Voters Go To Polls Tuesday In New Location

McLean citizens will go to the polls Tuesday to decide on eleven propositions. Voters will now go to the library to vote. The proposed amendments will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1. "The constitutional amendment authorizing fewer justice of the peace and constable precincts in counties with a population of less than 30,000 and providing for con-

tinuous service by justices of the peace, constables, and county commissioners when precinct boundaries are changes."

PROPOSITION NO. 2. "The constitutional

amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3. "The constitutional amendment providing for

the advancement of food and fiber production and marketing in this state through research, education, and promotion financed by the producers of agricultural products."

PROPOSITION NO. 4. "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the

suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

PROPOSITION NO. 5.

"The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6. "The constitutional amendment authorizing the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts." See VOTERS, Pg. 2

Tigers Fall To Booker Kiowas, 10-0 Friday

The McLean Tigers played perhaps one of their best games of the season Friday night at Booker as they fell in a conference contest 0-10.

The Tigers mounted a determined drive in the first quarter which carried them all the way to the Booker five yard

line before being stopped, and another later in the first half which was also denied the thrill of a score by the Booker defense. Keven McDowell and Gregg Mann gained good yardage all night for the local lads, and the offensive blocking was effective

throughout much of the ball game.

The third quarter and most of the fourth was a good defensive battle and Scott Stubbs of McLean played an exceptional game for the Tigers as did the always dependable defensive unit.

Booker finally scored a

field goal with 11:57 left in the fourth quarter when Godino booted it through the uprights, and with 1:51 left in the game, scored a touchdown on a pass from Pinckard to Ammons. Godino added the extra point to give the final score of 10-0.

Follett's Panthers will be the target for the Tigers this week as we will travel there to get the season back on a winning note. The final game will be here next Friday against the Wheeler Mustangs.

Cubs Complete Football Season

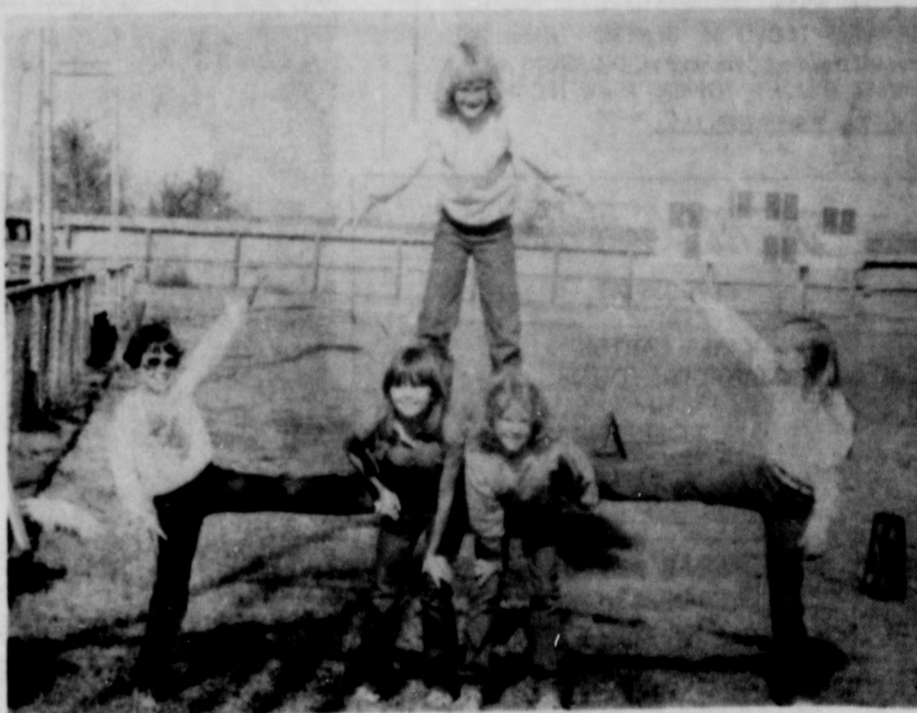
McLean's Junior High Cubs went out in style Thursday night, holding district champion Groom from the goal line the entire night.

The McLean City Council met in a called session Oct. 27 at the City Hall. The meeting was called to order by Mayor George Terry. Those present were city councilmen Lloyd Bybee, Jim Barker, June Suggs, and W.A. Bentley; Mayor George Terry; city secretary Stella Lee; and city superintendent Bob Glenn. Councilman Bill Thomas was absent.

Ordinance 210 was read for its second and final reading and was

approved and passed. Vote was unanimous.

A motion was made to authorize previously discussed changes to the city hall to make the building ready for ambulance use. Vote was unanimous.

Action pertaining to current city services was tabled for further investigation.

A request from the Hillcrest Cemetery Association was also tabled.

Meeting adjourned at 8:00 p.m.

Holland Reports Wrecks

DPS Patrolman John Holland reported several wrecks in the McLean area recently.

On Oct. 30 at 1 a.m., Leonard Ramos, Jr., of McLean was travelling east on I-40 in a 1963 Chevrolet. He allowed the vehicle to move right, striking a Southwestern Public Service power pole. Lines were knocked down, blocking traffic on I-40 for approximately two hours. Southwestern Public official Brad Dalton directed traffic until local officers were contacted to take over. Ramos was not injured in the mishap.

driving a 1980 Kenworth semi-truck on I-40, tried to negotiate a curve .3 miles east of McLean, at a high rate of speed. He was unable to handle the curve, ran off the left side of the road, and turned the truck over on its left side. There were no injuries.

On Oct. 23, at 7:06 p.m., Darin Corley of McLean, travelling east on Morse Street, met an unknown vehicle travelling west on the same street. 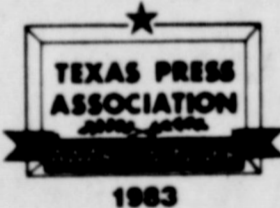

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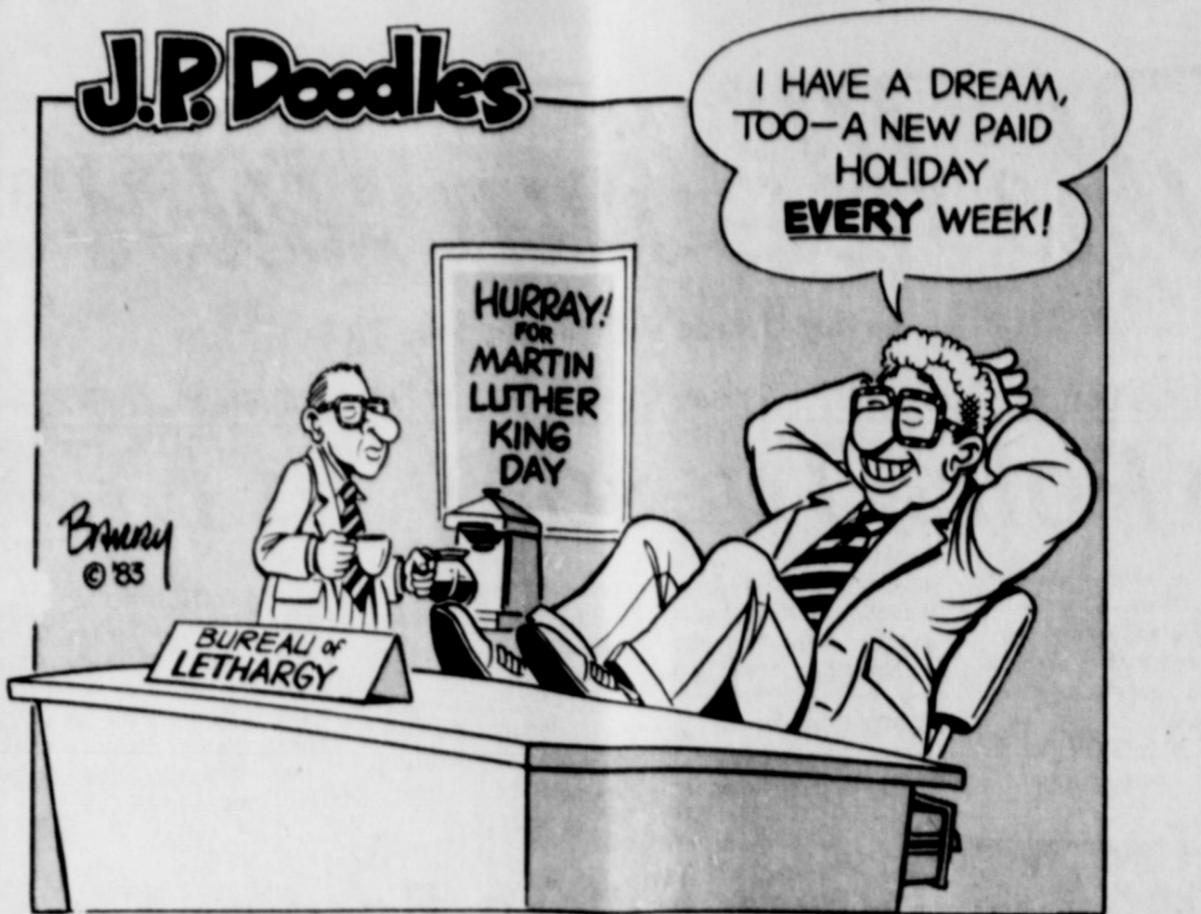

amendment allowing the Legislature to provide for additional remedies to enforce court-ordered child support payments."

PROPOSITION NO. 7, "The constitutional amendment for financial assistance to veterans and to authorize the issuance of \$800 million in bonds of the state to finance the Veterans' Land Program and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program."

PROPOSITION NO. 8, "The constitutional amendment to authorize taxing units to exempt from taxation property of certain veterans' and fraternal organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 9, "The constitutional amendment providing for assignment of judges of statutory probate courts to other statutory county courts with probate jurisdiction and to county courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 10, "The constitutional amendment to permit a city or town to expend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of sanitation or sewer laterals on private property."

PROPOSITION NO. 11, "The constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

1984 Guinness book of World Records

All dyed-in-the-wool trivia fans will be thrilled to know that the 1984 edition of the Guinness Book of World Records is now available at Lovett Memorial Library.

All the current records for almost anything you can imagine are listed in this extremely interesting volume, and with just a little work you can look up almost any record which might come up among people interested in legitimate records or those leaning toward the unique and sometimes ridiculous.

You may not know that the largest man in the world weighed 1069 pounds, that the Gaboon viper has fangs almost 2 inches long, that the smallest pygmies average about 4 1/2 ft. high, that the largest dance floor is 256 ft. long, that the largest indoor

SECTION 1. SECTION 4. All Ordinances and parts thereof in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 5. AND BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, that notice of the enactment of this Ordinance be given by publication of the same in the official newspaper of the City.
