School To Have Beef Short Course

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held November 18-21 under the sponsorship of the McLean High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. Jefferson, Superintendent, and Mr. Ken McGinty, teacher of Vocational Agriculture. Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Dr. Krehbiel is a native of Oklahoma. As a farm boy and FFA member, he had shown livestock and won many awards, including championships at the Southwestern Livestock Exposition in Ft. Worth and at the American Royal Livestock Show in Kansas City. He has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B.S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, and M.S. degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph.D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. The short course at McLean is scheduled to begin November 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Krehbiel will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on the farm instruction, according to Mr. McGinty.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Jefferson or Mr. McGinty. An entry fee will be charged. Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends the training session.

Livestock Workshops Are Scheduled

Workshops scheduled in Dalhart, Claude, and Gruver counties will provide livestock producers experiences in several techniques of rodent and predatory control.

The program will be held on November 12, 7:30 p.m. in the Elementary School Auditorium, Dalhart; November 13, 2:00 p.m. in the Fairview Community Center in Armstrong County; and November 14, 1:30 p.m. in the County Agriculture Building in Gruver.

Foster Whaley, County Extension Agent said wildlife specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Texas Rodent and Predatory Service will discuss techniques of den hunting, air-craft hunting and calling up coyotes.

Effective setting of traps and M-44 devices for predators will be demonstrated and methods of reducing rodents depredation of feed stuff illustrated.

Instructors in the program will be Melton Caroline of the Fish and Wildlife Service and Supervisor of the Rodent and Predatory Animal Control Service, and Charles W. Ramsey, Wildlife Specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Still other instructors will be district supervisors of the Rodent and Predatory Service Jodi H. Webb, H.B. Ellard, V.K. Carpenter, Raymond Trimble and Loyd Cheacur.

George Brewer was first to score on a 17 yard drive with Kelly Cook kicking the extra point. Dan Cook was next to cross the goal line on a 17 yard ramble. The extra point try failed, Bobby Cantu completed scoring for the 1st quarter with a three yard dash up the middle to make the score 20-0.

George Brewer then passed 20 yards to Sam Gonzales. Brewer let fly with another to Ed Thomas for a 63 yard score. Cook booted the extra point.

Paul Hanna intercepted a Tiger pass and turned it into a 6 pointer with 70 yard run.

Shane Tarver scored the single touchdown of the 2nd quarter with a 25 yard sprint. Lesse Davis took advantage of the extra point making the final score of 46-0.

Leading ball carrier was Curtis Simpson who totalled 38 yards in 16 carries followed by Steve Longley with 27 yards on 11 scrambles. Simpson was also credited as recovering a fumble.

Todd Darsey lead the Tiger Defense Friday night with making 5 tackles unassisted with 11 assists. Darsey also returned the pigskin into the hands of the Black and Gold with two fumbles recoveries.

Next Friday night, the Tigers travel to Shamrock to play the Irish in their final game of the season.

Miss Bowermon is a student at Commercial College. Mr. Hall is working for Sinton and Norton Drilling Company.

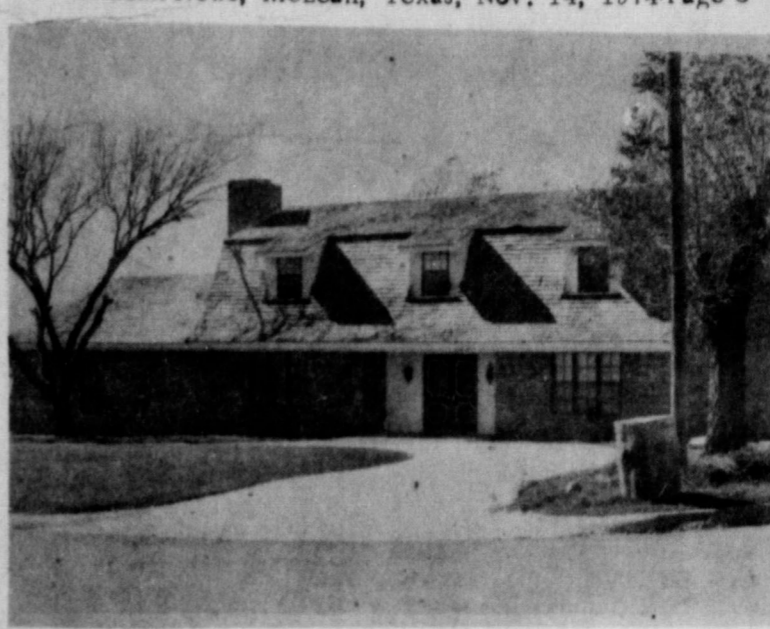
Pampa Group To Present Brigadoon

AUSTIN—Atty. Gen. John Hill, viewed as a likely gubernatorial candidate in 1978, emerged from the November 5 general election as the top statewide Democratic vote-getter.

While all the statewide incumbent Democrats won landslide victories over Republicans and minor party candidates, Gov. Dolph Briscoe ran last on the ticket.

But last was good for 62 per cent of the total vote cast in the governor's race (nearly a million) and an apparent sweep of all but five counties by the governor.

Hill was followed closely by Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong in the vote-getting statistics.

While the attorney general received more than 74 per cent of the votes over two opponents, Armstrong was less than a percentage point behind.

All but two of the statewide Democratic contenders topped well over one million votes, and most had more than 70 per cent of their contest totals.

Treasurer Jesse James ran down the list and just ahead of Briscoe, but he still managed to finish with 64.7 per cent in his race.

The turnout of just over 1.6 million was, percentage-wise, perhaps the worst in recent Texas history—about 31 per cent.

While there were only 1.4 million votes in the 1966 general election and 1.5 million in 1962, there were far fewer than the present 5.4 million registered voters then.

GOP HOPEFUL — Republicans, in spite of the drubbing they took in statewide elections, already are talking hopefully about rebuilding for the future.

GOP Chairman Jack Warren of Tyler said the state party will be zeroing in on 1976 legislative races and looking for a strong U.S. Senate candidate to challenge for Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's seat. GOPs from Texas will also want to have a say in the next big presidential effort, Warren emphasized.

There were bright spots in the darkness for the Republicans this year, Warren noted. He pointed to victories of Jon Lindsay for Harris

County judge, John Whittington's upset of longtime Dallas County Judge Lew Sterrett and Nathan White's victory for the Collin County judgeship. The party had a net loss of one congressional seat (U.S. Rep. Bob Price in Panhandle-North Texas district 13) and two state House of Representatives places in the November 5 general election.

ONE PRIMARY LESS — Raza Unida Party, which held its first primary this year, won't be conducting any more in the near future.

Under new election law, parties which receive two to 20 per cent of the vote for governor must nominate in conventions. Raza Unida falls in this bracket, with about a six per cent showing November 5.

Only Democrats and Republicans will nominate in primaries next time out, since both received more than 20 per cent of the gubernatorial vote.

The American Party and Socialist Workers Party, if they get on the next ballot, will have to submit about 16,000 signatures on petitions.

They needed 34,000 signers to qualify this year.

COURTS SPEAK — The Court of Criminal Appeals refused to reconsider its September 24 decision upholding convictions of former House Speaker Gus Mutscher and two aides for conspiracy to take a bribe.

The high court reversed and directed new trial for a Houston woman convicted of slaying her husband.

In another husband-killing case, the same court affirmed the 20-year sentence given a Dallas housewife.

The State Supreme Court ruled in favor of the state in a tax case involving liquor served by a Taylor County country club.

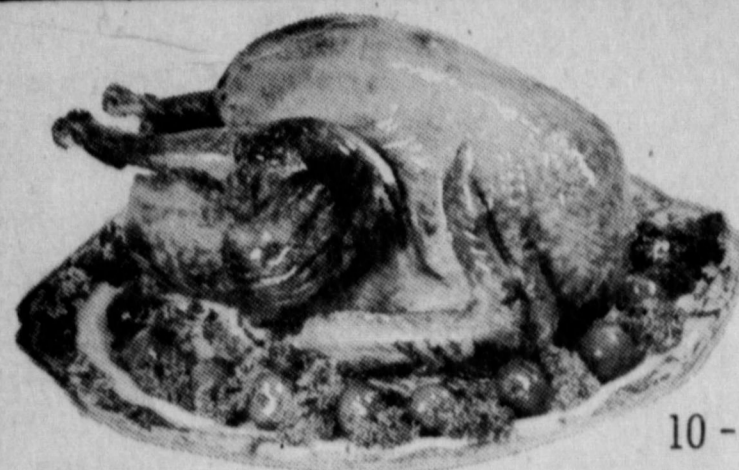

CONFERENCE SET—A national conference on economic problems and energy consumption forecasts is set here November 14-15.

Economists and mathematicians from over the nation will meet to discuss mathematical techniques used in economic analyses, supply and demand forecasting, governmental program planning and constraints on development.

The governor's office is host for the conference. The session will produce papers and reports to help state and federal government analysts in evaluating modeling and analytic techniques and data requirements.

FEW BLACKS HIRED — A Dallas legislator has complained that 54 state agencies (most of them small) have no black employees.

Rep. Paul Ragsdale of Dallas, a black, said only one agency has more than 10 per cent black employees. That is the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation.

Compared with a state population which is 12 per cent black, there are fewer than nine per cent black state employees, and only two per cent hold state jobs which pay \$10,000 or more annually.

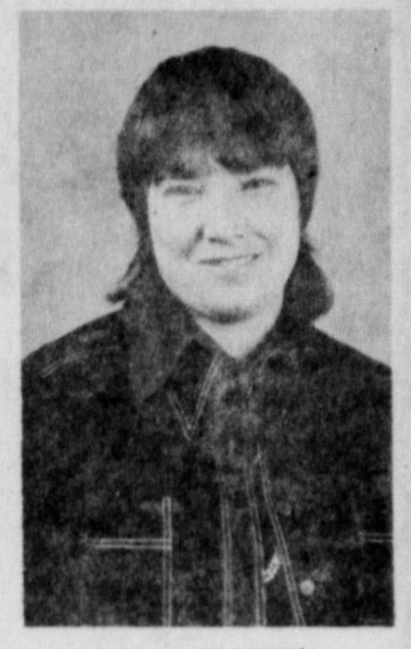
Ragsdale said Texas population is 18 per cent Mexican-American, but only 11.6 per cent of state jobs are held by Mexican-Americans.

SPEED CHECK URGED — Department of Public Safety Director Wilson E. Speir has urged Texas drivers "to make a greater effort to observe the 55 miles per hour speed limit."

Speir said surveys indicated more than 60 per cent of all vehicles are exceeding the limit, including trucks. Speeding arrests are doubling this year, and DPS officers are concentrating on unsafe driving practices by commercial operators. Speir said the truckers frequently radio each other warning of law enforcement efforts.

INCOME TAX SEMINAR

In the early part of 1974 I scheduled through our Extension Headquarters Staff a top flight specialist Mr. J. Michael Spratt to appear on an income tax seminar I had planned for late this month.

Just recently Mr. Spratt advised me he was resigning from the Extension Service and would not be able to furnish this program.

In the past we have had a Farm Management specialist stationed at Amarillo that has coordinated income tax seminars over the Panhandle. The position is also vacant at the present. The Internal Revenue Service no longer provides help on these meetings. Therefore, much to our regret we will not have an Income Tax program this year. We do have our order in for a good supply of the 1974 Income Tax Guides. They will be available at our office on request. These probably won't arrive until December. If you would like to have a copy, call our office 669-7429 and we will place your name on the list to receive a copy when they arrive.

Actually there has been very few changes in the income tax laws since the 1969 revision.

However, we anticipate there will be some tax reform in 1975. So maybe we can have our help back and have one on any changes made by the upcoming Congress.

MORE ON INCOME TAX

Just recently Mrs. J. M. Turner and Hank Cole called me on an income tax question. The question involved a coop dividend check whereby Hank had received a check that represented 20 percent of a dividend the coop elevator had dispersed. The question was, "should Hank declare only the twenty percent check as income or the entire one hundred percent coop declared?" Keep in mind that eight percent of the dividend was on paper and not redeemable at the time. The answer is that the check and the other eighty percent must be declared as income to Hank and reported as income on his income tax return. Our reasons for pointing this out is because it is a very common question asked by producers.

The background on this issue is prior to a revision of the income tax laws (I believe this occurred in 1969)

most farm coop elevators and other types of farm cooperatives usually declared all the dividend in a non-redeemable paper certificate in the form of a dividend stock. The management of the coop's refused to pay the tax since it was a stock dividend. The farmer refused to pay since he could not redeem the stock dividend in cash. So, either a ruling or a law was passed that stated if the management of the coop would pay a minimum of twenty percent cash dividend (I believe) then the management of the coop was relieved from the responsibility of paying the Internal Revenue Service and this responsibility was shifted to the farmer receiving the twenty percent cash plus his eight percent paper dividend.

WHEAT PASTURE

We have never seen more lush fields of wheat pasture for this time of year. You will see some fields half knee high and another field that is just now coming up. The many interruptions caused by rain since early September has strung the wheat sowing out.

A recent USDA wheat pasture report showed one area in the Central Texas Panhandle as excellent pasture. Most of the rest of the Panhandle south of the Canadian River as good. North of the Canadian River through the Oklahoma strip and northward across Kansas, the wheat pasture was rated only fair to poor.

Some local wheat farmers have found it a little harder to obtain cattle than normal.

In appreciation for the barrier-free environment, the National Easter Seal Society Board of Directors will honor San Antonio city officials and Hilton Hotel executives at the President's Dinner closing the convention Friday, November 15.

Easter Seals, the oldest and largest voluntary organization serving the handicapped, expects to attract more than 2,000 handicapped persons, parents, educators and rehabilitation specialists to its convention, meeting in San Antonio November 12-16.

The Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas is the state affiliate of the National Society.
