Twelve months ago, Tessa McCurley entered her only event in the All-Campbell County Rodeo. On Saturday, the 12-year-old Rozet seventh-grader not only went for the women's all-round title but won it.

McCurley won her speciality goat tying, and also placed first in barrel racing against competition that included adults with years of experience on their side. McCurley, who started riding in rodeos at age six, scored 28 points.

All-round contestants had to enter at least six of the ten

events. "I thought I'd be up there, but..." a modest McCurley said as her voice trailed off. The oldest of four girls who ride in rodeos, Tessa practices "two to three hours a day."

McCurley plays basketball and leads cheers at Rozet, but neither of those sports yield prizes like the one she rode home with Saturday: a saddle valued at nearly \$1,000.

Tessa is the daughter of Doyle and Karen McCurley of Gillette, Wyoming, and the granddaughter of Jewel McCurley of McLean.

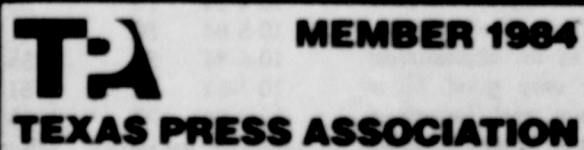

Center Jerry Money was injured during the first play of the game, suffering from a knee injury. Money was unable to return to the game.

Tiger Bob Patman suffered an arm injury during the second quarter, and was unable to return after the half. In the beginning moments of the fourth quarter, Dan Fish suffered a dislocated shoulder and was also side-lined for the remainder of the game.

Junior Jim Ridgeway stepped into the quarterback position for the first time this year, replacing Kirk Anderson who was moved into the running back position.

Junior Chet Bohlar was moved from running back to guard, as was sophomore Casey Cooper. It was also the first time to play guard for Cooper. Freshman Carey Richardson

was moved for the first time to center, and junior Donnie Smith took over some of the specialty team duties previously performed by Kirk Anderson. Smith punted twice in the fourth quarter of the game, and returned a third-quarter kick-off 26 yards, to move to 2nd for overall individual yardage gained for the Tigers.

The Cardinals, receiving the opening kick-off, scored with 8:19 remaining in the first quarter. The kick after the touchdown was blocked by the Tigers, and the score stood at 6-0.

The Tigers fumbled the ball on their first possession of the half, giving the recovering Cardinals easy touchdown hopes.

The Cardinals, taking one play from the Tiger's 16, took the ball across the goal line, making the score 12-0. The PAT was successful, and the Cardinals led 13-0.

After making a first down, the Tigers were unable to move the ball further, and punted to Turpin. The Cardinals took



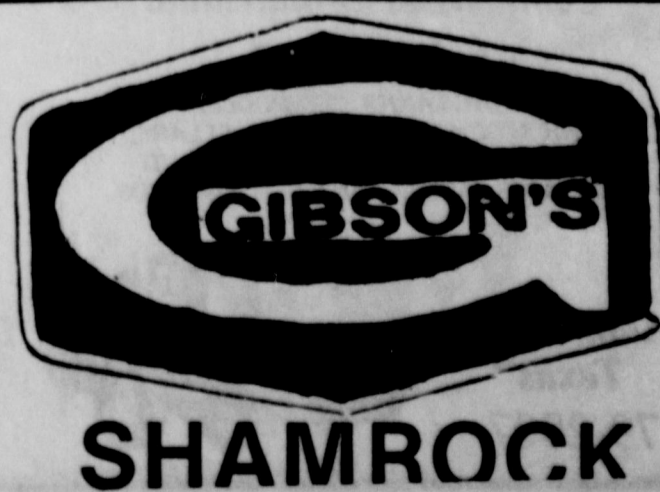

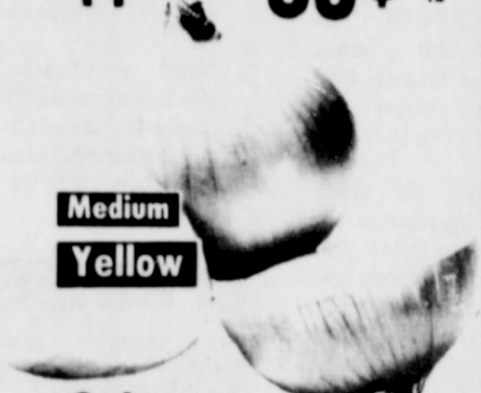
