The Commissioners Court met Monday May 8 with the following members present; F. M. Bradley, E. O. Conner, R. C. Edmiston, J. Forrest Runge, T. C. Meador and W.N. Ramsay.

## Senate Passes Rural School Bill

The Texas Senate passed a bill the first of the week, to appropriate \$8,000,000 for rural school aid for the next biennium.

None of the funds could be used for payment of county school supervisors, and could not be spent by school trustees for buses to transport children. The House had previously passed a bill of like manner for \$6,000,000. Now they will have to get together.

## BREAD PUDDING

3 c milk  
3 eggs. (save whites for meringue)  
2 c soft bread crumbs  
1 tsp. flavoring  
1-2 c sugar  
Method: Mix all together, put in double boiler and cook until consistency of thick cream.  
In buttered baking dish put 2 cups sweetened fruit or preserves. Set pan in another pan in oven and bake until nearly firm. Cover with meringue, put in slow oven for 20 minutes. Serve with sauce.  
Sauce: Use 1-2 c sugar to 1 c fruit juice, adding cinnamon, spices or orange peel, boil for 5 minutes.

## Eldorado Wool Co. Sells Several Small Clips

The Eldorado Wool Company sold early in the week to F. J. Solis for Wright Bros. of Boston about 18,000 pounds of wool in small clips at prices reported to range from 21 1-2c to 22 1-2c per pound.

The first consignment of R. A. C. C. wool left Eldorado Monday when the local wool-huse shipped for Draper & Company a car-load consigned clip.

A few contracts for wool on the sheeps back were reported made at the close of last week at 21c per pound, the amount of wool involved is not estimated to be over 50,000 pounds.

This well had reached an interesting depth last February and has been trying to get back to bottom ever since.

## National Speaker On Prohibition Here

Sunday night at the Baptist Church the Rev. Van Valkenburg, a national known prohibition speaker, was here in the interest of the prohibition cause and spoke for an hour on the many virtues of the good derived from the 18th amendment and told why it should remain a part of the United States Constitution.

He had financial figures to show that the 18th amendment was one of the greatest assets the government has ever had, and the figures were so plain that any one open to conviction could see the virtues of the law. He plainly showed that the people of the United States owned more homes now than ever in the history of the government, especially among the working class of people.

The speaker made it plain that the drunks would have to come from the young people and wanted the fathers and mothers to say which one would give up their children to the drink habit. He said 25 years ago it was estimated that 90 per cent of the drunks came from children under the age of 16, and that 64 per cent came from those under the age of 21, yet the anties will tell you that children could not get anything to drink under the old laws of open saloons.

The speaker claimed that there had been more accomplished in the 13 years of prohibition than any other like period of time in the history of the world. He urged the people to awake to the situation and avoid a calamity for the nation by voting back liquor in any form, his appeal was strongly to the young voters who have attained their manhood since the old saloons were laid aside. A free will offering was taken at the close of the talk.

The new born babe, a high gift of God, is born into the world pure, but no sooner does he arrive at the age of accountability and mingle with the affairs of men, than he begins to be stained and corrupted.

In his youth he may realize that he is God's messenger—that God has made him the wrapper of a great truth which he is to deliver to mankind and it is his task to deliver it, unsullied to the world. He starts out with a high resolve to be true to his mission, but no sooner does he contact the world, than he discovers immense pressure being brought to bear upon him, to compel him to compromise his message. Unless he has the moral courage, the God sustained stamina of a Martin Luther, or John Bunyan or a John Wesley, he will yield to the pressure, and either give up his mission entirely and turn to the beggerly elements of the world, or so garble his message that it will lose much of its power to help humanity.

The same truth that applies to the man and applies to humanity in general. One hundred and fifty years ago God handed down to our forefathers a wonderful new conception of Government, freed from the stains and corruption that had crept into the governments of the old world. But succeeding generations, thru ignorance and short sighted greed, have made it such a burden to the average citizen, that unless some radical remedy were applied it was rapidly growing ripe for revolution. Indeed, revolution was already started in some parts of our country, notably among the farmers of Iowa. Luckily for us the right man was placed in power in the nick of time, and enough new blood was elected to Congress to over come the reactionaries and apply the remedy. The result is the clouds are beginning to roll away and the rainbow of hope once more spans the sky. We are in process of being born again, that is from above, which is the only means by which things defiled by earthly corruption may be purified.
