Eldorado Wool Company Sells Long Wool Around 27c

The Eldorado Wool Company sold late last week to A. W. Hillard & Sons, represented by Tom Ritchey of Lampasas, Texas, between 90,000 and 100,000 pounds of twelve months wool, and to J. M. Lea several small clips of short wool. The price on the long wool is reported to average 27c per pound.

The local warehouse has on hand 65,000 pounds of long wool.

The Eldorado Wool Company has handled this season around a million and a half pounds of wool which has been a great asset to our ranchmen and the business interest of our city. It is something that has been needed in our County for a long time.

BEER IN THE NATION'S CAPITOL

The recent Congress passed a law legalizing the sale of beer in the District of Columbia and threw around its sale practically no restraints. That body of men appeared to be under the domination of the some interests, liquor interests, that were so roundly and specifically condemned by a committee of the U. S. Senate in the early days of the World War. The Congress even permitted its sale under the white dome of the capitol building in which every citizen has the pride of ownership—liquor was banished from the capitol building long before the Eighteenth Amendment was ever heard of. Under alien domination that Congress treated the Constitution as a scrap of paper and applauded while alien feet were wiped on the flag of the United States.

What has been the result? Has it reduced drunkenness like they said it would?

The Washington Times a wet Hearst newspaper of June 19th answers as follows: "Station houses and the Police Court of the District of Columbia were jammed today when a new all time record for arrests was rolled up over the week-end.

More than 500 Washington citizens—525 to be exact—found themselves in custody. Of this number 211 were charged with drunkenness. The records show that for the 24 hours ending at 8 o'clock this morning 84 persons were locked up for imbibing too much, while for the previous period 127 who had drunk not wisely but too well landed in 'durance vile.

When police court opened to day 257 persons were arraigned on various charges, the majority being intoxication. This sets an all time record for the number of arraignments...."

In the same week, the Washington Post carried the headline: "Sergeant-at-Arms of House Accused of Being Disorderly and Drunk," followed by this statement: "Sergeant-at-Arms of the House of Representatives Kenneth Romney was arrested last night on two charges, drunkenness and disorderly conduct, as the result of an alleged disorder in the Pennsylvania Hotel." The Southwestern Advocate.

The above clipping came out of the Southwestern Advocate published last week. It reads as if the drinking of beer since the repeal of the beverage in Washington was growing considerable worse since it has been legalized, yet some people believe or pretend that they believe that it will become better. The above was taken from a wet Washington paper and evidently is not overestimated. The Success presents it from the Southwestern Christian Advocate. There is no defense for the liquor traffic and when a man or any set of men want to place it on the public by legalizing it by law, just for the pauper dollar that they say it will put in the treasury, is deceiving himself for it makes only one person money that is the man that sells it or manufactures it. Then we should not debauch our National life for the money, which is the root of all evil. The liquor traffic is bad enough when it is outlawed and when it can come back with the defense of the Nation it will be as of old trying to take charge of every political office in existence. August 26th will be the testing time for many. Will you bow to the will of liquor or will you stand by the manly principles that your mothers taught?

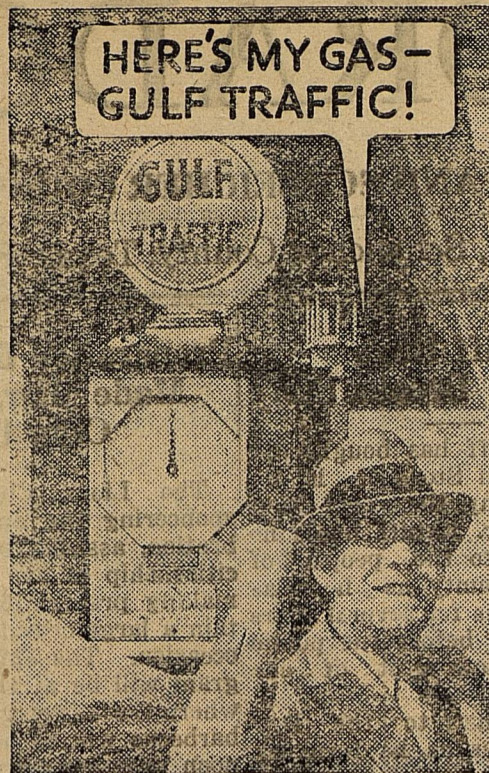

It is so easy for the wets to dodge the facts in their effort to raise the moral standard of this country. Have you noticed that they never give you an invitation to their prayer meeting?

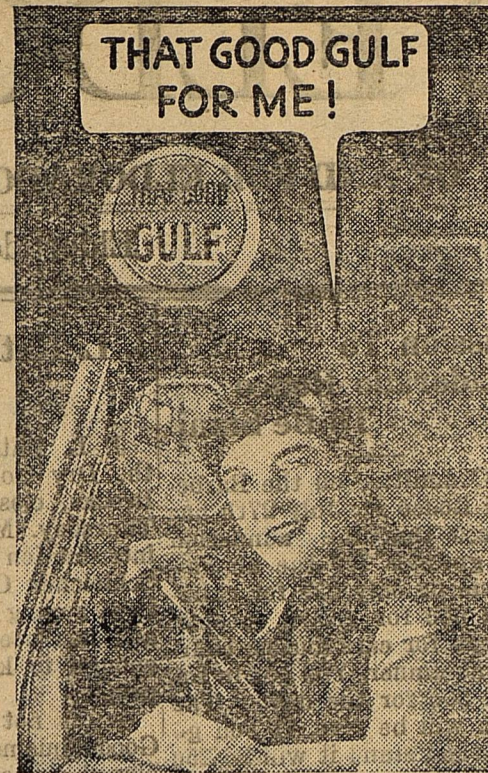

THE PRICE OF BUSINESS SPEED

Banking Institute Speaker Says That Bank Failures Followed Business Failures

CHICAGO, Ill.—Many appear to think that failures occur only to banks, but the complete story of business shows that failures of American banks have followed the failure of business enterprises, and have not been a cause of those failures, Dr. Harold Stonier, National Education Director of the American Bankers Association, declared in a recent address here before the American Institute of Banking.

"It is true that we have had more failures in our banks than in the banks of a number of other countries," he said. "It is also true that we have had more failures in drug stores, grocery stores, railroads, and in every other type of business enterprise. At the same time, it must be said that we still have left after all our failures, more drug stores, more grocery stores, more railroads, and more banks than any other country."

People do not realize, he said, that we have in excess of 108 banks which have been in existence over a century and we have more than 2,000 banks which have been in existence over 50 years.

"In other words, we have more banks over 100 years of age than any other country—we have more banks over 50 years of age than any country in the world," he declared. "The American banking system has not fallen down—it is not in danger of decay. Such failures as it has experienced are due to the price we pay for too rapid development of business enterprises, but that is the American spirit."

U. S. GOVERNMENT GREATEST BANKER

Runs Fifty-two Financing Institutions With Investment of Two Billion Dollars—Thirty-nine Agricultural

AMERICA'S biggest banker today is the Federal Government, which is now operating fifty-two financing institutions, says Professor John Hanna of Columbia University in the American Bankers Association Journal.

"Forty of these are owned entirely by the Government," he says. "In twelve more the Government has already a two-thirds interest. Thirty-seven are intended to be permanent. Twenty-five of the permanent ones and fourteen of the temporary ones are agricultural."

"The capital stock held by the United States in these banks has a par value of \$1,380,000,000. The Government's total investment is nearly \$2,000,000,000. Resources of these institutions exceed \$3,000,000,000. In addition the Government has detailed supervision over fifty-one mortgage banks, operating under Federal charter."

"The Government also supervises 4,600 local agricultural loan associations with Federal charters. All this takes no account of the relations of the Government to the twelve Federal Reserve banks, nor of the authority recently given to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation to buy preferred stock in national and state commercial banks."

The President has ordered the consolidation of the agricultural credit agencies into the new Farm Credit Administration, says Professor Hanna. He expresses the opinion that before the consolidation of the agricultural financing agencies too much machinery had been created to administer the financing institutions which the Government either owns or supervises.

"Existing institutions represent a considerable differentiation of function and any consolidations should be preceded by a careful survey of the actual activities of the various institutions," he continues. "The only consolidation the Administration has announced is that of the agricultural credit agencies in the Farm Credit Administration. As a permanent solution this arrangement is too closely bound up with politics."

"A better scheme would be to create a finance corporation under Federal charter to take over either the agricultural finance activities of the Government or all its lending agencies."

"The Government's financing and banking activities should be kept severely apart from subsidy and other schemes for raising the prices of farm products. One is business, the other is major political policy. The advantages of the corporation over bureau control for the business functions are real and significant."

Railroad Legislation

A RECENT state legislative bill provided that a track man carrying a bell by day and a lantern by night should lead all railroad trains across grade crossings; that conductors must smile when answering questions; that it would be a misdemeanor to serve eggs more than one day old on pullman cars; that trains be required to stop at any time when flagged by hitch-hikers, and that trains crossing rivers wider than twenty-five feet be equipped with lifeboats and life preservers. This one did not pass.

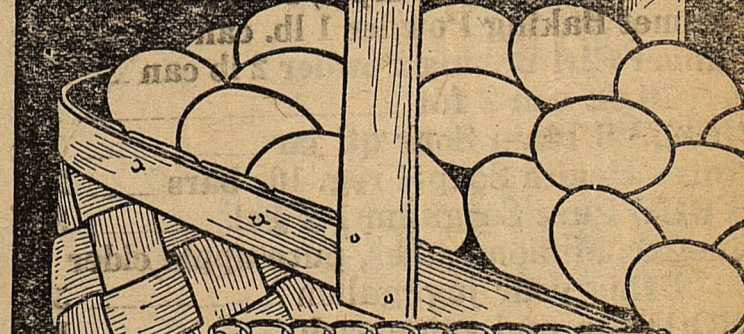
