Tigers Claw Owls 39-0

McLean's Tigers got more than a mouthful of feathers as they hooted the Silverton Owls off the field in a 39-0 blitz Friday night.

McLean struck quickly as they took less than a minute and a half to score their first touchdown of the game on a 21 yard scamper by James Matheny. The drive took only three plays, with the big one a 46 yard run by Terry Todd.

The impressive first drive was only a preview of things to come as McLean's offense ran roughshod over the Owls. The Tigers rushed for 278 yards behind the fine blocking of the offensive line, anchored by Theron Stubbs, Bill Hambright, Bill Kincannon, Tim Smith and Frank Todd.

The Tigers asserted themselves on defense as they allowed the Owls only 50 yards and four first downs for the night. On Silverton's first possession McLean forced the Owls back toward their own goal line. Bill Hambright's sack of the quarterback for a long

loss put Silverton in a hole from which they could not recover.

Following an exchange of punts Silverton started from their own 20. The McLean defense again rose to the occasion as Dudley Reynolds, Bill Skipper, and Terry Todd forced an Owl fumble and the Tigers recovered at the Silverton 19. Two plays and two penalties left the Tigers facing 3rd and 21 at the 30. Dusty Sanders sprinted to the seven on a bootleg for a first and goal as the first quarter drew to a close. On 4th and goal from the 6 yard line Tim Killham snared an errant pass to bring the score to 12-0.

McLean's next score, following a Tim Killham fumble recovery, came as Terry Todd took the handoff at the Owl 15 and rambled into the end zone. Tim Smith kicked the first extra point of the game to give the Tigers a 19-0 lead in the middle of the second quarter.

The remainder of the first half was scoreless.

McLean opened the third

quarter with as much excitement as they had given the crowd in the first half. After Todd's kick off the Owls brought the ball to their own 17. A hard advance left them at 4th and 8, and a low snap resulted in a fumble in the end zone, where it was covered by McLean's Billy Kincannon to bring the tally to 25-0.

Silverton, hampered by hard-hitting Theron Stubbs and Bill Hambright, and stymied by Bill Kincannon's quarterback sacks, was unable to find its way to the McLean end of the field, and it was McLean's ball after an Owl punt to the McLean 35. A series of short runs by Terry Todd and James Matheny, squelched by an off-sides penalty, brought the ball back to the McLean 47, leaving the Tigers at 3rd and 8. Matheny then zipped around the opponents' line for a 41 yard run to the Owl six yard line. A few seconds later it was McLean-31, Silverton-0 as a handoff from Sanders saw Bill

Skipper dancing into the Owl end zone.

On Silverton's next possession they managed to get the ball to their own 42 before a fumbled pass attempt was recovered by Tim Smith at the Owl 32. A penalty brought the Tigers back to the 42 and 1st and 20, but a tipped pass intended for Tim Killham was caught by a long-reaching Bobby Sprinkles, bringing the ball to the Owl 20. After several no yardage gain plays by the Tigers, and a delay of game penalty, Dusty Sanders gave up trying to fight his way through the Owl line and simply carried most of them with him on his trek to the four yard line, bringing McLean to 1st and goal to go as the third quarter ended.

The next play saw Sanders following a path cleared by center Frank Todd to the two yard line. On fourth down and

A Mockery Of Justice

Shakespeare's solution was simple and direct. "First thing we do," he has one of his characters say, "we'll kill all the lawyers." That might be a bit drastic. Some of our best friends are lawyers, but Texans might consider some drastic action against the hair-splitting legalists on the Court of Criminal Appeals whose most recent outrage against the People of this State was the reversal last week of convictions against two killers from Amarillo, the "travelling rapist" and the brutal murderer who used a dough-mixing machine to mangle a victim's head.

The capital murder convictions against this pair were overturned, not because the Justices found the evidence against either of them insufficient, but on questionable technical grounds.

The conviction of Samuel Hawkins, the "travelling rapist", for example, was overturned by the Court of Appeals because, the Justices declared Hawkins was not sufficiently advised of the danger of representing himself in the trial, which he insisted on doing, although a court-appointed attorney was forced to sit helplessly while he did it.

A new trial for Hawkins will mean that the only survivor of his reign of terror, a gallant lady from Hereford, will have to go through all over again the traumatic experience of testifying against him since she is the only one of Hawkins' victims who lived to identify him as the attacker.

This is a mockery of justice, additional trauma for a victim, and an intolerable burden for society.

Letters To The Editor

Dear Mrs. Haynes:

As former Mayor of Amarillo, and one who has a continuing interest in the welfare of the Panhandle area, I am writing to correct and clarify several misleading statements made in your editorial of August 28th regarding State Senator Bob Price.

FIRST: The truth is that Bob Price did aid in the passage of several vital and significant pieces of legislation during the last session. As a member of the Natural Resources Committee, he passed bills in the Senate to encourage the production and sale of gasoline, thus utilizing Texas grain crops (S.B. 988), and to stimulate solar and wind-powered energy (S.B. 204). Bob Price sponsored the Family Farm Security Act which was overwhelmingly approved by voters in November, 1979, as an amendment to the Constitution, and the Price version (S.B. 1321) of the Ogallala Water Import Authority bill was substituted for the original bill and passed into law. Senator Price also co-sponsored bills in the Senate to provide in-home care for the elderly, and to assist qualified senior citizens meet increasing utility bills.

SECOND: You criticize Senator Price for expenditures to operate offices in the district and in Austin, and compare his costs to those of former Senator Max Sherman. What you fail to tell your readers is that Mr. Sherman was able to utilize his existing law office, while Senator Price—a farmer and rancher—had no such existing facilities and was forced to rent and furnish offices to serve citizens in the area. Perhaps you would rather have him try to service district needs from his hay barn!

Bob Price has done an outstanding job for all citizens of the 31st Senatorial District in his first term. His opponent's short stint as an aide to Billy Clayton does not qualify him to undertake the important job as our State Senator, nor do his degrees give him a first-hand understanding of the daily problems facing our area's agri-business community.

In 1976, much to our present dismay, many people voted for "a nice guy with a nice smile" and now we have Jimmy Carter. This is not the time for our area to have a senator who needs "on-the-job training." We need an effective, experienced, proven conservative like Bob Price in the Texas Senate, and I feel his reelection is greatly warranted.

EDITORS REPLY

Our readers should be informed that Mr. Drummond sent this letter along with a press release to several area newspapers, stating that he was tired of Sarpalius' slandering Price's record. However, the editorial which Mr. Drummond took issue with was not written by Sarpalius, nor by one of Sarpalius' workers, but by the editor of this newspaper, and I stand behind what was published.

Drummond says that I misled my readers by saying the Price had not passed "a single Senate bill out of the 27 which he introduced." That is a correct statement. Price did co-sponsor some bills which eventually passed, or he wrote bills similar to ones already existing in the House and those bills eventually passed.

Those who understand the workings of the state legislature know the difference between introducing a bill and aiding passage of a bill.

The legislative process is a complicated one, and I don't pretend to understand all the convolutions politicians go through during a session. However, co-sponsoring and authoring bills already written in the House are not the same as writing, introducing, and passing a bill.

As far as office expenses are concerned, the state audit report lists Price's expenses. Those are a matter of public record, and renting office space was not the only expense which was high.

Check the list of expenses, Mr. Drummond. You might be surprised at the money spent on phone calls and salaries. I am sorry that the only thing that has been noticed about the editorial was the negative statement about Price. I had intended the opinion to be a positive endorsement of Bill Sarpalius, rather than a tirade against Price.

I object to Drummond somehow trying to link Sarpalius with Jimmy Carter. That's very far-fetched, and that kind of reasoning is pretty foggy. He

prognosis for complete healing was not very good.

We went through that horror of watching a little child wheeled into surgery in a big, strange place. His eyes pleaded with me above the stark, white gown as the nurses took him away.

We spent the next few hours sitting or pacing in the waiting room, thinking of all the things that can go wrong when a child has surgery, thinking of that healthy, happy little boy perhaps permanently crippled.

In a few hours, Scott was in his room sound asleep. Sam slept in a chair by his bed, but I was still pacing in the waiting room, keyed up from the excitement and still worried and feeling very sorry for myself. Why did it have to happen to Scott? What if he was never able to run, play football, ride horses?

The fears and anger built inside me until I was almost in tears.

About that time I noticed another woman in the waiting room. She was about my age, and was sitting staring at the wall. I noticed that occasionally she would get up and stare in the window of a door that was marked "Isolation."

"Do you have a child in here?" I asked.

"Yes, my daughter," she said. "She's eight years old."

I really wasn't too interested in her problem, because I was so busy feeling sorry for myself, but it was the middle of the night, and we were alone in the waiting room.

"Is she here for a tonsilectomy?" I asked, sure that her problem could not be as bad as mine, since she was so calm.

And then I noticed the stricken look on her face. "No," she said quietly, "we brought her in this afternoon...my husband just went out for coffee...they think she has meningitis...they won't let me hold her...and she keeps crying for me." About that time she went back to the window and I went with her, and there lay a little girl, holding her arms toward the face in the window, crying "Mommy, Mommy!"

I spent most of that night sitting with that mother, and later with her husband. The doctors had told them that they didn't know if the child would live through the night. Unbelievably, about five o'clock in the morning, the father received an emergency call in the waiting room. Their only other child, a little girl about six, had developed the same symptoms as her sister and was being rushed to Amarillo in an ambulance.

"SUGAR-FREE" MAY CAUSE DIARRHEA:
"Sugar-free" foods may cause diarrhea, if they contain sorbitol or manitol. Sorbitol and manitol are the key ingredients in many "sugar-free" foods designed for use in weight-control diets—and as aids in preventing tooth decay. Sorbitol and manitol are known as "hexitols" or sugar alcohols. They are slowly absorbed from the intestinal tract into the body, and they're slowly acted upon by bacteria in the mouth.

Unfortunately, these sugar alcohols do cause problems in some individuals.

Medical authorities are reporting cases of "chewing-gum diarrhea" in patients who consume large amounts of sugar-free gum. Chewing gum isn't the only problem though. Any foods containing sorbitol or manitol can cause diarrhea in some persons. Children are affected, as well as adults, particularly if they eat large amounts of dietetic candies.

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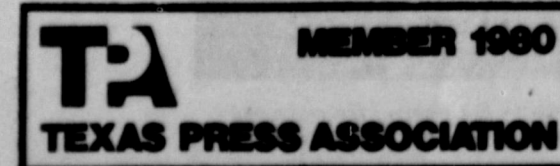
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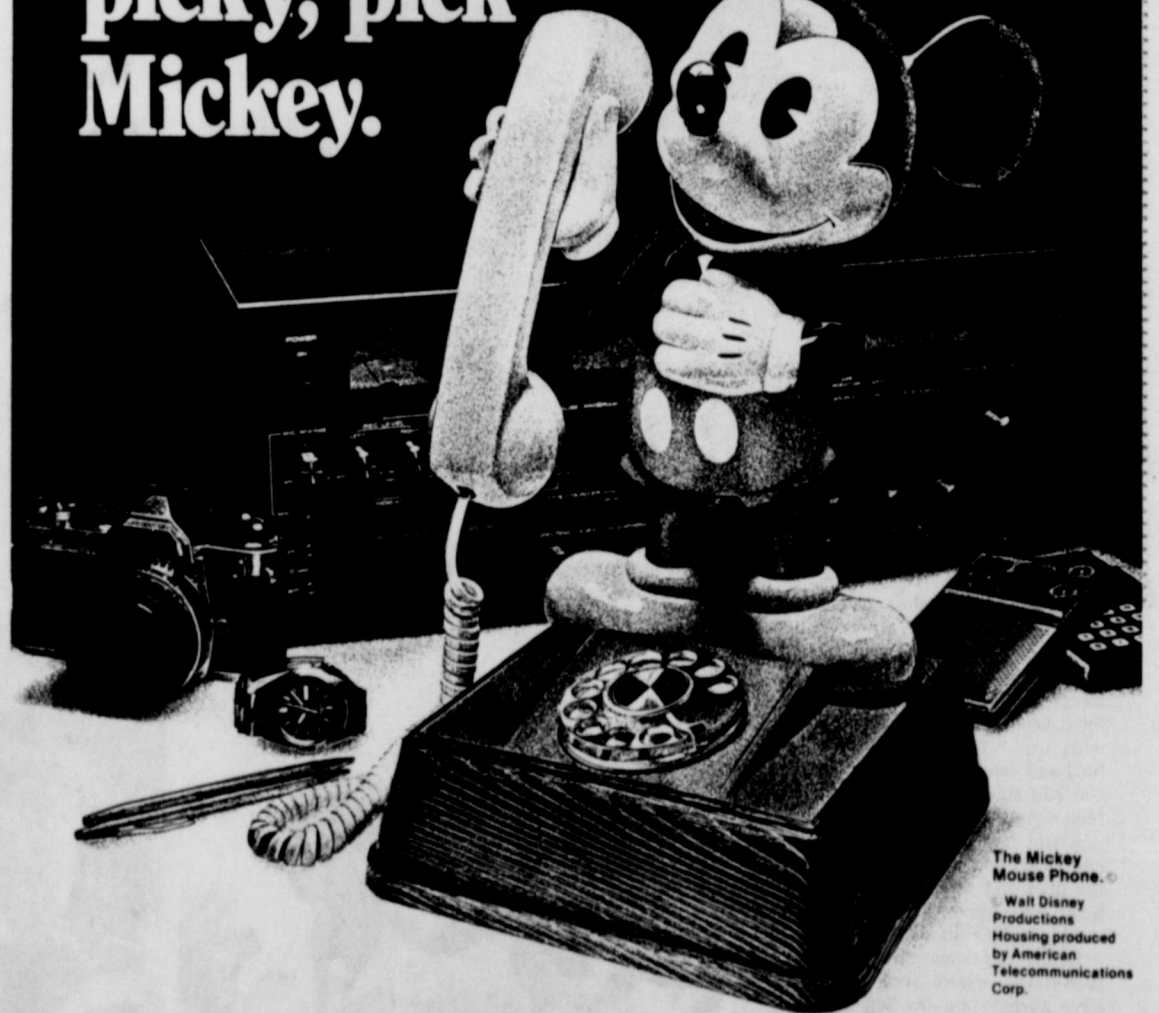

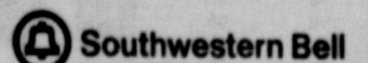

Cattlemen Losing Money

COLLEGE STATION--Recent high calf prices in the 80-to-90 cents a pound range are delighting cattlemen, but they're not making too many trips to the bank. Why? Because with rapidly increasing production costs, they're breaking even.

"While current calf prices are up substantially over the 1975-78 period, producers are not recording big profits," emphasizes Dr. Ed Uvacek, livestock marketing economist with

the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

He points out that production costs have increased steadily in recent years, as shown by a recent U.S. Department of Agriculture report on cow-calf operation costs and returns.

According to the report, 1978 production costs per cow totaled \$295.25. Those costs then jumped to \$371.73 per cow in 1979, and projections for 1980 show production costs at \$420.64 per cow. Costs in terms of actual pounds of feeder calves sold are even more startling since every cow does not have a calf, some calves are held over until they are yearlings before being sold, and other factors such as high death losses. For 1978 the cost per feeder calf sold was \$67.32 per hundred-weight (cwt). The comparable 1979 figure was \$75.67 per cwt, and the estimate is \$86.75 per cwt. for 1980.

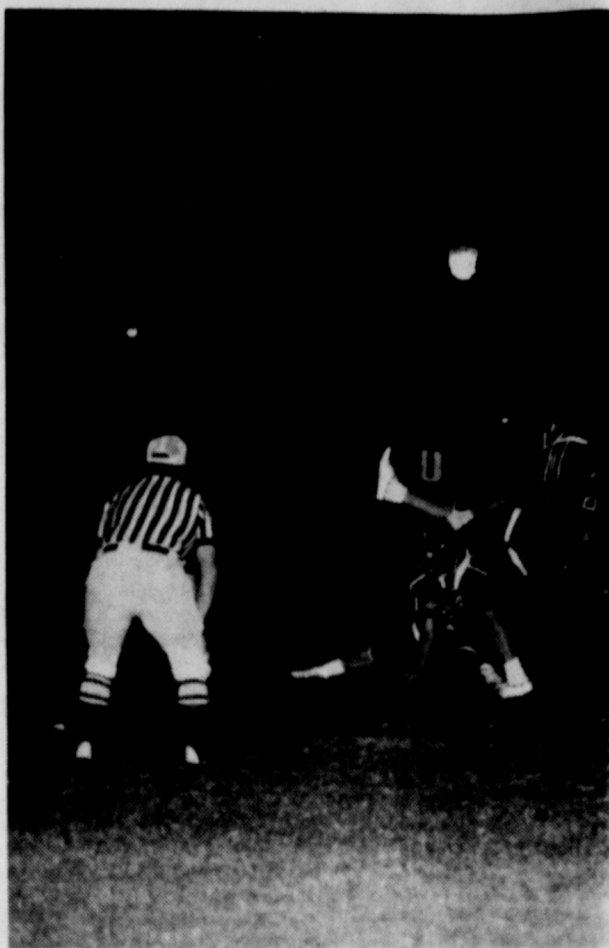

A Sanders handoff to Brock Crockett saw the ball advance to the 40, then Kevin McDowell, seeing a hole on the left, streaked through the Owl line, and when the dust cleared McLean had a 1st and 10 at the Owl 18. Brock Crockett sprinted into the end zone for the sixth Tiger touchdown of the night, bringing the final score to 39-0.

The Amarillo Globe-News named Dusty Sanders as one of the top contenders for Class 1A player of the week award, noting "Sanders, a senior quarterback, sparked McLean's 39-0 upset of Silverton, a four-point favorite according to the Harris Rating System."

"He set up three touchdowns with runs on third-and-20 and third-and-15 situations," said

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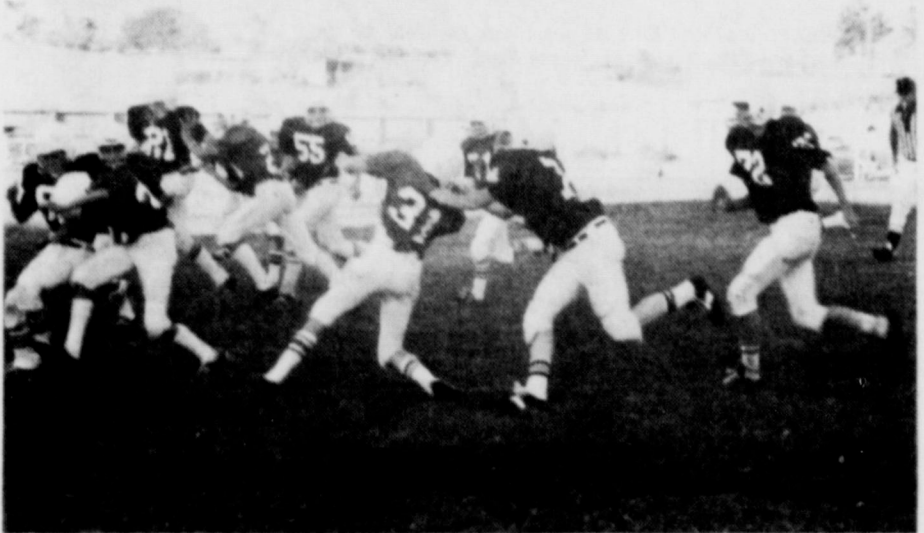

McLean Junior High And Junior Varsity Drop Games To Visitors



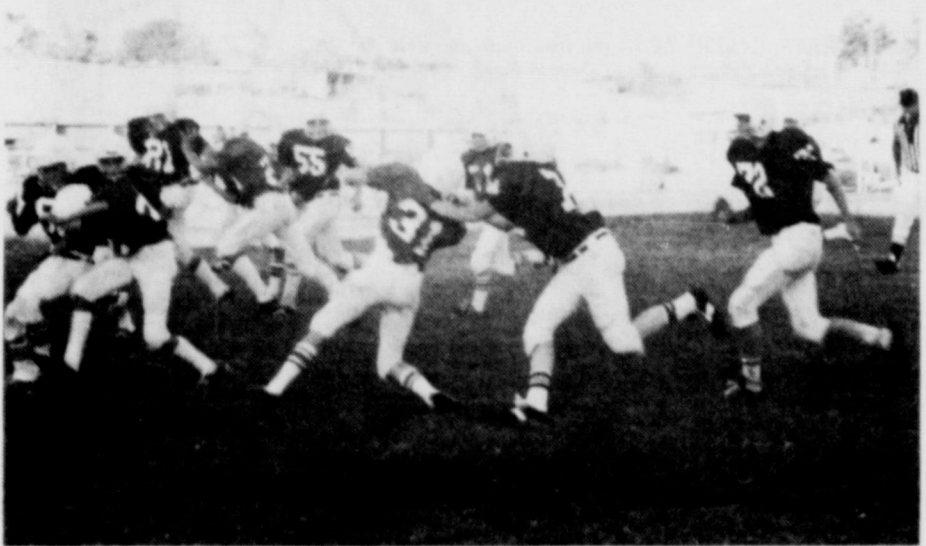

The junior varsity, which lost earlier in the season to Childress, also lost to Childress Thursday night with the JV visitors scoring 24 points. Mc-

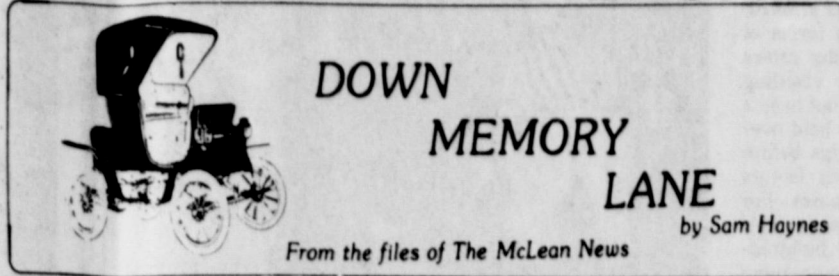
Lean JV was unable to get on the scoreboard.

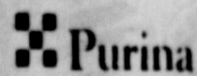

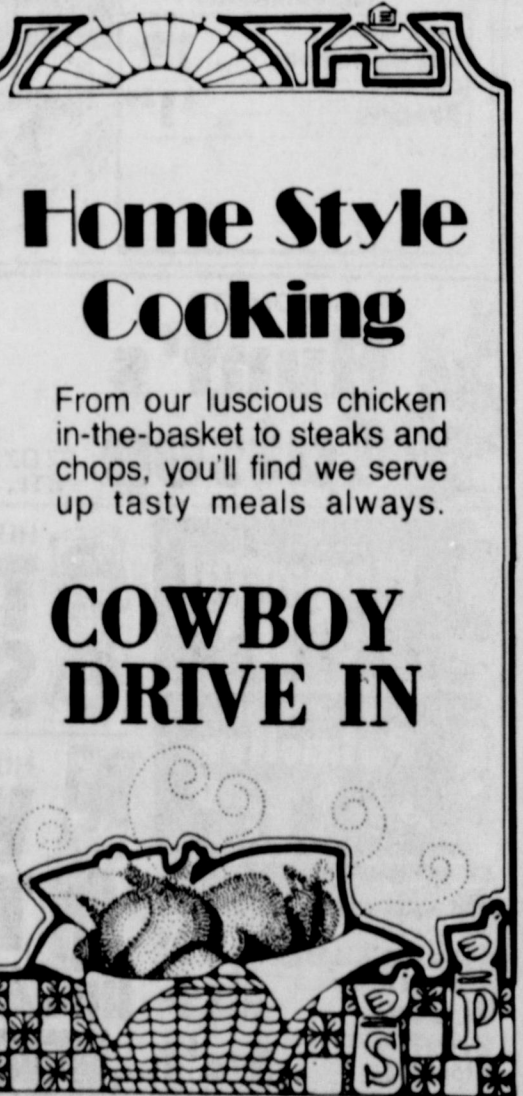

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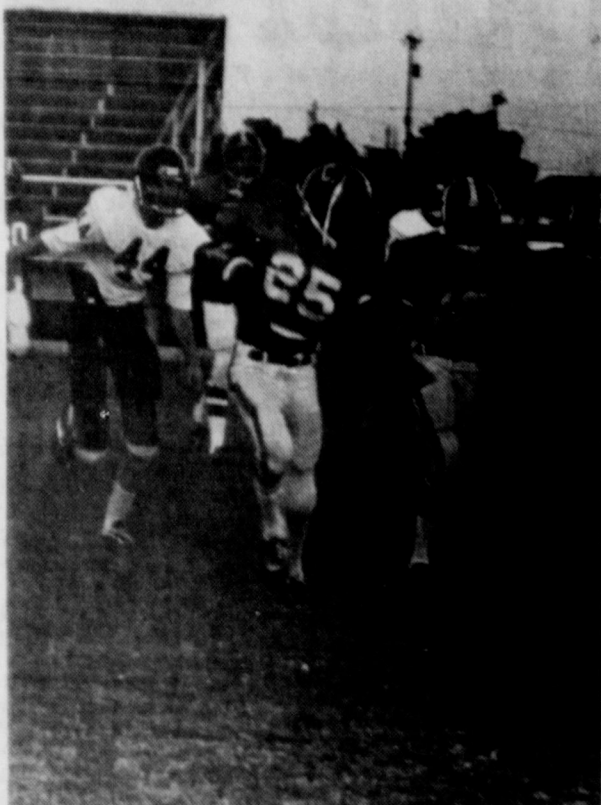
