## All First Class Mail to go Airmail

The U. S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program will go into effect at McLean Post Office on October 11, Postmaster Frank Simpson said today. Under the program, first-class mail will receive that is equal to airmail. "In practical terms, what this service improvement means is that domestic first-class postage now will purchase the level of service that previously only airmail could buy," said Simpson. "Under the new program, there no longer will be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery," he said. Priority mail, which includes air parcel service, and international airmail are unaffected by the improvement program and continue in their present form, the postmaster said. "Airmail stamps will be sold for use on priority and international airmail. They can also be used in various combinations with other stamps for first class mail. Customers can exchange stamped envelopes and cards at full postage value for ordinary stamps, stamped envelopes and cards. Stationery bearing airmail indicia will be allowed to be mailed at the first-class rate, Postmaster Simpson said. To aid postal customers and areas targeted for next and second from McLean will be on display in the post office lobby, the postmaster said.

## Congressman Hightower Announces Beef Research - Information Act Passed

Congressman Jack Hightower today announced final passage of the Beef Research and Information Act by the House of Representatives. The bill, H.R. 7656, passed by a margin of 40 votes, 229 to 189. "I am delighted with this action by the House," the Congressman said. "In approving the bill by such a substantial margin the House has firmly endorsed and commended the beef industry's desire and intent to help itself." Hightower said the bill will enable cattlemen to conduct a referendum, on whether a two-thirds majority favors a uniform collection to establish a fund for research, consumer and production information and market program is voluntary, allowing any producer to get his assessment refunded upon request. There had been intense lobbying against the bill by organized consumer groups, prompting the House leadership to postpone final consideration three times. Representatives Fred Richmond, Democrat of Brooklyn, N.Y., offered an amendment that would have mandated that 50 percent of the 68-member beef board must be made up of consumers. His amendment was resoundingly defeated by voice vote. "Beef industry leaders

AUSTIN—Auto insurance rates almost certainly are going up—and rather steeply.

The State Insurance Board staff recommended an average statewide increase of 17 per cent at an October 1 hearing on proposed new rates.

Even that didn't satisfy insurance industry spokesmen who asked a 24.9 per cent overall increase.

Figures proposed by Board staff actuaries would increase company revenues \$112.8 million a year. The companies sought a \$165.4 million hike.

New rates outlined by the Board staff would raise premiums of so-called typical or average motorists over 25 years of age driving late-model medium-priced cars to work in the range of \$8 to \$43 a year.

Smallest increase would be in the Sherman-Denison area and the largest in Houston.

Figures refer to standard liability, \$100 deductible collision and full coverage comprehensive.

Young drivers in Houston may face a \$130 increase, to \$746 a year, for their regular coverage, while older drivers in that city pay about \$296 for the same insurance.

The Board will make its decision by October 15, Chairman Joe Christie indicated. New rates would take effect January 1. A raise of 8.8 per cent was ordered last year.

**Spending At Record**

State government spending hit an all-time monthly high of \$962,154,535 last May, Treasurer Jesse James has reported.

James' report for the fiscal year ending August 31 said average monthly spending totalled \$712,750,000 during the period.

The Treasurer said the state earned more than \$78.9 million during the last fiscal year of \$1.33 billion worth of time account deposits in 1,240 Texas banks. He said cigarette tax collections totalled \$247.6 million, interest and dividends on investments held by the treasury bond division \$315 million and escheat and other taxes collected by treasury \$2.97 million.

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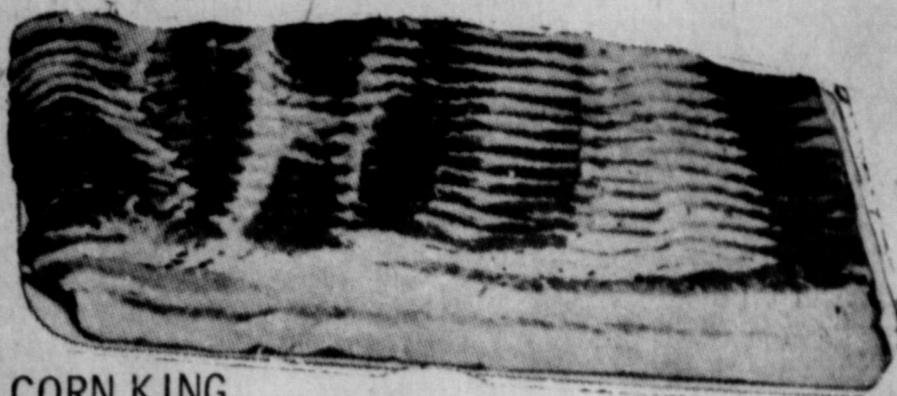

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### Commission Gets Case

The new Texas Public Utilities Commission got its first case last week — a controversy over telephone equipment rates.

Its authority to act before January 1 is expected to be challenged, since the law creating the agency gave it regulatory duties starting next year.

Fisk Telephone Systems Inc. of Houston accused Southwestern Bell Telephone Company of offering "fictitious" low prices on special PBX telephone equipment in an effort to drive out competitors.

The case was accepted by the Commission for filing and turned over to the attorney general's office for where-do-we-go-from-here advice.

### Courts Speak

A federal district court jury convicted District Judge O.P. Carrillo on income tax charges. Duval County Commissioner Ramiro Carrillo was also found guilty.

Increases in assessed property values for more than 500 Fayette County owners of rural land without individual written notice were invalidated by the Third Court of Civil Appeals.

A divided Supreme Court held Lo-Vaca Gathering Company must pay \$7,244 to an Erath County couple due to damage of their fishing lake in laying a pipeline.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals, in an Austin case, said mechanics who repaired a car later abandoned had first claim on it, over a bank which held a larger note on the vehicle.

The Governor appointed Peter S. Solito of Houston 208th district judge.

He named Gene H. Bishop of Dallas, J. Frank Holt III of Dallas and John P. Thompson to the Texas Turnpike Authority board of directors. (Holt and Thompson are reappointees.)

Henry Sanchez Jr. of Brownsville, a former state representative, is new deputy director of Texas Good Neighbor Commission.

U.S. Sen. John Tower placed Bill Keener of Dallas in charge of his Austin office. Larry Combust will move from the Senator's Austin office to Dallas, and Mrs. Dorothy De La Garza of Dallas will assume public relations duties in Tower's Dallas office.

### AG Opinions

A school district can't charge for supplies, lab fees and band uniforms without legislative authority, Atty. Gen. John Hill said in an opinion.

Hill concluded the Texas Open Records Act on confidentiality of personnel records does not keep Alvin Independent School District from disclosing employment applications to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Firms specializing in fitting executive-level personnel into jobs are still private employment agencies for regulatory purposes if a significant portion of their activity involves providing employees for employers Hill said.

The Attorney General said a state employee who exhausts accrued sick leave becomes eligible for workmen's compensation benefits.

He classified crew leaders, day labor contractors and operators of temporary labor pools as "labor agents."

### Bullock Balks

Comptroller Bob Bullock turned down a University of Texas request to pay an architectural firm for UT law school building remodeling plans.

Bullock, reviving a long-standing controversy, said the law school project had not been approved by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, and the Governor had vetoed appropriations bill riders attempting to give the project legislative approval.

The vetoed rider is void, anyway, because it sought to write general legislation in an appropriations bill, Bullock said.

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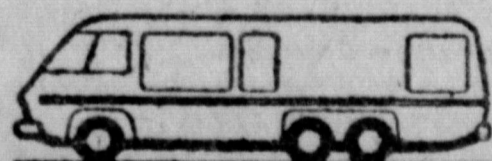

## Prairie Chicken Hunt Scheduled

Upland bird hunters are preparing for the annual October prairie chicken season to be held in 12 Panhandle and four South Plains counties.

The weekend of Oct. 18 and 19 should be marked on your calendar and if the excellent food and cover condition continue in Northwest Texas, Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists predict a good prairie chicken season.

The eight Panhandle counties open include Ochiltree Lipscomb, Roberts, Hemphill, Gray, Wheeler, Donley and Collingsworth. The South Plains counties of Terry, Cochran, Hockley, and Yoakum are included on the list.

The daily limit will again be two birds with four in possession and shooting hours are 30 minutes before sunrise to 30 minutes after sunset for both days.

Firearms used or carried by prairie chicken hunters will be restricted to shotgun, longbow and arrow or falcony.

Successful prairie chicken hunters will not be required to check their birds through the check stations have gathered adequate information needed to manage the species even though these specialists will be in the field during the two day hunt.

"Each hunter spent an average of 4.4 hours per each bird bagged last year, and only 447 birds were checked through all the check stations.

Dvorak said that the destroying of native grasslands has more to do with the reduction in the number of birds than any other factor. The expansion of good prairie chicken habitat is not predicted by department biologists and it is hoped that landowners will retain the few remaining acres of native grasslands left on the High Plains.

Most successful prairie chicken hunters use dogs to find downed birds and a well trained retriever could mean the difference between a full game bag and feathers.

These same successful hunters usually contact the landowner to get permission to hunt near the grain fields or water tanks in advance of the opening date.



of some 7.2 million 4-H youth between the ages of 9 and 19. More than 215,000 of these are Texans. Youth enrolled in the 4-H program in Gray County total 265, notes Barton.
