## 33% Saving Bond Goal Reached

In releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman Floyd F. Watson, announced today that sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Gray County during March totaled \$43,054. Sales for the first quarter of 1974 were \$157,947 for 33% of the yearly goal of \$475,000.

Sales in Texas amounted to \$19,563,901 during the month while sales for the first three months totaled \$61,244,066 with 26% of the \$236.8 Mil. goal achieved.

## F. B. L. A. Sponsors Jubilee Saturday

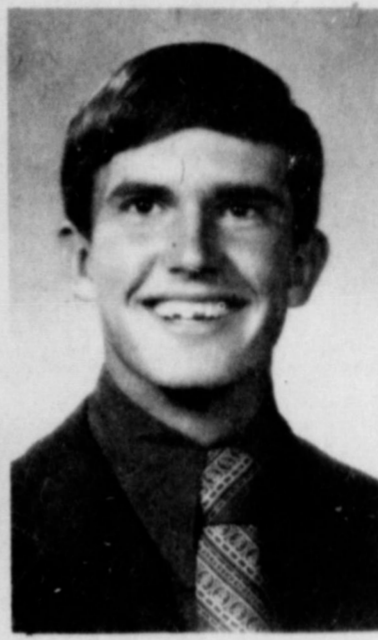

Area Voters turned out in large numbers to cast their vote in the Democratic primary on Saturday.

In the local part of the ballot Mary Hess Dwyer received 235 votes while Ted Simmons received 195 for the county commissioners race for precinct 4. They will be involved in a run-off election on June 1. Others in that race were John Guill 45 votes and Britt Hathaway 54 votes.

Earnest Beck, who was unopposed for the J.P. office received 392 votes. Phil Cates, who running unopposed for the Representative office received 407 votes.

For County Clerk, Wanda Carter received 334 votes. Grainger McIlhany received 391 votes for district judge.

Helen Sprinkle got 385 votes for District clerk.

Don Cain got 369 votes for county judge.

In the Congressman race Hightower got 323, Ruffin 92, Finney 65.

For Governor: Posey 26, Alexander 28, Briscoe 354 and Farenhold 91.

Hobby received 363 votes for Lt. Governor. For Attorney General: Hill got 361.

Voters turned down the referendum concerning horse racing 229 against and 203 for it.

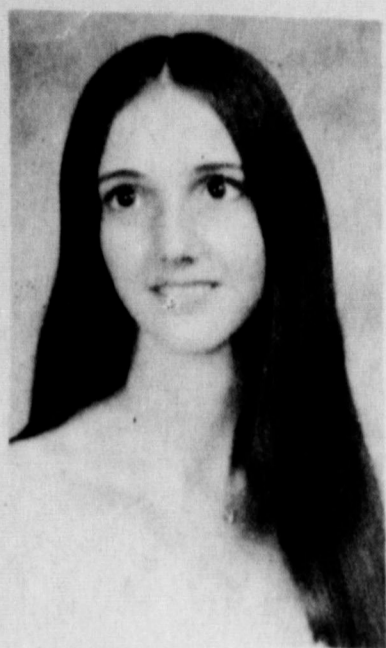

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### NEWS and VIEWS

It is important today, with so many products on the market, that homemakers learn to read labels and buy wisely. To buy intelligently, today's shopper must understand the numerous terms relating to grocery products.

Many food stuffs come in several different forms - often with quite a difference in costs. One example is oatmeal - a dehydrated cereal that comes "regular," "minute" and "instant." It takes five minutes to prepare regular oatmeal, 60 seconds to cook minute oatmeal and only the time needed to heat water to prepare instant oatmeal.

"Regular" and "minute" varieties in the familiar round box costs the same. The savings in cooking time is approximately four minutes.

Instant oatmeal, however, is packaged individually with eight servings to a box - and costs several cents more than the medium-sized round box which contains some 20 servings.

Consumers "buy time" when purchasing convenience foods. If the difference is great between the amount of time it takes to prepare the regular item and the convenience item, we may be making a wise choice. If the two items and the convenience item, we may be making a wise choice. If the two items are close together in preparation time, we need to take another look at our purchase.

Many convenience items are worth their cost in certain situations. Some - such as instant coffee - costs less per serving than the regular variety.

Often we pay for more for convenience than our time is worth. Read the labels and compare - know what you are paying for.

### THE THREE-FOLD TEST FOR RIGHT WORSHIP

Jesus gave three requisites for right worship in John 4:24: "God is a Spirit; and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth." According to this passage worship to be right MUST, (1) have the right object--God; (2) be rendered in the right attitude--in spirit; and (3) be done according to the right standard--in truth.

1. THE RIGHT OBJECT--GOD. We are forbidden to worship the (sainted) dead, a supposed earthly potentate, Mary the mother of Jesus, Peter or any earthly animate or inanimate object. "It is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and Him ONLY shalt thou serve." (Matt. 4:10)

2. THE RIGHT ATTITUDE--IN SPIRIT. God, the object of our worship, is a Spirit, and our worship must be commensurate with the object; hence, in spirit. Unless we have the right attitude when we worship, we will only be calling words when we sing and pray and be going through a vain, empty and profitless form as we engage in each of the items of worship. Let us take heed lest while we worship, we draw nigh to God with our lips while our hearts are far removed from Him! (Matt. 15:8)

3. THE RIGHT STANDARD--IN TRUTH. God's word is the truth, (John 17:17) hence, to worship in truth, our worship must be based upon the Word of God. Otherwise, it will be vain, being according to the doctrines and commandments of men (Matt. 15:9). Our worship is to be rendered in the name of Christ; that is, by His authority. (Col. 3:17) God's Word authorizes five items of worship: (1) singing, Eph. 5:19; (2) praying, 1 Cor. 14:15; (3) Teaching, Acts 2:43; (4) the Lord's Supper, Acts 20:7; and (5) giving of our means, 1 Cor. 16:2.

Anything added to that which God has authorized, or taken away, leaves the person that commits such in a fearful state: "Whosoever goeth onward and abideth not in the teaching of Christ; hath not God; he that abideth in the teaching, the same hath both the Father and the Son." (2 John 9 ASV)

AUSTIN, Tex. — New federal revenue sharing funds totalling \$294,045,044 will be distributed to state, county and city governments in Texas during the next fiscal year.

This is \$9 million more than allocations for the current year which amount to \$285,228,345 for all units of government in the state.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe reported state government will get nearly \$3 million more for the 1974-75 fiscal period beginning July 1 than the 1973-74 allotment.

State government's cut is \$98,081,488 compared with \$95,283,690 for this year.

An overpayment of \$108,711, due to an Office of Revenue Sharing mistake in Washington, will be deducted from next year's funds sent to Texas.

The allocation is based on a formula including consideration of population, per capita income and tax effort.

Under next year's formula, hospital district taxes will be considered in the total county tax effort. Hospital taxes previously had been considered a city tax effort.

Six Texas counties will get larger revenue sharing allotments while some cities within the counties will get smaller amounts.

Harris County, which now receives \$6.87 million, will get \$9.65 million for 1974-75. Houston will receive slightly less — \$17,366,689 as compared with \$18 million under current formulas.

The Dallas County total will increase from \$3.58 million to \$5.2 million. Nueces County's share will increase from \$1.7 million to \$2.3 million, Bexar County's from \$2.6 million to \$5.2 million, El Paso County's from \$1.2 to \$1.9 million and Tarrant County from \$1.8 million to \$3.25 million.

The city of Dallas will get slightly less — \$13.1 million, as compared with \$13.6 million. Corpus Christi's total will decline from \$3.66 million to \$3.4 million, San Antonio's from \$9.6 million to \$9.3 million, El Paso's from \$6.1 million to \$6 million and Fort Worth's from \$5.26 million to \$5 million.

**DROUTH DECLARATION SOUGHT** — Governor Briscoe has requested U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Earl L. Butz to declare Coleman County a disaster area as a result of drowth conditions in the county.

Briscoe requested the disaster declaration provide low interest loans and other assistance to farmers and businesses that suffered wheat crop losses from the drowth.

The Governor informed Secretary Butz a number of other Texas counties have been affected by prolonged dry weather and high winds and similar requests for supplementary Federal assistance may be received from other county officials in the near future.

State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said estimates of wheat losses due to drowth conditions in 47 Texas counties run about \$160 million.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — Under most circumstances submission by State Welfare agencies of basic information concerning the identity of welfare recipients to a centralized computer does not violate any Federal or State common law statutory or constitutional right of privilege, Atty. Gen. John Hill has ruled.

In an opinion requested by Governor Briscoe, Attorney General Hill noted there would be no public disclosure of the information, hence no violation of law. The Governor had noted that the centralized computer list would eliminate the need for welfare recipients to fill out applications.

Hill also issued an opinion saying it is a legitimate expenditure of campaign funds for "publicity" purposes to furnish transportation to members of the press to accompany a candidate on campaign travels.

"If paying for the transportation of newsmen is a means of securing publicity, and we think it is, then we cannot say that it is an unreasonable one," Hill said in his opinion.

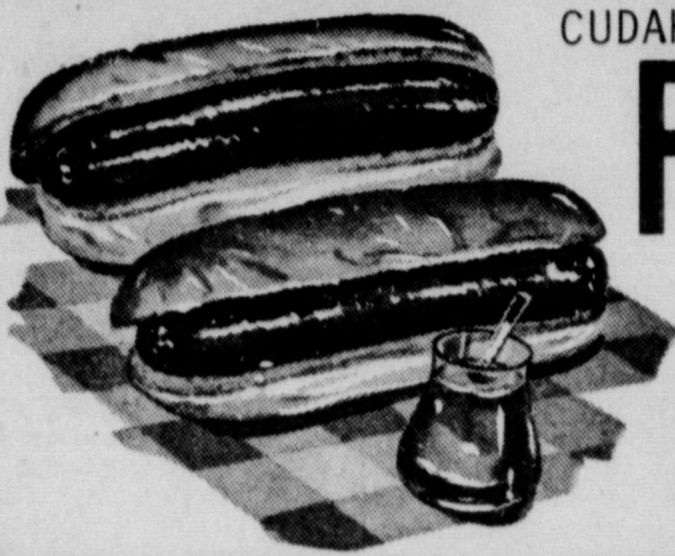

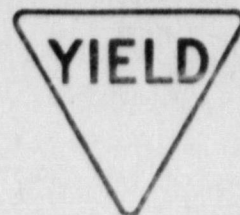

**Yield Signs Are Put Up In City**

Over the past few months, 41 of McLean's top signs have been removed and are being replaced by yield signs.

To date, 37 of the yield markers have been posted and 35 more will be added according to city foreman, Bob Glenn.

To drivers, a yield sign indicates that one approaching a yield must give the right a way to any vehicle in the intersection or approaching it. If both yield and stop signs are posted in the same intersection, as occurs on Main Street in McLean, the vehicle approaching the yield sign gives the right of way if the auto in the stop intersection has come to a halt. However, if a vehicle is approaching the stop, a vehicle already at the yield point



**HUD AGREEMENT SIGNED** - Governor Briscoe has entered into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development transferring administrative responsibilities for HUD's 38 neighborhood facilities to the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

The facilities, which are located in 32 Texas communities, have been built under terms of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1965. Under terms of the Act, ownership of the centers is vested in the community with HUD remaining responsible for administering use of the centers.

Under the new agreement, the Department of Community Affairs will assist local governments and local service agencies in developing and implementing programs to more fully utilize the neighborhood facilities. At present, HUD officials say, there is gross under-utilization of space and equipment at many of the facilities.

**SALARY-PERSONNEL POLICIES** - Salaries and personnel policies for non-faculty employees of Texas universities will be examined as a part of a statewide study directed by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

First phase of the study, to be completed this fall, is expected to result in recommendations to the 64th Legislature regarding level of state funding required to support equitable salary policies for non-faculty employees, says Higher Education, Commissioner Bevington Reed.

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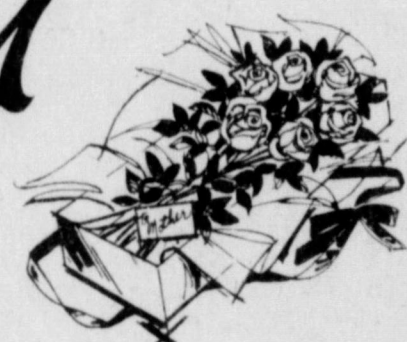
