## Pinion Trees Damaged In Lot

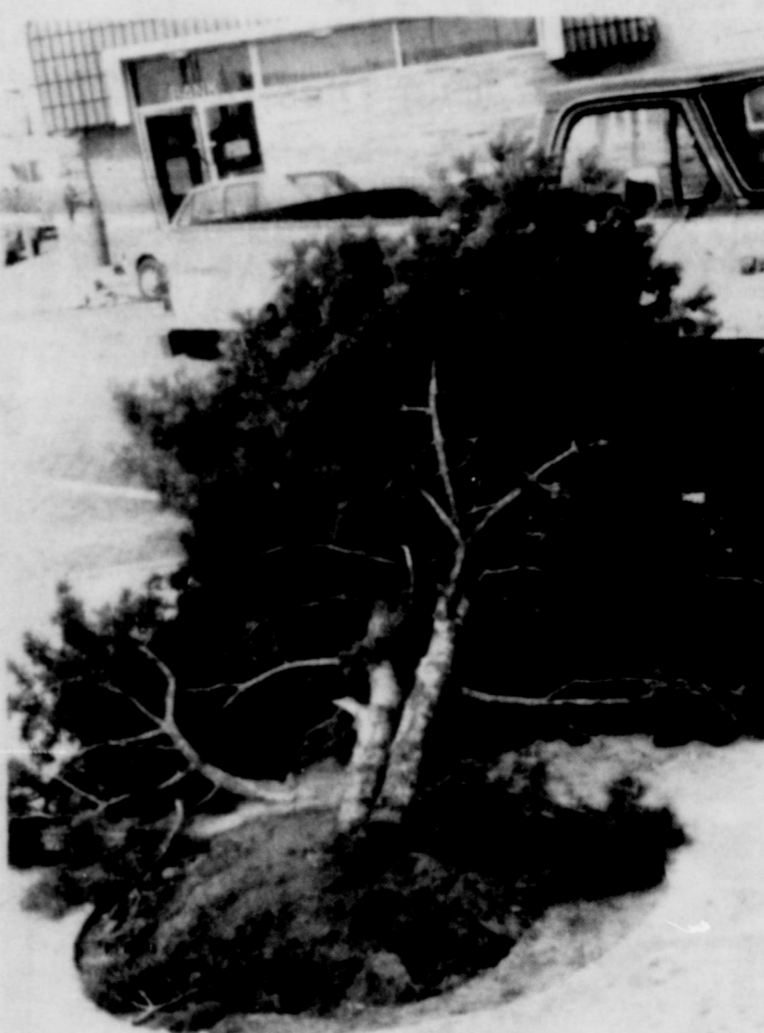
Two pinion trees in McLean's Memorial Park were damaged sometime early Sunday morning by unknown vandals, according to investigating law officer, Jim McDonald.

She married Horace Rippy, April 5, 1905 Gatesville.

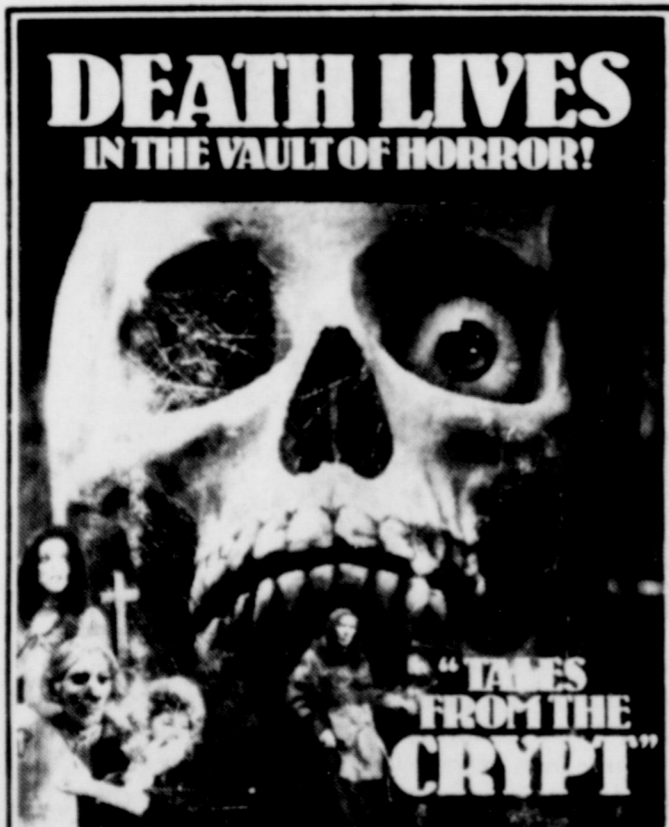
She was a member of First Baptist Church. She and her husband owned and operated Rippy's Cafe in Shamrock many years.

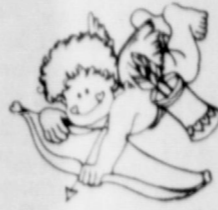

**ORDINANCE #215**  
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 5 AND 7 OF ORDINANCE NO. 133 SETTING IMPOUNDING FEE AND AILY CHARGES: PROVIDING FOR TIME OF IMPOUNDING AND

DISTRUTION OF ANY ANIMAL IMPOUNDED; PROVIDING FOR UNCONSTITUTIONALITY; REPEALING CERTAIN ORDINANCES; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; AND PROVIDING PUBLICATION AND PENALTY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF McLEAN, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1.** That section 5 of Ordinance no. 133 be, and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner of any dog impounded may redeem such dog at any time prior to destruction by the payment of \$25.00 for first offense and \$50.00 for each offense there-

after and \$5.00 per day or part of day such dog shall have been impounded, and providing the dog has been vaccinated with antirabies vaccine by a licensed veterinary within the last twelve months, if the dog is over six months of age.

**SECTION 2.** That Section 7 of Ordinance No. 133 be and the same is hereby amended to provide as follows: The owner may redeem any animal placed in pound by paying all charges with in three (3) days after the animal has been picked up. If animal has not been redeemed within the three days then it will be destroyed.

**SECTION 3.** That if any section, part, or provision of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional or invalid, then in that event, it is expressly provided, and it is the intention of the City Council in passing this ordinance that all other parts of this shall not be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.

**SECTION 4.** That any owner who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance

shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, and each and every day of violation shall be deemed a separate and complete offense.

**SECTION 5.** The fact that a large number of dogs are running at large within the boundaries of the City of McLean causing a manace and hazard to the health and well-being of the public creates an emergency and necessity, and the rule requiring said ordinance to be read on two separate occasions is hereby suspended and this ordinance shall be passed and shall take effect and shall be in full force and effect after its passage and publication.

**SECTION 6.** Notice of the enactment of this ordinance shall be given by publication in the official newspaper of this City; and this ordinance shall become effective upon passage UNANIMOUSLY PASSED APPROVED AND ORDERED published by the City Council of the City of McLean, Texas, on this 9 day of October, 1984.

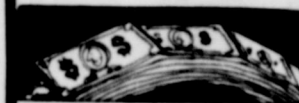
