As a confirmed smoker for 23 years, I always looked at those who claimed to have quit, and thought that they undoubtedly had not had the habit as bad as I did, or they would not have been able to quit.

Several things acted as a catalyst for my quitting. In the first place, I had had bronchitis for about six months, and could not shake it, despite a hospital stay and several rounds of antibiotics.

Athletes Honored At All-Sports Banquet

The McLean High School athletes were honored Monday night at the annual All-Sports Banquet at the McLean Country Club. The banquet, sponsored jointly by the McLean Lions Club and the McLean Schools, has been an annual event in McLean for several years.

Five athletes were given special recognition at the ceremonies. Dick Bode was presented the McLean News Most Valuable Football Player Award by McLean News editor Linda Haynes. Bode, a senior at MHS, played center for the Tigers.

Joy Rhine was presented the Most Valuable Girl Athlete Award by coach Vester Joiner. Miss Rhine, an all-district basketball player, was also a regional qualifier in track.

Coach Jack Dorsett presented the Fighting Heart award to all-district Tiger Wade Smith. Smith, playing his first year for the McLean Tigers, was the all-district kicker this year, and set a district record for one of his kicks.

Billingsley, McDonald Face Run-Off June 7

McLean candidates Joe Billingsley and Jim McDonald are the only two candidates in Gray County who will have to face a run-off election, following the Democratic primary last Saturday. McDonald had 377 votes and Billingsley had 370 votes in the race for constable of precinct 5 which includes McLean. The other candidate in the race, Ray Sharber, had 173 votes, not enough to qualify for the run-off.

Gray County Clerk Wanda Carter said that the election will be June 7 with McDonald and Billingsley the only two on the ticket. "Unless I hear otherwise, I don't think there is another race which will require a run-off," Mrs. Carter said.

In McLean, Billingsley received 231 votes; McDonald, 216; and Sharber 47 votes.

In other races, McLean gave Jack Hightower 383 votes for the Democratic nomination for U.S. Representative. In a hotly-contested race for a seat on the railroad commission, McLean voted 203 votes for John Poerner and 165 votes for Buddy Hill. Also for Railroad Commis-

sioner, McLean voted 141 for Jim Hightower and 259 for James Nugent.

In the race for state senator, Bill Sarpalius received 305 votes to Gerald McCathern's 107 in McLean.

In the non-binding presidential primary in McLean, Carter garnered 206 votes, Kennedy 37, Jerry Brown 21, and uncommitted 151.

In other county races, Jerry Dean Williams defeated Billy Dean McMinn for Lefors const-

table of Precinct 1. Williams got 454 votes and McMinn received 383 votes.

Ruth Osborne, County Democratic chairman for several years, lost her seat to challenger Mary Simpson who received 1418 votes to Mrs. Osborne's 1106. O.L. Presley defeated Weldon Holley for County Commissioner of Precinct 1 (Lefors) with 571 votes to Holley's 336.

In uncontested races in the county, Harold L. Comer received 2242 for district attorney for the 31st district; Margie Gray received 2220 for tax assessor-collector; Rufe Jordan got 2327 votes for sheriff; James O. McCracken received 326 votes for commissioner of precinct 3; Robert D. McPherson won 2164 votes for county attorney; and Foster Whaley received 2308 for state representative from 66th district.

Only about 22 percent of the registered voters appeared at the polls Saturday, according to County Clerk Wanda Carter. Last year 2,795 Democrats and 1,125 Republicans voted in the county.

The most-valuable player winners were chosen by the athletes in secret balloting a few weeks ago.

Commissioners Meet In Pampa

Gray County Commissioners met for a short business session May 1 approving several items of business.

Included on the agenda was the approval of a payment of \$75 per call for fire calls in Gray County to the Mobeetie Fire Department. The county pays Lefors, McLean, Groom and Pampa Fire Departments for fire calls in the county. Representatives of the Mobeetie department said that they answered very few calls in Gray

County, but wanted an agreement with the county on the amount to be charged.

In other business, the court voted to join the city of Pampa in participating in the CETA program, approved spending \$506 for the purchase of new equipment for the County Health Department, and approved the number of ballots delivered to the county clerk's office for use in the absentee voting for the primary election.

Green Thumb Program Begins

Three McLean residents will have part-time jobs as a result of the Green Thumb program. Annie Herndon will work at the Alanreed-McLean Museum, Sophia Hutchison will work at the Lovett Memorial Library, and T.G. Richardson will work at the park as part of the program.

Green Thumb is a program sponsored by the Texas Farmers Union, and is part of a nation-wide program sponsored

by the National Farmers Union. The program emphasizes senior citizens to work for about 20 hours a week on programs which will improve the general welfare of the community. The program specifically forbids workers in the program from working in political activities or profit-making activities as part of their job.

McLean mayor Sam Haynes will supervise the employees in McLean.

Mayor Reminds Citizens Of Gun Rule

"McLean does have an ordinance which prohibits the firing of guns or pistols or any other kind of firearms in the city limits," Mayor Sam Haynes said this week.

"Several residents in McLean have been complaining to the city office that they have been hearing BB guns discharged in the city limits."

Ordinance #80 which was passed in 1942, states that it is "unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to fire guns or

pistols or air rifles or other firearms on any of the streets, alleys, parks or other public places within the corporate limits of the city of McLean, exempting elective and commissioned officers and those acting under permission of the city."

Haynes said that the problem has been growing in the last few weeks, and he wanted residents to be aware that there is an ordinance forbidding this type of activity.

But since I am an avid reader, it is only normal that it would be a book that really inspired me to quit. The book was "You Can Stop" and it was written by Jacquelyn Rogers, who was a smoker for 25 years.

She was the woman who founded the Smokers' program which is an eight-week long seminar to help people quit smoking. She wrote in the book of some of the things that they use in the seminars to help

addicted smokers. Perhaps the one chapter that helped me most was one about why people began smoking. I had to confess after I read the chapter and took the self-evaluation survey, that the reason I had started when I was 16 was because I was shy and because I wanted to look older.

At the tender age of 16 when I began smoking I was a married college freshman, surrounded by older, outgoing,

very sophisticated people. Since I was somewhat reticent and rather shy, and also much younger than my friends, I started smoking to give myself a crutch to lean on when I had to meet a stranger. I also thought the cigarettes made me look older.

After I discovered the reason that I had begun smoking, I had to admit that neither reason was valid for continuing. I am no longer shy, and I certainly don't care anything about looking older!

Also, so many people either are non-smokers or have quit smoking that it was getting to be a little embarrassing to smoke in public. Lisa and I noticed at the recent press convention we attended in Amarillo that out of about 65 or 70 people at the meetings, only two were smoking!

I would like to give a few words of advice to the families of the addicted smoker. It is certainly a good idea to let your smoker know that you are worried about his health because of his smoking. But continual nagging on the subject won't do much good.

Every smoker knows he has a problem. He also knows that it is bad for his health. But smokers can't be scared into quitting. Nor can they be driven to quit by your making them feel guilty.

If you are really concerned, buy them the book I mentioned. Or save up some money and offer to send them to one of the stop-smoking clinics that are held in Amarillo occasionally.

Smokers and alcoholics have a great deal in common. Victims of either bad habit cannot break that habit until they decide to!
