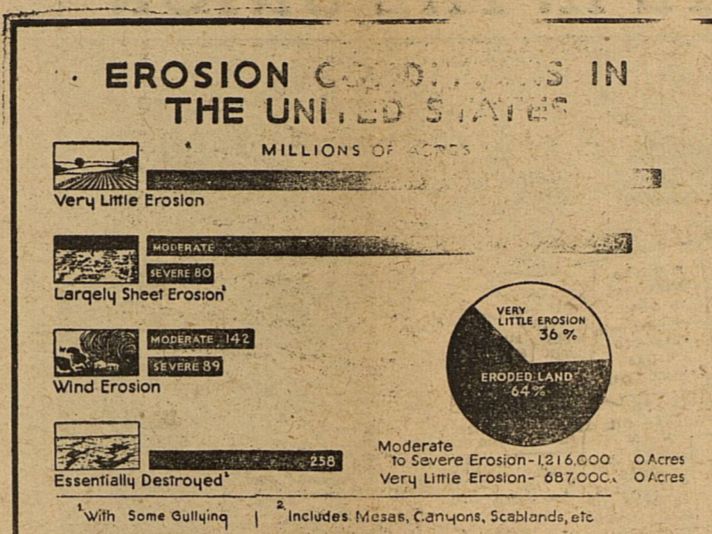
Mr. Edgar, Editor of the Success, has asked that I write this information for the paper as I am very familiar with the past of our city and its water supply. The people in the past have voted on two different occasions to build a water system and one time or a sewer system, and on those occasions voted tax paying bond, but this time the bonds are to be revenue bonds, and the proposition will not place a penny of taxes on anyone. It could be placed by your city officials without an election, but they desire an expression from the water

users, endorsing the movement and insuring co-operation from the users when the City builds its system.

We first want to say that it is our desire to see Eldorado have an adequate water supply, with full fire protection and at the lowest possible cost, and we can only have this by putting in the plant ourselves.

The plant will be erected on money received from the issuance of these bonds and bonds will be retired by the revenue derived from the water system. It will cost you no more water than at present, with a probable lower rate, and will furnish you water in quantity at much lower rate. Besides the town will save quite a good deal on fire insurance rates, something like \$2,000.00 per annum. This saving alone is worth the effort.

You will naturally want to know what will be done in regard to the present water system. This we hope to buy, if a satisfactory price can be obtained from them; if not we expect to build a system of our own. If we can buy the present system it will be improved, to meet the needs of the city. Eldorado needs a good water system and in the writer's opinion a good sewer system. Why not have it?

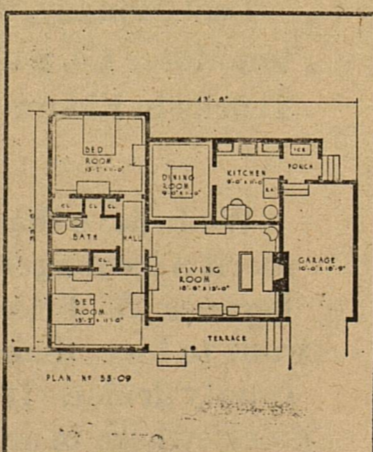
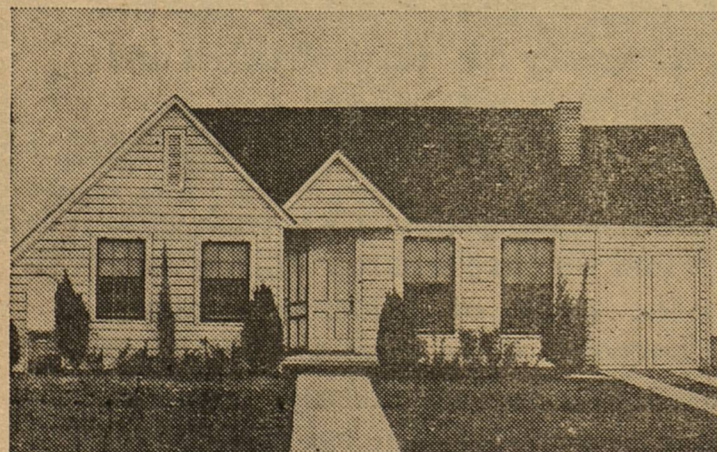

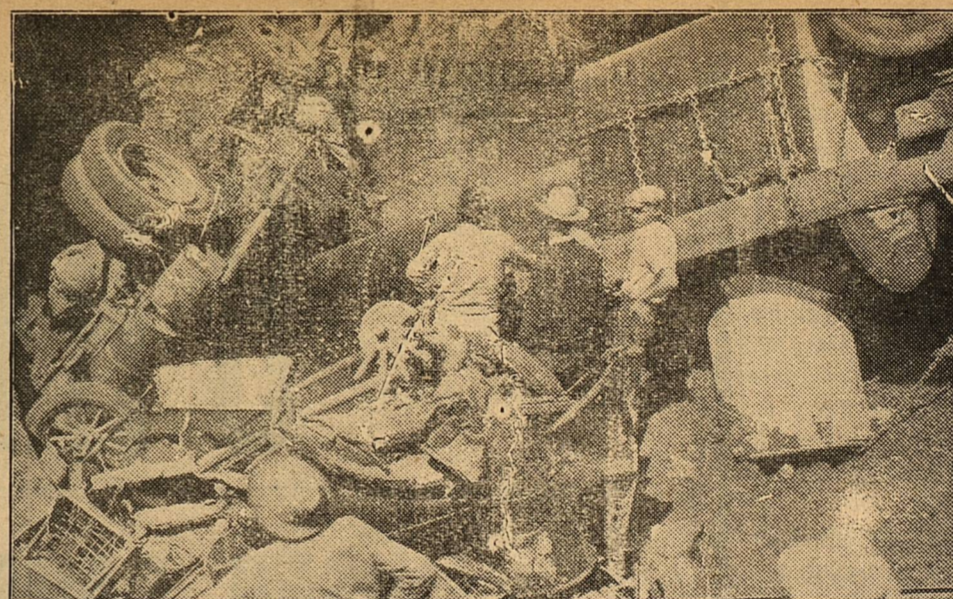

## SAFETY---OR THIS?

DEATH, in the guise of heavily loaded motor trucks, rides the highways of Texas every day and every night. The toll of human death and injury of these vehicles is appalling.

In the five-year period, 1932 to 1936, inclusive, trucks in Texas have participated in 8,416 highway accidents in which 2,195 persons were killed and 11,962 injured. In 1936 alone, their record stood 2,208 accidents with 3,323 persons injured and 576 killed. These actual records of people killed, as shown by Texas newspapers, compared with the number of deaths resulting from all motor vehicle accidents, as given by the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin, show that the average Texas truck participates in twice as many fatal accidents as the average passenger car.

Likewise, as might be reasonably expected from their greater weight and size, and as shown by the records of the Texas Railroad Commission, the Carrier-for-Hire truck accidents, during 1936, have resulted, vehicle for vehicle, in three times the number of fatalities as for the average passenger car.

Increased liability to highway accident forms an inseparable result of BIG truck operation. But even now, the threat of greater highway hazards hangs over the people of Texas. Newspapers report that operators of BIG trucks have organized for the purpose of securing an increase in weight and speed limits, already too large. These are the elements, weight and speed, which, in highway accidents, spell "D-E-A-T-H."

The right to grant, condition or deny the use of the highways for profit, belongs to you, the people of Texas, notwithstanding the attempts of the operators of BIG trucks to take it away and give it to the federal government instead. Your present laws, limiting the size, weight and speed of trucks, were enacted by reason of your insistence, and by your insistence they have remained on the statute books. Their amendment would serve the sole purpose of increasing the profits of operators of the BIG trucks, with the certain results of also increasing the mounting injuries, deaths and property losses now taking place on your highways.

Public welfare and public safety demand that existing highway regulations shall be retained and enforced.

### NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Austin.—The bitter and lengthy battles that are usually fought before committees of the house of representatives over revenue measures apparently will be fought out on the floor at this session, and from this circumstance, the people who hope recovery in Texas will be permitted to go forward without the burden of tremendous new tax imposts this week took heart.

The carefully selected committees, which are made up largely of rural legislators who don't give a lot of thought to the problems of business that is struggling to prevent being bogged down by new tax levies, this week brought out two tax measures that are estimated to yield \$54,000,000 a year. These are the corporation franchise tax bill of Herman Jones increasing levies on all corporate business—large and small—about 700 per cent. The bill, if finally passed in the form approved by the committee, would yield about \$14,000,000 a year.

The other measure was the bill by Reed of Texarkana, imposing a tax of 10 cents per barrel on crude oil production, estimated to bring in \$40,000,000. Committee hearings were brief extended battles on the floor of the house, and opponents took heart from the fact that if committees bring out this kind of legislation as rapidly as indicated, the calendar will become so crowded that an unprecedented legislative jam will result in the last few weeks of the session. This will automatically kill a lot of legislation that probably should be killed, and may result as one observer expressed it, in a "great break for the people."

of a constitutional amendment specifically permitting the people to pass on whether the state should pay a pension of \$15 to everybody over 65, regardless of need, is growing here. Advocates of the plan point out that it would settle finally the constant agitation over this question, and remove it from politics. The pension problem so far has consumed more time than any other issue, and already the politicians are setting their sails to catch the pension breeze in the 1938 primary elections. Some advocate submission of a sales tax at the same time, thus ending another highly powerful and persistent political issue. If the sales tax is tied in with the pension question, Texans ought to see a red-hot campaign for and against the amendments, even if it is an off political year.

#### Politics Simmering

The trip to Washington this weekend of Gov. Allred, ostensibly to plead with President Roosevelt for \$10,000,000 of PWA money for Texas cities that have issued bonds to match federal funds, led to a revival of political talk. Incidentally, Gov. Allred's trip is timed to put him in Washington when the huge testimonial banquet for Jim Farley is being staged. Revived seeking in a federal judgeship and that he hopes to close a trade with Farley and John Garner for the job on this trip.

The latest underground here is that the deal is virtually made now, with Allred to get an appointment as judge of the west Texas district, where an additional place is to be created. This report, however, says the appointment, by stipulation of Sen. Tom Connally will not be available for Allred until he finishes his term as governor. The senator is said to be friendly both to Rail Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson and Atty. Gen. McCraw, now leading candidates for governor in 1938, and he wants to avoid complicating this race by letting Allred resign, which would automatically put Lieut. Gov. Water Woodul in office, with a very good chance to be re-elected governor over both McCraw and Thompson. Connally naturally wants to remove Allred from the field as a potential candidate against himself in 1940 and this program would neatly solve the problem. Allred is said to have been tentatively offered an appointment on the federal court of claims, at \$40,000 a year for an eight-year term, but is said to have declined, because he wants to live in Texas, and the district judgeship is a lifetime tenure.

#### Bobbitt Inaugurated

Before a notable gathering of politicians and friends, Judge Lee Bobbitt stopped off at Dallas for 10 minutes, en route to Washington, and was sworn in as chairman of the state highway commission on the station platform, by Dist. Judge Sara Hughes, Texas' only woman jurist.

Friends of Bobbitt forecast

new era of courtesy and co-operation on the highway commission, recalling that he once headed a delegation from his former home, Laredo, to Austin, to ask for some highway improvement. The commission gruffly told the Laredo delegation they could have two minutes to present their case.

"Then we'll leave now," retorted Bobbitt. "If our interest is only worth two minutes of the commission's time, we won't even trouble you, gentlemen."

The delegation started to withdraw, and was hastily recalled by the commission. They got halt an hour to present their plea for road improvement.

"And I'll bet that never happens to another county delegation at Austin, with Lee Bobbitt presiding over the commission," remarked one of Bobbitt's

friends, as he was sworn in.

#### News And Names

The attorney general's race in 1938 is the subject of much discussion here, with several candidates already campaigning actively, and half a dozen others reported ready to announce later. Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodul is obviously far out ahead now, having frankly begun his campaign the day he took office as lieutenant governor. Gerald Mann, of Dallas, is an avowed candidate, too, while Elbert Hooper of Austin, Franklin Spears of San Antonio, Roy Hofheinz of Houston, Judge Ralph Yarborough of Austin, and several others are potential candidates. . . . Lonnie Stinson, treasurer of Rockwall, the smallest county in Texas for the past 24

years, will seek election to the state treasurer's post next year, according to Dick Gaines, genial Rockwall publisher and booster, who attended the Press association session here.

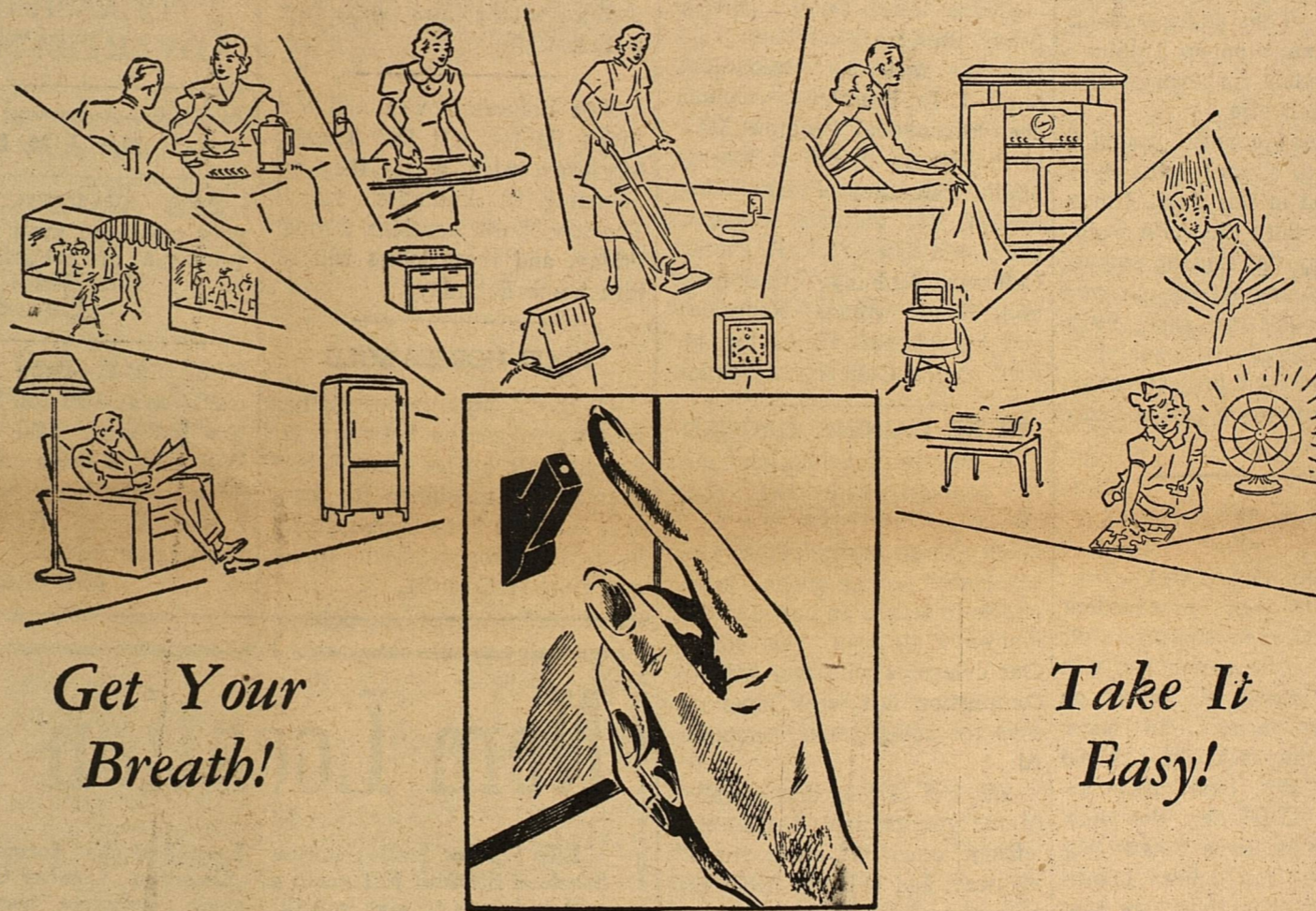

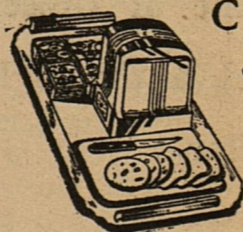
