## GSPA Seek New Members

Grain sorghum Producers Association President A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, Tex., announced the organization's fall membership campaign, launched October 1. Anthony said GSPA has become "one of the nation's most influential commodity groups, especially in Washington." As proof of this, he said GSPA directors serve on several top level advisory committees, including the Federal Energy Advisory Committee, USDA's Feed Grain Advisory Committee, and the National Cost of Production Advisory Committee. Other GSPA county directors serve on state and county-level committees, advising agricultural officials of the sorghum producer's viewpoint.

Don Crockett of McLean, Gray County GSPA director, urged area farmers to mail their membership dues early this year. He stated that "membership in GSPA is one of the best bargains available. For just \$10 annually, you get representation in Congress, contribute to world-wide market development and have your production problems gain the attention of prominent sorghum researchers. You also receive the GRAIN SORGHUM NEWS without additional charge."

Citing some of GSPA's goals, Crockett said, "We stand solidly opposed to any type of embargo on sorghum exports, we will continue to work to guarantee our farmers an adequate supply of fuel, and we are putting a great deal of time and effort into solving the problems of increased production costs." Crockett said membership dues application cards are now being mailed to all producers on the GSPA mailing list.

## Tigers Lose To Silverton Owls 26-6

The Tiger varsity journeyed to Silverton last Friday night as the Owls made for a 26-6 victory before their homecoming crowd.

Kit Long lead the Black and Gold defense with 8 assists and 3 unassisted tackles, followed by Curtis Simpson with 1 unassisted and 10 assists.

Recognized again in the offensive field was Curtis Simpson who ran 96 yards in 14 carries to lead the Tigers in rushing. His average came to 6.9. Simpson was followed by Ronnie Heasley who racked up 52 in 8; Bobby Crockett totaling 41 yards on 16 rambles, and Ricky Lowery with 16 in 10 carries.

Curtis Simpson made MHS's only touchdown when he cut around left end to score on a 60 yard drive with 4:05 showing on the clock in the third quarter. The extra point failed.

McLean's total yardage came to 215 against Silverton's 333 yards. The Owls twelve first downs were followed closely by 10 belonging to the Tigers.

Junior varsity players evened up their game count last Thursday night as they defeated Silverton's second string here on Thursday night with a score of 12-8.

Sammy Don Haynes is credited with making both the Black and Gold scores of game in the first half of play. Haynes intercepted an Owl pass, returning it to the end zone for the first score. The second six pointer was added on a 3 yard run off tackle in the second quarter. Extra points failed on both touchdowns.

The Owls threatened in the last half when they scored in the third quarter making the 2 point opportunity to make 8 points, but Tiger defense held them to the single score.

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## RELAXING GOD'S LAW

In Matt. 5:19 the Revised translation tells us that anyone who "relaxes one of the least of these commandments shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven." This is a solemn warning indeed! There have always been those who have sought the path of least resistance. The first time God had a law Satan attempted to "relax it." (Gen. 3) Tragically, the Devil was successful because man is exceedingly weak when he leaves God out of his life. The first murder was committed by a man who would not yield to Heaven's desires. (Gen. 4) Sodom was destroyed because its population enjoyed living on "Easy Street." (Gen. 19) Abraham could not find ten men of real conviction. The parables of Jeremiah's day are epitomized in famous language:

"The prophets prophesy falsely and the priests follow their example.... and the people love to have it so!" (Jer. 5:31)

A century earlier Isaiah was heartsick when his fellows said "Speak to us smooth things." Eight centuries later Paul was confronted by those who looked for compromise--preachers who would tickle their ears with soft words. Today, one finds fervent appeals for soft, easy, pretty sermons. This is one of the basic contributions to the decline of America and the decadence of the world today! Satan is shrewd and devastating in his devious doctrines, he is the master craftsman of sham and pretense. Under the guise of humility some are influenced by the Devil to say, "Preacher, don't expose error so strongly--go easy on our loved ones--they might get the impression that we think they haven't obeyed the Truth. The Bible, however, tells us that we are no man's enemy when we tell the truth, (Gal. 4:16) but that we become the enemy of God if we compromise the truth (Gal. 1:10). Satan influences some men, under the banner of "love" to say "Preacher, don't stress the plan of salvation so often because after all it is just being a good moral man that is essential! But the Bible says that Christ only saves those who obey Him (Heb. 5:9). And, in Mark 16:16 Jesus stated so clearly, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved." We are not to relax the law of Christ! This principle of absolute integrity and supreme loyalty toward the Lord also forbids us to be silent in dealing with weakness and error! In Christ-ianity it is not who you are, but WHOSE you are that counts! Instead of relaxing God's commandments let us enter the Truth by unstinting conviction and deep, abiding faith.

## Museum Memorabilia

Many have said down through the years--and rightly so--that Guy Beasley was one of the few "southern gentlemen" left. No matter what age she was, eight or eighty, if Mr. Beasley met a lady on the street, his hand automatically lifted his hat in a respectful gesture and a smile of admiration played on his lips.

Guy Beasley loved people, both old and young, and he loved to work for the church, the school, and the community. His first love was his family, his four "girls" his wife Georgie and his three beautiful and talented daughters; Joyce, Dorothy and Martha. Nothing was too good for them.

Guy died peacefully in his sleep Thursday, September 26, 1974, on his and Georgie's wedding anniversary, perhaps dreaming of what those years had meant to him and planning for the future of his loved ones.

It's a long story, but I shall make it brief. In 1905, my mother, with money she had made by selling eggs, chickens, butter, milk, and vegetables bought a piano. It was an Adam Schaaaf and cost \$495--a lot of money in those days but mother dreamed of her baby girl becoming a musician some day, so she churned a little more butter, set a few more hens, and planted an extra acre of vegetables. Finally the piano was paid for but her dreams of a great musician materializing in her family never came true.

When Jim and I were married in 1916, it was too expensive to move the piano, so I sold it to my brother in Wichita Falls. Years later, he bought a Baby Grand and gave my daughter Mabel the Adam Schaaaf. Mabel, a chip off the old block, showed no special talent for the piano either, though Mrs. Boyett worked hard in trying to find some musical spark. Consequently when times were hard and with college behind her and marriage in her future, Mabel sold the piano to Oma and Lawrence Watson.

One day while visiting in the Beasley home, my eyes caught sight of a familiar object. Though the case had been refinished, its musical tones were the same. It was my piano! Memories flooded my mind and I said, "If you ever decide to sell that piano, please give me the first chance."

When Mr. Beasley was gone and could no longer hear the musical strains brought forth from the instrument, Georgie called a conference with her three girls and the mother and daughters decided to give the piano to the museum in my honor.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Candidates are moving into the last laps of the 1974 campaigns but voters seem little concerned.

The general election ballot offers nine contested state-wide races and 16 congressional district challenges, in addition to hundreds of local races.

At the top of the ballot, Democratic Gov. Dolph Briscoe, 51, is opposed by Republican Jim Granberry, 42, of Lubbock; Raza Unida Party's Ramsey Muniz, 31; Sam McDonnell, 51, of the American Party, and the Socialist Workers' Sherry Smith, 28.

Another hot race features Democrat Bob Bullock, 44, and Republican Nick Rowe, 32, fighting it out for the state comptroller's office which is being vacated by Robert S. Calvert, who held office a quarter century. Sas Scoggins, 37, Austin, is also seeking the comptroller's job as a Socialist Workers Party candidate.

Democratic Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, 42, has opposition for a second term from Republican Gaylord Marshall, 39, of Dallas, and Dan Fein of Houston, the Socialist Workers Party nominee.

Atty. Gen. John Hill, 51, Democrat, also seeking a second term, is opposed by Tom Cole, 42, of Houston and SWP's Pedro Vasquez, 25, Houston.

State Treasurer Jesse James, senior state official, 69, has a Republican opponent in Robert G. Holt, 41, Amarillo.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong, 41, a Democrat, faces Republican Mary Lou Grier, 48, Boerne, and SWP William Rayson of Houston, 22.

Republican Zack Fisher of Memphis, 32, opposes Agriculture Commissioner John White, 49.

Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon is opposed by Republican Joe P. Cain, 58, and Fred R. Garza, Houston, Raza Unida. Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace, faces GOP Dale W. Steffess, 40, Houston and SWP Rick Congress, 30, Houston.

**HEALTH CARE NEEDED** — Nearly 37 per cent of children surveyed by the Department of Public Welfare were shown to need immediate health care.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell told a Governor's Task Force on Youth Care and Rehabilitation 3,885 children out of 10,010 screened in a free medical survey were referred to a physician for immediate treatment.

From September, 1973, through last July, Vowell said, 91,000 children were screened and 33,176 referred for treatment.

The checkups are part of a federal-state program called "Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment—EPSDT."

Ailments include visual, hearing, skin, teeth, throat, heart, anemia, lead poisoning and blood abnormality problems. About 389,000 children under 21 are eligible for EPSDT medical screening.

**LEASE BONUSES PAID—**

Oil companies paid another \$5,567,177 in cash bonuses for leases to explore and develop oil and gas resources on state lands at a School Land Board lease sale.

The sale reflected a drop in cash bonuses from a record \$24 million sale last July, Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong noted.

Armstrong said lack of availability of offshore drilling rigs as well as available bonus dollars was a factor in the sale.

More than 144,554 acres of state land were leased. Hunt Hassie Trust submitted the largest cash bid of \$256,356 for an upland tract in Loving County. More than 89,472 in Gulf of Mexico acres were leased for more than \$3.7 million. Other leased acreage include 49,226 in Texas bays for \$2.1 million, 485 riverbed acres for \$11,612 and 5,370 upland

acres for \$657,283. The School Land Board asked for a staff recommendation on advisability of holding three rather than four lease sales each year and of leasing by geographic zones.

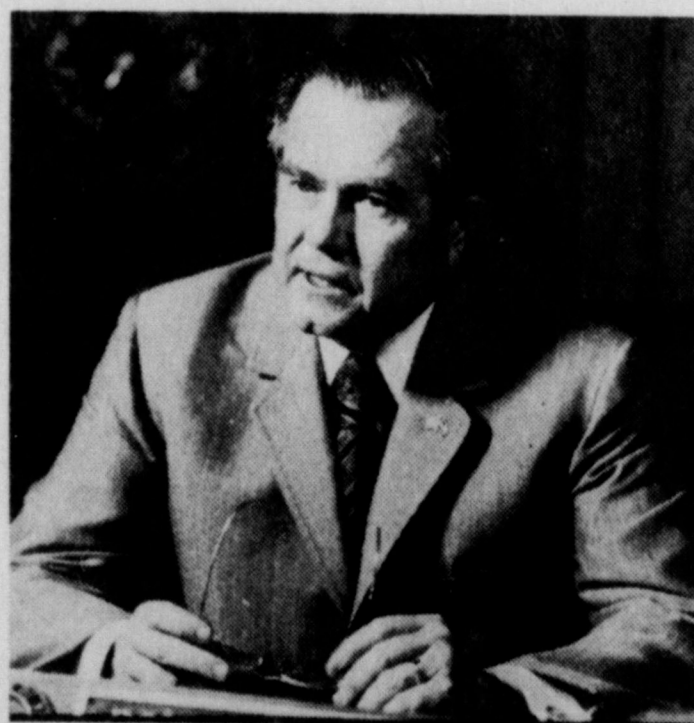
## B-Team Beat Owls

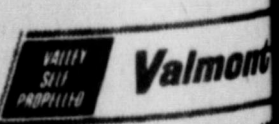
