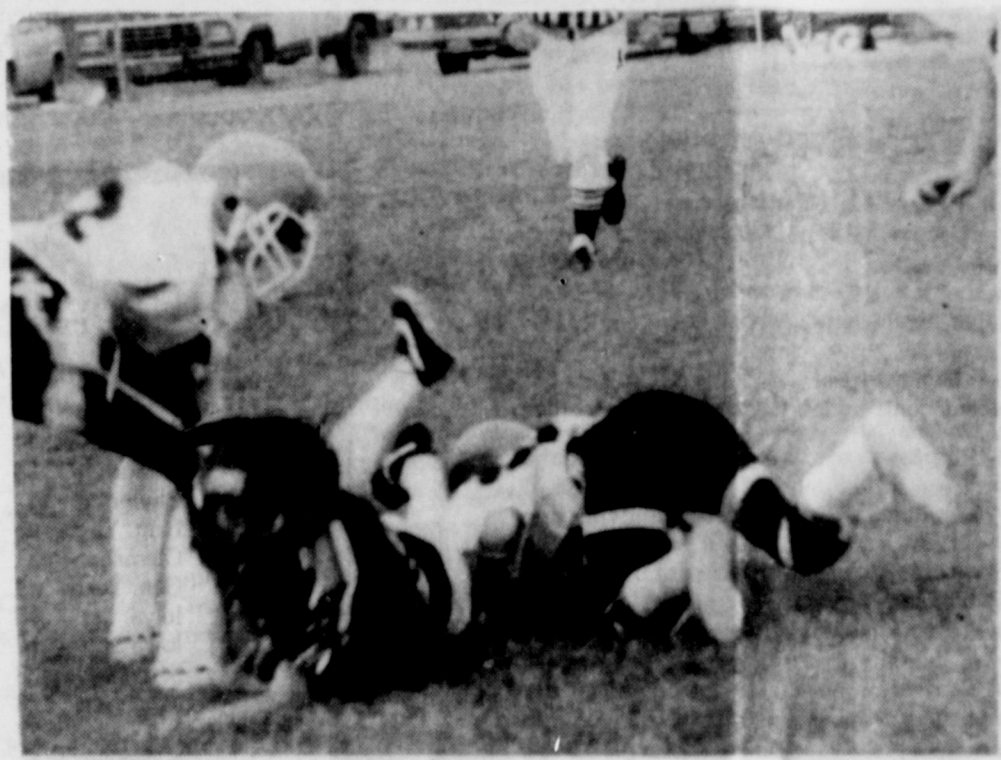

You can't hardly go anywhere any longer without seeing a bumper sticker, T-shirt of baseball cap, without the slogan "Will Rodgers never met H. Ross Perot" printed on them.

Last week the Fortune 400 list of wealthy Americans came out and Perot was rated only number four. I can only imagine his embarrassment at being placed a measly fourth with a total of about \$1.4 billion.

You probably read that list, it had a few names that are recognizable. Number one was Gordon Peter Getty, the son of the late billionaire J. Education Bill passed in the Summer session of the Legislature.

Under rules he pushed, to the tune of hiring 20 professional lobbyists to prod the legislature during the special session, his daughter would not have passed.

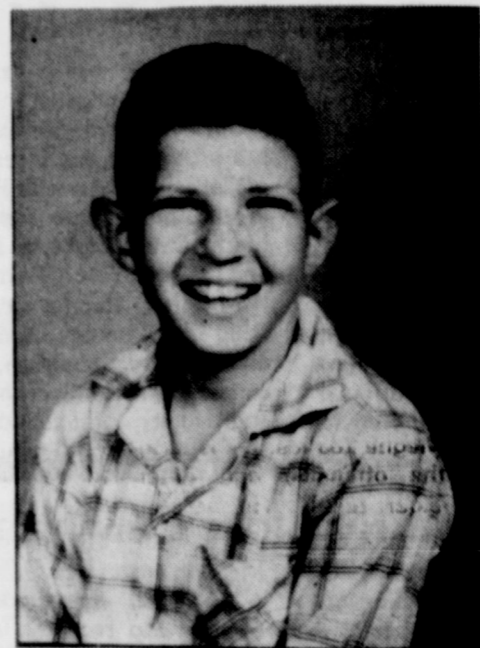


