Over 50% Of Voters Come To Polls

Over 50% of the registered voters in McLean exercised their right to vote, according to poll watchers Elmo Whaley and Catherine Weaver.

Shortly after 6 p.m., poll watchers reported more than

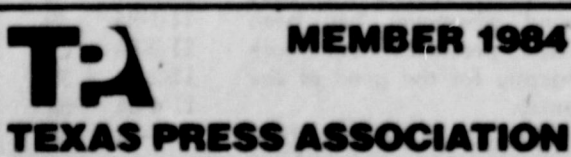

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby levied for the year 1984, upon all real property situated within

the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, and on all personal property which is owned within the corporate limits of said City of McLean, Texas, on the first day of January, A.D. 1984, except so much thereof as maybe exempt by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, a total of \$2661/100 (\$2661) dollars on each One hundred and No/100 dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation on all said property, which said total is levied in the portions hereinafter set forth in this ordinance.

SECTION 2. An ad valorem tax of and at the rate of \$2661/100 (\$2661) dollars on each One hundred and no/100 (\$100.00) Dollars of assessed valuation of said taxable property is hereby levied for the year 1984 for the purpose of providing revenue for the General Fund in the City of McLean, Texas, for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1985, and such tax when collected, shall be

appropriated and deposited in and to the credit of the General Fund of the City of McLean, Texas.

SECTION 3. All taxes herein levied shall be due and payable on the first day of October 1984. Such taxes not paid in full by the 31st day of January, 1985, shall bear penalty and interest as provided in Article 7336 R.C.S. of Texas.

SECTION 4. AND BE FURTHER ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, that notice of the enactment of the Ordinance be given by publication of the same in the official newspaper of the City.



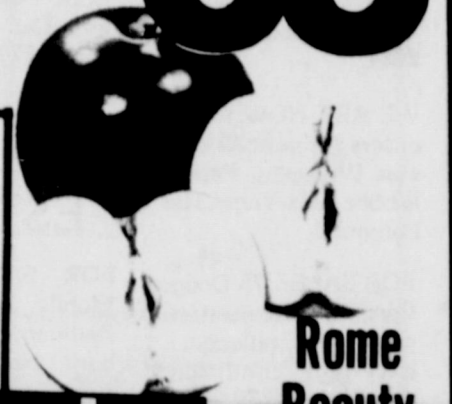

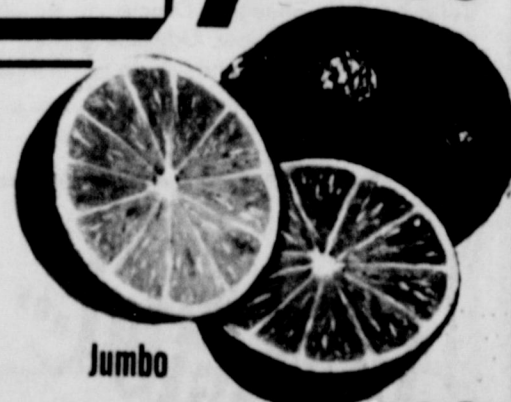
