I heard a brief news report the other night that El Paso Natural Gas had closed down negotiations with the Algerian government about the liquid gas plant there. Have you noticed that McLean seldom gets mentioned in the big city paper to our west... unless the "mention" is negative?

When McLean was preparing for its 70th birthday celebration, we sent the Amarillo paper information about the things that were planned. Unless I missed it, nothing was ever mentioned.

We also notified some Amarillo television stations about the event, and one station sent a representative, but they featured an interview with our local county commissioner in which the reporter asked some very insulting questions. The big celebration McLean was having was virtually ignored, or at least certainly played down.

Does every town rate a banner headline and a long story when they have one speeding ticket, and one misdemeanor possession arrest made?

I think if that was the usual policy at the Amarillo paper, they wouldn't have room for much else.

Or maybe I'm just sensitive and notice only what is put in the paper about McLean. I still, however, question the judgement when something like this is blown out of proportion.

When I was still teaching, my daughter asked me once how I could stand up to the pressure of being criticized. She said that if someone made remarks about her that they had about me that she would dissolve in tears.

## Trustees Reorganize Board Swears In New Members, Changes Kindergarten Schedule For Next Year

The McLean School Board canvassed ballots Monday and reorganized the board following the election Saturday. Recently elected board members J.C. McAnear, and incumbents Jim Allison and Darryl Herndon were given the oath of office. At the meeting at the school business office, Allison was elected president of the board, with Lloyd Hunt elected as vice-president, and June Suggs elected as secretary. McLean city secretary Stella Lee appeared before the board to discuss the possibility of combining assessment and collection of city and school taxes. Mrs. Lee said that because of new tax rulings by the state that the business connected with taxes was becoming extremely expensive. The cost of leasing a computer would be over \$575 per month for the city. The board discussed the feasibility of combining the collection and assessment of the school and the city, and decided to approve the idea, with details to be worked out between the school board and the city council. The city would still have its own equalization board and set val-

ues and rates for taxes, but the actual assessment and collection would be done by the school. School business manager Shirley Johnson said that combining the two would perhaps prevent McLean citizens from having to go to Pampa to pay their taxes after the county-wide appraisal board is in operation. Superintendent Carl Dwyer told the board that he and board member Tony Smitherman had looked at a 40' by 110' steel building at the Quail schools which will probably be up for bids in the near future. The building cost around \$86,000 when it was built at Quail, Dwyer said, but that the McLean school could possibly procure the building for around \$20,000. Dwyer said the building was similar to the ag hall, and contained several classrooms and four bathrooms. Smitherman said that the building could be used for administrative offices and perhaps for elementary physical education. Dwyer said that other schools had expressed an interest in buying the building, and the board decided to investigate the

cost of moving the building and installing a concrete slab and plumbing before making a final decision. Dwyer told the board that he would find out if the building has been released for bids yet and notify the board. The resignation of Jarrell Russell, McLean High School vocational agriculture teacher, was accepted by the board. Dwyer told the board that he already had several applications for the job. The board agreed to interview candidates for the job at a future board meeting. The board approved the hiring of all auxiliary personnel for the school at their current salaries, since salaries were updated earlier in the year. In discussing kindergarten classes for next year, board members discussed the fact that McLean had been very lucky to procure good teachers in the middle of the year for kindergarten classes, but that a full day of classes for one semester for kindergarten students had proved unworkable. Board members voted to have kindergarten for a half-day for

## Three Trustees Elected Saturday

Three board members were chosen in the school board election in McLean with a light turnout of voters. J.C. McAnear led the ticket with 161 votes, and incumbents Darryl Herndon with 150 votes and Jim Allison with 144 votes were returned to the board. Candidates Coy Smith received 38 votes and Tommy Gipson received 26 votes in the balloting.

## Voters Choose Three For Council

An extremely light voter turnout returned three incumbents to their posts on the McLean City Council in balloting Saturday. Boyd Meador received 77 votes, George Terry received 74 votes, and Miro Pakan received 72 votes in the election. The three men were the only candidates in the election.

## Boys, Girls Win District Golf Championship

McLean's girls and boys golf teams each won first place in University Interscholastic League district competition at Clarendon Monday to garner berths at the regional tournament in Levelland next week. The McLean boys' faced teams from Lefors, Claude, and Nazareth. In the girls division, McLean's Missy Billingsley was medalist with Sally Haynes tying for third place. The McLean girls team was the only one in the district competition but individual players from Nazareth and Valley played for medalist honors. Miss Billingsley shot 108, with Haynes shooting 120. Donna McAnear shot 124, Rozanna Eck shot 127, and Tammy Smith shot 138 for McLean. On the district winning boys' team, Timmy Kilham shot 97 to take third place medalist and lead the McLean group. Wade Smith shot 99, Bill Hambright shot 106, Spooky Smith shot 103, and Tim Smith shot 101. The golf teams brought home medals and trophies for their district wins.

## Methodist Revival To Begin Sunday

The Rev. Kenneth Metzger, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Memphis, will conduct a week-long revival at First United Methodist Church in McLean beginning with the Sunday evening service, April 13. Services will be each evening at 7:30 a.m. through Friday. Mrs. Bonnie Fabian is in charge of music for the revival. The Rev. Metzger, a native of Farmington, N.M., attended McMurry College and Southern Methodist University in Dallas. He has been the pastor at Memphis for four years. He and his wife have two children, who are both high school students at Memphis. A salad supper Sunday evening at 6 p.m. for the entire church has been planned. Various groups and classes in the church will host lunches each day of the revival for their group and the ministers. The Dorcas group will host the luncheon Monday at noon; the Wesley Sunday School class will host the Tuesday luncheon; the Susannah group will host the Wednesday luncheon; the Builders Sunday School class will host the Thursday luncheon; and the Deborah group will host the Friday luncheon. The revival will close with the Friday evening service.

## Commissioners Discuss McLean Residents' Letter

Gray County Commissioners met for their regular session April 1 in the courthouse at Pampa with several items on the agenda. Commissioners discussed a letter from McLean residents concerning law enforcement in McLean. Ted Simmons, commissioner from McLean, answered questions concerning the matter. No residents from McLean attended the meeting. Commissioners have no jurisdiction over law enforcement, commissioners decided, except controlling the law enforcement budget. Judge Carl Kennedy told the court, "This is a serious matter and the court is here to aid all residents of the county. If there was a problem in McLean, I am

sure that some of the residents would be here to represent the issue," according to a quote in the Pampa News. The Pampa News article continued to say that commissioners felt the probable answer for McLean residents interested in the law enforcement question was to be sure proper officials were elected to serve. If service is not acceptable, the use of the voting process and the election of ones who will meet standards could be the answer. In other action at the meeting, commissioners requested Perry-Lefors Airport manager Roy Smith to purchase two 6,000-gallon storage tanks, if the price was \$3,000 or less. After discussion of the FAA requests and the availability of

government grants, commissioners decided to authorize the use of \$25,000 from the general fund for airport improvements. A plat approval for Carpenter Acres in Lefors was considered by commissioners and approved. State Health Nurse Marge Holland requested financial aid from the court for extra space and equipment. Commissioners requested further information concerning the extra room rent and the prices of a hearing machine, requested by Mrs. Holland. Judge Kennedy proposed letting the State Health facility use hospital equipment owned by the county and not currently being used by the hospital.

Improvements to the county barn were discussed and tabled by the commissioners. Gray County has allocated \$6,000 for 1980 improvements to the barn and more information is needed concerning the improvements proposed by the Rodeo Club, before commissioners can make any decision. The Pampa Rodeo Club has agreed to make \$2,000 per year available for improvements to the barn. The engaging of an independent auditor for Gray County offices and the revenue sharing fund were also discussed. Commissioners decided to use the services of the Jerry Davis Auditors for the 1979 county audit.

## Company Installs First Gas Meter For New City Gas System

Wes-Tex Construction Company, the company which is installing the new gas line for the city of McLean, installed the first gas meter in the new system last week. The meter, installed in Alanreed, marks a major step in the million dollar construction job which began in McLean last December. Gil Shea, superintendent of the project, said that the company has completed about 13 miles of the new system, which is about 25 percent of the total

amount of pipe which will be laid. McLean voters last May approved the project to build a new gas line to replace the city gas system which was installed in 1926. Shea said that every old piece of pipe that had been uncovered showed numerous leaks and was in very poor condition. "Every leak we uncover that is repaired when new pipe is laid, means money in the taxpayers

pocket," Shea said. The line to Alanreed is almost complete, with construction slightly delayed while waiting for material, Shea said. The construction company is not taking up the old pipe, unless it is in the place where the new pipe is to be laid. "Taking up the old pipe was not financially feasible," Mayor Sam Haynes said. "The city council decided that the old pipe was not in good enough

shape to justify the expense of removing it," he said. The company is installing new meters in each location, Shea said, unless the gas meter is very new. "I'm guessing that every old meter in town has at least some leakage," he said. Shea said that the company, which is employing about 12 workers, should have the project completed on schedule, in See CONSTRUCTION Page 3

## HUNDREDS CHOOSE NOT TO VOTE!

A light voter turn-out during an election usually means that the voters are satisfied with the status quo, but an embarrassingly low turn-out such as was evident in the two elections held in McLean last Saturday has to have greater ramifications than that.

In the city election, only 77 people bothered to vote, which is probably understandable since there were only three candidates for three positions.

But in the school board election, there were five candidates vying for three positions, and only 178 voters showed up at the polls. According to election officials, the big majority of those voters were people who no longer have children in school. Approximately 70 of the voters were parents with children in school.

Since the McLean schools have an enrollment of approximately 300 students, about 600 parents could have voted in the election.

Where were they? Why didn't they vote?

If this action (or rather inaction) does not scream loud and clear to our children "We don't care", then I don't know what the youngsters are expected to think.

It is a pathetic comment on our interest in our children and in our schools when such a small number go to the polls to elect representatives who will make the decisions which will guide our schools over the next few years.

The members of the board of education control a large sum of money, dispensed to pay for education. They set the tax rate, hire school teachers, decide on expenditures. It is a very important position, and representatives to that board should be chosen carefully. BY THE MAJORITY OF THE PEOPLE!

Several hundred people in McLean are apparently willing to let a few chosen those representatives, and in my opinion that is the beginning of the breakdown of our type of free government.

If you were one of the people who were just too busy to vote Saturday, then I am sure that you will not bother to complain about the way the school is run over the next few years. You effectively gave up your right to complain when you failed to vote.

Now, don't misunderstand. I think that three good men were elected to the board, and I have confidence in their abilities as school board members. It is just a shame that more people in McLean did not take the time to express their right by voting to elect a board that was elected.

When it comes time in May to elect county officials, will you stay home and allow the voters in Pampa to choose our officials for us? And when it comes time in November to vote for the President of the United States, will you be too busy to go to the polls and allow the people in other parts of the country to choose our president?

Perhaps this is the explanation behind the latest overblown controversy concerning the commissioners court in Pampa. According to some reports, an Amarillo station was present with its cameras and several radio and newspaper reporters were present at the meeting waiting for a big fight!

The cause? Several residents of McLean recently submitted a letter to the Gray County commissioners court asking that the court use its influence to urge law officers to be sure that one officer was on patrol on the weekends.

Some sharp television stringer picked up on the story and decided it would get him several minutes on the air (for which he gets paid).

So the stage was set for a big, public brawl, in which nothing would be accomplished, reputations would be ruined, but a reporter would have his story.

Imagine the disappointment when no one from McLean showed up to fight!

I can't speak for the instigators of the letter as to why they did not go to the meeting. I'm sure that they felt that it

was not necessary to be present. They had stated their case in the letter, it was presented to the sheriff and the court. McLean has an elected representative on the court, so why should they go? Besides, some action had already been taken, and I'm sure that the McLean people felt that the problem had at least been noticed, and that the commissioners and the sheriff were doing what they could to solve the matter. The McLean News did not send a staff member for the simple reason that we rarely attend the commissioners meeting unless the meeting happens to concern something vital to the town.

This particular meeting fell on a Tuesday, which is deadline day here, and we could not spare a staff member to attend. We did cover one commissioner's meeting when the hospital was sold, because we felt that the continuation of a hospital in McLean was of vital interest to McLean.

I'm sorry that the meeting didn't dissolve into a big controversy for the sake of the Amarillo news media who had made such a long trip.

However, maybe we will have some one else arrested for speeding, and the Amarillo paper and television stations can have another big, exciting story about McLean!

revised policy for the use of facilities to be discussed and adopted at a later meeting.

Members approved the election of two directors for the Region XVI Service Center in Amarillo.

The annual School Board workshop in Canyon April 30 was discussed. Superintendent Dwyer and board member Allison plan to attend.

Dwyer also said the school board policy manual needs to be localized and updated. Board members decided to revise parts of the manual at future meetings.

The need for repairing or replacing the large windows in the elementary building was also discussed. The windows make the school difficult to heat or cool, Dwyer said. The board decided to call in experts to give an estimate of the cost of covering the windows.

Dwyer told board members that he had received a federal revenue vocational application, by which the school would obtain about \$1,000 from the federal government, but that the form was extremely long and complicated to fill out. Board members told Dwyer to ignore the form unless he learned that the application had to be made to receive state funds for the vocational program.

Mrs. Johnson told board members that state officials had not decided on whether to use market value or ag use value for taxation next year. She said that the school may be able to stay with market value, which for McLean would be the lower of the two, for another year if the board approved. The members told Mrs. Johnson that if that were possible they would like to stay on the market value system for another year.

Five men were appointed to the tax equalization board for a one-year term. Members will be Gerald Tate, Steve Brass, and Ernie McCracken, with F. Jake Hess II and John M. Haynes as alternates.

The McLean schools will participate in three coop support programs through the Panhandle Education Service Center in Amarillo next year for approximately \$1,000 for each program. The school will have curriculum director service, library service, and counselor service. Dwyer explained to the board that the services were necessary for accreditation, and that by using the services from PESO the school would not have to hire individuals in each area.

have no respect for anyone who does not stand up for what he believes, regardless of the consequences.

That's a high and mighty statement to make, but at the risk of sounding self-righteous, I must confess that that is what I believe.

The primary times in my life that I feel that I have sinned gravely have been the times that I have kept my mouth shut and allowed a good idea to go undefended or allowed a wrong statement to go unchallenged. And I have been as guilty of that as many of you have.

I came from a family which had many good examples of that lofty ideal, but my father was particularly a man of deep integrity who fought for what he believed.

I watched him when I was about 10 years old become embroiled in a controversy that could cost him his job, but he stuck to his beliefs. He was already in failing health, we had no savings, we had no property to fall back on. He knew that if he lost his job, that there was a distinct possibility that we would suffer badly.

But he explained to me that there are things in the world which are much more important than money, or security, or even food to eat, and that is your own personal worth. He said that if you go against what you know is right, and compromise simply to remain secure that you have damaged your soul.

I remember a scene when, at the peak of the controversy, a school board member came and threatened my father that if he did not agree to certain terms that the board member would see to it that Dad was fired.

I'm sure he did not stop to realize that there was an impressionable child watching his reaction, but I took it all in when he said "You can't buy me or fire me but you can't buy me or my beliefs." And Dad quit. Walked away from a good job, when he had nothing to take its place. Walked away from a community where he was loved and respected. Walked away from the security of knowing he could put bread on the table for his family to eat.

And when he did, in my eyes, this small, sickly man became ten feet tall, and gave me an ideal which I have falteringly tried to live up to all my life.
