ON TEXAS FARMS

It is said that surplus milk has been poured on the ground on many a Palo Pinto county farm this spring, and that perfectly good butter made well-nigh worthless by low prices has been made into soap on some farms. These practices have stopped on 800 farms where the home demonstration agent reports the housewives successfully making cheese out of surplus milk.

Modern sanitary pit toilets costing from \$1.15 to \$3 plus materials out of old houses have been built by farmers in Limestone county in demonstrations supervised by the county agent in cooperation with the State Department of Health.

Good farming often leads to good husbandry. Randall Gartmann, a Coke county 4-H club boy, last year raised 7050 pounds of maize heads per acre on five acres. He fed some of this in combination with other feeds to a beef calf which gained 660 pounds in 256 days at a cost of 2.48 cents per pound of gain.

Cutting beds with tile sub-irrigation systems installed have been made by 15 women and eight 4-H club girls in East land county to provide places where ornamental cuttings may be rooted in quantity for distributing in the county-wide movement to beautify farm yards. The tile were made at a cost of less than one cent per foot by R. F. C. labor.

McLennan county farmers pooled 50,000 pounds of wool and sold late in May to the high bidder for more than 20 cents per pound average, each clip sold on its own merit. Cost of selling through the association, was 10 cents per hundred pounds of wool.

Demonstrations spread because they speak for themselves. Last November H. F. Wagoner of Gonzales county sowed alfalfa. He let livestock graze it during the winter and this spring cut 11-2 tons of line pea-green hay to the acre. When a little field meeting was held the county agent found plenty of volunteer alfalfa demonstrators.

We wish to call your special attention to the recent Allotment Processing Plan as announced by Secretary Wallace of the Agricultural Department of Washington, D. C.

Mr. Wallace has publicly stated that there will be a processing tax collected of from 25 to 30 cts. per bushel on wheat, which will be equal to around \$1.30 to \$1.40 per barrel on flour. All flour in CONSUMER'S HANDS on the effective date will be free from tax, but all OTHER FLOUR, whether in the hands of bakers, wholesale grocers or retail grocers, as well as all pending and future contracts, will be subject to this additional tax with the exception of a small amount that might be allowed as free stock on the date the law becomes effective.

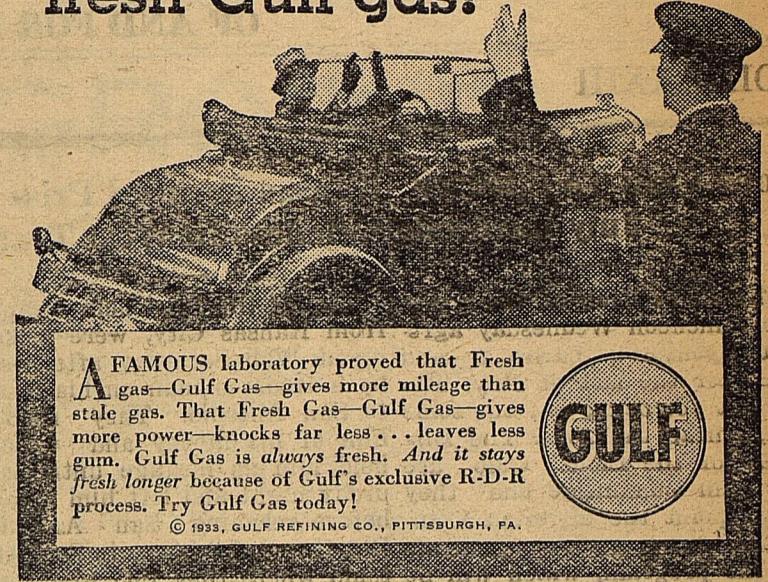

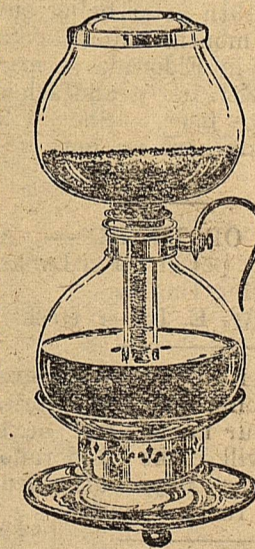

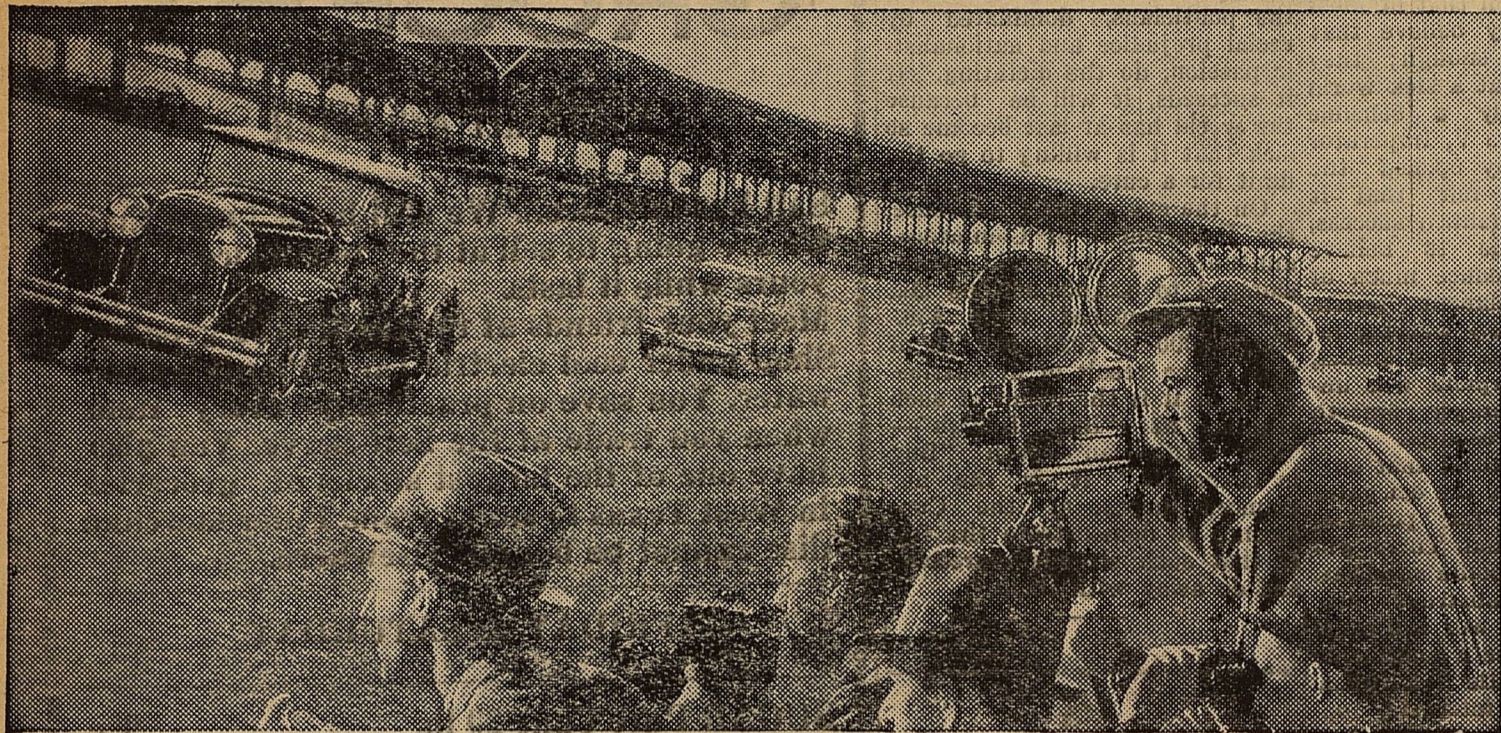

TWO TEXANS APPOINTED TO FOREIGN POSTS

AUSTIN, Texas, June 18.—Contributions to the deficit continue topour into State Democratic headquarters in Austin, despite the absence, in Washington, of Roy Miller, director, and Frank Scofield, financial director of the state organization.

Miller and Scofield are in Washington, where they are presenting to the administration the claims of Texas Democrats for federal appointments. Texas is beginning to receive the reward for party service of

the first rank earned in last fall's campaign, when Texas wrote up the largest majority and contributed the second largest amount of any state to the Democratic National campaign fund.

R. W. Morrison of San Antonio was selected as one of the six members of the American Delegation to the Economic Convention at London. Morrison is recognized as one of the ablest business statesmen in America. Though a resident of Texas, his interests are wide and he has had important commercial dealings in nearly every important country in the world. Other Texans recently honored by the administration is Colonel Alvin M. Owsley, who has been named Minister to Rumania, a highly important diplomatic post in the historic Balkan region that have incubated so many wars.

The selection of Robert G. Caldwell of Rice Institute at Houston, as Minister to Portugal, was also very pleasing to the Texas Democratic organization. A number of other Texans are under consideration for important posts under the administration and they are being supported by Miller and Scofield. Texas has assumed a \$75,000,000 quota for the Democratic National Committee. This is ten percent of the total deficit,

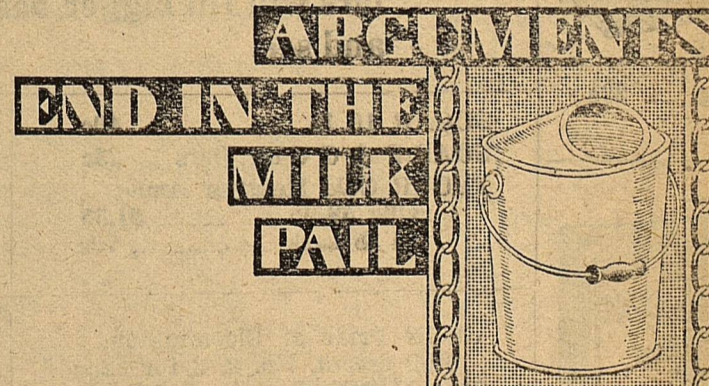

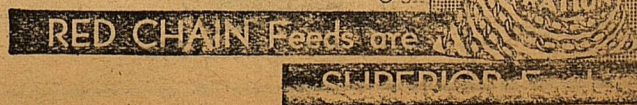

Happenings That Affect the Dinner Pails, Dividend Checks and Tax Bills of Every Individual. National and International Problems Inseparable From Local Welfare.

ECONOMIC HIGHLIGHTS

"If the world is sick enough to have gained any sense, the (Economic) Conference will be a success."

So spoke James Middleton Cox, one of the American delegates, just before sailing. His attitude jibes with that of most observers. They believe that the world is sick enough; they know likewise that a sick world is not necessarily a sensible one. When George V, Emperor and Rex, formally opened the Conference, none felt that it would be an unqualified success, many were unable to believe that it would produce much of definite and permanent worth. There are too many warring interests at play; as in a drama, plots and counterplots will underlie the seemingly smooth tenor of the proceedings.

It is a safe forecast that during its first weeks, the delegates will be sparring for position, testing their ground. There will be a great many polite speeches, pretty gestures, abstruse discussions. The real war will come later. There will be a continuous thinly-veiled battle between various sectional interests, opposed philosophies. As the Conference opens, the world it faces might be described, briefly, in this manner:

A Europe which is closer to war than at any time since 1913—with armed troops patrolling unfriendly borders and looking jealously at alien lands. An increasing spirit of nationalism in many major powers, of which Germany under Hitler is the classic example. In the Far East, a growing spirit of imperialism on the part of the Japanese, which must inevitably cause the Chinese to develop a still greater enmity for all foreigners. Widespread unemployment and industrial debility in every country. Chaotic monetary systems and tottering currency standards. And, in most powers, fear and distrust of the rest of the world.

These matters are not discussed in the Conference's agenda. But they will have much to do with the policies of the delegates, and they will influence the proceedings at every turn. What the agenda does specifically mention for discussion follows: Monetary and credit policy; prices; resumption of movement of capital; restrictions on international trade; tariff and treaty policy;

organization of production and trade.

These are high-sounding labels and the subjects they cover are Greek to ninety per cent of the world's people. But the economist can translate them into terms of jobs, wage scales, living standards. If the Conference collapses, it will be because the politicians, dominated by racial prejudice and nationalistic passion, do the dictating. If it succeeds, it will be because the world has at last become so sick that it is willing to go the limit for a cure.

On the eve of the Conference, the Department of Commerce announced that world trade slumped to \$26,000,000,000 last year, as compared with \$68,000,000,000 in 1929. Not all of this is the result of depression. Much of it is the result of such slogans as "Buy British"—"Buy American"—even "Buy in Homeville." It is the announced purpose of the Conference to demonstrate the folly that such slogans represent, and do away with them.
