Four doubles of lambs went to Boyer Brothers of Fort Worth, Monday from the ranches of Truett Stanford, Ed Reynolds, Ward Parks and Dick Bearce at a price of 8 cents a pound in the wool.

Marion Wade, Schleicher county sheep dealer, spent Monday at Wade Brothers' Irion county ranch. Mr. Wade says that he has cleaned up all of his feeder lambs this year with the sale made Saturday to John Clay.

\$450,000 Federal Appropriation Made For Blowfly Control

A federal appropriation amounting to \$450,000 has been recently obtained largely through the efforts of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association supported by Congressman C. L. South of this district, with which to combat the blow fly in the five states comprising the southwest district, namely: Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, California and Arizona.

Judge J. A. Whitten, chairman of the Texas committee seeking this appropriation, has been working in conjunction with Charlie Cannon and other prominent west Texans including Roy Hudspeth, Dr. Bowden, S. W. Cunningham and Mr. Kidd. Since early in 1935 in an effort to secure this appropriation for blow fly control. It has been conservatively estimated by the committee that the blow fly is responsible for an annual loss to stockmen in this district of more than \$100,000.

Vaccination Required By Northern Feeders

Dr. I. B. Boughton, Chief Veterinarian of the Sonora Experiment Station, according to an article appearing in the March, 15th issue of the Southwestern Sheep & Goat Raiser, in discussing problems of the sheepmen recently in Junction, pointed out that many Northern and Western buyers of Texas lambs insist on vaccination against soremouth. Boughton further pointed out that practically all feed lots are contaminated with sore-mouth virus and all sheep not vaccinated have varying degrees of sore-mouth while on feed which sets them back sometimes for several weeks and results in loss to feeders. Dr. Boughton expressed the opinion that it would not be long before order buyers for feeder lambs would take only those which had been vaccinated.

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EDITORIALS.

It is unfortunate that every 12 year old boy in America isn't in some Boy Scout organization. The community that has a real Boy Scout leader is indeed fortunate.

The only two nations that seem to be spoiling for a fight at the present time are Japan and Italy. How would it do to let these two war hungry nations pick out a good place and fight it out. It might cure both of them.

Thirteen states elect delegates to the presidential convention by primary. The others use the convention system.

The Italian-Ethiopians have equipment on a par with the American Indians' tomahawks and bows and arrows, while Italy is one of the best war equipped nations in the world, it doesn't speak well for the promises of the Duce's legions. When Caesar went after the nations of Europe, he went equipped with the best army equipment the world afforded at that time. His well trained, well armed soldiers fought against soldiers untrained and as defenseless as the Ethio-pians. By serving as his own press agent he was able to sell himself a posterity as a great fighter. What Mussolini needs is more press agents.

Charles H. Trapp, a job printer in Topeka, Kansas, recently died. His death was commented upon by newspapers all over that section of the country. The enterprise of Trapp's that caused his death to be given such wide publicity was a small eight page paper printed on pink paper called the Pink Rag. 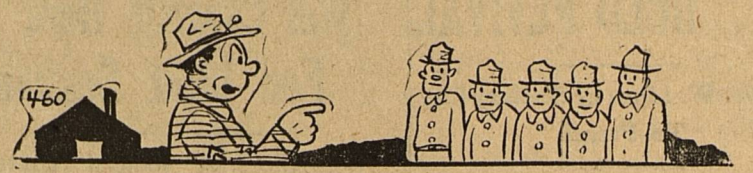

"We was laborin' men," answered one, speaking for both. "Very well, thin, all you educated guys take these here gunnysacks and pick up every scrap of paper around the parade grounds. And the rest of you, who want to learn barberin', you grab these here lawn mowers and cut grass until I tell you to leave off. You two laborin' men kin go back inside the tent and take a nap."

SCALING DOWN FARMER INDEBTEDNESS

The Farm Debt Adjustment division of the Resettlement Administration is doing a fine piece of work. Many loans were made on farms during a period of abnormally high prices, and with the decline in values, accompanied by low prices for farm products, farmers found it impossible to keep up their annual payments, and in many cases allowed interest and taxes to become delinquent. To assist in the saving of these homes, the Farm Debt Adjustment organization has contributed very materially.

In nearly every county the Governor of the State has appointed an adjustment committee of farmers and business men. There is also a State Committee, also appointed by the Governor. These men work without pay. When a farmer becomes hard pressed and fears foreclosure, he may appeal to the county committee, which in turn makes an investigation of his every available resource, and then makes an effort to get debtor and creditor together to talk it over. Frequently, if not always, some way is found either to extend the notes or to make a compromise. Oftentimes the creditor, considering the depreciation in values, accepts a portion of that loss and reduces the amount of the note. Sometimes this reduction is sufficient to enable the farmer to qualify for a loan with the Federal Farm Bank and thus pay the creditor in full.

In the last three and one-half months of 1935, farm debts in the United States of more than \$20,000,000 were cut down by compromise by \$6,000,000, almost one-third. In Texas and Oklahoma, the scale down has not been as great as the National average, amounting only to about 9 per cent during the month of January. This has enabled farmers to pay \$62,500 in back taxes, thus aiding both the counties and the state. These farmers are now refinanced and ready to go ahead to pay their obligations and improve their farms. Cost to the Government was less than seven tenths of 1 per cent of total indebtedness.

YOUR CITY'S FATE MAY HANG ON A THREAD

When a fire breaks out and every car in town, along with hundreds of pedestrians thunder down the street, life and property depend upon how much water and how fast a stream of water can be sent crashing into it's natural enemy — fire. What would happen in Eldorado if in a crisis the firemen lost their buckets?

Just such a situation occurred during the Eldorado conflagration in June 1934. When the fire reached such dimensions that the local bucket brigade could not cope with it, a plea for aid was sent to Sonora and San Angelo. These cities rushed fire companies with fire trucks to the aid of Eldorado. But when they arrived it was impossible to fill the tanks on the trucks. So they were forced to stand idly by after the first tank of water had been used, while the city burned.

The fight for adequate fire fighting equipment was started long before the writer came to Eldorado. Now we think that there should be something done at once.

This public-spirited job should be accomplished. No one knows how many lives and how much property will be spared if properly protected against fire.

If some long tongued gossip would attempt to spread the poison about some of the heathen that they do about their Christian brothers and sisters, there would be some right up to now funerals in the tribe in short order.

SUPPORT LIONS CLUB

A Lions Club has nothing to offer a community but service and leadership. The service that it may give depends largely upon its financial condition. If the income is small and uncertain many activities are made impossible, or if undertaken may be only partly completed. Where there is financial stringency and incapacity to render service, leadership is liable to be lacking, or halting and hesitant.

A Lions Club or any other organization which offers an opportunity for cooperation, will serve only in the measure which is made possible by the membership. If they give wholeheartedly of money, thought and time nothing can prevent such an organization of being a potent factor in community development and progress. But if little money, thought and time are given, the service may not be expected to be satisfactory and critics spring up like mushrooms.

SALES TAX NETS \$77,333,555

The sales tax in Illinois has raised \$77,333,555 in two years. It replaces all state property taxes on homes often as much as 25 per cent, pays all expenses of state government. One-fifth of the Illinois sales tax or \$15,958,334 goes to elementary Schools. As the result of the sales tax many people now on a salary, and who live well but pay no taxes, are called on for a fair share of taxes. Those who spend pay in proportion as they spend.

GOVERNMENT ELECTRICITY

We note that the Supreme Court has ruled that the government has a right to make and sell electricity. When the government gets to supplying all the electricity, the fun will come when a consumer thinks his light bill is too high. There will be no one to protest to. ELDORADO SUCCESS

Allred Seeks Way Assist Ex-cons

Governor Allred has taken a long step forward in the field of humanitarianism in the establishment of parole boards throughout the state.

The meeting Saturday at Austin, when 200 members of these boards met to plan their work, was an inspiring occasion.

As the governor pointed out, too often the history of our handling of convicts has followed this vicious circle: Crime to detection to punishment to parole to discouragement and back to crime again.

Now, when the convict is paroled, he is to find helping hands when he comes out of the prison walls, hands that will be extended to make a new life possible, without the brand of "exconvict" closing every door to him and leading him straight back to evil associates.

The new parole boards, which already have been organized in more than 140 counties, including a fine group for Harris county, have been chosen on the nomination of the service clubs of their communities, and do not represent "political" appointments. The members are serving without pay, giving freely of valuable time, for in each case the members are substantial citizens with work of their own to do.

They will undertake to be a brother's keeper, indeed, to the paroled men as they come out. They will familiarize themselves with the cases and histories of the men released, will try to find jobs for them, will exert every effort to see that they are received back into society and given a chance to make good.

Naturally, the system will not be perfect. There are many who believe that really effective results will have to wait on the time when we have trained, salaried probation officers to undertake this work. In other cases, even the best intentioned men will make mistakes, and, of course, there is the possibility that some boards will tire of their work when the novelty wears off.

But the state has not provided the means for expert probation supervision, and this voluntary effort puts Texas well forward on a new step in its dealing with the problem of criminal rehabilitation.

It is a tribute to the character of Texas citizenry that so many men are willing to undertake this task and a hopeful sign for the future.

That reformation is more important than punishment, in the handling of the criminal class, is generally admitted. Reformation, however, is unlikely unless the soil is prepared for real opportunity for the paroled man to resume his part in the world around him.

Many problems are involved, not the least of which is to find work in a world in which there are more humans than there are jobs, but the governor, in making these appointments and inaugurating this work, has assured Texas of an honest effort to tackle the problem in manly

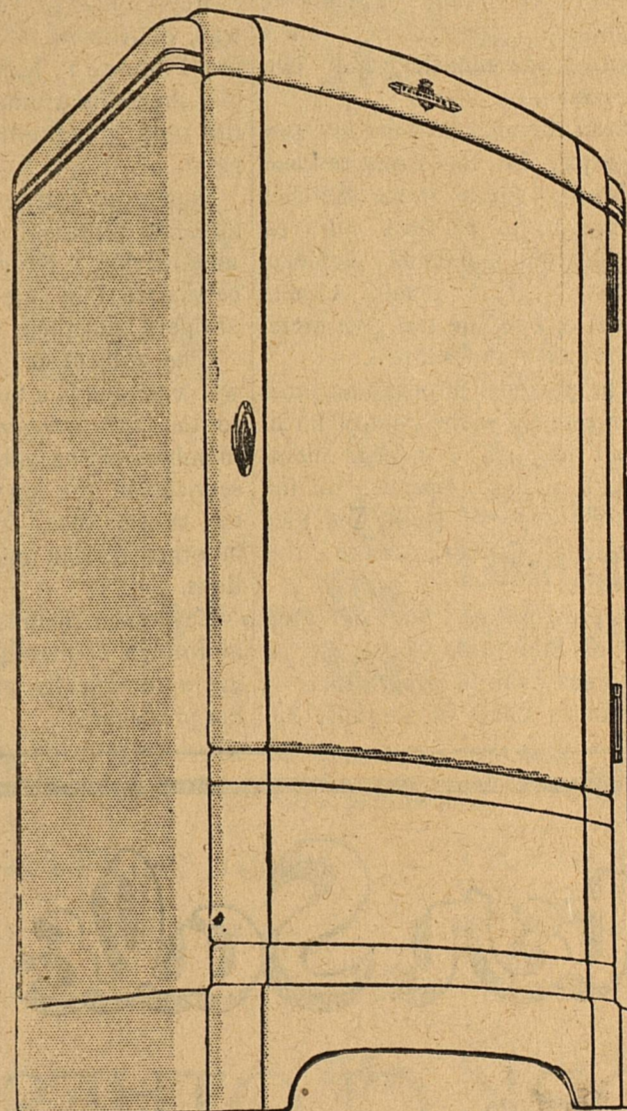

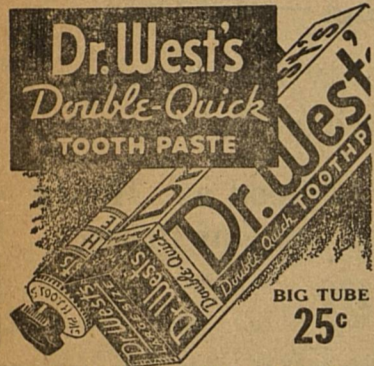

C.L. South As Lawyer Among Ruling Gentry In National Congress

Congressman C. L. South of this district is among the ruling profession making up the national congress, for two-thirds of all senators and representatives are lawyers, and an equal proportion has attended college. The congress is more nearly representative of the lawyers than of any other profession, according to the congressional directory which shows the body to be not justly apportioned among the various occupational groups in the population. Next to law, agriculture has the best representation there, affording a grain of comfort perhaps to West Texas farm and ranch interests.

Nearly 100 members relate that at one time or another they have engaged in some type of agricultural occupation.

Fifty-five members have engaged in the publishing business or have written for publication. More than 40 have engaged in the teaching profession.

Doctors and Dentists

A competent medical staff might be organized from the two houses. There are at least five physicians, as well as a pharmacist and several dentists.

There are six manufacturers, two members of the theatrical profession, several bankers, a number of utility executives, engineers, contractors, merchants, one minister, and two hotel men.

Each member submits his own biography for the Congressional Directory. Some of the sketches require 20 to 25 lines of type and list the individual achievements in great detail. Others consist of one line and give merely the name and address.

The personal information most often omitted is the date of birth. About one-fifth of the 531 members, including Speaker of the House Joseph W. Byrns and Vice President Garner, make this omission.

Representative Schuyler Merritt, of Stamford, Conn., 82, is the oldest man in congress.

Senator Glass of Virginia, 78,

and Senator Fletcher of Florida, 77, are the two oldest men in the senate.

Service Record

"The dean of congress" is Senator Sheppard of Texas. He has had the longest continuous term of any member, having served since 1902 when he was elected to the house to fill the unexpired term of his father.

Representative Joseph P. Monaghan, of Montana, who will be 30 in March, is the youngest man in congress who reports his age in the Directory.

Senator Rush D. Holt of West Virginia, who had to wait to assume office until last June when he became 30, is the youngest senator.

Nearly two-thirds of the members are married. But a large number of prominent members, including Senator McKellar of Tennessee, Senator Walsh of Massachusetts and Representatives Mitchell and Cooper of Tennessee are bachelors.

The Family Man

Senator Vic Donahey of Ohio has the largest family of any senator. He has 10 children and in his biographical sketch he gives their names and addresses as well as the names and addresses of his grandchildren.

Representative Isabella Greenway, of Arizona, and Representative Florence P. Kahn, of California, share the distinction of being the only grandmothers in congress.

Numerous fraternal organizations are represented in congress' membership. Nearly 40 members state they are Masons or Shriners, and there are 29 Elks.

The subject of pensions for war veterans is a personal matter to the 113 members who were members of the military or naval services in the war with Spain, the World War, or who served in other foreign military expeditions.

Seventeen members were born in foreign countries, thereby being automatically excluded from the presidency.

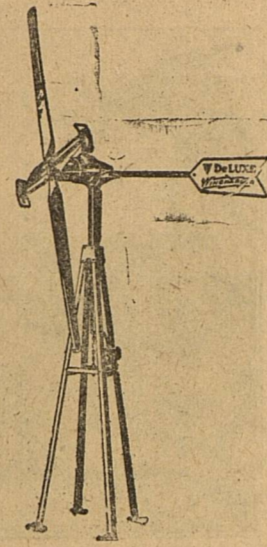

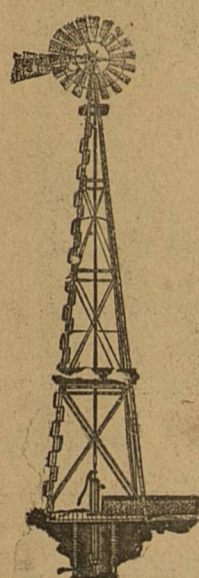

EARLY HOT BED GROWS LEAFY VEGETABLES

To serve the purpose of a hot bed early in the season, and to keep a leafy vegetable growing the year around, a vegetable bed about 3 feet by 6 feet was made by Nell Edmiston, cooperator in the Eldorado 4-H Club.

A frame of old lumber was made for the bed with one side extending a foot above the ground and sloping toward the front to 6 inches above the ground. A screened cover was hinged to the back side of the frame, and hooks provided for fastening to the front of the bed. This cover is to keep out birds and other marauders, and also to support a canvas cover in cold weather.

The dirt in the bed was dug out to a depth of one foot, and filled in with rich soil from the barnyards. Concrete tiling for sub-irrigation was laid down the center of the bed to a depth of 10 inches from the surface of the soil.

Nell is using the bed to grow peppers and tomatoes, but when these plants are moved to the family garden, she plans to keep a leafy vegetable in the bed.

PRINTERS INK PROTECT CLOTHES FROM MOTHS

"For the garments which need to be folded and packed away for another season, newspapers make an excellent wrapping against moths. There is some ingredient in printer's ink very distasteful to moths," said Miss Lora Farnsworth, county home demonstration agent, to the Reynolds Home Demonstration Club, in a meeting at the home of Mrs. Otto Sauer, March 25th.

Miss Farnsworth talked on "Adequate Storage for Family Clothing," displaying a miniature clothes closet and discussing the essential features. The organization of drawer space in clothes storage was also emphasized.

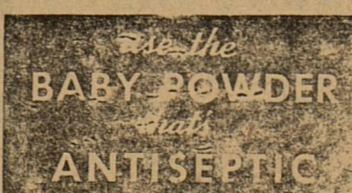
Soap making was discussed by the club and a demonstration on soap making was given by Miss Farnsworth.

Bruton, home food supply demonstrator in the Reynolds Home Demonstration Club, stretches two strings side by side taping stakes along to hold the string stakes along to hold the strings off the ground, she punches holes in the caps of fruit jar lids and ties them along on the string, so that a lid on one string is even with a lid on the other string. These lids knock together and serve as little bells, thus scaring the birds away.

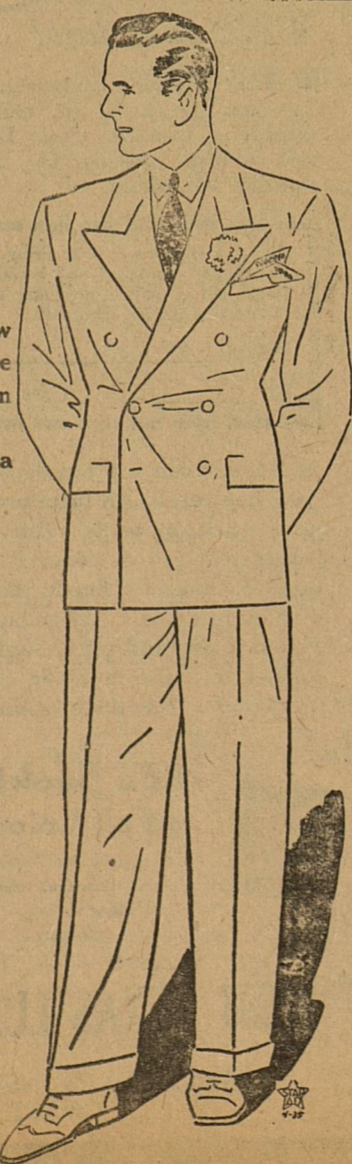

The association voted to purchase six shrubs for the new grade school building. Mrs. Williams appointed Mrs. E. C. Hill, Mrs. Mary D. Adrian, and J. Carlton Smith as a committee to select and purchase the shrubs.

Cooking Hints For Appetizing Menus Aid To Housewives

During Lent the search for meatless meals invariably brings us to the question of fish. And today the fish filets make it easy to solve the problems. The fish are taken in salt water and immediately cleaned, boned, usually skinned, wrapped, packed and sealed for delivery to all merchants. They may be purchased inland as fresh as from the ocean; for they are frosted at a very low temperature. This solidifies them immediately and retains the cell structure. It may be cooked immediately without "defrosting."

Breakfast: Prune juice, oatmeal, toast, marmalade, milk, coffee.

Luncheon: Vegetable soup, Boston baked beans, apple-celery salad, brown bread, milk, cookies.

Dinner: Broiled Filets of Haddock, Duchess potatoes, buttered peas, quartered tomatoes, hot rolls, orange sherbet.

Breakfast: Stemmed brown rice with apple sauce and cream, toast, milk, coffee.

Luncheon: Baked salmon, stuffed tomatoes, spinach ring, fresh cucumbers, bread and butter, stewed rhubarb.

Dinner: Tomato juice, creamed chicken, buttered cauliflower, glazed carrots, radishes, hot rolls, caramel custard pie.

RECIPES

Broiled Filets of Haddock: Brush the filets with lemon juice and sprinkle with salt. Arrange on a hot oiled plank or heavy skillet. Place under the broiler-flame in an oven which has been preheated to 450 F. Broil for about 15 minutes. If served on the plank, surround with Duchess potatoes. These are made by adding beaten egg to mash potatoes.

Baked Salmon: 1 No. 2 can Salmon, 1 cup mildly sour cream lemon juice. Turn canned salmon into baking dish. Sprinkle with the lemon juice. Pour over it one cup or more of good sour cream. Bake in a moderate oven (325-350 F.) until the cream reduces and gets spotted with brown.

Stuffed Tomatoes: 6 medium tomatoes, 1 cup bread crumbs, 1 small onion, 2 T. butter. Brown crumbs and chopped onion slightly in butter. Remove centers of ripe tomatoes and fill with crumbs. Place in large muffin rings to hold their shape, and

Emergency Feed Loans Available In Few Days

Emergency crop and feed loans for the year 1936, as authorized by the President's Executive Order of February 28, will be available within the next few days, Governor W. I. Myers of the Farm Credit Administration stated here today. Regulations governing the loans have been issued.

Governor Myers said the loans will be made through the same channels used in previous years. Farmers eligible may obtain applications from the field supervisors or the local emergency crop loan committees already operating in most counties.

He said the loans will be limited to the minimum amount necessary to meet the immediate and actual cash of farmers who are unable to obtain credit from any other source, and in no instance exceed \$200 to one farmer. Applicants who can get credit from any other source, including a production credit association, will not be eligible for emergency loans, he explained.

Loans will be made for the production, planting, cultivating, and harvesting of crops, for summer fallowing, for supplies where they are necessary for production of 1936 crops, or to produce necessary feed for livestock.

According to the Governor's statement, preference will be given to applications of farmers whose cash requirements are small, and no loans may be made for purchasing livestock or machinery or for payment of rents, debts or taxes.

SOCIAL SECURITY SOMEWHERE AHEAD

Few theories of government have received the measure of support that is being accorded the Townsend Old Age Pension plan. The reason that an idea so utopian should receive such general acceptance is due largely to the fact that it was presented to the country just at the time that it was. There has never been a time in the history of the country when people, especially those nearing the sixty mark, have felt less secure of their future than they do today. Many of them have seen the saving of a life time swept in a brief space of time in spite of everything they can do. This has occurred in many cases where the best judgment approved by years of successful practice was followed. That the plan may not be feasible is not the concern of the average individual. He accepts the statement of its author for this, and lets it go at that. The point is, that it offers the only thing that seems available in the way of old age protection, and he grasps it as a drowning man a straw, and trusts to luck that its details may be soundly worked out by wiser heads. The conviction of most conservative thinkers is that some such plan is inevitable in the not far distant future, but the most liberal of these do not hope for incomes on quite so generous a scale.

I've often wondered if the heathen people and the savages gossip about each other as the so called Christian people do. I am inclined to think they don't.

Just why the rest of the world should be concerned I cannot see. Nearly every country of any consequence has reached out at some time or another and taken a slice of some other country.

The loans will bear interest at the rate of 5 1-2 per cent a year and be secured by a first lien, or agreement to give a first lien, on all crops financed in whole or part with the proceeds of the emergency loan. Where loans are made for the production of feed for livestock, they will be secured by a first lien on the livestock to be fed.

Where farmers applying for emergency loans are the tenants of a private landowner or concern, the maximum amount of loans to the tenants of one landowner in one county may not exceed \$500. The maximum amount of loans to members of one household who are occupants of the same farm is \$200.

All disbursements will be made from the original Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Offices located at Springfield, Mass., Baltimore, Columbia, S. C., Memphis, Dallas, St. Louis, St. Paul, Omaha, Wichita, Salt Lake City, and Spokane.

PEACE IS NOT YET A DEFINITE POSSIBILITY

The efforts on the part of the League of Nations to force Italy to abandon her war by the application of sensations and economic isolation have demonstrated that while peace could probably be indefinitely maintained in the world today through the influence of such a policy its strict application is not yet a possibility. The entangling alliances and secret and other treaties form a maze of complications through which the League has not yet been able to chart its course. It furnishes a ray of encouragement however, to those interested in world peace in that it is evident to the effect that world peace is a possibility and can be enforced if all nations concerned come into the meeting with clean hands and high motives. The recognition of this fact is a wholesome and helpful step toward world peace in that it publishes to the citizens of the several nations that peace is possible if the leadership of the world is willing to do the thing necessary to bring it about. Once let this fact strike deeply home and the rank and file of the men and women of the country will make its demands too definite and insistent to be ignored.

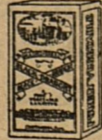
NO MORE FREE SEED

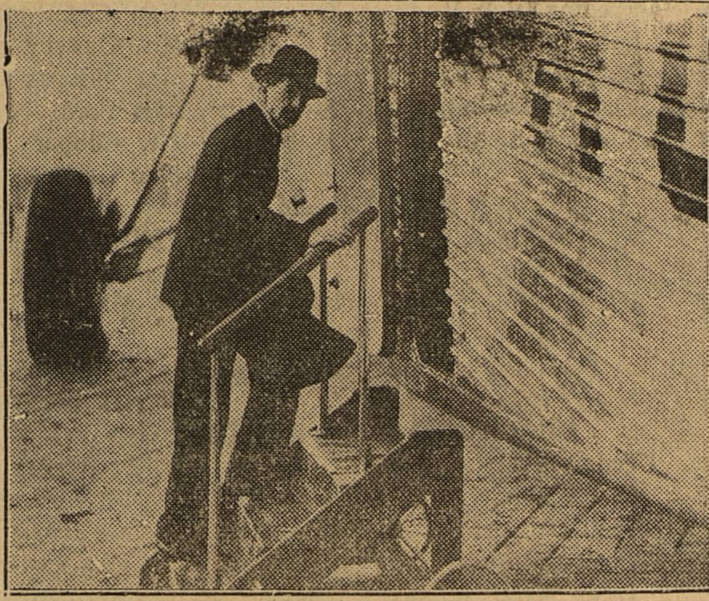

WHAT WE THINK

I note that President Roosevelt in seeking new sources of revenue offers the suggestion to Congress that the surplus earnings of corporations that are not distributed as dividends be taxed about 35 per cent and that the exemption now permitted on income received in the shape of dividends by a stock holder in a corporation be done away with.

The purpose in legislation of this kind is to get the money out into circulation.

If such a law had been in effect during and after the war this country would have paid the war debt and the soldiers bonus long ago.

Instead, at the close of the war, income taxes of those who had made large profits from the war were not only radically reduced but income taxes that had already been paid were returned.

An example of the large incomes earned during that period is found in the Duponts. From 1915 to 1918 this corporation paid \$140,000,000 in dividends and had left \$95,000,000 in surplus.

The new tax proposal, if it had been in force at that time, would not only have made the \$140,000,000 subject to income tax but the \$95,000,000 surplus would have been assessed 35 per cent.

As may be expected the proposal will be received with a great deal of objection on the part of the Liberty League and the corporation interested portion of the country.

Being only a farmer and not supposed to know much about finances involving such big figures, I am not qualified to speak with finality regarding the merits of the new proposal. All I have to say is that it would get the big money into circulation.

SAFETY SLOGANS

More people have been killed by automobiles in the past 15 years in America than were killed in all the wars in which America participated in 159 years, from 1776 to 1935. Drive carefully.

If you have an accident, stop, get the names of all the witnesses and give your name and address to the injured person.

If you chill thru and thru you may catch cold no matter how many heavy clothes you have on. Be guided by how you feel—not how you are dressed.

It will also have this effect as I see it.

The big money of the country isn't going to take it lying down as they say. It is going to fight and fight hard.

It may not get the job done at the next election but it will endeavor to the best of its ability to get the law changed, if it becomes a law, by the election of men to Congress and the Presidency who have a different theory of taxation.

The proposal by President Roosevelt to me is the most surprising thing that has been done in an administration that has been full of surprises.

He virtually throws the gauntlet down to the money power of this country and on the eve of election challenges it to battle.

It indicates to me a very high type of moral courage or a complete disregard of his political future and maybe both.

It must have given the party leadership, who especially just before election weigh every act to determine its vote getting possibilities, a terrible headache.

It is going to be interesting to watch the outcome of this particular suggestion of the President's and its effect in the campaign.

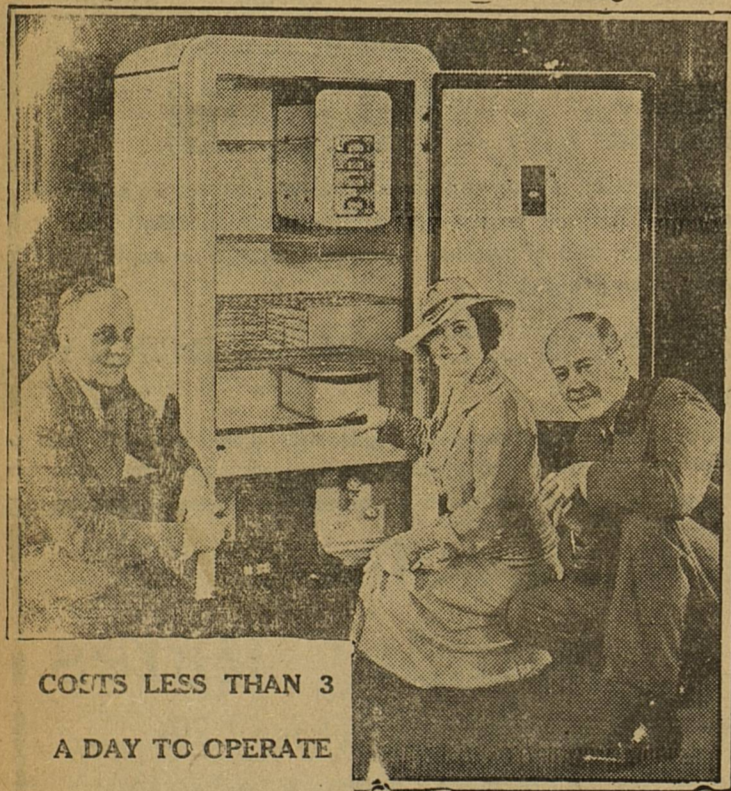
