Grandview Rejects Compromise, Appraisal Board Question Not Solved

The Grandview-Hopkins Independent School District rejected the compromise for a nine-member county tax appraisal board in a special called meeting Jan. 31, according to a story by Deborah Bridges in The Pampa News, Feb. 1.

"The school board thinks the original seven-man board is the way to go," School Superintendent T.R. Adkins said, according to the story.

He said the board resolved to support the seven-member resolution first filed in mid-October and the Whittenburg law firm, representing Grandview-Hopkins will continue in the suit with Pampa and Pampa ISD.

Adkins said Grandview-Hopkins had dropped the original declaratory judgement suit against County Clerk Wanda Carter when she declared the seven-member resolutions using the three-quarter rule in Senate Bill 621, "not timely filed."

Jerrel Julian, school superintendent for Lefors ISD said the ISD and the city of Lefors held a combined meeting Thursday night and voted to withdraw the seven member resolution and proceed with the five-member board first stipulated in the senate bill.

The city of McLean and the McLean Independent School board voted in a later session to accept the compromise and filed their acceptance with the county clerk.

The nine-man board would give Pampa and Pampa ISD five representatives, with McLean having one, Lefors one, Grandview-Hopkins one, and Alameda one. The seven-man board would give Pampa three representatives, with the smaller taxing bodies each having one. The members of the five-man board will be elected by majority vote, with Pampa and Pampa ISD possessing the largest number of votes.

Each entity then turns in the nominees, the ballots are distributed by the clerk and the board is formed, he said.

County Clerk Wanda Carter said she had not received the Lefors resolution (as of Feb. 4) to withdraw the seven-member board.

but with the five man board, the smaller taxing bodies will probably not be represented at all," Haynes said.

According to The Pampa News, Pampa Mayor Thompson said since Grandview-Hopkins has rejected the nine-member board and if Lefors withdraws their seven member resolution, the five member board will become fact.

The county clerk provided for the number of members each entity can elect based on the tax dollars collected last year, Thompson said.

"Since Grandview-Hopkins refused to approve the compromise, all the smaller entities will be hurt," McLean mayor Sam Haynes said this week. "With the nine-man board, we were guaranteed at least some representation on the board."

Icy Highways Cause Wrecks

An icy Interstate 40 east of McLean caused two wrecks Jan. 30, injuring three people.

In the first wreck at 12:15 p.m. Ruby Jean Tuggle of Tulare, Cal., was pinned in the wreckage of the Kenworth truck she was driving. She had apparently lost control of the truck on the ice, and the truck rolled and landed upside down in the median.

The McLean Ambulance Service used its "jaws of life" tool to free the woman. She was taken to the McLean Hospital for treatment.

Her husband, Ronald Wayne Tuggle, a passenger in the truck, sustained several cuts on the face, and was also taken to the McLean hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Tuggle was given a ticket for excessive speed, according to Department of Public Safety Trooper John Holland.

In the second wreck that day, Michael Ray Hodge of Sacramento, Cal., lost control of his 1980 Chevrolet pickup in the same area about five miles east of McLean on I-40. The pickup rolled off the road on the right and turned over several times, going over the service road and landing on its wheels. Hodge had just purchased the new pickup in California. The vehicle was totally destroyed. He was ticketed for excessive speed.

A passenger in the pickup Burt Walder of Sacramento, Cal., was transferred to an Amarillo Hospital for treatment.

Nursing Home Given Superior

Four inspectors from the Texas Department of Health conducted a surprise inspection at McLean's Thomas Nursing Home Friday and gave the facility a superior rating.

The inspectors checked the entire facility, according to local nursing home director Bill Thomas, and found no deficiencies.

"The health department has

begun using a point system," Thomas said, "and they gave our nursing home 95 points and the highest rating possible."

The inspectors included a nurse, a dietician, a social service expert, and a generalist (an inspector who checks everything), all from Canyon.

This is the first inspection the McLean facility, opened in 1979, has undergone.

Home Nursing Care Available in McLean

The Panhandle Home Health Agency is offering nursing service in the home in McLean, according to officials of the agency. The nursing services are made under the direction of the patient's doctor, and skilled nursing visits can be made daily, weekly, or as often as needed.

The service can be paid for by Medicare, Medicaid, Champus, VA or private insurance.

According to officials, nursing care given can be monitoring blood pressure and vital signs for cardiac patients; health teaching for diabetics; physical therapy for CVA patients; injections as ordered by the doctor; care of Levin tubes and Foley catheters.

These services are available to persons in Wheeler, Donley,

Collingsworth, or Gray Counties.

BOARD STILL CONTROVERSIAL

Grandview-Hopkins last week voted to reject the compromise proposal offered by Pampa concerning the Gray County Appraisal Board.

If you have been following the developments concerning this board in the papers, you are probably as confused as I am about what is going on.

The board was mandated by Senate Bill 621 (which was rejected when it was called the Pevetoe Bill, but passed by our "far-sighted" legislature last May). The bill calls for each county to establish a county-wide appraisal board which would set appraisals for all property in the district for ad valorem taxes collected by the schools, cities, hospital districts in the county, etc., every taxing body except the county government itself. This appraisal board will use guidelines furnished by the state to appraise property so that each taxing body will collect taxes on a uniformly appraised basis.

It sounds like a good idea... on the surface. For example, in Texas now, you pay taxes to the school, the city, the county, and to a hospital or college district if your county has one (Gray County has neither). A tax apaiser for the school might value your land property at \$10,000 and the city might value the same property at \$15,000 so you would be paying taxes on two different values.

The purpose of this board is to eliminate that kind of inconsistency.

In the bill, the county tax appraisal boards are to be five-member boards with the members chosen by the taxing entities. Each taxing body will have a number of votes in proportion to the amount of taxes that entity collects.

What it boils down to is that with a five-man board, the city of Pampa and the Pampa Independent School district, as the largest tax-gathering bodies in the county will have the lions share of the vote, and if they want to, will probably be able to choose all five members.

The smaller taxing bodies in Gray County (the city of McLean, McLean ISD, the city of Lefors, Lefors ISD, Alanreed school, and Grandview-Hopkins ISD) decided to take advantage of a part of the bill which says that three-fourths of the taxing bodies can vote to change the number of members or the method of selection.

The smaller taxing groups decided to vote for a seven-man board with Pampa receiving three members, and the other four members chosen from the smaller units.

The petition was declared "untimely" since no one was sure exactly when it had to be filed, and things were brought to a stand still with Grandview-Hopkins filing suit to enforce the seven-man board.

Of course, Pampa, as the majority tax collector in the county, was not to be happy with the seven-man board, since they would not have even a simple majority but would pay 90 percent of the cost of the board. They proposed a compromise which would give a nine-man board, with five members coming from Pampa, and four from the smaller taxing units.

The compromise was a fair settlement of the controversy, and in a meeting at Lefors, all bodies concerned seemed to agree on the compromise. Local officials in McLean were pleased with the compromise as the best solution to a thorny problem, and it looked like the problems were over...until last week.

For some strange reason, Grandview-Hopkins school district decided to stick its heels in the ground and opt for the seven-man board. We're not sure what motivated their decision, but in my opinion, their vote has thrown the entire question back into a controversy that will not be solved to anyone's advantage.

The compromise proposal by Pampa was a fair one, if we all accept the idea of majority rule. The small taxing entities should have a voice on the board, but they should not have the majority vote. As the situation stands now, the five-man board will probably become the official board, and the small taxing bodies will be lucky if they get a single representative on the board.

As I've stated before, the whole controversy is probably nothing but a tempest in a teapot, because the state will set the guidelines for appraisals and the board will probably be nothing but a figurehead which will rubberstamp whatever the state says. However, it would have been much better for McLean and Lefors and Alanreed and Grandview-Hopkins if each one had had a representative on the board to protect the interests of all of us outside the city of Pampa.

Grandview-Hopkins has probably made that impossible by their actions and we are all losers because of it.

board, but should she receive the resolution the five-member board will go into effect.

The Grandview-Hopkins suit has not been stopped to her knowledge, so it's possible it will still go to the courts to be decided, she said.

The city of McLean and McLean ISD had participated in the suit earlier, according to Mayor Haynes, and had shared some of the cost of the suit, but if Grandview-Hopkins continues with the suit, the city will not participate, Haynes said.

According to superintendent Carl Dwyer, the McLean school board has not met to make any decision about continuing support for the suit, but "I feel that they won't want to go ahead with the support, because we don't have anything to gain now," Dwyer said.

Oct. 12, 1979, members from the city of Pampa and the Pampa ISD — in separate meetings — nominated five men to be considered for election to the county tax appraisal board.

The same week in October, six entities from Gray County turned in resolutions to County Clerk Wanda Carter using the three-quarters rule in Senate Bill 621.

The bill, passed last May by the 66th state legislature, states three-fourths of the taxing entities in a county may change the method or the number of members on the county tax appraisal board.

It was designed to create a centralized county board to determine tax appraisals for ad valorem purposes.

Several suits are pending across the state to determine the interpretation of the bill.

Letter Writing Book Offered

As part of its nationwide National Letter Writing Week observance (February 24 - March 1), the U.S. Postal Service, in cooperation with the National Council of Teachers of English, is offering a booklet on letter writing for school youngsters according to McLean Postmaster Frank Simpson.

"All About Letters" is a 64-page publication designed for students in grades six through twelve. The NCTE, an organization of some 100,000 teachers of English, has been licensed by the Postal Service to print, accept orders for and distribute copies to public, private and parochial schools and the general public.

The booklet's three sections offer guidance and instruction for all types of letters. The first section, for example, includes letters for personalities such as composer-performer Stevie Wonder, the former New England Patriot star Darryl Stingley and noted columnist Abigail Van Buren (Dear Abby) and Joyce Lain Kennedy. Students will learn how to write job application letters, resumes, fan letters, pen pal letters, letters to editors, consumer complaints and how to avoid being cheated by mail fraud swindlers.

Other portions of the booklet list addresses for organizations offering publications by mail on hundreds of subjects of interest to students, from "archeological digs" to "200 populations."

Postmaster Simpson said teachers, parents and students can obtain copies of the booklet by writing to the National Council of Teachers of English, Department A, 1111 Kenyon Road, Urbana, IL 61801 and enclosing a check or money order for \$1.50 for a single copy, or 75 cents per copy when ordered in classroom sets of 20 or more copies.

Clarendon Enrollment Hits Record

Final statistics released by the registrar's office of Clarendon College shows the college has 772 students enrolled for the spring semester, the largest spring enrollment ever for the panhandle college. The enrollment is a 9% increase over the 705 students enrolled at the institution last spring. The final enrollment figures are a total head count of academic, vocational, adult-vocational and community services classes. The Clarendon College-Pampa Center enrolled 424 students. The center is offering 30 academic courses and a number of community service programs. The center has scheduled both daytime and evening classes this semester. 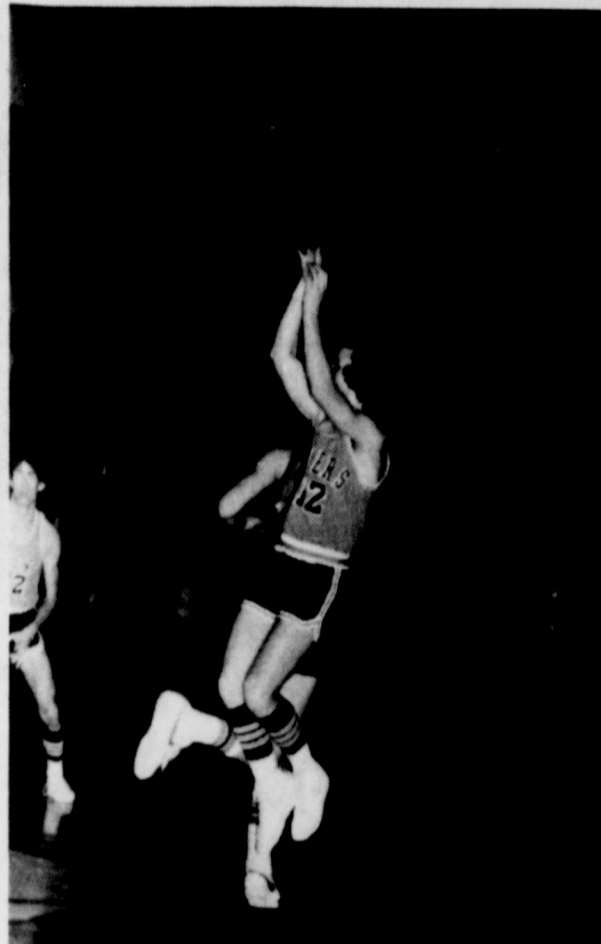

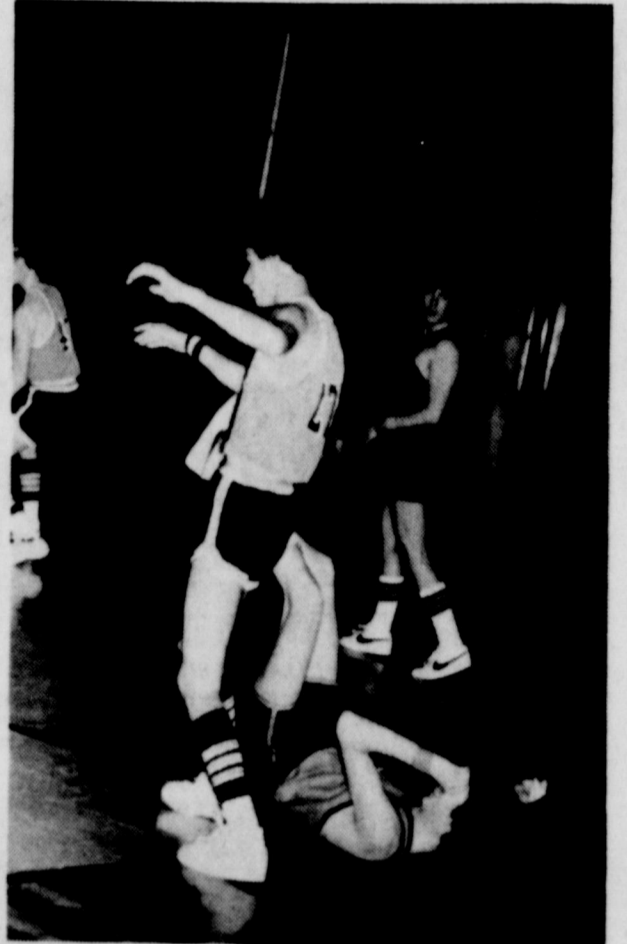

In The Kitchen

I found some new recipes for ground beef that I think you will enjoy. Of course, in this time of high food prices, ground beef has become a staple in almost every menu.

For some variety in ground beef dishes, try these two.

TACO BURGERS
 1 lb. ground beef
 1 16-oz. can tomatoes, cut up
 1 tsp. chili powder
 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
 1/4 tsp. garlic salt
 1/2 tsp. sugar
 1/4 tsp. dry mustard
 8 hamburger buns, toasted
 2 cups shredded lettuce
 1 cup shredded American cheese

In skillet, brown meat; drain off excess fat. Add tomatoes, chili powder, Worcestershire sauce, garlic salt, sugar, and dry mustard. Stir well, breaking up large pieces of tomato. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer gently, uncovered, for 15 to 20 minutes, or till thick. Spoon into toasted buns. Sprinkle with lettuce and shredded cheese. Makes 8 servings.

STROGANOFF MEATBALLS
 1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup
 1/4 c. milk
 1 c. oz. package cream cheese, softened
 2 Tablespoons catsup
 1/4 tsp. dried thyme, crushed
 1/8 tsp. garlic powder
 12 meatballs* (see recipe below)
 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
 8 oz. medium noodles, cooked and drained

Make meatballs by beating one egg, add 2 T. milk, 1 pound ground beef, 2 T. chopped onion, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 cup soft bread crumbs. Place meatballs in baking pan. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes. (May be made ahead and frozen after cooking for later use.)

In large saucepan, combine soup and milk; add cheese, catsup, thyme, and garlic. Cook and stir over low heat till blended. Stir in meatballs, simmer, covered till meatballs are thoroughly warm about 10 minutes. Stir small amount of hot sauce into sour cream; return to saucepan. Heat through but do not boil. Serve over noodles.

THE WESTERN PEACE OFFICER

(A Legacy of Law and Order) by Frank Richard Prassel

The long-accepted myths about the exploits of the lawmen of the west are brought to reality in this carefully researched and well-written book by Frank Prassel.

The glitter and tinsel associated with the stories of the enforcers of law from the days of the frontier till the present time are shown to be a fallacy in most cases, and the author shows the day to day drudgery and often unrewarded efforts of those responsible for upholding the law.

Exploits of famous men such as Wyatt Earp are complemented by stories of less known but sometimes more colorful men such as Frank Watron (who wore a diamond-encrusted badge of solid gold), who not only upheld the law, but ran a drugstore and tended bar as well.

Prassel believes and expounds in his book that despite the efforts down through the years, law has never really been brought to the west, and that it is as bad now as it ever was in the old days.

The author mentions several times in the book that the lawman's duties were largely routine, without the flair and romanticism commonly associated with the job, and that most of the men involved were no better or more flamboyant than the people they served.

"The Western Peace Officer" is a volume that will be enjoyed by all those interested in the history of the west or the progress or lack of progress of law and law enforcers down through the years.
