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American National Bank Closes August 16; Re-Opens As Bank Of Commerce August 17

75 years of banking in McLean came to a sudden close August 16, when the American National Bank was declared insolvent and closed by order of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

Although the closing of McLean's only bank was a surprise to most of its customers, it has proven no hardship to them. It re-opened just as suddenly, under the new ownership and a

new name. The bank was closed by Federal officials shortly after 3 p.m., August 16; it re-opened as the Bank of Commerce the next morning.

The bank was purchased by Gray Co. Bank Shares Inc., a group headed by well-known area banker E.W. Williams, Jr. Williams, who owns interest in several Texas banks, including the National Bank of Commerce

in Pampa, has been named chairman of the board. Serving as president is J. David Williams, who is also vice-chairman and chief operating officer of Hale County State Bank in Plainview and executive vice-president and director of Citizens Bank of Lubbock County in Slaton.

According to Jeff Hacker, and FDIC attorney, the FDIC will take over the bank's bad loans, collecting some of the overdue

debts and liquidating others. The Bank of Commerce retains only the good loan portfolios. The bank's brief closure seems to have had little negative effect on its customers. In fact, according to the new president,

deposits showed an increase the first day of its reopening.

Other officers include Richard Kimbrough, senior vice-president; Lloyd Kurtz, senior vice-president; Roger Mc-

Cracken, Vice-president and cashier; Lavern Back, vice-president; Gwen Henley, assistant cashier; and Charlotte Malone, assistant cashier.

According to Williams, all old checks with the American National Bank signature will be

honored at the Bank of Commerce.

"Customers may continue using their old checks until they run out of them," explained

Williams. "The bank's number and the customer's number will not change."

"We are very excited to be here and are anxious to serve the community," stated Williams. "We are pleased with the reception and the show of confidence we have received from the citizens of McLean. If anyone has any problems or questions, we want them to feel free to give us a call or come by and see us," he said.

New State Legislative Rules To Effect McLean Teachers And Students

Teachers began staying 45 minutes after school two days this week as part of the new state requirements for teachers and schools take effect.

According to superintendent Jim Rutherford, teachers will be available for tutoring from 3:45 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Wednesdays each week.

"According to the state interpretations, tutoring will be voluntary for failing students this first six weeks," explained Rutherford. "After first six-weeks period, students who are failing may (not shall) be required to attend the free tutoring offered by the schools this year." "However," Rutherford went on to explain, "there will be no transportation to and from school provided for the students undergoing tutoring."

Among other changes teachers, students and parents will be experiencing from the state legislatures new rules will be the shortening of the school year.

According to a press release from the Parent-Teacher-Association in Austin, the school year has been dropped from 180 days to 175.

However, students will not be allowed to miss any classes. Only five days of unexcused absences during a semester will be allowed.

School districts must now have at least one teacher for every 20 students, instead of one for every 25 students per class. More than 175,000 teachers are expected to open classes this fall in Texas.

Announcements in school will be limited to only one per day. Extra-curricular activities will be scheduled for after school hours to preserve the school day as much as possible for academics.

Students will be suspended from extracurricular activities if they have a grade below 70 in any academic class.

Students may not be granted social promotions. They must be promoted only on the basis of academic achievement. A grade average of 70 on a scale of 100 is considered a passing grade.

No student is exempt from taking final examination if any other student in the class is required to take final exam.

At least every six weeks, the schools are required to give parents written notice of students' grades in each class. If

the student is failing any class, a parent-teacher conference should be arranged.

Other changes in school law, which will not go into effect

until the 1985-86 school year, include: minimum competency tests before a high school diploma awarded; competency

Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports

AUSTIN - The education reform legislation of this Summer will have an impact on administrators of schools around the state.

One of the new items for administrators will be testing based on administrative skills, knowledge in subject areas, and other matters that the State Board of Education considers appropriate.

Examinations will include ability to read and write with sufficient skills and understanding to perform satisfactorily as a professional administrator. The test will be developed in consultation with administrators.

Other administration changes include the replacement in January, 1985 of the current 27-member elected board. The new board will be composed of 15 members, appointed by the Governor from a list of nominees compiled by the Legislative Education Board, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House o

Representatives. The State Board of Education will return to a full elected body by 1989.

The State Board will appoint an advisory committee to develop statewide standards for school board members. The board may provide a training course in regional service centers for local school board members.

A management training pilot program for 100 principals and superintendents will be designed and implemented by September of 1985. A report on the conclusions and possible program changes will be made to the Legislature on the outcome.

The fine tuning of the role of administrators will have an impact on the quality of education in Texas in the future.

Alcohol abuse cost Texas \$14,939,712 today, Senator Bill Sarpalius announced recently.

"Add that to the same number yesterday and the same number, on the average, for every day in the year," he said, "and you have more than \$5 billion."

The Texas Commission on Alcoholism extrapolated the figure of \$5,453,480,000 from the data collected previously on alcohol abuse costs in Texas and from a new study by the Research Triangle Institute of North Carolina showing the cost of alcohol abuse to the nation in 1983 as more than \$116 billion.

"For an idea of what a figure like this means, just realize that the entire budget for the state of Texas is \$30.9 billion for the 1984-85 biennium," Sarpalius said.

Stovall is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clay Gable, formerly of McLean.

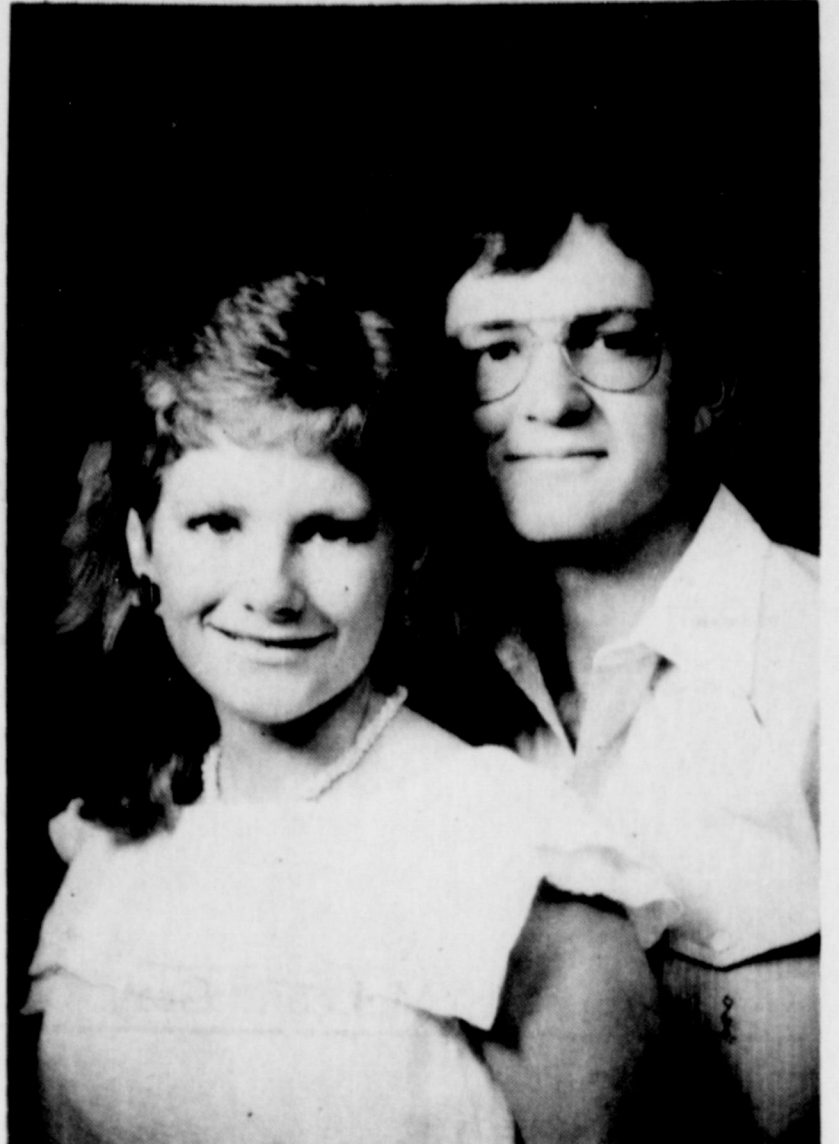
The couple will exchange vows at 7 p.m. August 31 in San Springs Baptist Church.

After graduating from OBU, he took a job at McLean High School. As it turned out, McLean had no baseball team, so he took over the girls track program.

"They had a real good crew of girl tracksters there," said Gray. "They were good ath-

letes with a lot of ability. I learned a lot from them," Gray told the *Banner*.

In a side note to *The McLean News*, Gray added, "I owe this all to that group of Freshman who made me love track (Sally, Jamie, Jill, Ann, Joy, etc., etc.) I love them all and always will be indebted to them for that. Thanks again, McLean," exclaimed Gray.

After two years at McLean, Gray moved to Duncan, where he was also at one time a varsity assistant for girls basketball. But track is undeniably his first love. It has been for about the past 10 years.

"Because of all the success and all the good girls I've had, I never again had the desire to go into baseball," he said.

When speaking of the great amount of success he's had, Gray never goes very long without mentioning the girls he's coached. And he doesn't just speak of them in a purely athletic sense; it's the type of young ladies he's had that means as much to him as their athletic ability.

"As far as I'm concerned, this award is really a team honor more than an individual one," he said. "I think of all the good kids I've had that have made all this worthwhile."

A variety of delicious, nutritious snacks can be easy to make at home.

When it comes to after-school snacks, there can be much beyond milk and cookies. Children want snacks to be quick and good. Parents want the snacks to be easy to prepare as well as nutritious: low in fat, salt and sugar.

Lucy DeVine, nutrition consultant for IGA food stores, suggests these palate-pleas-

ing, healthful snacks as delicious after school surprises:

- Popcorn (dry-popped), dusted with chili powder, onion powder, or Parmesan cheese. A brief dusting of non-stick aerosol spray keeps it in place on the popcorn.
- Apples baked in low-cal soft drinks. Try baking in ginger-ale.

- Fruit, whole or in chunks threaded on toothpicks or wooden skewers. Select grapes, melon and pineapple.
- Taco Chips, homemade, using tortillas from the supermarket. Cut in quarters and bake on a lightly greased sheet until crisp.
- Spicy Bean Dip—for those taco chips or carrot sticks. You can blend canned tomatoes on one side. Spread the other side with a dollop of spaghetti sauce, (buy it or make your own). Sprinkle with low-fat mozzarella cheese and broil until bubbly.

- Parfaits begin with angel food cake or lady fingers (both low in fat and high in protein-rich egg whites). Alternate chunks with fruit—frozen, fresh or canned. Next, top with plain yogurt flavored with vanilla and a sugar substitute. kidney or pinto beans from IGA with chili, onion and garlic powder, and add a few drops of bottled hot sauce and a dash of vinegar.

- Banana Magic—Peel ripe (or over ripe) bananas, wrap tightly in foil or plastic wrap, and freeze overnight until rock-hard. Then carefully break or cut into one-inch chunks and process in the food processor for a minute or so. Those brown bits will turn into silky almond-colored "ice cream."
- "Mini-Pizzas" can be easy to make at home with a pita loaf split horizontally and

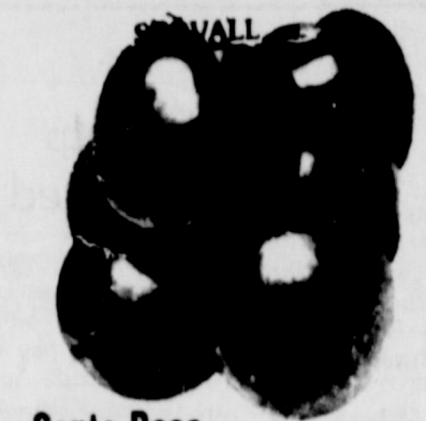

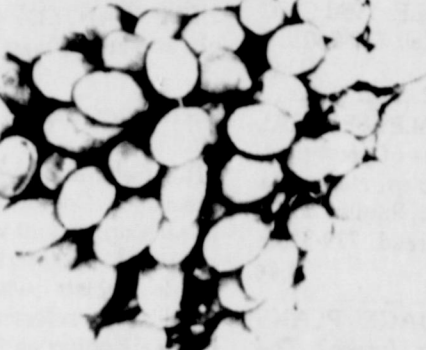
