

# **Venereal Disease A Serious National Problem, Says AMA**

Venereal disease is spreading so | new cases of gonorrhea are developrapidly that it now represents this nation's most urgent communicable disease problem.

VD is hitting particularly hard among teenagers and young adults, according to the American Medical Association.

The venereal diseases are infecting about two Americans a minute-3,000 a day, or 1,100,000 a year. Cases of infectious syphilis have al-

ing annually.

VD can blind, cripple, and even

The ravages of venereal diseases are all needless tragedy, says the AMA, because both syphilis and gonorrhea can be avoided. If contracted, they can be cured by prompt medical treatment.

intimate personal contact.

Complacency, ignorance, and a free-and-easy attitude toward moral standards are partly responsible for the spread of VD; the increasing use of alcohol, especially among young people, also plays a role.

Authorities believe, however, that thousands of young people simply aren't aware of the dangers of VD. Once infected, they are complacent about treatment

One of the first signs of syphilis may be a painless, ulcerating sore. Gonorrhea produces inflammation of the genital and urinary tracts, and a discharge of pus.

A person may contract syphilis and be unaware that he has the disease. After the first symptoms, the germs may remain hidden in the body for as long as 20 years before any damage is discovered. Then the person may become crippled, develop heart disease, blood vessel disease, blindness, or show mental symptoms. Even death may result from this hidden stage of syphilis.

If left untreated, gonorrhea may be responsible for arthritis, endocarditis, sterility, and blindness.

If a person suspects he may have contracted venereal disease, he should go to a physician immediately.



### **Gallstones Still** Medical Puzzle

In the upper right part of the abdomen is a small pouch called the gall bladder. It is a temporary storage center for bile, and is a part of the digestive system.

Sometimes lumps of solid matter composed of bile pigment and salts form in the gall bladder or in the ducts leading to it. These are called gallstones.

There may be only one gallstone or there may be hundreds. They can be so tiny that they look like sand or they can be as large as a day evening at First Baptist Church golf ball. Gallstones occur more often in women than in men and more frequently in persons past 40.

Exoctly why we get gallstones is still somewhat of a puzzle. They are generally thought to be the result of changes in composition of the bile, or stagnation of the bile, or infection.

Gallstones often lie quietly in the gall bladder or bile ducts. But if a large stone starts to move, you'll know immediately that something's wrong. Pain in the upper part of the abdomen will be severe and will cause the sufferer acute agony. The attack may be over in a few minutes or it may last for days. Sometimes it becomes mildly chronic and may be interspersed with acute episodes

Of course, not all severe pains in the upper part of the abdomen are from gallstones. Only your doctor can tell with proper diagnostic techniques.

You can't diagnose gallstones yourself. Your abdominal pain may or may not originate in the gall bladder. Let your doctor decide, and recommend treatment.





Many armers and ranchers are planning on controlling sagebrush and shinnery with a chemical spray. Shinnery should be sprayed with an emulsion containing not less than 1/2 pound of 2.4,5-T or silvex acid equivalent, and 1 gallon of diesel fuel with sufficient water to make 4 gallons per acre. Shinnery must be sprayed during a period of vigorous growth between weekend with Mrs. Dodd's mother, May 1 and June 1. Sagebrush should be sprayed with 1 pound of 2.4-D, and one gallon of diesel fuel with sufficient water to make 4 gallons per acre.. It should be sprayer at the most vigorous growth between May 1 and June 1.






